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## Ozons Gets .84 Rain In Town Shower Result Of Week's Turbulence

A system of turbulent weather which produced some hail, high winds, and reports of a tornado being sighted south of Big Lake poured .84 inch of rain on Ozona last Thursday night.

The rain missed large areas of Crockett County, particularly to the west but the Thursday rainfall combined with heavy thunderstorms which it south and southeast of Ozona Friday night left from near one to over two inches on many thousands of acres of parched rangeland.

For Ozona proper, the rain followed .42 of an inch of moisture which fell Monday and gave Ozona a total of over an inch for the week.

Some areas to the north and northwest received additional moisture over the weekend as the Big Lake area received big rains which did not extend this far south.

A trace of rain fell in Ozona Tuesday morning with a good shower reported to have fallen several miles north and northeast of Ozona.

The Thursday rain ended one of the driest Mays in record in Ozona as the month had a perfect record, no moisture at all, until the final few days.

For the past several years June has been one of the wet months of the year and current weather conditions continue to give hope that June will produce some badly needed rains in Crockett County.

## Jones, Sutton, Halydier Named In Record Run-Off Vote



A record turnout of Crockett County voters for a second primary swept two new County Commissioners and a County Judge into office last Saturday in three airtight races, one of them not decided until the final box was counted.

Voters picked Brock Jones, ranchman, insurance and real estate dealer, as Demo nominee for the county judge's post and named Rex Halydier County Commissioner for Precinct 2 and unseated Commissioner Jake Young in Precinct 4 with contender Glenn Sutton, Ozona filling station operator.

A total of 1080 votes were cast in the Saturday voting as compared to 1177 cast in the May primary. Paid poll taxes and registered exemptions totalling 1203 were shown on the voting list, leaving less than 100 difference in the number of votes cast in the two primaries despite the reduced number of candidates involved.

Closest election of the day came in the run-off between Rex Halydier, Ozona newspaper distributor,

and Richard Flowers, a Crockett County rancher. With only the Powell field box out, Flowers led by a narrow 100 to 107 count but the 15 to 6 win for Halydier in the Powell box, the last to report, tipped the scales in Halydier's favor 115 to 113.

The county judge's race also provided to be very close as only 8 votes divided Troy Williams and Brock Jones in the day's balloting. Jones held a 33 vote margin in the absentee voting to extend his lead to 41 and win a 554 to 513 victory.

Jones will replace Ralph Jones who was appointed to the office following the death of Houston Smith, and become the fifth judge in Crockett County's history, the fourth elected judge.

Still another close race developed in Precinct four where Glenn Sutton, who had trailed Jake Young by six votes in the first primary, came from behind to win in the final 137 to 120.

Young led Sutton 130 to 129 in the absentee voting but Sutton picked up 108 votes to Young's 90 in the Saturday voting.

Results of the balloting this year, presuming that Democratic nomination is tantamount to election next November, the Crockett County Commissioners Court will meet next January with only two veteran members still in their seats. C. O. Walker, who won nomination in the first primary in Precinct 1 after having held the post in Precinct 2 for several years, and Rusty Smith, the Precinct 3 representative who was not up for election this year.

In the state races, Crockett voters picked John Connally over Don Yarborough 504 to 481 in the only state race that proved to be very close in this county.

Connally won the democratic nomination in the state race with a margin of something less than 26,000 votes, a margin less than that he amassed in Dallas county alone.

In other races Preston Smith carried the County and state to win the democratic nomination for Lt. Governor over James Turman. The vote count in Crockett County was 640 to 345. The Smith win was something of an upset since Turman led the state by a rather sizable margin in the first primary.

Waggoner Carr led in the first primary and did so again in the second primary as he carried Crockett County 661 to 309 over Tom Reavley and carried the state by over 100,000 votes.

In the battle for Congressman-at-large Crockett County, picked its only loser, going for Woodrow Wilson Bean 590 to 369 for Joe Pool. Pool was the winner statewide.

Ozona Junior Rodeo Hands Do Well In Del Rio's Annual Event

Seven Ozona Rodeo contestants, boys and girls scored heavily in the Del Rio Junior Rodeo held Friday and Saturday in Del Rio.

All three of the Ozona girl entries managed to get into the prize money with Pam Perner taking first in the barrel racing, Mary Ann Pitts winning average in both the pole bending and barrel racing for juniors and Nancy Friend winning third place in pole bending and fourth in barrel racing.

Among the boys, Carey Pitts took second place in bull riding and third in ribbon roping. Carey had first in the bull riding until the final rider beat him.

Frank Childress took second place in the ribbon roping to also finish among the winners.

Jay Miller and Paul Perner failed to finish among the winners.

## Welding Award Is Won By Ozonan In FFA Competition

### Tommy Everett Declared Winner At District FFA Convention

Tommy Everett, Ozona FFA student for the past four years and a 1962 graduate of Ozona High School, won the Forney Electric and Oxyacetylene Welding Scholarship for the coming year, it was announced at the Area II FFA Convention in San Angelo last Friday.

The scholarship from the Forney Foundation at Ft. Collins, Colorado, is presented each year to the outstanding student in welding in the vocational agriculture program.

Ozona took a second honor when Moe Barbee's record books were judged best in the area. Moe received a plaque, and \$10.00 for his first year Agriculture set of records and the books will mailed to the state office for consideration along with winners in other districts over the state.

Keith Mitchell, speaking on the topic "Range Management," took second place in the public speaking contest. In public speaking only first place winners advance to the state finals.

Area II includes some 80 schools who offered vocational agriculture last year. In being awarded the Forney Scholarship, Everett was chosen top boy in arc welding, brazing, cutting steel, and several other phases of ranch and farm.

## Friend Gas Area Extended By Two New Completions

### Re-Entry on Friend Ranch, Kincaid Estate Tests Flow

The Ozona, East multipay field of Crockett County, 1 1/2 miles southeast of Ozona gained extensions with completion of two projects by Delta Drilling Co., Odessa, formerly Delta and Paulcy Petroleum Inc.

The No. 1 Friend, 1/4-mile southwest of the firm's No. 1-A Friend, dual Canyon and Ellenburger opener and lone producer, was finished from the Canyon for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.1 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-oil ratio of 16,800-1. Gravity of the liquid was 71.6 degrees.

Production was through perforations between 6,345-363 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing set at 3,484 feet, on total depth of 8,485 feet.

A re-entry operation, it originally was drilled by Delta et al, and abandoned Aug. 8, 1961, at 8,485 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the east and 760 feet from the south lines of I-OP-GC&SF.

**We Must Have His Way**

"The President," reported Senator Hubert Humphrey to newsmen after a recent visit to the White House, "has the bit in his mouth (we assume he meant 'teeth') on medical aid for the aged . . . He was kindly and soft-hearted in the steel dispute as compared with his feelings on medicare."

Well-known before this bulletin was the flat rejection by Mr. Kennedy of any consideration of a health plan for oldsters outside of the compulsion of the Social Security system. Thus, it might be well to consider, before it is too late to protest and before our lawmakers commit us irrevocably, why, if the intentions are so benevolent, the proffered services so complete and the cost so trifling, medicare cannot be offered on a voluntary basis.

Is it because nine million Americans already over 65 — and millions more who are approaching that age — already have the sort of health insurance they want, and do not want Federalized care?

Is it because the would-be beneficiaries are shocked by their discovery of the additional costs of medicare — \$10 a day for the first nine days of hospitalization, payment by the patient of the first \$20 of the cost of outpatient hospital diagnosis, payment by the patient of his own doctor or surgeon and purchase of drugs used outside of hospital or nursing home?

Or is it because the whole So-

cial Security adventure has been so fiscally disastrous (\$600 million in the hole last year) that something new must be found to save it, a glossy gimmick that will boost the spiralling SS tax farther and faster — to an estimated \$507 a year per Social Security number by 1968?

Once Medicare is established, if the Congress is heedless enough or weak enough to pass it, voluntary health and hospitalization plans must go. Not enough people, no matter how much they prefer the do-it-yourself program and no matter what their salaries, will have enough left after Federal, state, local and Social Security taxes for such a luxury. Medicare must then, of necessity, be expanded to include all ages. And, insofar as taking care of their own health and that of their children is concerned, Americans will have had it!

Is this what President Kennedy is so determined to achieve?

**The Federal Budget will be Balanced** a year from now, Treasury Secretary Dillon told the House Ways and Means Committee while asking for elevation of the debt ceiling by another \$8 billion — for a total of \$308 billion.

Mr. Dillon assured the solons that this would be a temporary ceiling. Whatever they may have thought, we are convinced of it. In fact, we'd rather take a bet on instability of the debt ceiling than on the balanced budget a year hence.

**Great minds in Washington**, according to Chalmers Roberts in The Washington Post, are debating the wisdom of spending so much on space and defense that the Russians will go broke following our lead. "Why not spend the hell out of them?" Mr. Roberts quotes one tactician as asking?

Nothing could delight the shade of Uncle Joe Stalin more. Has everyone forgotten he planned it that way? And that is one Stalin strategy Khrush has never objected to. We would, however, be happier if our foreign aid funds were diverted to reactivating the RS 70 first-strike super bomber program.

There are those who will argue we have already spent the hell out of ourselves!

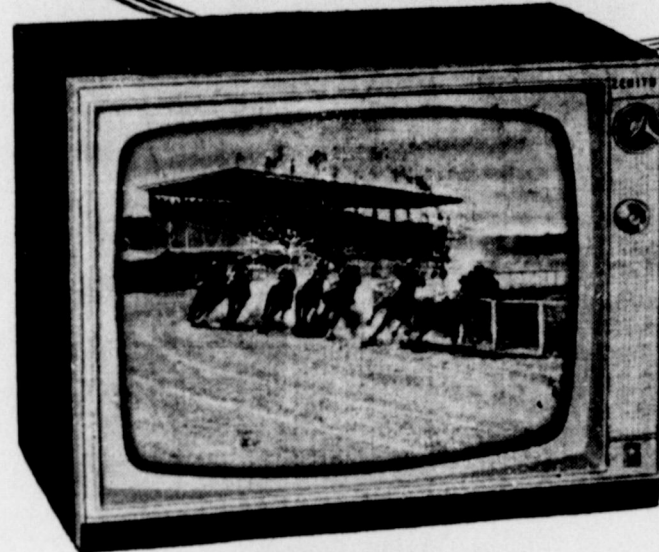

**The News Reel**

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman June 8, 1933

One of the largest crowds ever assembled at a funeral service in Ozona gathered to pay last tribute to the memory of W. Pon Seahorn, pioneer Crockett County resident and prominent rancher, who died in a San Angelo hospital Sunday, when funeral services were held here Monday afternoon.

**Ozonans Recall D-Day Thrills as They Note 18th Anniversary Wed. Of Event Which Presaged Defeat Of Nazi Germany And End Of WW II**

Large numbers of Ozona citizens paused briefly Wednesday to reflect on their whereabouts 18 years ago when D-day heralded the rise of Allied power and the eventual end of World War II.

The announcement of the invasion came at 3 a. m. Ozona time and not many Ozona residents were aware of it until dawn, but crowds in the business section clustered around radios throughout the morning, listening to regular news casts and special bulletins which came at intervals of about every three minutes.

Churches opened their doors and prayer meetings were scheduled to pray for victory.

The Ozona Rotary Club had its regular meeting on the 6th and discussions of the invasion and prayers took up the usual program time. W. R. Cabaness, club secretary, and veteran of World War I, who served in France, described the terrain about the invasion site and Houston Smith, also a veteran

of the first war, discussed possible strategy. Prayers for the success of the invasion were given at the opening of the meeting by C. S. Denham and at the close by Rev. M. C. Stearns.

The fifth war bond drive had just begun in Ozona and the news of the invasion spurred sales with Crockett County going over its quota a month or so later.

For a large number of Ozona men there is no memory of the home front at the time as camps here in the states, stations overseas, and fronts scattered from Anzoi to New Guinea were brought to mind again by the June 6th anniversary.

Many of the present Ozona residents who were in the service at the time were uncertain as to where they were, particularly those who were overseas in other theaters of operation at the time.

## HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Crooked-hole well-drilling is the big news at the Capitol.

More than \$3,000,000 in penalties is asked by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson in the first suit brought by the state following "crooked-hole" investigations in the East Texas Oil Field. Suit contends that six oil wells were drilled in such a direction that they wound up under someone else's land.

Operators plugged two of them before Texas Railroad Commission engineers could check to see if the holes were straight or crooked.

Suit asked \$1,000 a day for each day of operation of each well. Over a two-year period, this comes to \$3,442,000.

Commission engineers plan to check more than 1,000 wells.

Humble Oil and Refining Company brought a civil suit against another group of oil operators. Humble says that the operators' crooked wells ended under an Humble lease and have been draining off Humble's oil.

**Safety in Age** — If you live to be 100, you'll be safe from death by accidents.

State Health Department statistics reveal that not a single Texan over 100 years of age died in an accident in 1960.

Statistics also reveal that there's something to what they say about Texas weather. Deaths from ex-

treme heat and from freezing both were reported during the year.

**Dove Hunting Season** — Texas will have representatives at the national dove conference in Washington on June 26 when length and dates of the 1962 hunting seasons will be discussed.

H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the State Game and Fish Commission, reports the outlook favorable for a good dove crop in Texas—both mourning and white-wing doves.

**Toll Road** — Only toll road in Texas — the Fort Worth-Dallas Turnpike — seems to be making its way.

The Turnpike grossed \$3,245,797 last year, with operating expenses of \$937,168. It put \$1,641,977 into the fund to pay interest on the \$58,500,000 it borrowed to build the road, and to build up its total reserves to nearly \$5,000,000.

**Smokers Pay** — Cigarette smokers are chipping in more than \$7,000,000 a month to the State Treasury under the 8-cent sales tax on each package.

Treasurer Jesse James reported income from that source to be \$7,700,588 in May.

**Screwworm Control** — Fight against the screwworm fly has been extended northward. Reason is because truck-hauled livestock, infested with screwworms, crossed the control line which was being maintained by aerial distribution of sterile male flies.

Texas Animal Health Commission meets on June 11 to adopt a regulation requiring inspection of livestock as they cross the control line, and spraying them to

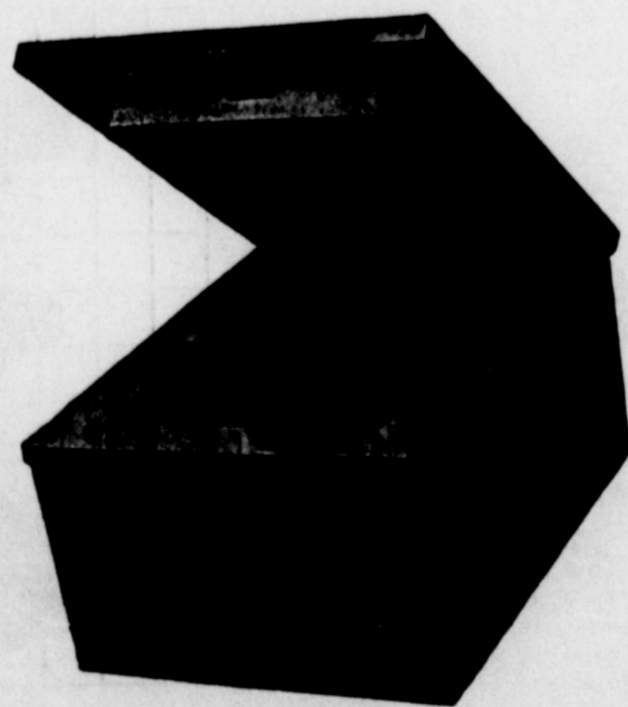

**A Creek In My Back**

(Continued from Page One)

At that meeting, both said "Dam, dam, dam" rather frequently, but did not use the homonym in the same sense, or with the same fervor, that Mexican vaqueros and Texas cowboys have used it for more than a century as they drove cattle across the border river. No, they were talking a different kind of dam — Amistad.

The word means "friendship." When Amistad Dam, an international project, is completed in 1967, it will be 253 feet high and six miles long. It will back water up the Rio Grande for 85 miles, and will make three streams deeper— Devil's River and the Pecos in Texas, and the Rio Conchos in Mexico. And it will create a lake covering 135 square miles — or more than a tenth of the area of the State of Rhode Island. (This later comparison is my own idea.)

You have to know this thirsty semi-desert land to appreciate what Amistad Lake will mean. Cowboys will be able to swap their saddles for water skis, their horses for outboard motors. And even now I can smell the catfish, rolled in corn meal, frying in deep fat . . .

All was not always amistad, or friendship, along this border river in the days of my youth. Del Rio was a dusty, deceptively sleepy town — a hard-riding, hard-bottomed, hard-drinking, hell-for-leather calvary town in those days. Many a revolutionary plot was hatched or half-baked in her sister city of Ciudad Acuna, across the river, and bullet holes in the walls of adobe houses there testified to the futility of some of them; and perhaps many a gun was run over from Del Rio in filibustering days. The Rio Grande had not been harnessed for irrigation; it was sometimes very wide, and as a lad of ten I saw a cowboy drowned while swimming a herd over.

An exciting atmosphere of chili peppers and revolutions still hangs over Del Rio, mingling with a nostalgic scent of trail dust and the lovely lassitude of "manana." Rope me a steer, a calf, or a goat in 14 seconds, and I'll shout "Hooray! Viva!" and "Bravo." Fourteen seconds is good time.

But it doesn't matter who wins. Rodeos are in the American tradition as much as baseball, turkey shoots, taffy-pulling, log rolling, and shooting off anvils on the Fourth of July. They are wonderful.

Besides, they are amistad — friendship.

The No. 1 Kincaid, 2 3/4 miles south-southwest of the discovery was dually completed.

From the Canyon, it was finished for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.81 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-oil ratio of 18,538-1. Gravity of the liquid was 72.5 degrees. Production was through perforations between 6,238-259 feet and 6,627-283 feet.

From the Ellenburger, it was finished for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.5 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 69,400-1. Gravity of the liquid was 54.8 degrees. Production was through perforations between 8,301-312 feet.

Total depth is 8,321 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set.

Location is 1,260 feet from the south and east lines of 6-MN-GC&SF.

The discovery was finished Feb. 26 from the Ellenburger for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.2 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 5,800-1, through perforations between 8,315-330 feet; and March 15 from the Canyon for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.85 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 8,200-1, through perforations between 8,340-435 feet.

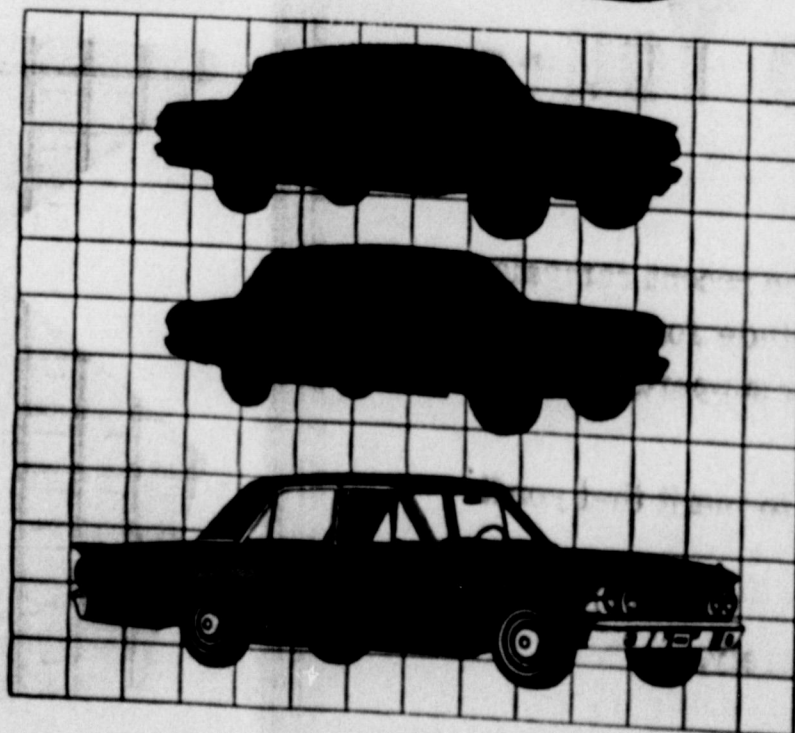
