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## Ozona High Basketball Team Reunion

### Team Recognized and Presented Awards 46 Years After Season

Several months ago, when the announcement was made and students of Ozona were notified of the fourth-coming reunion to be held in July, Dr. Weaver of Houston wrote Judge Smith, suggesting a reunion of the 1915 Ozona High basketball team.

The 1915 team had been a unique one in a number of ways, it was the first basketball team, undefeated, and eight members of the team and the Coach still among the lists of those to attend Ozona's fourth coming.

Present at the business meeting and program for the 46th in the high school auditorium, saw five members of the team presented with gold basketball awards in lieu of awards not presented to the team in 1915.

Present for the giving of the awards were: Wayne West, Welton Bascom Cox, Ernest Dunlap and Hollis Weaver along with Houston Smith who presented the team with the awards.

During the 13th of July, still around were: Bill Friend who resides in Iowa, Ben Craig who lives in Houston, Ben Friend of Ft. Davis and Bland of Midland.

At the fall of 1914, the High School Principal, Houston Smith, had recently been in the University of Texas, thought it would be worthwhile to have a basketball team in Ozona, and he had a little training in the game, it was decided that a gym would be built and a team organized.

A good part of the fall was spent building the court which was of the present Junior High. It was hauled on a barrowed on to the site, and leveled. Rakes while a local blacksmith was hired to make the hoops total of cost of the project about \$13.00 but later when it was not paid since the school felt it was too expensive Smith wound up paying the cost of his own small salary.

**WHO IS THE "WHIPPING HORSE"?**

President Mohammed Ayub Kahn of Pakistan, the man for whom Mount Vernon was reactivated and official Washington thrown into a tizzy by the most Arabian Nightish state dinner in memory, made his pitch next day to a joint session of Congress. More accurately, it was his pitch and President Kennedy's in behalf of foreign aid.

And there are solons on Capitol Hill — in both the House and Senate — who reported it as the strongest support the President's multi-billion dollar proposal with its five-year back-door borrowing authorization has yet had.

President Ayub declared that US aid was a life-and-death matter to his country and to all newly-independent countries. Unless Pakistan was able to take care of its people, he said, it would become another Kremlin satellite within 15 to 20 years.

"It was a speech of great courage and great logic", declared the usually taciturn Speaker Sam Rayburn, while more bubbly members

thought the visitor had done a great selling job. Chairman J. W. Fulbright of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee expressed a more cautious opinion. "I suppose it will have some effect," he said, "but he represents only one of 60 or so countries involved."

In his address, President Ayub referred to foreign aid as "a real whipping horse" and advised that "you'd better not get tired of it."

But Congressmen are beginning to learn that large numbers of their constituents are getting tired of it, and consider that, after about \$84 billion worth of it, they are the "whipping horses". Post experience causes them to doubt that even this staggering largesse has purchased an appreciable devotion to Western ideals and viewpoints — which are frequently quite incomprehensible to the beneficiaries — to say nothing of loyalty or affection. And President Kennedy's new gimmick of borrowing from the Treasury back door and free from Congressional snooping, has been coolly received by disenchanted taxpayers.

And another aspect of foreign aid that the gentlemen of Congress might consider was brought up by President Ayub in his subsequent address to the National Press Club. Ardent as he is for aid to Pakistan, he views with alarm the consequences of such aid to India, which, he indicated, might employ it against his country.

Nevertheless, the Ayub speech was undoubtedly a shot in the arm to proponents of foreign aid and impressive to the waverers and the opposition, too. Furthermore, President Kennedy followed up the Ayub assist the very same day with a command White House meeting of members of the House Foreign Affairs Committee to push, it was reported, for his requested long term (up to 50 years), direct-from-the-treasury borrowing authority. And more such meetings are in prospect.

Thus the battle lines are tightening it is predicted that the foreign aid authorization bill will be passed. But there can be no White House victory until the appropriation bill is passed. Letters, wires and phone calls can still cut the handouts drastically — and defeat the iniquitous Treasury borrowing feature.

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
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### Front Sets County Wide Saturday

#### West Fall North; Sheffield Gets Five Sat. Morning

A persistent cold front pushed southwest Texas last Saturday bringing general rains to the Plateau region and about blanketing Crockett with measurements that from three quarters of an inch to near five inches near Sheffield.

Heavy rain with no wind and electrical activity dropped and three tenths of an inch of moisture in Ozona to bring totals in Ozona to slightly over three inches.

Southern and eastern parts of the county received the heaviest rain with measurements of two to three inches.

Weather continued all over most part of this week over the county and showers fell in many places this week but no widespread rain has since Saturday night in the

rain measurements picked by the Stockman during the week were as follows: R. A. 1 1/2 inch, Joe Bean, 1 1/2 inch, Clegg, 2 inch, Max Schneer, Jr., 7 inches, P. C. Perner, 2 1/2 to 2 inches west to east.

Though the rain carried the way to Fort Stockton at many ranches south and of Crockett county did not on the rainfall. Jerry Hayes Tom Powers reported no rain a number of other ranches in the area but all were out of the county.

Some of the ranches reporting rain fall in the northwest part of the county received the rain Sunday while others in the east part of the county shared about a half an inch of rain had not been previously reported in the paper.

The five inch rainfall in and around Sheffield was not widely

spreaded. B. B. Ingham, Jr., reported only an inch but stated that the rain got much heavier just beyond their south and west fences.

The threat of more rain this week seemed very promising as warm damp air from the Gulf kept moisture readings in the area at a very high 40 to 60 percent and a new northerner pushed south.

The July rains following the heavy general rains in June have turned summer pastures in Crockett County the greenest since before the drought and some ranchers believe since 1941.

### Notes From The County Agent's Office

Farmers are reminded by C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist, of their eligibility for a refund of the 4-cent per gallon Federal gasoline tax on that used for farming purposes. The claim should include all eligible gasoline gallonage purchased between July 1, 1960 and June 30, 1961.

The claim for refund should be filed on Form 2240 and not later than September 30, Bates said.

The gasoline on which a refund may be claimed covers that used for farming purposes and includes most normal production operations. Three exceptions, however, are noted by the specialist. They are gasoline used on the highway, even though for transporting farm products; that used for processing, packaging freezing or canning operations and that used for non-farming or personal purposes.

Records of fuel purchases should be kept to verify the refund request and care should be exercised to avoid inaccurate, or excessive claims, Bates said. He noted that Form 2240 does not apply to diesel and special motor fuel. Farmers who have questions regarding taxes on these fuels are advised to contact an Internal Revenue Service director. The county agent has on hand the forms for requesting the refund. They are available for the asking.

Texas farmers and ranchmen continue to show a real interest in the Great Plains Conservation Program, according to Assistant State Conservationist Homer A. Taff of the Soil Conservation Service. Under Taff's leadership, Texans have assumed a leading role in combating erosion hazards in the nation's "breadbasket". The program now operates in 86 West Texas counties compared to 271 counties in the 9 other Great Plains states.

In the fiscal year ending June 30, Texas Farmers and ranchmen developed 821 contracts providing for complete soil and water conservation treatment on more than 1,600,000 acres. Since the program began operations in 1957, 2,732 contracts covering 5,438,368 acres have been completed in the state.

Details of the Great Plains Conservation Program vary with local problems and needs, Taff pointed out. In each county, the program is developed and directed by a County Program Committee composed of state and federal agencies interested in agriculture. Complete information for your county can

be obtained by contacting the local work unit of the Soil Conservation Service or your county agent.

From The Stockman July 28, 1932

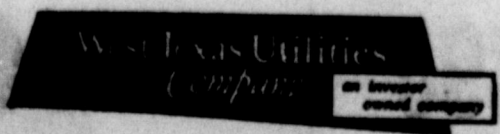

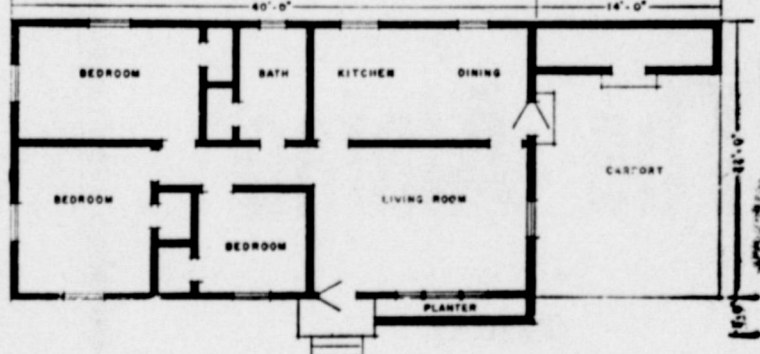
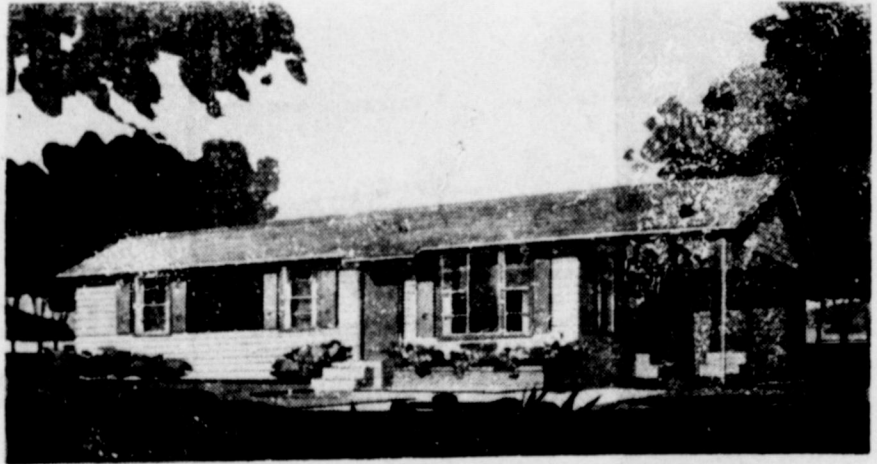
