## Two Odessa Men Hurt When Pickup Overturns On Big Lake Highway

Two Odessa men were injured, one critically, Sunday morning about 10:20 a. m. when the pickup truck in which the two men were riding had a blow out and overturned 17 miles north of Ozona on highway 865. The pickup was pulling a trailer.

Most seriously injured of the two was Melba Kelly who was thrown from the truck. The two injured men were rushed to the Crockett County Hospital by the Big Lake emergency crew which was summoned to the scene of the wreck.

Kelly, after receiving emergency treatment at the Ozona hospital, was transferred to San Angelo while Larry Hayhurst, the second man in the accident remained in the local hospital.

The two men are employed by the Permian Casting Company of Odessa.

## Shell Tippett ReEntry Tests Shallow; Outpost Set In Lancaster Hills

Shell Oil Co. will plug back to wildest depth of 6,330 feet for tests of shallower zones at its No. 2 Marrs, former producer in the Tippett field of Crockett County, nine miles south of McCamey.

It became depleted and was abandoned Feb. 2, 1953.

Location is 1,320 feet from the southwest and 1,750 feet from the northwest lines of 3-GC&SF, Abst. 3951, Cert. 5001.

Hunt Petroleum Co., Dallas, will drill the No. 1-16 University as a one-mile northeast outpost to the lone Devonian gas-distillate producer in the Lancaster Hills multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County, 25 miles west of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the west and 1,000 feet from the south lines of 16-29-University. Contract depth is 7,600 feet.

Signal Oil & Gas Co., Midland, has plugged back from 12,191 feet to 11,847 feet and was preparing to run casing and test an unidentified zone at the No. 1 Cities Service-J. W. Henderson Estate, in 1-SL-T&StL, Crockett County wildcat, 20 miles west-northwest of Ozona, 2 1/2 miles west-northwest of a recent Canyon gas discovery and four miles south-southeast of a recent dual Canyon and Strawn gas discovery.

No other information has been released.

Shell Oil Co. No. 1-21 Couch, in 21-QR-HE&WT, Crockett County Wolfcamp prospect 1 1/2 miles north east of the opener of the Ozona, Southwest (Canyon sand gas distillate field) flowed 24 hours, making 16 barrels of oil and seven barrels of water, plus gas at the daily rate of 725,000 cubic feet.

Flow was through a 32-64-inch choke, and perforations between 6,284-820 feet.

Testing continued.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

"BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces of the United States or in the military service of the United States; provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law, and the Legislature may authorize alternate voting procedures to provide for the length of time as required by the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

"BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior amendments to this Constitution, there has been designated the Veterans Land Board, said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified hereinafter. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two citizens of the State of Texas, one of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one retired in finance. One of such citizen members shall with the advice and consent of the Governor be appointed for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on the date of the election of the Governor shall complete the term of which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for such members shall be fixed by the Legislature, and each shall make bond in such amount as is hereinafter provided as prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall be the administrator of the Veterans Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans Land Board may provide for lease and sale not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars of the State of Texas bonds for the purpose of creating a fund for the Veterans Land Program. The total amount of such bonds shall not exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000) of which have heretofore been sold in such amount not less than par value and accrued interest shall be set aside and held in trust for the purpose of creating a fund for the Veterans Land Program. The interest on such bonds as are now or may hereafter be provided by law, shall be placed in such fund and shall be used for the purposes of the program as determined by said Board and shall be paid by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly understood, shall not exceed the rate in the municipal bond market of all such bonds and shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued or sold hereunder shall after approval by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, and approval by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, be delivered to the purchaser for purchase, be negotiable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas, and all such bonds or obligations shall be subject to the same laws and regulations that apply to the purchase of such bonds, all of such moneys then remaining or thereafter becoming a part of said Veterans Land Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board in a series of bonds in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so long as such moneys are on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold, and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, and there are sufficient moneys to do so, the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans Land Fund shall thereafter be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

"BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior amendments to this Constitution, there has been designated the Veterans Land Board, said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified hereinafter. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two citizens of the State of Texas, one of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one retired in finance. One of such citizen members shall with the advice and consent of the Governor be appointed for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on the date of the election of the Governor shall complete the term of which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for such members shall be fixed by the Legislature, and each shall make bond in such amount as is hereinafter provided as prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall be the administrator of the Veterans Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans Land Board may provide for lease and sale not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars of the State of Texas bonds for the purpose of creating a fund for the Veterans Land Program. The total amount of such bonds shall not exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000) of which have heretofore been sold in such amount not less than par value and accrued interest shall be set aside and held in trust for the purpose of creating a fund for the Veterans Land Program. The interest on such bonds as are now or may hereafter be provided by law, shall be placed in such fund and shall be used for the purposes of the program as determined by said Board and shall be paid by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly understood, shall not exceed the rate in the municipal bond market of all such bonds and shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued or sold hereunder shall after approval by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, and approval by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, be delivered to the purchaser for purchase, be negotiable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas, and all such bonds or obligations shall be subject to the same laws and regulations that apply to the purchase of such bonds, all of such moneys then remaining or thereafter becoming a part of said Veterans Land Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board in a series of bonds in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so long as such moneys are on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold, and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, and there are sufficient moneys to do so, the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans Land Fund shall thereafter be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

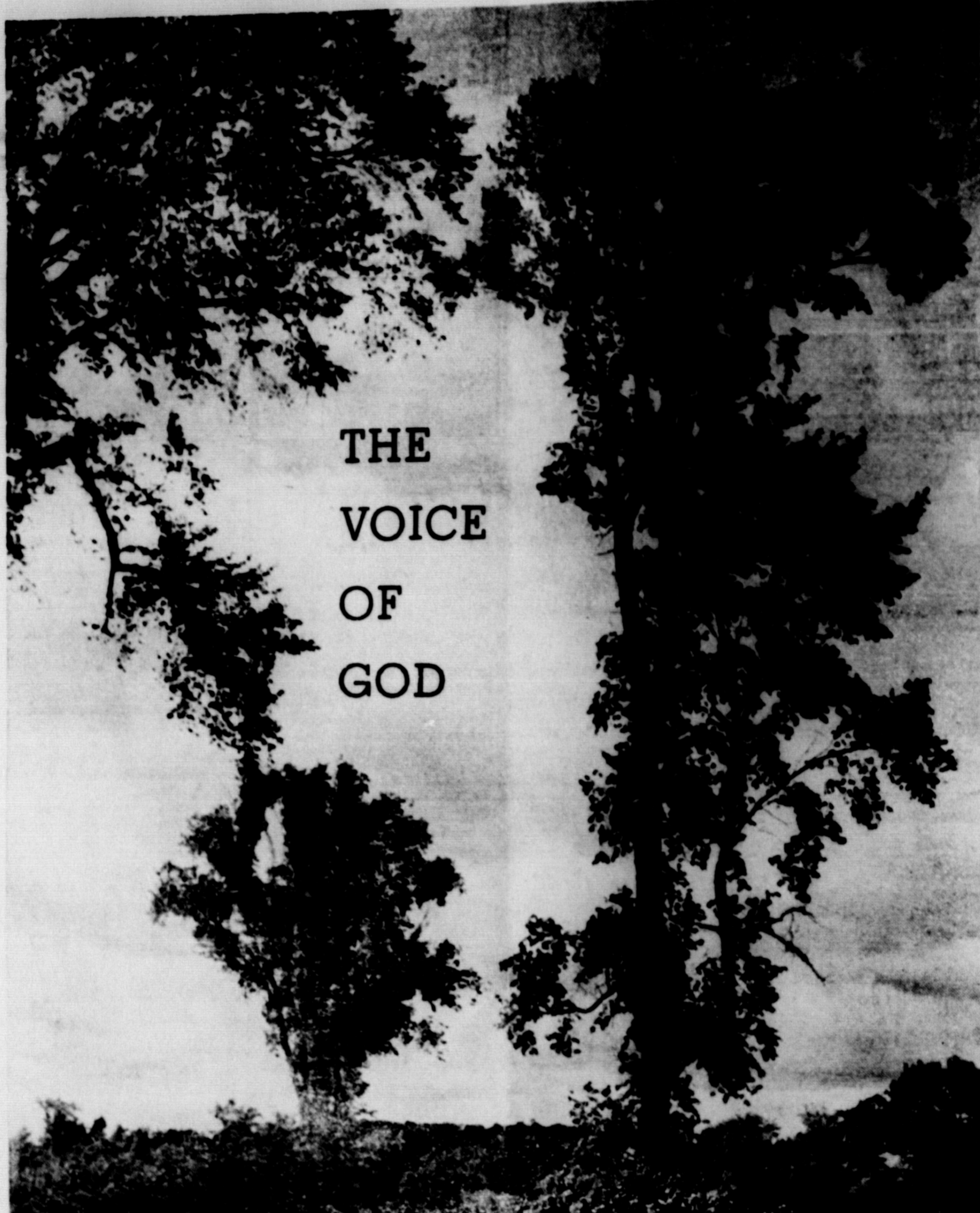

### Congressman ED FOREMAN Reports

#### PEACE FOR PROFIT

The American taxpayer, groaning under the greatest defense burden ever imposed on any nation, is paying more and more every year for disarmament, too.

Under the New Frontier "program," we must keep spending while we work energetically to become totally incapable of defending ourselves. The clear-cut philosophy of the Eisenhower Administration is gone. Then we built armed forces to the point where no one dared attack us. Recognition would be certain. Aggressors knew it would be swift and total.

Under this administration we have a hodgepodge of cross purposes — and a frightening decline in our armed potential. The Defense Department babbles about a modified second strike, sort of a "plumic eye for an eye" theory which would have us bomb only to the extent we have been bombed.

Although we are spending billions to maintain almost as much military "establishment" as we had during wartime, we are not developing new weapons. In the anti-missile field, in nuclear warheads, we have stopped and the Kennedy Administration has killed any further RS-70 program. Successful flight would cause a clamor for conversion to a super sonic jet transport plane for airline use, and further research and improvement for military use. The Administration is getting less defense for the dollar and more waste.

The Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, a Kennedy concoction, is growing by leaps and bounds. This year it wants to more than double its budget — from \$50,000 to \$15,000,000. It wants to spend tax money on studies of private peace groups and their effect on public opinion. A \$10,000 study would probe the organization and operations of the Soviet dual system and budget. Why they should be studying how total disarmament work is a matter of question.

One of the gravy train riders in the growing field of disarmament boondoggle is the Institute of Defense Analysis, whose president gets \$45,000, twice the pay of a Congressman. It has received \$1 million from the Arms Control Agency and has 234 employees studying, in effect, how it can be more effective with its propaganda to get more money to hire more people. A whole flock of U. S. corporations have disarmament contracts ranging from \$10,000 to \$50,000. Disarmament has become a hot field for Federal till taps. So universal is the desire for peace, and so beguiling is the advertising of the ACDA that "professional peacemakers" are finding their happy hunting grounds.

### Deep Wildcat, Offset Spotted In Crockett; Show Of Oil Bailed

Crockett County gained location for a deep wildcat an extension and a show of oil in another operation during the past week.

Jake L. Hamon, Dallas, will drill the No. 1 Robbins, an 8,400-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, seven miles southeast of McCamey and three miles north of the Tippett multipay area.

Location is 4,656 feet northwest of the east corner and 467 feet northeast of the northeast line of 22-36-H&TC, but in 2-B-G&SF.

Macdonald Oil Corp., Midland, No. 1-3 D&E University, in 3-29-University, 3,400-foot wildcat in the Lancaster Hill multipay oil and gas field of Crockett county, five miles east of Fort Lancaster, bailed oil at rate of one barrel per hour from an unidentified zone, possibly upper Clearfork.

The project had encountered free oil while drilling between 2,885-895 feet.

Drilling continued below 2,960 feet. It is 1 1/4 miles south of the de-

pleted upper Clearfork discovery which was recompleted as a San Andres oil producer.

Howard Olsen Development Co., Midland, will drill the No. 2 Miller as a 1,000-foot north offset to its No. 1 Miller, recent 3/4-mile northeast extension to 3,200-foot sand production in the Refoil multipay field of Crockett County, 10 miles south of Ozona.

Location is 1,467 feet from the most southerly south line and 2,000 feet from the most westerly west lines of Sallie Renshaw survey No. 38. Contract depth is 3,300 feet.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1946. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 11a and 11-b-1 of Article III so that the same shall mean, of one section, to be known as Section 11a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of sums to (1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individual recipients of Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amount for such assistance payments shall not exceed the amounts that are payable out of federal funds for such purposes, providing that the amount expended out of state funds for such purposes shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000); providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States; and providing for the necessary action, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 11a and 11-b-1 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same are hereby amended, so that the same shall hereinafter consist of one section, to be known as Section 11a of Article III, which shall read as follows:

Section 11a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be enacted, for assistance to, and for the payment of sums to:

(1) Neely aged persons who are aged, bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(2) Neely individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their sixtieth (60th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Neely Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(3) Neely blind persons who are aged, bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

(4) Neely children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for such assistance as is authorized by this section, provided that such Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to such person assisted shall not exceed the amount matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per year out of state funds for such assistance shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

"The Legislature may enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1946, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the (1) neely aged, (2) neely individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) neely blind and (4) neely children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Government of the United States for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amount expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the (1) neely aged, (2) neely individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) neely blind and (4) neely children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Government of the United States for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amount expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall cause to be printed and distributed for the purpose of this section, a copy of this Constitution and the proposed Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas.
