## Dies From Injuries Suffered In Accident

Injuries Prove Fatal To Jerry Wm. Kilgore, 19

William Kilgore, 19, died this morning in a San Antonio hospital where he had been admitted for injuries suffered in a jeep in which he was driving with another Ozona youth on the J. B. Parker road.

Kilgore suffered fatal injuries when he and J. W. Sparks, Jr., and Mrs. Walter Sparks were on a deer hunt on the Sparks property. Sparks suffered minor injuries in the mishap. The two boys were out early on the hunt and were reportedly nearly ten miles from home when they were found and taken to a hospital by a passerby early morning.

Kilgore was born July 10, 1944, in Ozona. He had worked the land for several years on the J. B. Parker road in the area. His father is a resident of Texas-New Mexico.

Funeral services will be held at the Crane Methodist Church at 10 o'clock this morning. Burial will be in the cemetery. The body will remain at the James Funeral Home here until Friday morning.

Surviving are the parents; three brothers, Don Jean, serving in the United States Army, and James Earl and Larry Wayne, both of whom are in the military service; the paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Kilgore of Cisco; a nephew and niece, Mike and Jean Kilgore, children of Mr. and Mrs. Don Jean Kilgore.

## Holiday Weather Is Cold - And More Cold, Spiced With Light Snow

Weather held the spotlight for Ozonans between Christmas and New Year, with winter leveling some of its hardest blows at the area.

Temperatures during most of the week have hovered in the low twenties each morning and Sunday night a light snow blanketed the ground as a new mass of cold air swooped down through Texas. A follow-up to the snow was one of the heaviest frosts in years which gave the appearance of snow here Tuesday morning. New Year's day started out a cold 23 degrees but turned out to be a balmy day, with most Ozonans glued to their television sets through most of the day, watching the Rose Bowl parade and the various football bowl games which occupied the afternoon.

## Drivers Must Be Responsible Under New Safety Laws

License Suspension May Be Penalty For Lack of Coverage

Austin — The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today reminded motorists that more stringent provisions of the state's safety responsibility law — requiring drivers and owners to be able to pay for damage to others in traffic accidents — become effective January 1, 1964.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS, director, emphasized that the law required the Department to suspend the driver licenses and vehicle registrations of drivers and owners who are not in compliance with the law at the time of accident involvement, if the accident comes under the Safety Responsibility Act.

"The law provides that drivers and owners of vehicles involved in traffic accidents occurring or originating on a public street, highway or thoroughfare resulting in \$100 or more property damage, injury or death must file written reports with the Department of Public Safety within 10 days, and its requirements must be met," he explained. "Accidents not involving death or injury but with \$25 or more damage involved still must be reported to the Department but will not come under the Safety Responsibility Law."

"The Department is required to suspend driver licenses and all motor vehicle registration plates of both the operator and owner of vehicles involved in an accident coming under the Safety Responsibility Law, unless:

1. Evidence of liability insurance coverage in the minimum amounts of \$10,000 where one person was injured or killed, \$20,000 where more than one, and \$5,000 property damage is reported to the Department.

## 1963 Produced Only 14.18 Inches Rain; Area Getting Drier

Average Annual Rainfall Dropped 3.6 In. Last 14 Years

If you didn't already know it, a look at the rain record will show that 1963 was another dry year in West Texas, in Ozona particularly and over most of Crockett county.

The year's rain totaled only 14.18 inches which is a little better than the previous year of 1962 but still a drought year and a continuation of the diminishing rainfall totals that have plagued this area for the last 14 years.

The 14.18 inches in 1963 compared with 11.65 inches the year before. The Ozona rainfall record, kept from 1931, shows the annual rainfall averages dropping steadily over the recent years. The 1963 total brought the 33-year average to 18.17 inches annually. This has been a drop from an annual average of 19.6 inches which prevailed here through 1950 and a drop of even more from a lush ten-year average, from 1935-1945 of 21.0 inches.

But the sharpest drop in the average annual rainfall has occurred in the last 14 years when the averaged scaled down to 15.98 inches in these years. This included the flood year of 1954 when Ozona received 12 inches in one week-end of rain.

The rainfall pattern in 1963 was one of drought. After a dry winter, with only .12 of an inch of rain in January, .94 of an inch in February, and not a single drop in March, the rain gods relented somewhat with good spring rains in April, May and even a scattering into June. But when the hot months came, the spring rains went. July brought only .14 of an inch of moisture, one light shower, and August produced only 1.25 inches, this in five different light rains through the hot month. September, when this section normally expects its fall rains, was good for only .82 of an inch, this again in four light falls, none of them good enough to more than wet the surface. October was even worse, with only .44 of an inch and November's 2.92 inches came too late to produce much winter growth and December was another dry one with only .46 of an inch.

Hope springs eternal, especially with a West Texas ranchman, and hopes are now rising for 1964, hope that the two-year cycle will prevail and 1964 will be a wet year.

Meanwhile, winter is taking its usual terrific poke at the West Texas livestock country and ranchman are pouring out the feed to all classes of livestock, hoping for an early, wet spring and a moderate, wet summer.

## Final Gas Discovery On Carson Ranch In South west Crockett

Texas American Oil Corp., Midland, completed a Canyon sand dry gas discovery its No. 1 Carson, 25 miles southwest of Ozona and 4 1/2 miles southwest of the one-well Ozona Southeast (Canyon sand) field and the same distance from a long extension to Canyon sand gas production in the Ozona, Southwest multipay field of Crockett County.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 542,000 cubic feet of gas per day through perforations between 5,401-6,123 feet in 4 1/2-inch casing set at 6,281 feet, on total depth of 6,401 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 2-2-4-GN.

## Lions Play Garden City In Opener Of Big Lake Tourney

Ozona Cagers Fresh From Victory Over McCamey Badgers

Coach Brooks Dozier's Ozona Lions will meet Garden City at 6:30 this evening as they enter the 33rd Big Lake Invitational tournament in Big Lake.

Big Lake and Crane are favored in the big twenty-four team meet but in a tourney the size of the Reagan meet it is sometimes hard to tell just who should be favored before it begins.

The Lions ran their record to 7 wins against 2 losses Monday night when they traveled to McCamey and downed the Badgers 47 to 36 in a rough ball game that resembled more a football game than a basketball contest.

The Lions hit only 26 percent of their field shots but even that was not so bad when you consider the types of defensive measures being used in the contest.

Rodney Stewart led the Lion attack as he connected for 28 points to lead both teams.

Ozona jumped into an early lead and was never in trouble as they controlled the Badger, whom they had edged by a single point earlier in the Rankin tourney.

Not much is known about Garden City except it would be fairly safe to say they will be taller than the Lions, who have thus far done a marvelous job of rebounding against their taller foes.

The Lions, win or lose, will play again about the same time Friday. Coach Dozier will start David Childress at the post with Scott Mahon and Richard Vargis at forwards and Leroy Cooper and Rodney Stewart at guards.

FFA members will have 138 lambs, 57 Angora goats and four calves, which they have been feeding, ready for showing, grading and judging by the date of the annual show.

The judging will begin at 8 a. m. and will be completed by noon. At the noon hour a benefit barbecue dinner will be served by the FFA.

## Schools Are Back In Business This Morning After Holiday Period

The Ozona Public Schools resumed studies today following the Christmas holidays which began Dec. 20.

High School enrollment, which has shown a gradual drop from an early year high of 215, may be below the 200 mark for the first time this year providing no new students appear for registration this week.

Enrollment at the North Elementary school has shown some increase since school began and after some losses just prior to the holidays expects some replacements to day but the rally is not expected to offset the losses and enrollment is off considerably from last year's mark. Two teachers were not replaced after resigning last year due to the drop in North Elementary enrollment.

At South Elementary, a record beginning enrollment has shown a slight loss but has remained steady for the past several months with few gains or losses.

Principal Ernie Boyd attributed the gain in enrollment at South Elementary to the employment of processed Mexican nationals on ranches in the area.

Not all of the judges have yet been selected, Mr. Barber said, and their names will be announced next week.

Following the morning judging and the barbecue dinner at noon, the afternoon will be devoted to an invitational livestock judging contest among area teams.

The visiting judging teams will compete against each other for team honors and awards, while Ozona FFA livestock judging teams will compete against each other on an individual basis. The home FFA teams will not compete in the invitational judging. Usually eight to a dozen area teams are entered in the annual invitational meet. Teams will judge classes of sheep, goats and hogs and will grade cattle.

FFA feeders will offer lambs in five different classes, crossbred mutton lambs, crossbred ewe lambs, finewool lambs, shorn finewool lambs, and commercial finewool ewe lambs. Fat lambs and calves will be graded into commercial slaughter grades, which are prime, choice, good and feeder. Commercial finewool ewe lambs will be placed by the judge and Angora goats will also be placed.

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#### VITAL ASSIGNMENT

Thomas C. Mann, now finishing up his chores as US Ambassador to Mexico, after being named Assistant Secretary of State for Inter-American Affairs on Saturday and given additional eminence as special assistant to the President on Wednesday, could well be the Western Hemisphere's man of destiny.

President Johnson told his press conference that he wanted Mr. Mann "to be the one man in the Government to coordinate the policies of this hemisphere," and added: "As special assistant to the President to coordinate our policies in Latin America, he will be dealing with many other American agencies and other international agencies. We expect to speak with one voice on all matters affecting this hemisphere. Mr. Mann, with the support of the Secretary of State and the President, will be that voice."

Mr. Mann, who is a Texan and a friend of the President, is particularly well equipped for what could well be the most important post that any American holds. A native of Laredo, Mr. Mann grew up on the Mexican border and absorbed his Spanish with the mother tongue.

He graduated from Baylor University in 1934 and practiced law in his home town until 1942, when he left to be special assistant in the Foreign Service Auxiliary and was sent to Montevideo, Uruguay. Moving up through various jobs in the State Department, he became special assistant to the Assistant Secretary of State for American Republics Affairs in 1947. His service in Washington has since alternated with diplomatic assignments in Caracas, Venezuela; Athens, Greece; in Guatemala, San Salvador and most recently in Mexico.

In view of the highly explosive area in which the new presidential assistant must operate, and in view of our long history of errors from Tierra del Fuego to the Rio Grande together with the looming crisis, it may be important in days to come to know of Mr. Mann's background. On the record, he is highly qualified.

And in fact, he will have to be—or we shall have not just a satellite, but a whole new Soviet in our hemisphere.

And one of the most fascinating bits of writing on the subject was one by that gifted Dallas News columnist, Paul Crume, appearing in the front page column called Big D in a recent issue of the News.

Because it is so appropo at the beginning of a new year and in these trying times in which the world finds itself today, and because we fear some readers may have missed it in the Dallas News, we reproduce it below, with thanks to Mr. Crume and the News.

Red Webster has a way of doing the gracious thing. Here came his regular New Year's letter during weekend saying, "... it is my fervent hope that 1964 will bring you all the good things you so richly deserve."

On the contrary, let us hope not, Thank goodness, I don't get the things I deserve. I get better.

If most of us got only what we deserved, we would be pretty disappointed.

It is a privilege, for instance, to live in this blessed land at a time when it is at a peak of power, when it is for at least a few years the most powerful nation that has ever existed. Continental Oil Co., Odessa, will drill the No. 1-7 J. M. Shannon, a 9,900-foot Ellenburger wildcat, in Crockett County, 3/4-mile northwest of its No. 1-1 Shannon, dual Escondido (lower Pennsylvania and Fusselman oil) opener and 1/2-mile due west of the firm's No. 1-8 Shannon, indicated second Fusselman producer and prospective Pennsylvania gas-distillate and Ellenburger pay opener, 14.3 miles northeast of Iraan.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of 7-2-GC&SF. It is also 3/4-mile northeast of a 9,520-foot Ellenburger failure.

The No. 1-1 Shannon, was finished Dec. 2 from the lower Pennsylvania for 262 barrels of oil through an 11-64-inch choke and

perforations between 8,300-8,400 feet; and from the Fusselman 285 barrels of oil through an 11-64-inch choke and perforations between 8,562-8,571 feet.

The No. 1-8 Shannon, in GC&SF, flowed gas at the maximum rate of 3,053,000 cubic feet daily and distillate at the hourly rate of 24 barrels and water at the hourly rate of 34 barrels in a test between 7,893-90 feet.

From the Fusselman, it showed 57.65 barrels of 36 gravity oil in one hour, on a 3/4-inch choke, and gas at the daily rate of 2,400 cubic feet, on a drillstem test between 8,625-80 feet.

From the Ellenburger, it showed 4,760 feet of oil and 40 barrels of heavily oil and gas-cut water in a test between 9,060-123 feet. It showed 92 barrels of oil and reversed out a full string of oil on a 3/4-inch choke between 8,116-9,200 feet, and flowed 20 barrels of oil in one hour and reversed out 57 barrels of

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

## HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin — Loan Offices Licensed — Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell issued a total of 1,630 licenses to be displayed by consumer credit companies which make loans up to \$1,500. Licensing was the first major step under the Texas Regulatory Loan Act which went into full effect on December 21.

All of these licensees — ranging from a single lender in New Boston to a 60-office Family Finance chain — now will be under state supervision. A lot of "loan sharks" who could not, or would not, meet the new state requirements were flushed out by passage of the law.

Loan lobbyists estimated earlier in the year that there were 2,200 loan offices in the state, but only 1,895 filed letters of intent to file application for a license. Then some 265 never followed their letters with applications.

Commissioner Miskell refused to license 30 applicants, and nine of these have suits against the state pending in federal and state courts.

Slant-hole sums recovered — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr announced the recovery of \$110,000 from two defendants accused of slant-hole oil well operations. Of this, \$10,000 was recovered.

Carr said the money will be placed in the State Treasury.

Opinions — The attorney general ruled that an agreement of passage of title made by joint owners of a motor vehicle would not be sufficient to authorize the State Highway Department to issue a new certificate of title to the motor vehicle in the name of the surviving joint owner.

He also made a ruling on fee collections in criminal convictions, other than homicides, and ruled out Texas A&M University's claim to a \$3,000 educational bequest which has been held in the Governor's Suspense Fund nearly 30 years. The bequest will remain in the fund until the benefactor's requirements are met.

Motorists Warned — Col. Homer Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, issued a

special warning to car owners that New amendments to the Texas safety responsibility law become effective on January 1.

Amendments require that drivers prove their ability to pay for damage to others in traffic accidents. All accidents resulting in \$100 or more damage, injury or death must be reported in writing to the DPS within 10 days. Accidents not involving death or injury and resulting in as much as \$25 in damages also must be reported. But these do not come under the safety responsibility law.

Licenses will be suspended unless both operators and owners of cars in accidents coming under the law can prove adequate liability insurance coverage.

Minimum requirements are \$10,000 covering liability for one person; \$20,000 for two or more persons, and \$5,000 property damage. Otherwise they must establish financial responsibility, if they are at fault.

Suspensions of licenses and registration will be for a period of two years unless requirements of the safety responsibility act are fully met.

Construction Rises — The seasonally-adjusted index of total construction authorized in Texas in November amounted to a three-percent increase over October.

UT Bureau of Business Research predicted that the November gain probably will cause the construction industry to top its 1962 total.

Short Snorts — Texas public school cafeterias will serve 2,400,000 pounds of chicken in months ahead. This is Texas' share of 50,000,000 pounds bought by the U. S. Department of Agriculture with school lunch funds.

O. J. McCullough, Houston tool manufacturer, has applied for a charter for the National Association for the Advancement of White People.

Former State Sen. Bob Baker of Houston, who ran unsuccessfully for governor in 1962, picked up official filing papers here and said he will be a candidate for statewide office again. Speculation is that he will run for lieutenant governor or land commissioner.

Water storage in Texas reservoirs increased 26,100-acre feet in November. This brings the total to 7,200,000-acre feet or 61 per cent

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

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

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

"2. A release signed by damaged or injured persons is filed with the Department.

"3. A signed agreement to pay damages in installments is accepted by the damaged or injured persons, and filed with the Department.

"4. The operator and owner are found not to be liable in a civil court of competent jurisdiction, and a copy of such finding is filed with the Department.

"5. The operator and owner deposit with the Department cash or bond security in an amount sufficient to cover any judgment for damages resulting from the accident that might be obtained by damaged or injured persons, which in no case shall be less than \$200".

In addition, the operator and owner must file proof of financial responsibility for the future and must maintain it for five years.

Garrison noted that under the new law, suspensions of licenses and registrations will be for a period of two years, unless the requirements of the Safety Responsibility Act are met.

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### The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Jan. 3, 1935

With three new faces appearing in the line-up, Crockett county officials were sworn in for new terms in office January 1. Two new county commissioners, Charles Black and E. R. Kinser, were sworn in and W. M. Johnigan took office as justice of the peace succeeding Bryan McDonald. A veteran official, O. W.
