Post Office Staff Asks Early Mailing

To Receive Mail Placed In Lob- buck Time

Floyd Hokit has asked the cooperation of Ozona residents in facilitating the mail during the Christmas season. "Mail early," Hokit urged, "to avoid congestion during the Christmas period, and especially during the last two weeks before New Year's."

Lion Cagers Post 3rd Straight Win With 55-39 Defeat Of Iraan Braves

The Ozona Lions posted their third win without a loss in Davidson Gym Tuesday night when they crushed the Iraan Braves 55 to 39 in a non-district tilt.

Coch Brooks Dazier had to call off the Lions early as they turned in a good first quarter to pull into a 14 to 3 lead and then increased their edge to 22 to 5 before reserves came into the lineup prior to the half.

Starting the third quarter the Lions quickly went far ahead, leading 42 to 16 when the second string took over to play most of the last two quarters.

In all, nine of the Lions got into the scoring act before the game was over with Carl Montgomery with 13 and Hal Long and Van Miller each with 10 leading the way.

Southland Royalty Completes Gasser In Field West of Ozona

Southland Royalty Co. Completed as a S-rain lime dry gas discovery its No. 1-A University, one section north of the discovery of the two-well Ozona, West (Clearfork oil) field of Crockett County, 14 miles northwest of Ozona.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 5.4 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations between 8,246 - 267 feet in 4 1/2-inch casing set at 9,440 feet.

A failure in the Ellenburger, it was drilled to 8,900 feet and plugged back to 8,408 feet.

The following tops were picked on derrick floor elevation of 2,362 feet: Strawn, 8,228 feet; Simpson, 8,355 feet; and Ellenburger, 8,636 feet.

A new Christmas and New Year greeting in lights was taking form in the Ozona city park this week as Huey Ingram, West Texas Utilities Co. service man, volunteered his services to make and erect for the county two permanent type electric signs which proclaim "Merry Christmas" on the south side of the park and "Happy New Year" on the north side.

The red lighted holiday greeting cards are constructed on steel framework, the iron posts of which are set in pre-sunk pipe holders set in concrete at ground level in the park. After each holiday season the decorations can be taken down and stored until the next year.

Mr. Ingram, who volunteered his services in designing, constructing and wiring the electrical display, was commissioned by the county Commissioners Court, the county to foot the bill for materials.

Mr. Ingram hopes to have the signs ready for lighting by early next week.

Condition Of Mrs. A. Hoover Critical In Wichita Falls

Ozona Woman Hurt In Pickup-Auto Crash Friday Morning

Mrs. Armond Hoover, Sr., of Ozona is in critical condition in the Wichita Falls General Hospital suffering from double skull fracture, a punctured lung and lacerated kidney suffered in an automobile accident 14 miles the other side of Wichita Falls shortly before noon Friday.

Mrs. Hoover was alone in her car, returning to Ozona after visiting a sister who lives near Wichita Falls. She was on a farm to market road and a pickup truck, entering the FM road from a side road struck Mrs. Hoover's car in the center of its side, throwing Mrs. Hoover out of her car.

Mrs. Hoover's body came to rest on her back on the pavement and gasoline leaking from her wrecked car gathered under her, causing severe skin burns on her back, adding to the complications of her treatment and to her discomfort. The head injury, fractures of the skull on each side above the ears, has left her in such critical condition that treatment of her other and also very serious injuries has been difficult. One of the doctors attending her is the husband of one of her nieces who lives in Wichita Falls.

That the pickup must have been traveling at a terrific rate is indicated by the fact that the Hoover car was bent almost to a U shape, according to information received by family and friends here. Mr. Hoover and their son, Armond Hoover, Jr., flew to Wichita Falls by the Dick Henderson plane upon learning of the accident Friday noon, and remain at her bedside. Mrs. Hoover is in Room 546, Wichita Falls General Hospital, Wichita Falls, Texas.

A man, driver of the pickup, and his wife were uninjured.

Where We Need An Insecticide Most

We seem to remember that just after the infamous — and still pending — Korean truce at Panmunjom, there was wide and heated discussion of the failure or inability of our officers to indoctrinate our soldiers on the nature of Communism and what they were fighting for. Lack of this vital morale factor was credited for the shocking detection of American boys to Mao's banner — and their failure in some instances to uphold the brightest traditions of American fighting men.

In the light of this tragic experience, the public uproar that resulted and the obvious need of our soldiers for such conditioning in these days of even greater ideological confusion, the fate of Major General Edwin Walker on the most critical of our cold war fronts grows more fantastic as we think of it. A dedicated soldier of 30 years service, devoted to his men, a leader whose gallantry in action is a matter of record, General Walker was summarily removed from division command in West Germany for his efforts to provide what it takes to win — in a battle of nerves or of bullets.

Eligible for retirement, General Walker has chosen to resign, to forfeit well-earned income of \$12,000 a year or more in order

Notes From The County Agent's Office

With Texas cattle and calves at 9.4 million head on farms and ranches last year, the forecasts indicate another rise expected for this year placing the January 1, 1962 count at somewhere close to 9.9 million head. The all-time high record count of 9.8 million head of cattle and calves for Texas was registered in 1891. The 1959 Census of Agriculture showed the three leading counties in Texas in cattle numbers as Harris, 105,230; Kleberg, 95,211; and Wharton, 85,059.

There is a safe and practical way to handle the leaves which are now falling and cluttering lawns. Why smoke up the neighborhood and create a fire hazard by burning the leaves? asks W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist, when a compost pile will solve the problem.

Making a compost pile is a simple operation, explains Bennett. Scrap lumber or a few feet of net wire and four posts are the only materials needed. Start with a six inch layer of leaves and for every four square feet of enclosure, sprinkle one-half cup of commercial fertilizer, such as 8-8-8, over the layer of leaves.

After the fertilizers is added, apply a 1/2 to 1 inch layer of soil then continue adding layers of leaves and soil until the pile reaches the desired height. Bennett explains that the top layer should be left somewhat saucer-shaped so it will hold water. In three to four months, the leaves will decompose and become excellent materials for use next summer to increase the organic matter in flower or vegetable garden soils or as mulch for flowers, shrubs or vegetables.

Heavy accumulations of leaves left on the lawn, Bennett points out, can damage the grass especially when they are wet. They may also be responsible for more disease problems. Leaves should be removed and the extra time required to put them in a compost pile will return big dividends, concludes the chemist.

The convention theme was "Homes Create Community Strength Through Effective Learning." This was developed by pupils of the Houston public schools and stressed throughout the session. The Houston schools also presented a pageant, "Tales of Texas—Fact and Fiction," involving 3,000 students.

Mrs. Robert Frost at Knoxville, Tennessee, chairman of Juvenile Protection of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, presented the national organization. In her address to the conven-

tion, she stressed the importance of the local unit of P.T.A. and reminded the membership that it is "later than ever," and it takes interest, determination and hard work to make schools better for youth.

Dr. Andrew Holt, president of the University of Tennessee, spoke on the topic "Caleb Plows New Ground." He said "Too many of us are willing to plow the fallowed soil — or take the easy way out in rearing children. All of us have high ambitions for our children, but too few of us are willing to plow the new ground necessary for us to realize them."

Afternoon meetings were group conferences held in the hotel banquet rooms. Special features included a tea, a life membership breakfast, council and past district presidents luncheons and special music.

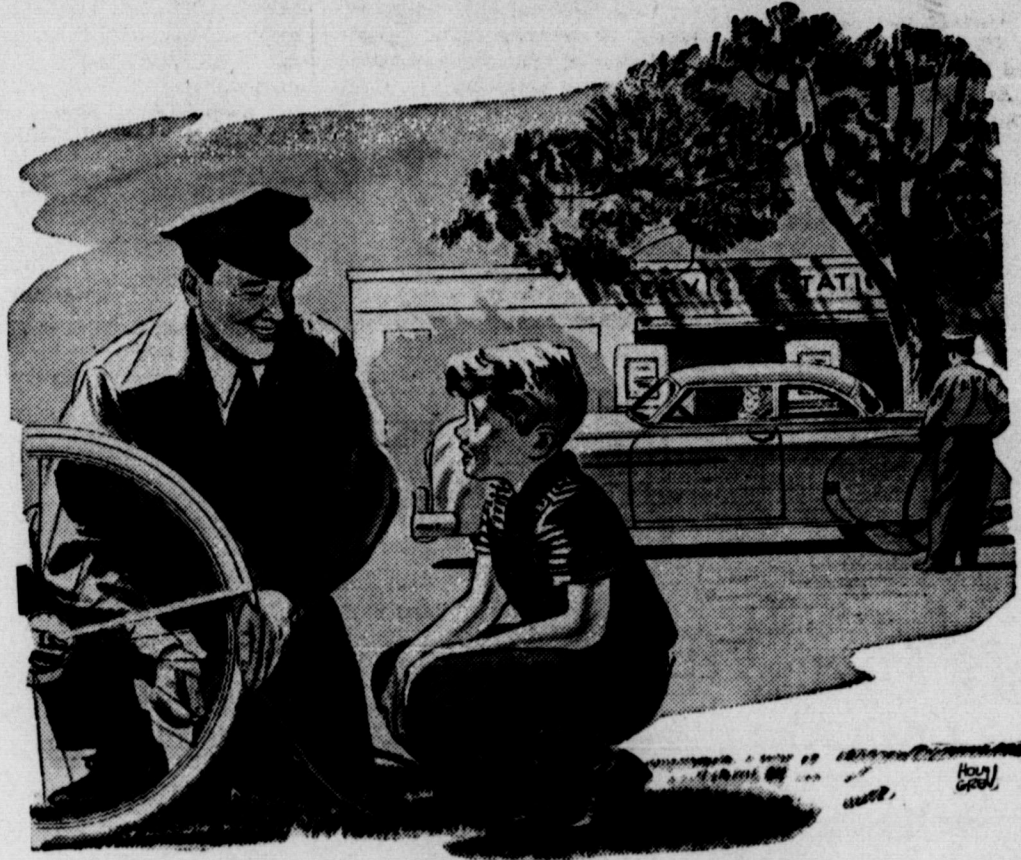
