BUT BOYS HAVE A WAY OF GROWING

Smallest Graduating Class in Years But Its Passing Will Take Some Outstanding Athletes; Prospects Dim For Next Year

The state track meet unrec'd in Austin last weekend ended the athletic year for Ozona High School and also the career of a number of fine athletes who are members of the 1963 graduating class.

The 1963 class is now, and has been ever since the first grade, the smallest class in the Ozona school system and has the rather unusual honor of having been the reason Ozona did not go double A at the same time Sonora moved up last year.

Even though a small class, the 1963 group has had some fine athletes among whom Pete Montgomery, Robert Cox, Brent Moore, and Penn Baggett have been distinguished. Add to this group Sostenes DeHoyos, Ronnie Houston and Billy Sanchez, all of whom took part in at least one sport and it can be seen that the 1963 class will be missed.

Enrollment figures now available show that Ozona High has had a decline from the high 190's to the low 180's this year with some more loss due before next fall due to loss of the radar base. But the next freshman class will run slightly over 40 whereas only 20 seniors will be lost and once again the high school enrollment will be near two hundred.

Coaches Fred Hickman and Sonny Cleere will have trouble assembling a varsity squad of as many as twenty players even though after the next year or two things may begin looking up again as far as numbers go.

In basketball and track, Coach Brooks Dozier will have to find some way to get along with a short team, one of the shortest in years, and Coach Chick Womack does not have much hope of replacing this year's seniors and may find himself without an outstanding trackman for the first time in a number of years.

All in all, the next year does not look too promising but boys have a way of growing and with a little determination and development, chances are next fall things will look better.

District 8-A trackmen had a good day in Austin last week when the state track meet was staged at Memorial stadium but Ozona's Pete Montgomery was the exception of the group. Montgomery posted times well below his better times this season, placing sixth in the high hurdles and eighth in the lows.

Montgomery was the only district 8 performer to qualify for more than one event but posted a 20.5 in the lows and a 15.4 in the highs. Montgomery had posted 19.6 in the lows which was good enough to have won and 14.9 in the highs which would have been second or third.

Iraan's Buddy Lanehart turned in one of the top performances of the meet in broad jumping 23'7" for a new class A record and Rankin's Jerry McDonald won third in the shot.

District 8-A's other entry, Mike Holmes of Big Lake, ran his best hundred of the year to win the Class A hundred yard dash for the second year in a row with a fine 9.8 performance. Holmes got one false start and was in danger of being disqualified but despite having to start cautiously came from behind in the last fifty yards to win the contest.

Thundershower With Violent Winds Rake Ozona Area Sunday

To the accompaniment of high winds which whipped leaves and stirred trash cans and other loose equipment about Ozona homes, rain came to Ozona again Sunday afternoon and night as a thundershower swept across a big part of Crockett county.

The additional welcome moisture for parts of the ranching area which had been favored in falls of the past two weeks will go far toward starting drouth-stricken ranges back on the road to recovery. Especially favored were parts of the county northwest and northeast from Ozona, and for some distance to the south. However, the fall was reported lighter in the far south section of the county.

Ozona received 6 of an inch of moisture in a heavy shower which began around 6 p. m. and continued intermittently for several hours.

ROLL-CALL ON FOREIGN AID

President Kennedy, in agreeing with the poet Milton in his foreign aid message to Congress last month that, "Peace hath her victories / No less renowned than war," added: "And no peacetime victory in history has been as far-reaching in its impact, nor served the cause of freedom so well as the victories scored in the last 17 years by this Nation's mutual defense and assistance programs."

Well, let's see — and before Congress votes that bargain-basement figure of only \$4.5 billion. The survey that follows, compiled by Brig. Gen. Bonner Fellers, national chairman of the Citizens Foreign Aid Committee (to aid American taxpayers), forms another message that every Congressman and Senator should read. We quote:

Western Europe has prospered with Marshall aid. But after 17 years and \$41 billion in U. S. aid, Western Europe meets only a fraction of its defense obligation; except for commercial loans, its aid to less developed countries is negligible.

Argentina (\$640 million aid), under indirect military domination, suffers from inflationary chaos.

Brazil (1.9 billion aid) is on the brink of Communism.

Cuba (\$52 million aid) once enjoyed immense sugar subsidy, has stolen \$1 billion in U. S. private investments; her Red satellite status is now guaranteed.

Haiti (\$100 million aid) writhes under a murderous tyranny.

Indonesia (\$670 million aid), her economy wrecked, is an armed dictatorship bent on conquest.

India (3.9 billion aid) probably faces Red Chinese attack.

Ivory (\$1.3 billion aid) is a monarchy without a parliament.

Laos (\$460 million aid) may soon fall to Communists.

Poland (\$522 million aid) is Communist with all freedom gone.

South Korea (\$5.4 billion aid) is ruled by its third military junta.

South Vietnam (\$2.4 billion aid) ruled by a puppet dictator, prop-
 ped up by the U. S., is racked by

a Red guerrilla war.
 Turkey (\$3.8 billion aid) is politically unstable and is economically weaker than before aid began.

Venezuela (\$274 million aid), despite prodigious oil wealth, is a major target of the Russo-Cuban fifth column.

Yugoslavia (\$2.4 billion aid) is Communist with all freedom gone.

Gen. Fellers notes that these items add up to \$65 billion and that the glowing report to Congress and the dismal facts were never in sharper contrast. National self-respect, fully as much as budget balancing, demands healthy cuts in foreign aid.

Miss Tarver and Mr. Gonzales plan a May 18 wedding in the Second Baptist Church in Lubbock. Miss Tarver is the daughter

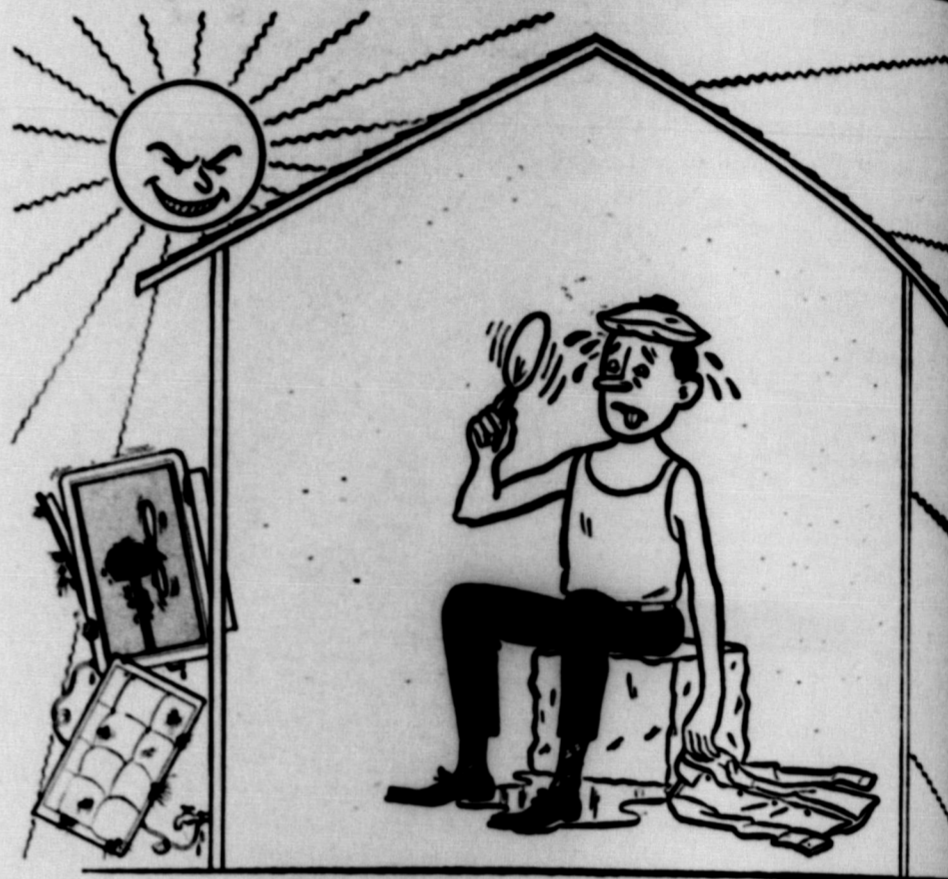

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SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

In the little city of Ozona, county seat of Crockett County, 1951, a group of children appeared before Mrs. McIntosh to enter kindergarten. They were small classes, 25 at South Elementary and 25 in North Elementary, and at that time no one suspected that by the time 1963 rolled around, they would have the best athletes, most beautiful girls and most handsome boys, and over-all best I. Q. of any senior class to ever graduate from the Ozona Public Schools!

These years of experience on the stage led to performances in "The Night of January 16th," and this year's version of the "Little Dog Laughed," starring Cheryl, Arlene, Pauline, Robin, Kathy, Gracie and Robert.

When the class reached the seventh grade, they moved to the Junior High Building. The grand total was 63 members. Among the graduates added to the roll was Justo. During this year, the athletes really got their start: Kathy, Robin, Cheryl, Pauline, and Jann were on Miss Knox's softball team, and they won district. The girls began their homemaking in Junior High and took part in the style shows. Arlene, Gracie and Gail entered the "Make It Yourself With Wool" contest and won the sub-district division.

Jann, Kathy, Arlene, Cheryl, Gracie, Robin, Gail, Justo, Ronnie, Robert, Helen, Penn, Priscilla, Matias, and Brent began with the band in Junior High. Jann, Cheryl, and Arlene served as twirlers during their sophomore and junior years. Members have dropped out along the way because of other interests, but Jann stayed and worked to become Drum Major and Pauline was awarded dual honors, being chosen Bend Sweetheart and President, and, along with Helen and Jann, went with the band to win 2 firsts at the Del Rio Band Festival this year.

The girl's sports branched out into basketball and volleyball during the freshman year. They consisted of Jann, Kathy, Robin, Pauline, Gail, Cheryl, Cilia, and Tommie. At this point, many thanks are due to our sponsors, Miss Powers, Coach Hoover, and Mr. Fife. Our thanks go to them and our mothers for many happy hours and help in concession stands. As we bring this chapter of our school life to a close, we think of some we lost along the way. Let's not forget Jimmy, Marty, and Patty, who were with us many years, but moved to other school, and Gladys who departed this year to graduate elsewhere, also Tommie, who decided to start housekeeping.

So it is with a dash of our pen we close and our thoughts go on to greater things ahead, and we'll leave behind to you the worries of concession stands and the excitement of the senior trip.

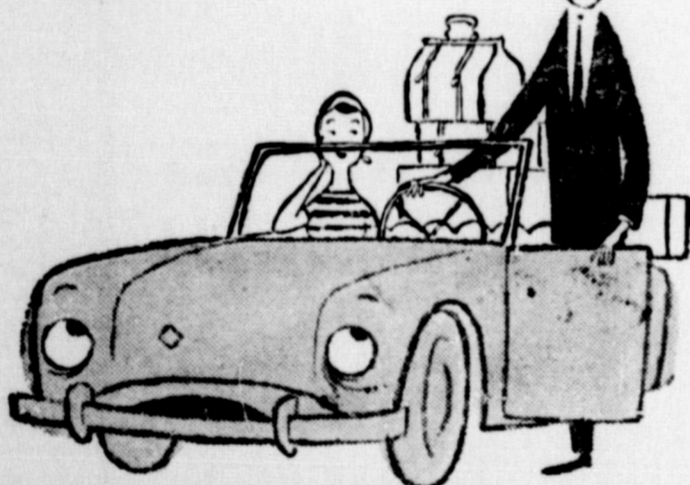
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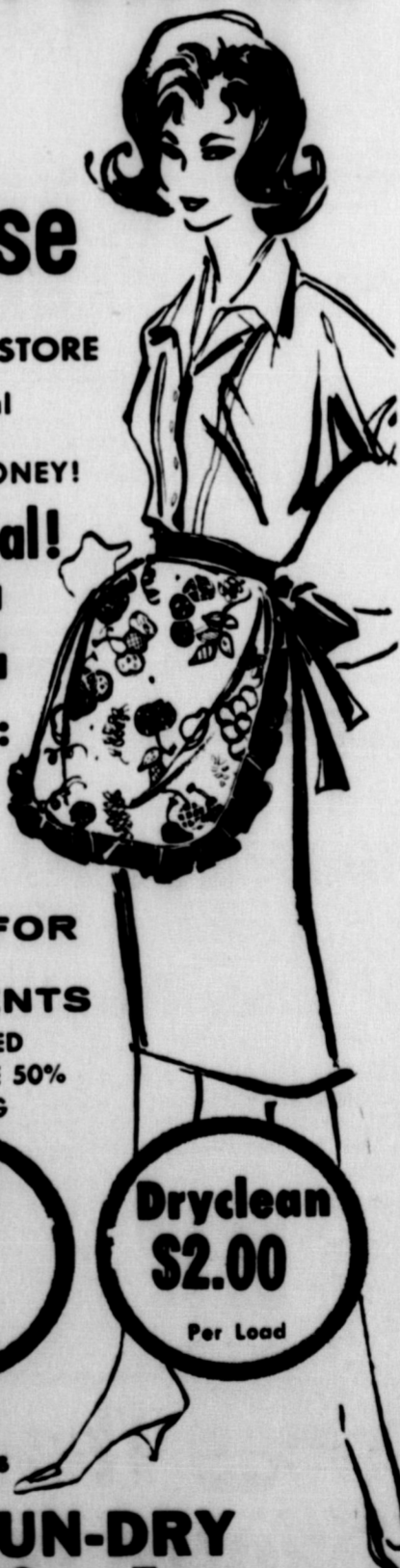
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Coronation Service Is Climax Of Focus Week For Girls Auxiliary
