## Unseats Congressman Rutherford

### Campaign For Young Business Man

A dynamic young Ozona man, running on a ticket, soundly defeated Democratic Congressman J. T. Rutherford, also of the featured contest Texas voting in general election.

## All Ages Urged To Take Polio Vaccine Doses Here Sunday

### North & South Elementary Schools Sites For 1-5 Sessions

Every man, woman and child above three months of age will be expected to show up between the hours of 1 p. m. and 5 p. m. at the North Elementary or South Elementary schools to get the first dose of Sabin oral vaccine against polio.

Sunday, Nov. 11, is Victory Over Polio day in Ozona, and doctors, nurses, and volunteer helpers will be lined up at both stations with lumps of sugar with a couple of drops of a clear, tasteless liquid which will immunize the recipient for life against Type 1 polio, with no risk and no ill effects.

Elsewhere in this paper is the copy of a registration form which should be filled out for every family, so that a record of those who receive the vaccine will be kept and written permit of parents for children to receive the vaccine in the hands of authorities. These forms are available through the schools and from the doctor offices here. One should be filled out for every family in readiness for the drive Sunday as a time saver.

If all applicants are pre-registered it is estimated that the lines will move at a moderate walk and thus taking the vaccine will consume but a very few minutes of one's time.

A. O. Fields, who is acting as coordinator of the program, financed and sponsored by the Tom Green Eight County Medical Society and the two local doctors, Dr. Lloyd Sherrill and Dr. Ralph Simon, has announced that some additional volunteer helpers are needed to assist in registration Saturday and Sunday. Registration desks are to be set up at B&B Food Store and Evans Foodway Saturday and as many as possible registered.

Sheriff Billy Mills will go to San Angelo early Sunday morning to bring the fresh vaccine here for use in the afternoon session. Paper cups and sugar cubes have been made available and volunteer helpers will be on hand at each station to assist in passing out the doses which will be measured by doctors, Dr. Sherrill to be stationed at North Elementary and Dr. Simon at South Elementary.

There will be no charge for the vaccine, although each person will be given an opportunity after receiving the shot to donate at least 25 cents if possible to help defray cost of the vaccine. Any money above actual costs will be donated to some worthwhile charity.

### Ozona Attorney Carries All Four Counties In District

Dixon Mahon, former Crockett County attorney, won his bid for election to serve out the unexpired term of Connel Ashley, resigned, as 112th district attorney, in Tuesday's general election.

Mahon, Democratic party nominee, beat out Republican party representative, W. C. (Bill) McDonald, young Fort Stockton attorney by a top-heavy margin of 3886 to 2197.

### Red Devils Fail To Exhibit Reputed Offensive Strength

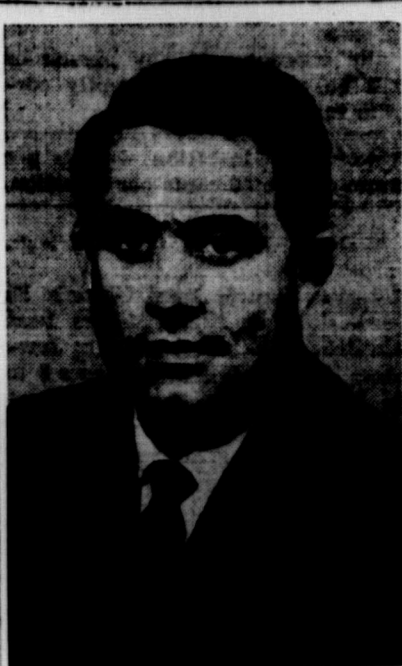

The Ozona Lions ran into unexpectedly light resistance last Friday night as they churned to a 52 to 13 win over a fumble ridden squad of Rankin Red Devils in a district 8-A contest staged in Ozona.

The win kept the Lions in the thick of the title fight, currently resting in third place just behind Eldorado and Big Lake, both of whom are unbeaten in district play.

Pete Montgomery, Richard Vargas and Bernabe Villareal led the powerful Ozona attack which accounted for 405 yards in the air and another 99 in the air but it was Pete Montgomery who had the real field day in rolling up 239 yards and three touchdowns on just 16 carries.

## Ozona-Eldorado Game Fri. Night Last Home Game

### Injuries And Illness Plague Lions As They Face Tough Foe

The Ozona Lions will place their hopes of remaining in the night when they entertain the unbeaten Eldorado Eagles at Lion stadium with the kickoff set for 7:30 p. m.

The Eagles are deadlocked with the Big Lake Owls for first place and, like the Owls, are unbeaten for the season even though they have two ties on their record.

Eldorado has thus far beaten Iraan 42 to 6, Sanderson 49 to 6 and Rankin 34 to 28 to run up a 3 and 0 mark in district play while the Lions have beaten Iraan 32 to 0, lost 34 to 3 to Big Lake and walloped Rankin 52 to 13 for a 2 win and 1 loss mark.

The Lions will go into the Eldorado contest in the poorest physical condition of the season, with Penn Baggett, and Dubbie Scrivner on the injured list and Jimmy Semmler ill and a questionable performer.

Eldorado will doubtless come to Ozona with the memory of the last two years game results fresh on their minds. Eldorado came to Ozona unbeaten and untied and ranked well up in the state two years ago and caught a fired up Ozona eleven that simply would not be denied winning the game on a spectacular catch in the end zone of a pass from Jim Freeman to Phil Carnes. The Eagles held field position on the Lions throughout the first half but could not cash in due to the near frantic defense the Lions threw up.

Last year the Lions, having lost to both Sonora and Big Lake, traveled to Eldorado to meet a highly favored Eagles eleven and, to almost everyone's amazement, walked off with a 28 to 0 win.

The Eagles would like some revenge this year and will once again bring a big fast team to Ozona that ranks an odds on favorite.

The game will be the last home appearance of the Lions for the season with only Sanderson remaining on the schedule after Friday night.

## Crockett Voters Favor GOP's Cox, Barry And Foreman

### Over 900 Votes Cast In Record Off-Year Voting Interest

Like most of the rest of Texas, Crockett county voters turned out in record numbers for an off-year election Tuesday and again like Texans all over, they split the ticket with wild abandon as they savored of the near realization of a two-party state.

Crockett county voters favored Republican Jack Cox over Democrat John Connally for Governor, voted for Republican Des Barry for Congressman at Large over Joe Pool and favored Republican Ed Foreman for Congress from the 16th district over incumbent Democrat J. T. Rutherford. But the balance of the big ballot was marked for Democrats down the line by voters in this county, with the unopposed list of local candidates for county offices approved with a minimum of scratches. Six votes were cast for the Constitution party nominee for governor, Jack Carswell.

More than 900 votes were cast in the county out of a potential of around 1400, which was in excess of most estimates of the county's vote.

In the contested races, the Crockett county unofficial total vote was as follows:

- For Lt. Governor: Smith, 536, Hayes, 387.
- For Attorney General: Carr, 596, Kennerly, 308.
- For Congressman-at-large: Barry, 484, Pool, 326.
- For Railroad Commissioner: Ramsey, 626, Hanson, 268.
- For Comptroller: Calvert, 587, Smith, 256, Rummel, 4.
- For Land Commissioner: Sadler, 645, Fay, 263.
- For Agriculture Commissioner: White, 602, Hubbard, 257.
- For Congressman, 16th Dist.: Foreman, 474, Rutherford, 456.
- For State Representative: Nugent, 628, Stacy, 287.
- For District Attorney 112th Dist.: Mahon, 725, McDonald, 198.

Voters in this county did about like the rest of the state on the fourteen proposed constitutional amendments. Five of the amendments were rejected here and nine approved, with the strongest vote against the 14th on the ballot, the trial de novo proposal, which was defeated statewide.

Disapproved in this county were Nos. 1, 5, 6, 10 and 14. They were, in that order, providing for workmen's compensation for all employees of political subdivisions; the blanket provision for creating hospital districts; providing for retirement, disability and death benefits for elected and appointive officers of counties and political subdivisions; permitting state employees to serve on school boards, and the de novo proposal.

The total vote registered for governor in the seven polling places in the county was: Courthouse, 193; high school, 159; North Elementary, 230; South Elementary 171; Powell Field, 23; Owens ranch, 23; Power Plant, 22, and absentee vote, 41.

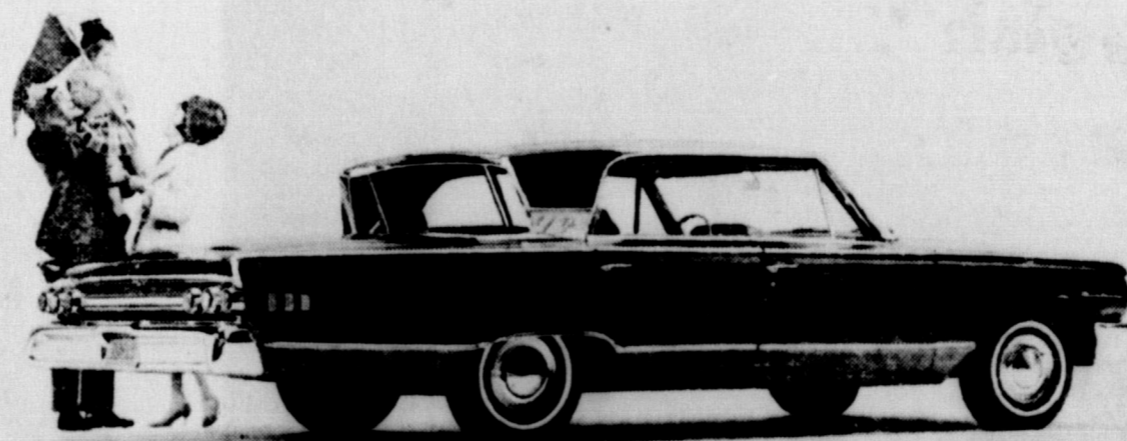

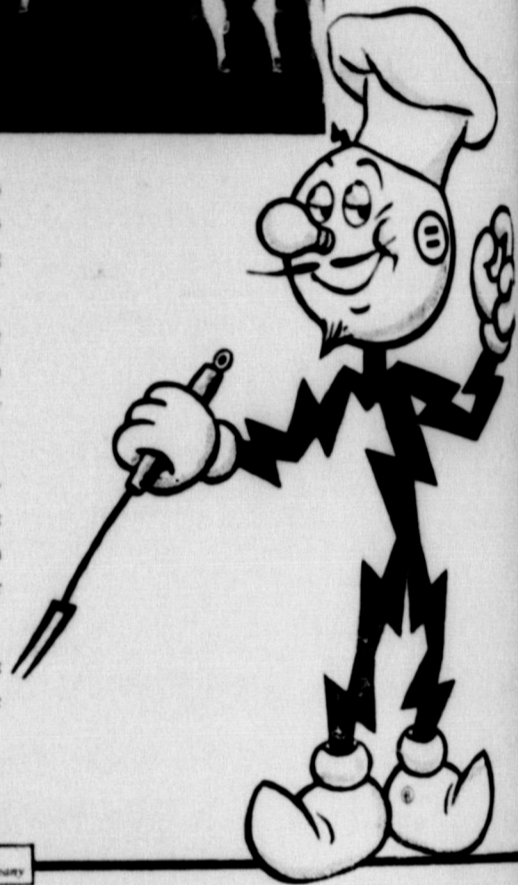

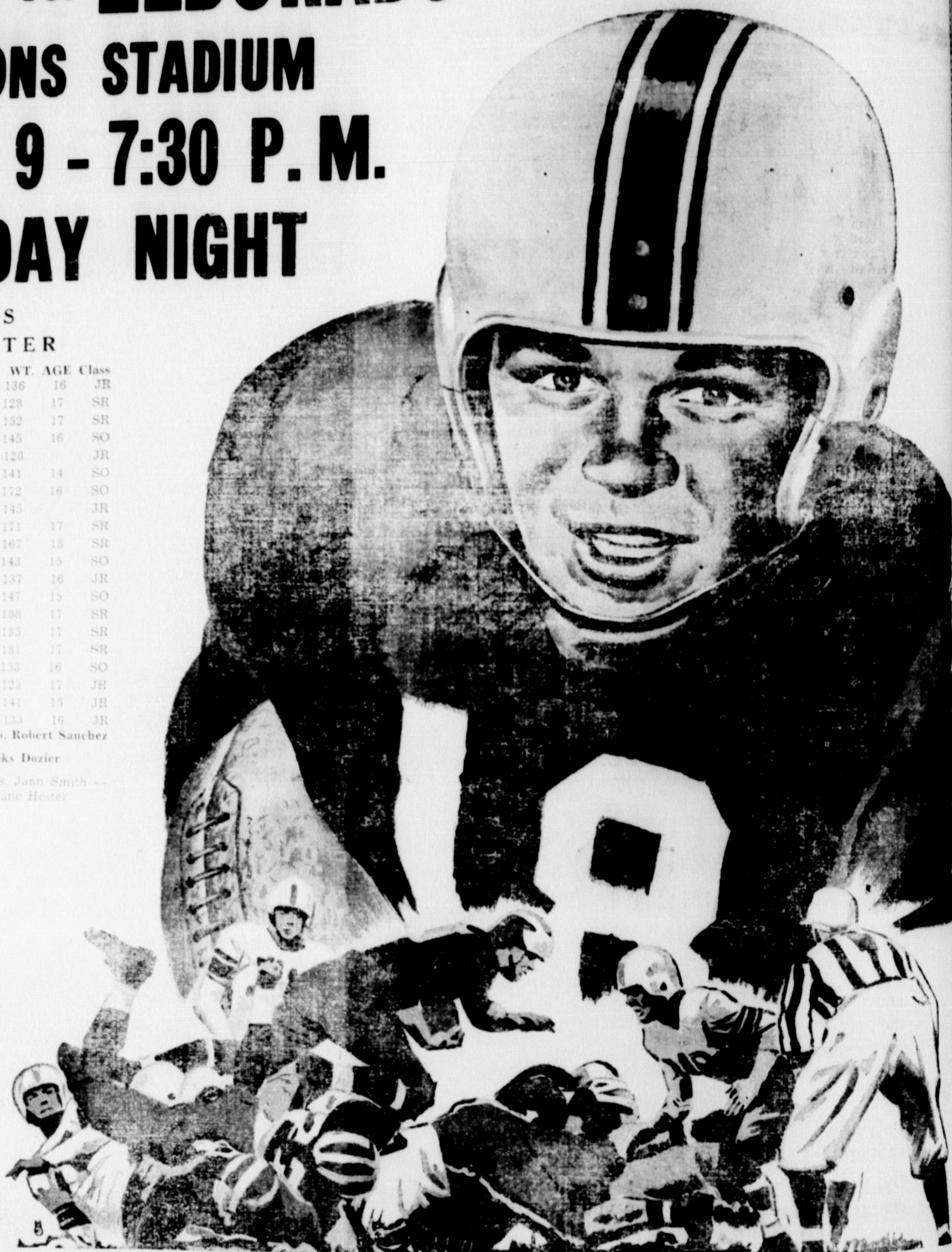

ahead to stay mid-way of the first period when he went 6 yards on a counter play for the game's first tally.

The Ozona score came on the Lions' second possession after a penalty killed their first drive deep in Rankin territory. The Lions got their drive started when Robert Cox covered a Rankin fumble on the Red Devil 43 yard line. Pete Montgomery set his team in motion with a 15 yard scamper to the 28 and Dubbie Scrivner cleared left end for 7 to the 21. Bernabe Villareal cracked the center for 8 and Cooper picked up 2 on a quarterback sneak.

Two cracks at the line with Montgomery getting 2 and Villareal 1 set the ball on the six and brought up third down. Cooper called a counter to the right side and Vargas shot through a big hole for the score. A pass for two points was intercepted and the score remained 6 to 0.

The Lions had already launched their second scoring drive when the first quarter ended and early in the second period Vargas once again scored, this time on a reverse from the six yard line. Once again the point try failed to leave the score at 12 to 0.

The second drive consisted largely of a 55 yard camper by Pete Montgomery which set the ball in scoring position.

Rankin launched strong counter attacks against the Lions following both scores but a fumble on the 43 brought the drives to a halt. The Devils big fullback Jerry McDonald was the big ground gainer for the visitors all night but he could not break away from the Lion defenders and the frequent fumbles were all the defense needed to halt the Rankin attack.

Following Ozona's second score, the Red Devils got in trouble deep in their own territory when two 15 yard penalties set them back. McDonald's punt was short and the Lions needed but four plays to make their third tally.

A pass from Leroy Cooper to Jimmy Semmler was good for 21 yards and three plays later Pete Montgomery raced over from the three yard line. A running try for the extra points met no better fate than the passing efforts and the score goes to 18 to 0.

With time just about out in the second period, the Lions once a-

gain recovered a fumble and this time Vargas, running the counter again, got loose for a 28 yard scamper into the end zone to bring the score to 24 to 0 at the half.

In the last half which saw Ozona play everyone suited out, and incidentally since the Beam did not play this week they too, were suited out, the Lions scored four times and Rankin twice. Pete Montgomery ran only two offensive plays in the last two quarters one in the third period went for 51 yards and a score when Scrivner was injured and the second covered 46 yards for the score when Scrivner was shaken up a second time.

Bernabe Villareal made the Lions' other two tallies, circling right end for the first one from 13 yards out and the second from the five following a 20 yard run which set the ball in position on the five.

For the Lions it was not one of their top defensive games but the air defense remained steady as they picked off one Rankin air try, the interception by Bill Bowman, and limited the Devils to just two completions out of 11 efforts.

Ozona picked up 17 first downs to 14 for the visitors, had 405 rushing and 27 passing for Rankin and after the second quarter pretty well relaxed in their second district winning effort.

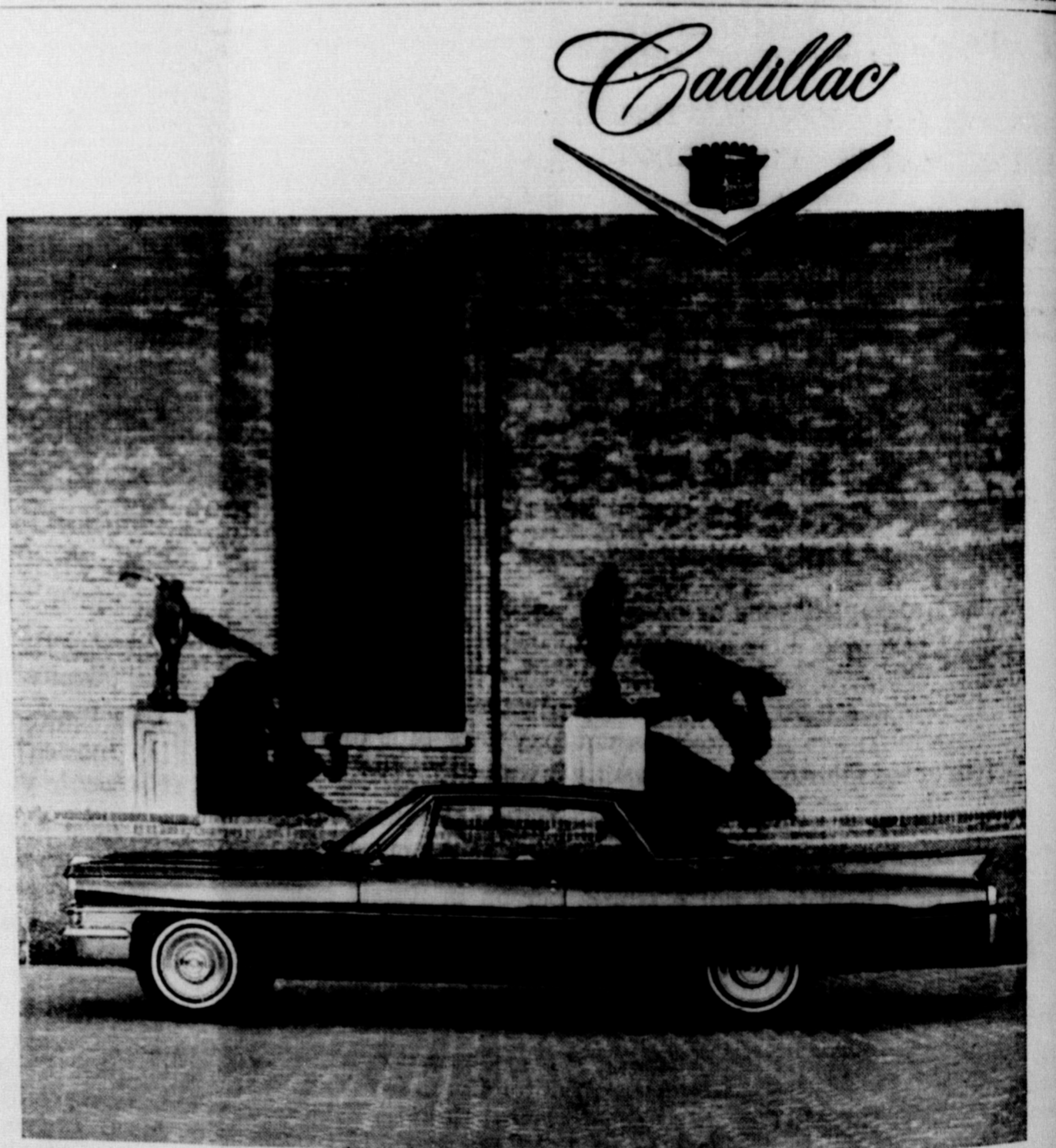
