Progressive Farmer Magazine Names T. A. Kincaid And Four Others As 'Men Of Year' In Service To Agriculture



T. A. Kincaid, Jr.

T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Crockett county rancher, former president of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association, winner of the Hoblitzelle Award for service to agriculture a few years ago, member of a number of national committees in the promotion of agriculture, has received still another recognition.

He was one of five men in Texas singled out by the Progressive Farmer, a magazine edited by C. G. Scruggs, as "Men of the Year in Service to Agriculture" and saluted by that magazine as outstanding leaders in the effort to rid the Southwestern of the screw-worm fly, one of the most expensive pests threatening livestock and wildlife in the Southwest.

Marvin J. Bridges, Dolph Briscoe, Jr., C. H. DeVaney, T. A. Kincaid, Jr., and Harold Nelson are named Men of the Year in Service to Agriculture by The Progressive Farmer for providing far-sighted, extraordinary leadership in behalf of the livestock industry.

The sub-head of a full page article which appeared in the last issue of the Progressive Farmer announcing the honor, written by Scruggs, whose name should be among those honored too, for his leadership in heading the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, the guiding force in the screw-worm program, opened with:

"Kincaid moved that we adopt plan for action and development of Southwestern Screwworm Eradication Program. Motion seconded by Dolph Briscoe. Motion carried unanimously. Devaney moved that all action possible be taken and that we meet within the month to make definite plans for action."

"The dull flat minutes of meeting of the Texas Animal Health Council at the Cactus Hotel in San Angelo, Texas, July 21, 1961, give no hint of the real and historic importance of the meet. Yet, the meeting reported above could be one of the most important milestones in the history of the Southwest livestock industry. For it was at this meeting that the decision was made to take necessary steps to establish non-profit Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation for purpose of receiving and disbursing producer funds for use in screwworm-eradication program."

Penn has had an outstanding 4-H record in showing fat lambs at the county and major shows. He had the champion lamb in the county show in 1957, 58, 60 and 61, won the grand champion group of three fat lambs honors in 1958, 60, and 61. He won the county showmanship award in 1959 and received the best herdsman award in 1960. He has won a total ten trophies on fat lambs at the county shows. Penn voluntarily discontinued showing fat lambs at the county show in 1962 to the relief of all other 4-H members.

George Russell, Jr. Crushed To Death In One-Car Crash

Native Ozonan, Bank Employee, Found Dead Under Overturned Car

Funeral services were held at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon from the Methodist Church for George L. (Buddy) Russell, Jr., 33, native Ozonan, who was killed in a car accident near here early Sunday morning.

Services were conducted by the Rev. Roy Schilling, Methodist pastor at Del Rio, and former pastor at Eldorado. The Rev. Schilling performed the wedding ceremony uniting Mr. and Mrs. Russell in marriage at Eldorado. Rev. Morris Bratton, pastor of the Ozona church, assisted in the services. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Janes Funeral Home.

Active pallbearers were Lowell Littleton, Bobby Halydier, J. G. Hufstедler, J. W. Howell, Dick Kirby and Pleas Childress. Honorary pallbearers were named as follows: Roy Henderson, Hillery Phillips, Wayne West, Jim Dudley, Roy Thompson, Bill Seahorn, Johnny Hunnicutt, Sherman Taylor, Boyd Clayton and Massie West.

Mr. Russell, assistant cashier at the Ozona National Bank, was killed in a one-car accident about 18 miles north of Ozona early Sunday morning. He was returning to his home here after a business trip to San Angelo. He had phoned Mrs. Russell before leaving San Angelo to tell her he would be late and not to worry.

Exact cause of the accident has not been determined but investigating officers guessed that he had dozed off to sleep and lost control of the car, which overturned and came to rest on top of Russell's body. Motorists passing the scene of the accident noticed scars and spilled gasoline on the pavement and reported to officers here. A check showed no report had been received here of an accident but an investigation was started and Russell's body was found under the car across the right of way fence. It was estimated that he had been dead an hour when the body was discovered.

Mr. Russell was the son of the late George Russell, Sr., long time county and district clerk of Crockett county who died of a heart attack at the height of the 1954 Ozona flood, and Mrs. Russell who makes her home here.

One Arrested In Safe Cracking At Auto Agency Here

Man Arrested in Hamlin Admits Having Been Here

One man is being held for investigation and Sheriff Billy Mills and his deputies are working on other clues in the burglary and safe cracking at Knox Motor Co. here Saturday night.

Sonny Abel, 23, an ex-convict, was arrested in Hamlin for local officers and was brought back here for questioning in the robbery. Abel has admitted being in Ozona the night of the robbery but has denied implication. An impression taken of a shoe print outside the building where the robbers gained entry matches a shoe worn by Abel, Sheriff Mills said.

A car driven by Abel was seen parked here the night of the robbery and Deputy Sheriff Vor Parker made a note of the license number. Suspecting this car as being connected with the robbery, it was traced and Abel was arrested in Hamlin.

The intruders gained entry to the auto agency building through a big door to the service department. Using a cutting torch found in the garage, the robber or robbers cut the bottom from the safe and gained access to a money drawer where \$265 in cash was taken. About \$50 additional money in the safe was overlooked, the sheriff said. Some tools were taken from the garage's service department, officers said, but these have so far not been recovered.

Violent Thunderstorm Produced .69 Inch Of Rain Here Last Night

With all the violence and noise of a typical summer shower, a December one last night dumped .69 of an inch of warm rain, and produced a thunderstorm that interrupted electrical service for an interval and rattled windows in Ozona homes with the heavy thunder.

The lightning damaged facilities of the West Texas Utilities Co. T. J. Bailey, manager, said about half the big street light globes were knocked out and reports of further damage were coming in this morning. Bill Cooper, manager of the water district, said a direct hit knocked out a relay switch on one of the district's pressure pumps. Lights on the TV tower were knocked out and cable service was interrupted briefly by the lightning.

The lightning and thunder was as violent as any summer disturbance ever noted here. A heavy rain fell during the comparatively brief disturbance. Reports of falls up to more than an inch were noted at the east and north edges of town.

Because of Our Affluence, Charles H. Brower, president of BBDO agency told the NAM's 67th Annual Congress of American Industry, "We wander a shamed through the wilderness of our success." Who is guilty? Business is guilty."

To "sell America back to the Americans", Mr. Brower would first "lift the hood on our economy . . . point out that the motor is called 'business', and that only the most upper-level economists would ever claim that the car would run better if we abandoned the motor and tried to run it on the air in its tires."

The Brower slogan: "Business Means America — America Means Business."

President Kennedy is still Pushing for a 1963 tax cut, he told his press conference, despite the well-aided views of Chairman Wilbur Mills of the House Ways and Means Committee that there's no need to hurry. He and Rep. Mills, he indicated, might not be "so far apart". But there has been no report on a meeting of the two afterward.

Notes From The County Agent's Office

Farming and ranching are big business in Texas. Total state cash farm income for 1961 was approximately \$2.4 billion. If the value added to agricultural commodities by processors and distributors is included, the total income from agri-business approximates \$6.5 billion.

This great production and wealth-creating industry is made up of the State's 227,071 farms which now average 631 acres each. These farms are operated by 9% of Texas' total population while another 31% is engaged in occupations related to agriculture.

Larger farms and higher land values have pushed the average capital invested in land and buildings per farm to \$48,378, or eight times above the same figure for 1940. Machinery investment per farm is approximately 10 times higher than in 1940, while other items of production have more than tripled in the past 2 decades. It is not unusual for family-operated farms to have more than \$100,000 invested in land and machinery.

Production expenses are increasing, on the average, 2 to 5% annually while net farm income has been decreasing by a similar amount. This situation has kept the agricultural producers in a "price-cost squeeze" the past several years. Only by using the highest levels of managerial ability have producers been able to continue their farming and ranching operations.

Agriculture provides approximately a fourth of the State's income from all sources and a livelihood for 40% of Texas' total population.

To people of Texas, this means that agriculture and other types of industry are partners in progress, and must work closely as team-mates in solving mutual problems.

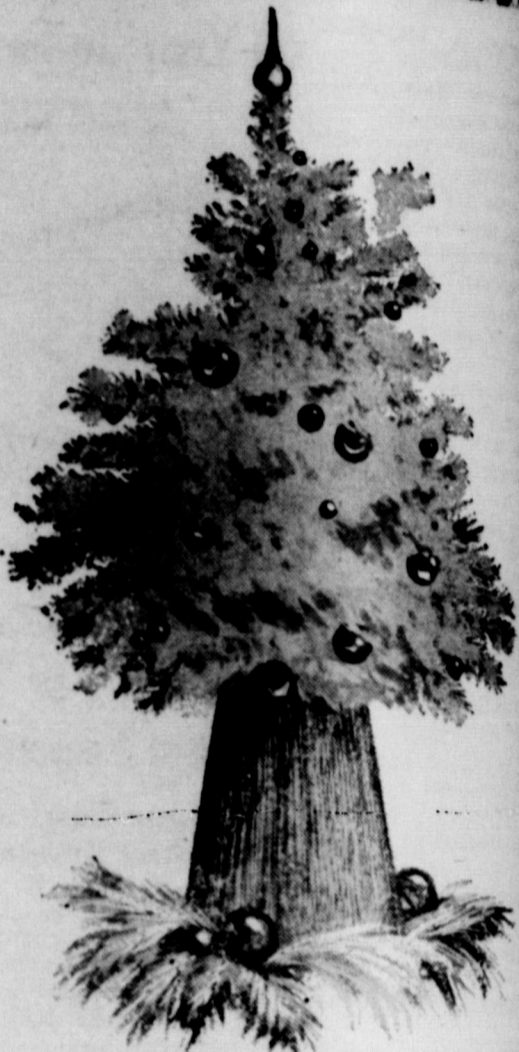

SANTA CLAUS

Santa Claus makes his appearance once each year to children of many lands.

In some European countries, St. Nicholas had been a mysterious deliverer of gifts to children on December 6. The date was later changed to December 25.

The legend is that he puts some money into the stockings of three daughters of a poor nobleman. This started the custom of presenting gifts, toys, and sweets to children on Christmas Eve.

The encyclopedia indicates that in different lands, Santa is known by various names. In Germany he is known as "Knecht Ruprecht" or "Weinachtsmann," in France as "Bonhomme Noel" or "Le Pere Noel." In England he is called "Father Christmas."

The tradition of Santa was brought to America by the early Dutch settlers.

CHRISTMAS CUSTOMS

Christmas is celebrated many different ways. Most of the customs of American celebration came from Europe.

Tradition prescribes Christmas Eve as the proper time for putting up the Christmas greens. It has been considered unlucky to bring holly into the house before that time.

Last of all, but not least, is Father Christmas, or Santa Claus, who is recognized in many countries of the world. He is supposed to come from the far North in his reindeer sleigh, laden with toys, on Christmas Eve.

The Ozona B team broke into the win column for the night by posting a decisive 42 to 25 win over the Badger reserves. The score would have been much higher had not coach H. O. Hoover used every man on the squad with reserves in at least half of the contest.

The Ozona varsity staved off a late McCamey rally to win the night's feature game 39 to 36.

The Lions did not play up to their usual standards this season and the loss of Leroy Cooper to any injury midway of the second quarter did not help matters either.

The Ozona reserves led 10 to 9 at the end of the first quarter but the second Ozona unit could not hold the visitors and went to the half trailing 23 to 16. The first unit could not get started again and the alternate unit lost a great deal of ground in the final quarter.

had five for Ozona. Ozona will have one more ball game before the holidays traveling to Sonora tonight for their final pre-Christmas game.

DPS Predicts 180 To Meet Death In Texas Over Holiday Period

Austin — The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reported today it is estimated 180 persons will meet violent death during the 11-day Christmas-New Year holiday season — 92 of them in traffic crashes.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., said the estimate is based on past ex-

perience over many years and compiled by DPS Statistical Services Manager N. K. Woerner. Purpose of the estimate, Garrison said, is to focus public attention on the dangers that accompany the holiday season.

He said that past statistics indicate that in addition to 92 "motoricides," 42 persons will be victims of suicide and homicide, and 46 will die violently in various accidents other than traffic.

The public safety director announced that "Operation Death-watch", will be in effect starting at 12:01 a. m. Saturday, December 22 through 11:59 p. m. Tuesday, January 1, 1963. During this period, he explained, the Department of Public Safety will tabulate violent deaths by category and make releases to the news media.

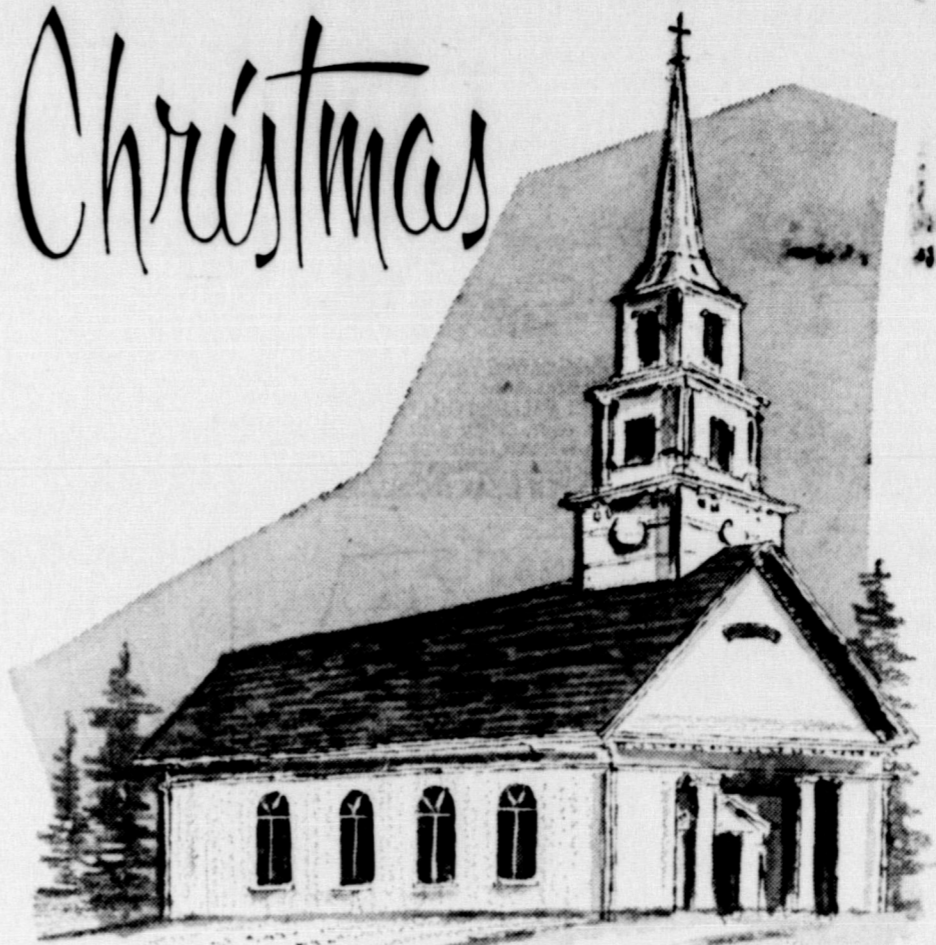

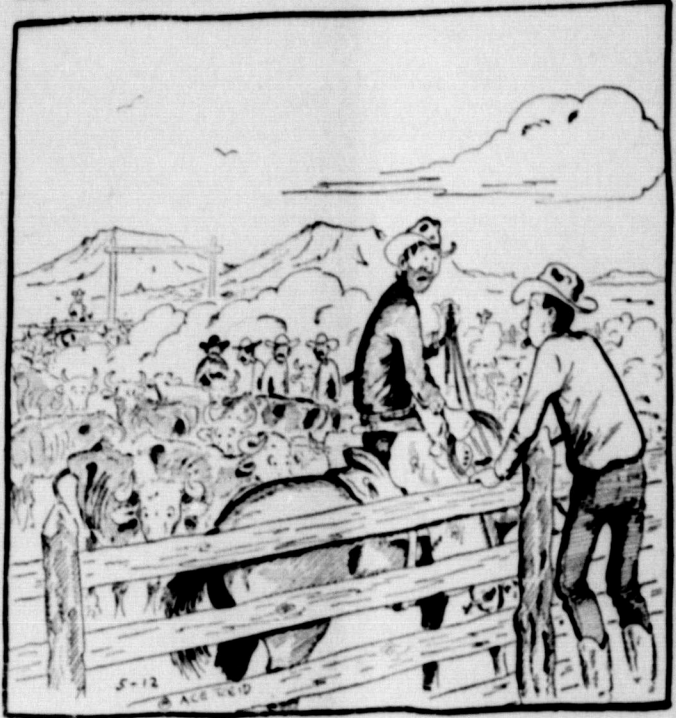
Mrs. Barraeta will be on a leave of absence from the Sears Co., where she has been employed in the credit department for 14 years.

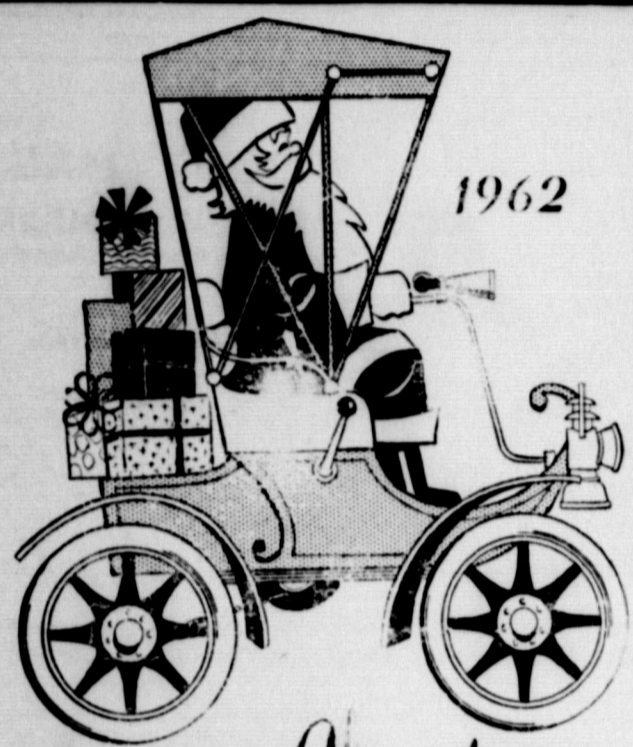

 come the fastest spreading, most widely supported, and potentially beneficial voluntary program that has been seen in the livestock business in the Southwest and possibly in the United States. And now that a screwworm eradication program is under way and near a successful conclusion, it's worthwhile to look at the odds faced by these leaders a year and a half ago.
 Mr. Scruggs then enumerates the almost overwhelming odds faced by the group of raising a \$3 million funds from producers and launching the area wide screwworm eradication program in the Southwest.
 "It was this group that provided the early and necessary leadership

to get a screwworm eradication movement under way," the Progressive Farmer article continued. "It is for this early and unusual leadership that five of the above men has been designated as Men of the Year in Service to Agriculture. Their almost constant meeting and traveling, beginning in the fall of 1961, had resulted a year later in:
 "County animal health committees organized in 350 Southwest counties in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Louisiana, and collection of more than \$2 million on a voluntary basis.
 "Completion of a new screwworm fly raising facility employing 400 people with a capacity of 80 million sterile flies per week.
 "Overcoming almost frightening amount of red tape, apathy, and misunderstanding.
 "In honoring these five leaders, the Progressive Farmer also pays tribute to the Texas A&M College System, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the county agricultural agents, vocational ag teachers, farm and ranch organization leaders, volunteer county animal health committee leaders, and livestock men themselves for an overwhelming response to the clarion call for action to control a costly pest."
