## Screwworm Fund Campaign In Texas Gains Momentum

157 Counties At Work; Crockett Total Now Tops \$32,000

The Southwest Animal Health Foundation's drive to raise \$3 million to combat the screwworm menace in Texas is going great guns, reports C. G. Scruggs, acting president. By December 7, 157 counties had organized committees and the number is increasing almost daily.

With county agents and vocational agriculture teachers conducting educational meetings throughout the state, it is difficult to keep pace with the rapid developments, Scruggs said.

He emphasized that all funds contributed to the Foundation would be used exclusively for the screwworm control program. Activities of the non-profit foundation, Scruggs pointed out, are governed by a board of trustees. With the recent addition of 5 prominent Texans, its membership now stands at 10. The new trustees are Alvie L. Cole, Sterling City; W. E. Crenshaw; Weslaco; Dr. G. Kendrick, Marlin; Claude K. McCann, Victoria, and T. J. Richards, Paducah.

Scruggs said that five remaining vacancies will be filled in the near future, bringing the governing body to its authorized strength of 15 members. Initial board members include Dolph Briscoe, Jr., Uvalde; T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Ozona; C. H. Devaney, Coahoma and Marvin Bridges, Buffalo.

Crockett county took an early lead in the fund raising drive and still holds the record for the total subscribed and for speed of accomplishment. This county's pattern of organization has been followed by many other counties in the state.

Latest reports from the Crockett county soliciting committee, headed by Wayne W. West as chairman, and Joe Tom Davidson as co-chairman, show the screwworm fund collection in this county now standing at \$32,657.20. Recent contributors whose names had not been previously published are Gene Williams Roy Henderson, Field Bros., James and Nancy Hunt John and Tom Mitchell, George Montgomery and Cleophas Cooke.

## Hal Long Dumps In 34 Points For New School Record

Lions Trample Bronte 68-30 and Iraan 64-37 In Week's Play

The Ozona Lions picked up two easy wins over the week to extend their season record to 7 wins and 2 losses as they trampled a poor Bronte team 68 to 30 despite a cold night shooting and then rode the hot shooting of Hal Long, to a 63 to 37 win over the Iraan Braves in Iraan.

Nine of Coach Brooks Dozier's cagers got into the scoring against the inept Bronte crew with Gary Studdard with 12 and Hal Long and Billy Cornelius with 10 points each leading the attack.

The Lions, who had some trouble finding the range, led 11 to 3 at the first quarter, extended that to 31 to 11 at the half and then reserves hit for 14 and 23 points in the last two quarters to easily outclass the visitors. Tommy Boecking hit for 22 points for the visitors but most of the points came late in the contest long after the issue had been decided.

In a freshman vs B team game the Bronte B team managed to squeak by the Ozona freshmen 39 to 38 in a game that saw Sammy Cervantez score 15 points for Ozona.

The Lions traveled to Iraan for three games Tuesday night with the varsity taking a 64 to 37 win over the Braves as Hal Long hit for 34 points, believed to be a new school record.

Van Miller, Carl Montgomery and Phil Carnes swept the boards and played strong defensive games as the Lions built a quick 10 to 0 lead, saw it sag to 10 to 7 and then pulled away sharply with a 26 points third quarter before reserves took over for the final period.

Eight of the Lions broke into the scoring column with few of the regulars except Long playing more than half of the middle quarters and none at all in the final eight minutes.

Coach H. O. Hoover's rapidly improving Ozona B team lost a one point decision to Mason High school's varsity in the consolation finals in Rocksprings Saturday as two free throws in the final seconds proved decisive.

Trailing by one point 37 to 38 Ozona fouled and on the one and one rule the Cowpunchers picked up both points just before Robert Cox hit a field goal to pull the Lion reserves back within one point of the lead.

Leroy Cooper, smooth little Ozona guard, was chosen on the all tourney team, reflecting the Ozona reserves' play in the tourney.

The Ozona reserves lost their opening round game to the eventual tourney winner, Asherton, 42 to 37 as Manuel Lozano poured in 20 point for the winners.

Ozona's attack was led by Robert Cox, who had 11, followed by Cooper with 8. The B team lost at least two points when the score keepers failed to record two Ozona free throws early in the game.

In the second round the Ozona reserves crushed the Uvalde reserves 40 to 20 as Robert Cox and Brent Moore led the Ozona attack with 14 and 11 points.

## 3 Men Burned In Gas Explosion At Well Near Ozona

Andrews Man Critical After Accident At Baggett Well

Three men were burned, one critically, Tuesday afternoon in a gas explosion at a well being spudded in on the Early Baggett ranch south of Ozona.

Thomas Davis, about 40, of Andrews, tool pusher for the Forest Blackstock Drilling Co. of Midland, is in critical condition in the Crockett County Hospital suffering from severe burns over most of his body. W. B. Whitley and J. C. King, both recently moved to Ozona are also under treatment in the local hospital for burns suffered in the well accident.

The new well on the Baggett ranch is to be drilled with gas from nearby gas wells and in some manner gas at the well site was ignited, burning the three men. Other details of the accident were not available.

## Midland Operators To Drill Shallow Test On Davidson East of Ozona

William G. Wright and W. D. Thorn, Midland, will drill the No. 1 C. E. Davidson, Jr., a 1,200-foot cable tool wildcat in Crockett County, five miles east of Ozona and 3 1/2 miles east of the Ozona-East (Ellenburger) field.

Location is 1,650 feet from the west and 330 feet from the south lines of 69-GH-GC&SF.

## Cities Service To Build Gas Plant In Northern Crockett

50,000 Gallons Liquid Daily From 15 Million Cf Gas Processed

Cities Service Petroleum Company will build and operate a gas products plant in Crockett county, Texas, to process gas utilized in the West World and Ranch Strawn pressure maintenance units. It will recover as separate products, approximately 50,000 gallons daily of propane, butane and natural gasoline.

In making the announcement, Fred H. Ramsey, Jr., of Bartlesville, Okla., manager of Cities Service's gasoline division, announced that the plant will be jointly owned by several interests in the two field units.

To be located about 20 miles northwest of Ozona the plant has been designed to process 15 million cubic feet of gas daily.

The low temperature absorption process will be utilized and basic equipment, other than processing columns, will be skid mounted and shop fabricated. This will enable Hudson Engineering Corp., the contractor, to have plant ready for initial operation in May of next year.

It's the time for Christmas greetings and for all the wonderful people we know and love we do with all our hearts wish them all the happiness possible at this great Christmas festival time.

Spontaneous, joyous and optimistic as we would like to have our greetings this year, we, like a gifted writer named Bob Taylor who writes for a service that reaches this desk, and who lives at McLean, Va. ("12 miles from the White House), "we find it difficult to keep up with the news and be joyful too."

"Whether we think of Katanga or of Cuba or of Berlin or Moscow or Santo Domingo — or for that matter, of Washington — we are inescapably reminded of that bitter verse from Kipling's "Christmas in India" written in 1886.

"Call a truce, then, to our labors — let us feast with friends and neighbors.

And be merry as the custom of our caste;

For if 'faint and forced the laughter'

**What Color Neutral India?**

Nehru the "peacemaker," Nehru the "neutral," Nehru the symbol of "non violence" has now emerged in his true colors — mostly red — in the seizure by force, despite the pleas of the United Nations, of the three Portuguese enclaves on the coast of India, which had lived in peace under its affiliation with Portugal for more than four centuries.

And, to justify this naked aggression, the pious Nehru declares that "the swift collapse" of the tiny territories proves the attack was "right." And that monstrous fester on American soil, the United Nations, equally piously declares that "since India has already in fact accomplished the seizure of the Portuguese territories, that there would now be no point in any U. N. action." You dear reader, may make your own comment on that.

The sudden and unprovoked, and in fact, unjustified attack, bore out the prediction of an attack by

and if sadness follows after  
We are richer by one mocking Christmas past."

In much the same spirit, but more determined, perhaps, to put a bright face on things, Walter Scott had written several decades earlier:

"Heep on morewood! The wind is chill

But let it whistle as it will,

We'll keep our Christmas merry still."

We definitely intend to follow this advice — and hope our friends and fellow Americans everywhere will do the same. And certainly all who can ((and that will be most of us) will seek to recapture through our children and our children's children the eternal meaning of Christ's Birthday. And may we succeed, as heretofore, in re-entering for a little time that simple world of belief and confidence and mutual understanding that belongs exclusively to the sprigs — yet in which they welcome all who seek admission humbly.

In other words, A MERRY CHRISTMAS!

India made in a December 6 press briefing of Dr. Franco Nogueira, Portuguese Minister of Foreign Affairs, in which he viewed with alarm the then concentration of Indian troops along the borders and warships off the coast, plus the increasing demands of the Indian press for military action to drive the Portuguese out of their ancient enclaves.

Dr. Nogueira had earlier ridiculed the 15-year-old Indian claim of "colonial rule." Goa, officially named "Portuguese State of India," is not a colony, he said, and has never been a colony in its 451 years under the Portuguese flag "Goa... is probably the most successful achievement of Portuguese policy overseas — a multi-racial and pluricultural policy of intermingling cultures and races on a footing of perfect equality, with the same rights and opportunities for all... It is not a colony; it is a territory perfectly integrated within the Portuguese nation, with

exactly the same status as that of any other territory... All the inhabitants of Goa enjoy full political and social rights. Since 1922 they have elected their representatives to the National Parliament. India's only excuse for claiming Goa, declared Dr. Nogueira, is that it is "geographically contiguous." If this constituted the right of annexation, he said, "Canada could claim Alaska; France could claim Monaco, and Italy could claim the Republic of San Marino."

But, the way the world wags, all this could come to pass. With the UN strafing the bow-and-arrow troops of Katanga — with our help — to destroy this small nation rather than permit that "self-determination" it has talked so much about, anything can happen.

Mrs. Eldred Roach, who suffered a heart attack near Fredericksburg recently and who has been under

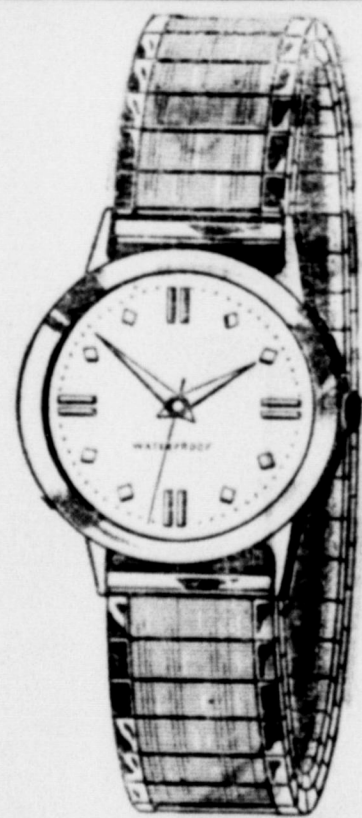

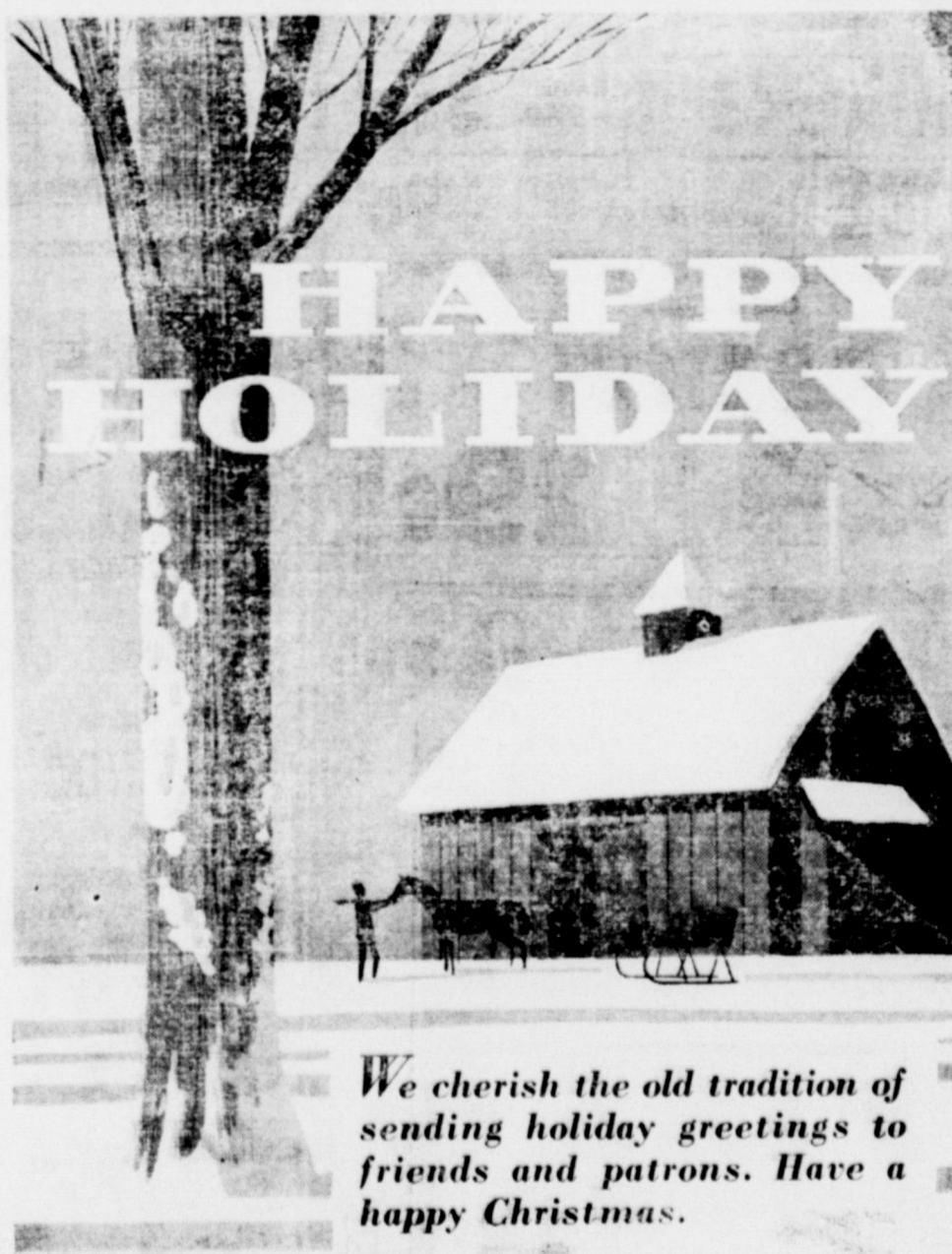
