Field Program At Friday

Test Results Experiment Station-Be Shown

County ranchmen are to view results of the experiment station's ram trial at a "traveling field day" at the Crockett county fair grounds Friday May 4.

Pete Jacoby is in charge of the arrangements and will be the chairman of the committee which includes Jim Davidson, George Carl Conklin, Brock and Dr. Jimmy McDutee. A "barbecue" will be served at the noon hour.

The program will get under way at 2 p. m. with the opening of the "Modern Livestock" by Dr. O. D. Butler, Department of Animal Husbandry, Texas A & M College.

On the basis of "Perpetuating" will be discussed by J. M. Shelton, and the superintendent of the station will follow with the "History of the Sonora Station."

Apple, animal husbandry will describe the change in production of wool, factors in the St. Vallet flock, Leo Rich of the breeders whose sheep have figured in the each year, will speak on "What Performance Has Accomplished the Flock" and J. A. and wool specialist, service, will wrap it up with a talk on "Establish a Performance Program on the Ranch." Rams from the current will be inspected by after lunch. The rams resemble each other in performance but will differ in records. The panel will point out in the difficulty in appraising visually and performance records to emphasize the importance of the test results.

Coaches Chick Womack, Sonny Cleere and Miller will leave Ozona Friday for Austin and following the run off of the broad jumping event Friday, Miller will travel on to Dallas to join the senior class there while the two coaches will remain in Austin for the balance of the state meet on Saturday.

Last week Miller got off a jump of 20 feet 10 inches to place seventh in the Red Raider relays. The seventh place finish came against all classes of competition from 4-A down through B. The event was won by a class B performer with a jump of near 23 feet.

Coach Chick Womack stated Saturday following his return from Lubbock that Miller barely scratched on his final jump, a jump which carried well over 21 feet and would have placed him in the finals.

SHELL DISCLOSES \$2 MILLION PLANT FOR CROCKETT

Installation In Northwest Crockett Complete By Mar. '63

Division offices of Shell Oil Co. at Midland this week announced plans by Shell to construct a \$2,000,000 natural gas and processing plant in Crockett county to serve El Cinco, South Crossett and Tippet fields in the northwest section of the county.

The plant, the company spokesman said, will have a capacity of 25 million cubic feet of gas per day, and current plans include gathering and compressing facilities for the El Cinco-South Crossett fields. Daily production is estimated at 18,000 gallons per day of propane and 24,000 gallons per day of natural gasoline.

Construction of the new facility in this country is scheduled for completion by March 1 of 1963, the spokesman said. Shell engineers are presently working on plant design and specifications will be released for bid shortly. The facility will be 100 percent Shell owned and operated.

Two Ozona FFA Teams Win Firsts In Tech Contests

Wool Judging, Cattle Grading Teams Cop Top Ratings

M. A. Barber, vocational agriculture teacher in Ozona High School and FFA Chapter sponsor, took two teams to judging contests at Texas Tech in Lubbock last week-end and each team won first place among the several hundred teams entered in the various judging and grading events.

The Ozona FFA wool judging team composed of Hugh Coates, Moe Barbee and Bobby Anthony won first place with a score of 1237. In second place was a team from Iraan with 1232 points; Ft. Hancock was third with 1212; Eldorado was fourth with 1204 and Sterling City fifth with 1183. Hugh Coates was second high individual in the contest and Moe Barbee was fourth high individual.

The wool contest consisted of placing four classes of wool and grading 20 fleeces, giving the grade of fineness, length and shrinkage. Contestants represented 14 FFA chapters in the West Texas area.

The other winning Ozona FFA team was the cattle grading team composed of Keith Mitchell, Rick Haglerstein and Doug Moore. The team won first in grading slaughter and feeder cattle with 262 points out of a possible 300. Brownfield FFA was second with 258; Post was third with 257.

Classes of fat lambs, Rambouillet ewes, gilts, barrows, cows and steers made up the field of contests. One hundred twenty seven teams registered for the livestock contests. Each team was composed of three members, making a total of 381 boys participating.

Ten different agricultural contests were held on the Tech campus. Some 1600 boys participated in the 10 contests.

Armed Forces Day To Be Observed At Ozona AFS May 19

'Open House' At Base; Military Craft Flyovers Planned

Armed Forces Day, a day in which the United States armed services display their might, will be observed throughout the nation this year on Saturday, May 19, and a part of that observance will take place at Ozona's Air Force Station, a small important segment in the nation's defense network to guard against sneak attack from the enemies of freedom.

Under command of Major W. C. Bowman, the 732nd Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron, ADC, Ozona Air Force Station, will observe Armed Forces Day May 19 with "open house" at the radar base five miles east of Ozona from 12 noon to 4 p. m. to which the civilian population of Ozona will be cordially invited.

During the open house hours, personnel at the Station will take visitors on guided tours through the base, brief guests on the function of the installation and will serve refreshments in the dining hall. Military aircraft based in the area will assist in the Ozona AF Station's observance with numerous flyovers during the day.

The mission of the 732nd AC&W Squadron is to operate and maintain an Air Defense Surveillance Station as part of the integrated Air Defense System of the 32nd Air Division for the purpose of conducting Air Defense Operations within the subsector of responsibility, Major Bowman explained in announcing the Armed Forces Day celebration plans.

"Ozona Air Force Station went into operational status 1 May 1959," he said. "Construction of on-base buildings took place from the fall of 1956 until summer of 1957. The base was on a standby status from that time up to the operational date in 1959."

"The Squadron has two small "satellite" stations in the form of remote controlled, unmanned, fully automatic Gap Fillers. The Gap Fillers are small radar sets which fill any gaps in the subsector of responsibility which are not covered by the prime radar equipment located at the Ozona installation. These installations are located at McCamey and Comstock, Texas, respectively.

"There are approximately 125 personnel assigned to Ozona Air Force Station and, although a small installation as compared to most other Air Force Bases, the 732nd AC&W Squadron performs all of the functions common to a large base. Available are all of the facilities for housing, feeding, and administration of assigned personnel as well as numerous recreational facilities."

VOTER INTEREST ATTRACTED BY TORRID STATE RACES AND FULL SLATE LOCAL HOPEFULS

With the tempo in state races speeding up, and local interest at top level because of county and precinct races, a heavy vote is expected here in Saturday's Democratic primary.

Polls will be open in all voting precincts in the county and election judges and helpers have been named by the county Democratic party machinery to conduct the balloting. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

With a spirited race for governor of Texas among six candidates, and with five for lieutenant governor, six for attorney general, seven for Congressman at large, and spirited races under way for district, county and precinct offices, Crockett county voters will have plenty of incentive to go to the polls Saturday.

Absentee voting was slow in the first part of the voting period but as the deadline approached early in the week, the demand for absentee ballots speeded up and 68 ballots had been supplied voters who expect to be out of the city on election day, County Clerk Letta Powell reported.

Four candidate are vying for the office of Crockett County judge, made vacant by the death of long time judge, Houston S. Smith, and now filed by Ralph Jones under appointment of the Commissioners Court following Judge Smith's death. Judge Jones is a candidate for nomination to the office in the Saturday primary, along with three others who seek the post. The other three candidates for the judgeship are Troy Williams, Brock Jones and Ted M. White.

Precinct 2, which has the smallest number of voters of any of the Commissioner Precincts, has the largest field of candidates for the post of county Commissioner. The No. 2 Commissioner post was vacated at the time of the appointment of the new county judge when C. O. (Lefty) Walker, then Commissioner Precinct 2, resigned to accept appointment as Commissioner from Precinct 1, vacated by election of Ralph Jones to the judgeship.

Now serving under appointment of the court as Commissioner in Precinct 2 is Richard L. Flowers, who is seeking election to a full term in the coming balloting. The slate of six contenders for the No. 2 Commission post, in the order they appear on the ballot, are Glenn Cox, W. T. (Bill) Miller, W. B. Lindsay, Flowers, Bob Bissett and Rex Halydier.

In precinct 4, the other precinct where the incumbent's 4-year term has expired, there are two candidates after the seat held by Jake Young, who seeks re-election. They are Glenn Sutton and Roger (Buster) Dudley, Jr.

There will be an election in Precinct 1, also but to fill an unexpired term, or two years. C. O. (Lefty) Walker, former Precinct 2 Commissioner and appointed to the Precinct 1 spot, is being contested in his bid for the two unexpired years by W. P. (Bill) Seahorn, Jr.

Sherrill Jr., in the firm of Ashley & Sherrill in Fort Stockton.

The Odessa firm Ashley is joining is that of McDonald Shafer. Ashley is a past president of the Fort Stockton Lions Club, a former vice-president and director of the Fort Stockton Chamber of Commerce, and repeated chairman of the Junior Chamber of Commerce Easter Egg Hunt. He is immediate past president of the Peccos County Bar Association.

Mr. and Mrs. Ashley and their two sons will live at 3202 Blossom Lane, where they are buying a new home.

Ashley's announcement of plans to resign the DA post have brought at least four definite announcements of prospects for the appointment, which will be made by Gov. Price Daniel.

Aspirants are Sherrill and James Kerr (associate of Maurice R. Bullock) of Fort Stockton, Dixon Mahon, Ozona, county attorney of Crockett County, and Jerry Shurley of Sonora, Sutton County attorney. Sherrill is the Fort Stockton city attorney.

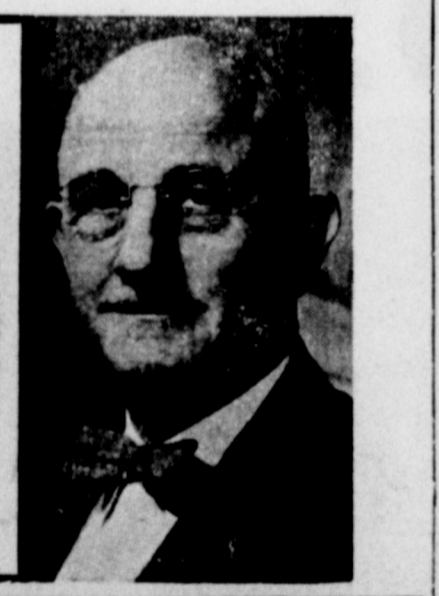
