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EXECUTIVE PUT-A-TAKE

The further we look, the more dragon's teeth we find in the surprise package that is labeled "The Civil Rights of -1963" and tabbed with the numbers S. 1731 and H. R. 7152.

Peering beyond its widely publicized Title II — the explosive "Public Accommodations" section which confuses property rights and human rights and withdraws the Constitutional right of trial by jury from those charged by Federal gum-shoers with violation of this chapter — there are some further shockers.

Title VII, for instance, is a blueprint for the destruction of the union seniority system — if not of the whole temple of organized labor. Stanza Seven authorizes a "Commission on Equal Employment Opportunity" with unlimited powers "as may be conferred upon it by the President."

It would prevent racial or religious discrimination in hiring by all employers "participating in programs or activities in which direct or indirect financial assistance by the United States Government is provided by way of grant, contract, loan, insurance, guaranty or otherwise." (Which means practically every business and professional institution.)

Where the Commission's inspectors found racial or religious "imbalance", an employer could be required to fire sufficient workers of the preponderant race or religion and hire enough Negroes or whites or Indians or Chinese or Eskimos, or Protestants or Catholics or Jews to achieve whatever

the inspector considered "balance". Obviously, the employer needing such replacements could no longer hire out-of-hand the workers sent him by the unions with which he had contracts.

And since the Commission could require removal of imbalance at all levels — from the laborers through the supervisors, executives, officers and directors — it seems obvious that its army of Federal busybodies would swiftly become the real masters of labor and management both — throughout the whole economy.

Their power becomes apparent when we realize that offenders might well have Federal loans called, contracts, guarantees or insurance cancelled, FDIC protection withdrawn, participation in any program denied — and after that, blacklisting for one, two or three years and revocation of Federally granted licenses — all by Executive Order.

The Executive Department is telling our Senators and our Congressmen that this is the kind of America you want. If you don't, write these men today and tell them to kill The Civil Rights Act of 1963.

TO BURY OUR SOULS FIRST

Khrushchev's famous promise: "We will bury you," has been variously interpreted. And even though you may want to think of it as a figure of speech, it is still no mere pleasantry.

On the West Coast, however, activities of the Bay Area Funeral Society in San Francisco and the Los Angeles Funeral Society — both of them directed and sponsored by Communist-fronters, fellow-travellers and assorted pinkos — strongly suggest a more literal acceptance of the Kremlin threat.

Both organizations bill themselves as co-operative non-profit societies, and while fronting for simpler and cheaper obsequies, seek to undermine the "bourgeois" institution of ceremonial and worshipful regard for the departed and thus destroy a fundamental expression of the Judeo-Christian ethic.

Both are dedicated to agitation against traditional funeral services as lavish, costly, more or less superfluous and an extravagance promoted by "monopolies" and "big business". As early as 1961, the Bay Area Funeral Society sought to relax California laws on the disposal of remains. While the original bill was referred to an interim committee for study, its sponsor, who had previously supported such Communist efforts as a curb on loyalty oaths and opposition to the disbarment of lawyers refusing to answer questions about their Communist affiliations, has said he will introduce another similar bill.

This macabre picture of Godless supporters of the Communist ideology (or lack of any) busily planning the manner of the burial Khrush has promised us should remind us of the earnest plea of the late Whittaker Chambers who wrote: "I beg you, do not underestimate the energy of the Communist will or the sweep of its strategic vision, simply because it seems improbable to you."

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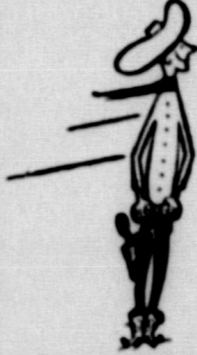
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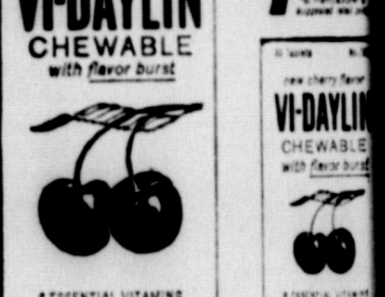

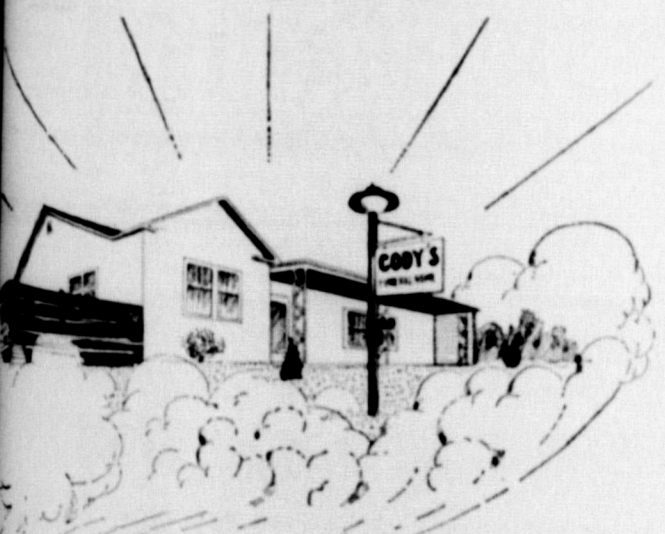

1964 Wool Incentive Payment Scale Is Set

College Station — The wool incentive and monetary support prices have been announced by USDA, says Ed Uvack, executive director of the Texas Wool Marketing Board. Shorn wool incentive price was set at 62c per pound and the maximum support price at 72c per pound for the 1964 marketing year.

The marketing year in 1964 coincides with the calendar year, the first time, says Uvack. This is in accordance with recent changes.

Prices of gulfed wool will continue to be supported at a level comparable to the incentive price for shorn wool.

The specialist notes that in 1961 marketing year, Texas wool producers received a gross incentive payment of \$16,994,327.54.

Continuation of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

The Stockman, Sept. 27, 1934

Accidents suffered early Wednesday morning in an automobile accident a mile and a half west of Ozona while on his way to the bed of a son, Ted Chapman, injured in another auto crash Sunday night, proved fatal to James Chapman, 78, pioneer resident of Ozona county, at 6 p. m. Wednesday, Chapman's car, which he was driving, was in collision with a car driven by Fred Williams, neighbor and chauffeur for Jim Mitchell of Ozona, who is here visiting his daughter, Mrs. J. C. Montague and other relatives.

The movement to reorganize a Scout troop in Ozona will be completed tonight when members of the newly appointed Boy Scout committee will meet with Joe Hadley, High School band instructor, and experienced Scoutmaster.

One dead, six injured, two seriously and four automobiles practically demolished was the toll of a series of accidents on the highways near Ozona the last five days, Jim Chapman was fatally injured in one of the accidents. Chapman was on the way to the bedside of a son, Ted Chapman, who with Louis Sapp, was seriously injured when the car in which they and Ollie and Emmett Sapp were riding, turned over between Ozona and Sonora. R. W. Swett, father of Bill Bissett, living near Barnhart, escaped serious injury when his car turned over near Junction.

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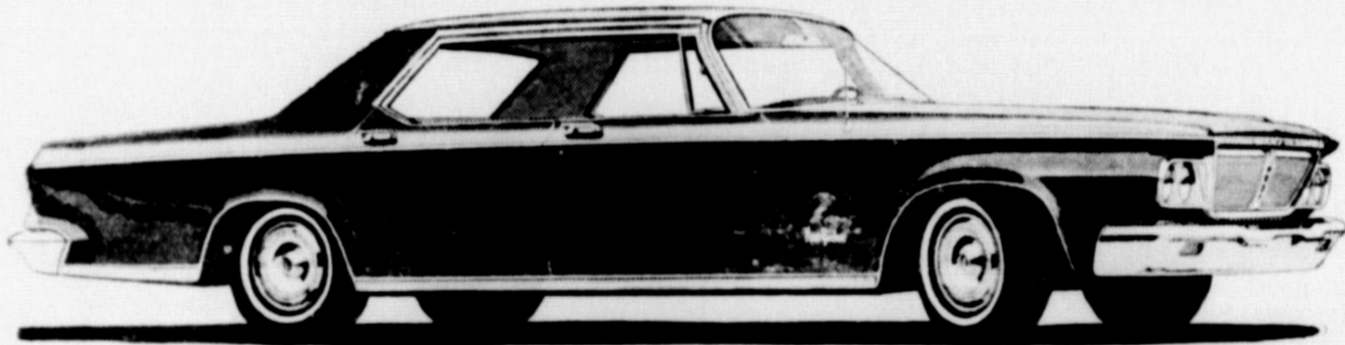

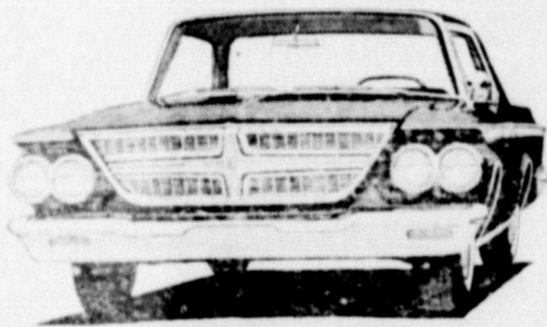
