## Crockett Ground Water Resources Survey Under Way

Five-Year Project Is  
Joint Venture Of  
County & State

Walter Carter, Chairman of the Crockett County Ground Water Commission, announced today that work has begun on an investigation of ground-water conditions in Crockett County. The work will be performed by the Crockett County Ground Water Commission in cooperation with the State Water Commission.

Objectives of the study are to determine: (1) the extent of water resources and the availability of ground water in Crockett County; (2) the direction of water movement and if the rate of movement; (3) the chemical quality of the water and reasons for any changes in the quality, including the movement of poor-quality water; (4) the areas of over-water recharge and discharge; (5) changes in water quality and the quality of the water over a period of time.

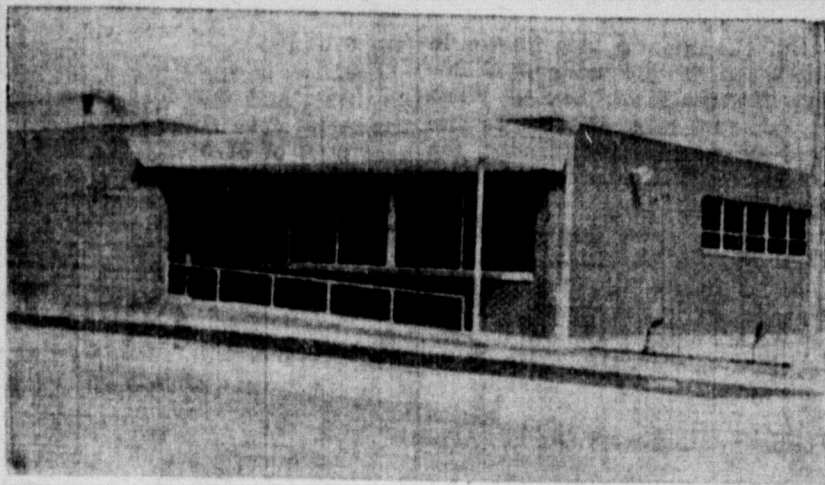
Work on ground-water conditions in Crockett County will be completed by the Commission after a study is completed in 1964. Copies of the report will be available to the public. The Chairman of the Commission is presently compiling geologic data at the University of Texas at Austin that will show the water-bearing formations and provide a basis for field work. Maps, electric logs and other information will also be collected from sources in Austin, Midland and San Angelo. One to two miles will be required to collect materials before actual field work begins. A field office will be established at Ozona. Information available here is that geologists, geologist, Ground Water Division, Texas Board of Engineers, will establish their office in Ozona about May 1 to begin survey project.

You may have the same box number but you will have a new combination and you will need to call Friday morning for your new combination.

Patrons are asked to pick up their mail from the old postoffice by 4:30 to day in order that a minimum of mail need be moved to the new office. When your new box number is known, postal authorities request that you have mail addressed to box number in the future. No mail will be handed out of boxes, the postmaster said. If someone picks up your mail for you they will have to know the combination to your box.

## Dr. McIntire, Former Ozona Physician, Dies; Funeral Friday At 3

Dr. Floyd T. McIntire, one of the nation's outstanding physicians, who started his medical practice in Ozona in the early thirties, died Wednesday afternoon in Shannon Hospital in San Angelo. He had been hospitalized since March 12 and had been in declining health the past three years.

Dr. McIntire practiced medicine here about four years before moving to San Angelo to join the San Angelo Medical and Surgical Clinic.

Funeral services are scheduled for 3 p. m. Friday at First Methodist Church in San Angelo with burial to follow in Fairmont Cemetery. Surviving are the widow; one daughter, Mrs. Harold Joyce Abernathy of Dallas; one brother, Charles S. McIntire of Perham, Maine; and one sister, Mrs. Alanzo Fluellen of Crouseville, Maine.

## End First Year Finds 4 Crockett Operators In Great Plains Plan

The Great Plains Conservation Program is beginning its second year of operation in Crockett County, according to James Glynn, local Work Unit Conservator.

During the first year of operation the local Soil Conservation Service has received four applications for assistance covering 48,207 acres of land in Crockett County. A total of \$51,676.00 has been obligated and set aside for assisting the Great Plains Conservation producers in carrying out their conservation plans.

Glynn stated that cost share payments under the program range from 50 percent to 80 percent of the cost of applying conservation practices.

## Eldorado Eagles Favored To Win Dist. Track Title

Ozona Stadium To Be  
Scene Of District  
Meet Saturday

The Eldorado Eagles will be favored to capture the district 8-A track title in Ozona Saturday with a well balanced fight in prospect for the second, third and fourth spots.

The Sonora Broncos, with good strength in the distance runs and relays, will be expected to give Eldorado its closest competition with Junction and Ozona being given only an outside chance to cop the title.

Coaches Chick Womack and Sonny Cleere will be counting on top performances from its entries in the field and hurdles to garner most of its points with seniors Carl Montgomery, Phil Carnes, and Van Miller carrying a large share of the load.

Sonora, Junction and Ozona will be depending on a split of points between the squads to give them their best shot at the high flying Eagles from Eldorado and the recent increases in size and performance of the Big Lake squad has given additional hope to the challengers.

Eldorado has a fine group of sprinters but cannot win either the 100 yard dash or the 220 unless something happens to Big Lake's Mike Holmes and in addition the Owls have come up with increased strength in the 440 relay and in the mile along with some strength in the shot and discus which could help or hurt the Eagles.

Sonora seems to be a strong favorite in the mile and the mile relay along with the half mile and in addition can place high in the 440 relay and the 440 yard run. The Broncos have questionable strength in the field events, however, and this could prove their (Continued on Page Three)

## Area Disturbance Is Good For .6 Inch Of Rain Here Wednesday

The prettiest sight in months was the consensus of opinion among Ozonans Wednesday afternoon as they watched the rain fall in promising quantity, the most since early last fall.

The winter's freakish weather has continued into Spring, with cold nights, sometimes cloudy sometimes clear days, but always dry except for sometimes teasing mist.

But yesterday afternoon everything got just right for a "weather-maker" and a lusty shower which brought .6 of an inch of moisture to Ozona resulted. The disturbance seemed widespread and hopes were high here that the moisture covered a wide swath of country. Additional thunderstorm activity in the early evening added another shower to bring the local total to .75 of an inch.

## Phone Campaign To Push Clean-Up Drive Next Week

Committees from the Ozona Woman's Club, the Woman's Forum, the Ozona Garden Club will launch a telephone campaign next week, calling every home in the city with a telephone, to urge full cooperation in the annual clean-up campaign which is scheduled to get under way here next Monday.

Next week, April 9-14, is clean-up week and every household in the city is urged to cooperate in gathering, stacking, sacking or boxing all accumulated trash on their premises, to see that vacant lots and alleyways are cleaned and that business owners see to tidying up around their places of business.

The following week, April 16-21, will be pick-up week when trucks of the city sanitary service, operated under supervision of the Water Control District, will be in service for free hauling of trash properly prepared in the clean-up week. All trash that is boxed or sacked to permit handling without shoveling will be hauled off free by the trucks. No trash that has to be shoveled to be loaded will be picked up.

Mrs. Armando Reina, president of the South Elementary P.T.A. will head a committee from her organization in conducting the notification campaign in the Latin-American sector and Mrs. Edna Fielder, president of the Lockett School P. T. A., will head a committee from her organization in urging citizen cooperation in that area.

Members of Boy Scout Troop 163, sponsored by the Community Center, has assumed the chore of cleaning up on both sides of the highway from the South Swimming Pool to the cemetery. The boys have already begun their clean-up job under the direction of Scoutmaster Carlos Lopez.

The Student Council of Ozona High School has launched an anti-litterbug campaign around the schools as its contribution to the clean-up campaign. Students are being urged to cultivate habits of neatness in their homes and in school.

Sponsors of the annual clean up point out that next week is the time to gather trash and place it in a convenient location for pick-up by the trucks. The trucks will make the rounds the following week and it will be too late to clean up then, since the trucks will make only one round of any particular area during the week.

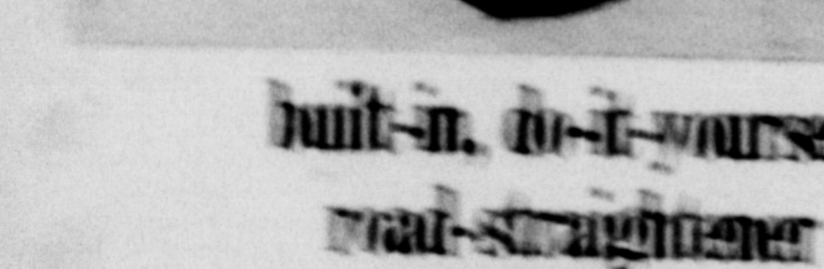

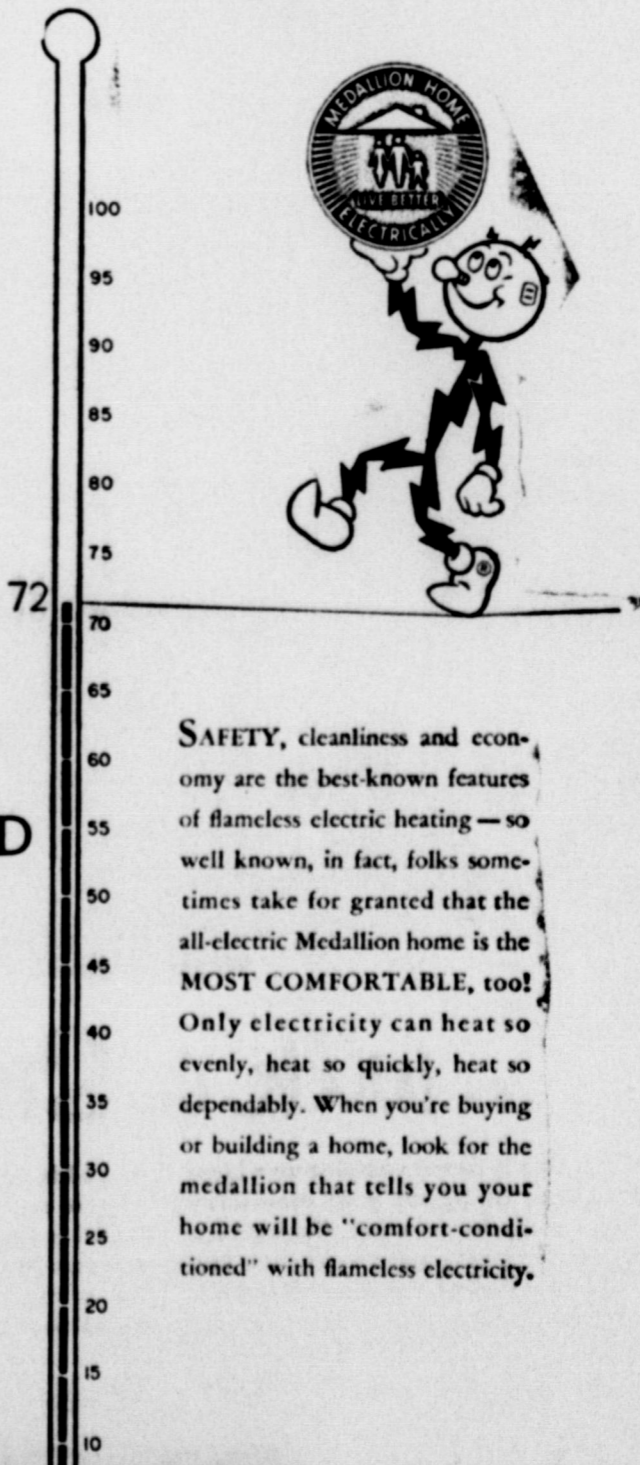

**Notes From The County Agent's Office**

Edwin H. Cooper, specialist in wildlife conservation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M College sends along this note on the screwworm eradication program now in progress in Texas. A major wildlife pest will have been removed if the current screwworm eradication program is successful. Screwworms infest deer, javelins, antelope and other wildlife species. Infestations occur when an animal's skin is

broken by wire fence cuts, cuts from sticks and other sharp objects, bullet wounds, encounters with teeth or antlers during fights and other common accidents.

Screwworm eradication will, however, pose a management problem in some areas where, as a result of overgrazed ranges, inadequate harvesting and other factors, deer numbers are excessive. The eradication of screwworms thus could multiply deer numbers where reductions are needed instead.

Death to deer or other wildlife by screwworm attack is not pleasant to contemplate and most wildlife authorities of heartened by the possibility of screwworm era-

dication. The problem in deer management created by removal of natural mortality factor must be solved by human action. The solution required in the deer areas is a more realistic approach to harvesting. Efficient deer investing in problem areas means harvest of both sexes of deer.

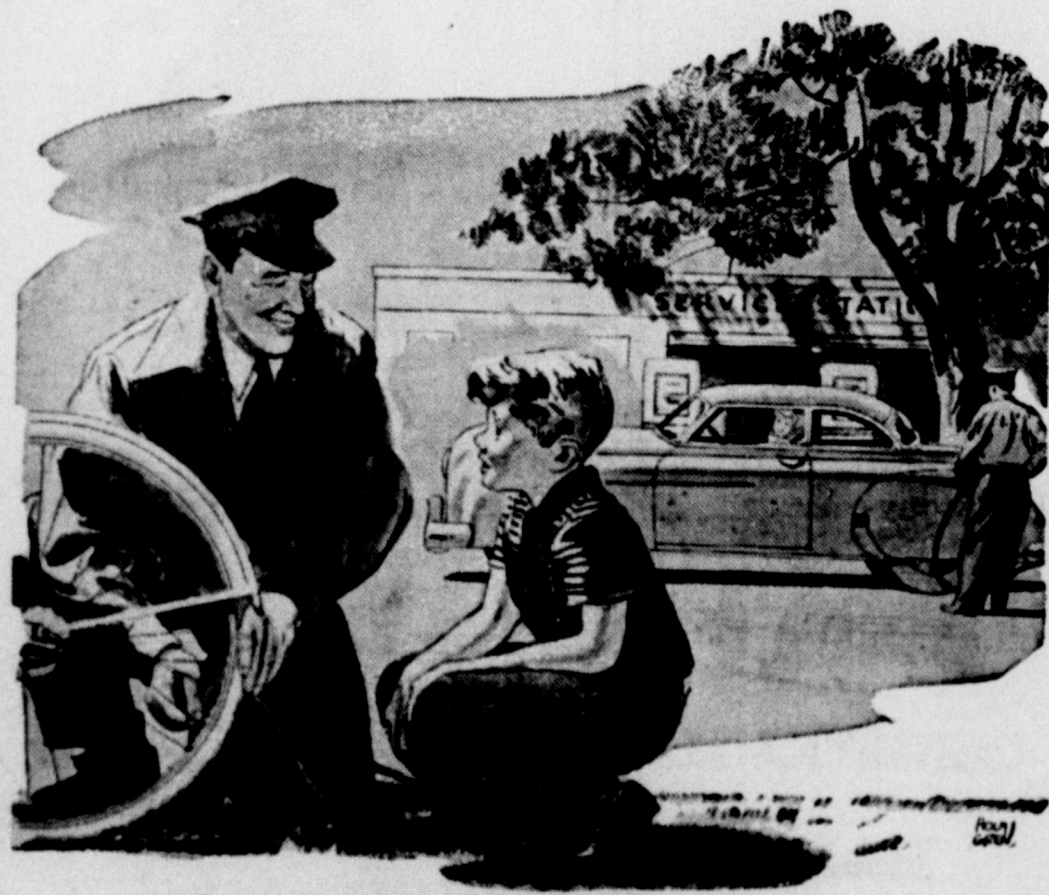

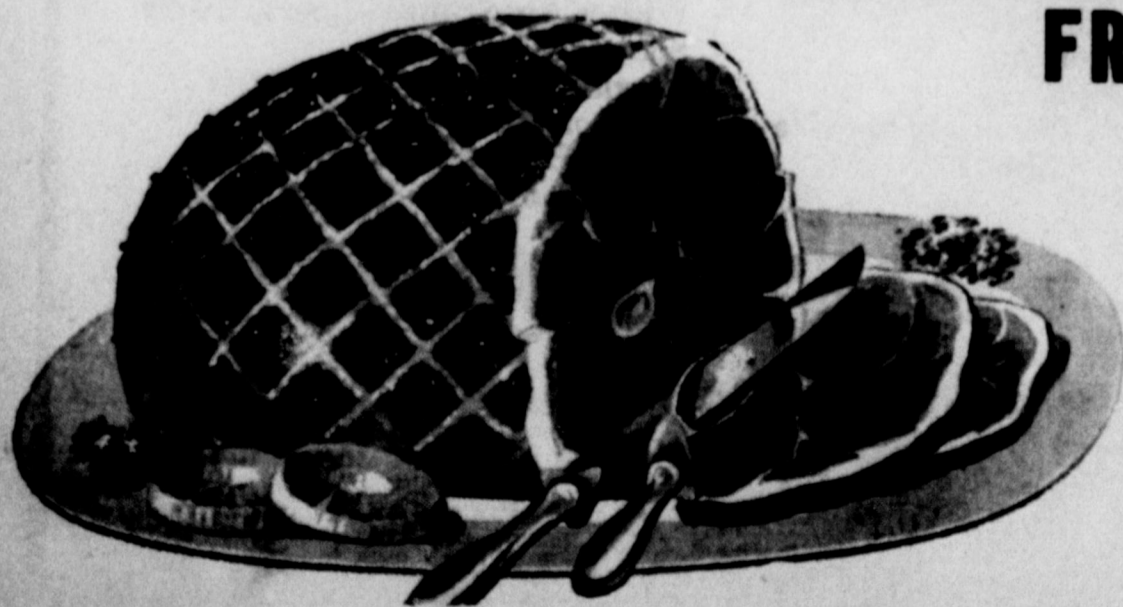
