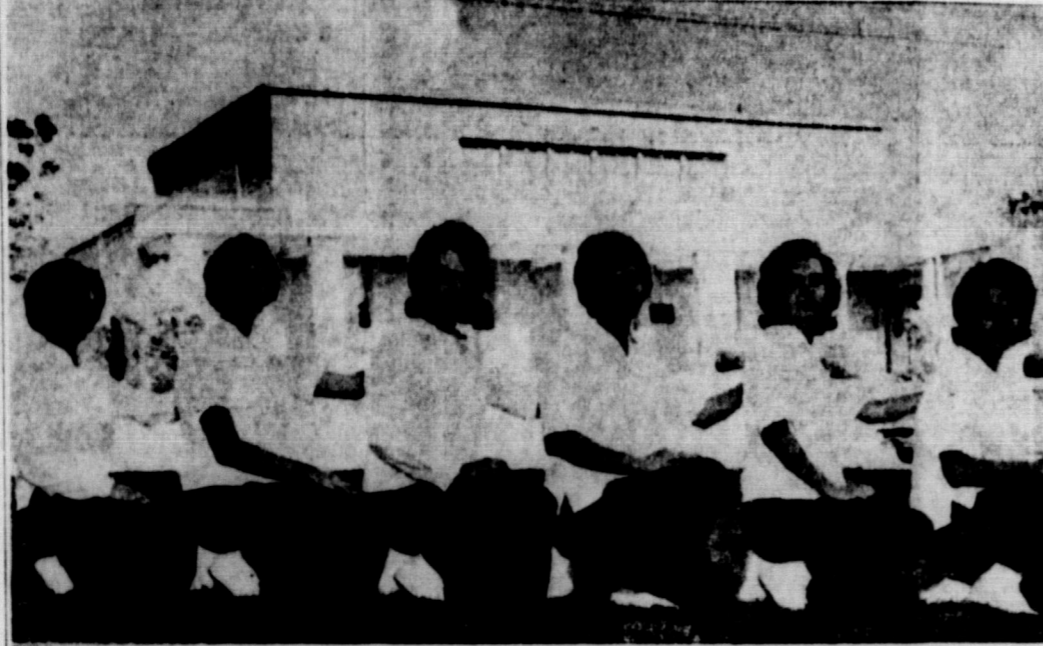

Power Interrupted When Giant Fuse In Sub-Station Blows

A large part of Ozona was without electric power for nearly an hour and other parts for at least 30 minutes Monday morning when a fuse burned out in the West Texas Utilities Co. local sub-station.

The giant-size fuse, as big as a man's arm and nearly as long, apparently reached the end of its period of usefulness and just burned out, with no apparent reason, such as a short or surge of current, according to local Manager T. J. Bailey.

Since no replacement fuse was on hand (it being a remote possibility of failure except in unusual circumstances) the WTU local repair crew had to fashion a "jumper" to restore the flow of electric current to city lines. A sub-station repair crew has been summoned to make a check on equipment at the local installation, Mr. Bailey said.

35 Grid Prospects Out For Practice Sessions; Season Opener Sept. 4

Coaches Fred Hickman and Sonny Cleere greeted thirty-five prospects for the 1964 Ozona Lions football team Monday morning as the boys and coaches began the rugged two-a-day two weeks training period which will end with the beginning of school Aug. 31.

The thirty-five players constituted the largest number of able bodies that the Lions have been able to muster in several years, even though a number of them are freshmen and sophomores and scheduled for B team service.

In contrast to last year's squad, which wound up the season with four seniors, this year's team seems likely to start the season with not less than eleven seniors, who are bigger and stronger and faster than last year's group, if any com-

Coach Hickman expressed the desire before the practice sessions began, to have at least 22 or 24 players on the first squad. At least ten and perhaps more B team candidates are expected to report Monday, and if they do, such a squad might be possible with a few squadmen being on loan to the B team for game experience, since the B squad will still have 22 or more players.

The 1964 Lions will have as their backbone seniors, Joel Huff, Pete Garza, Bob Amthor, Rick Hagelstein, Mike Walters, Aiejos Tambunga, George Kyle, Richard Vargas, Thomas Garza, and Sam Cervantez, with one other senior, David Childress, who has yet to play, perhaps being a factor. When it is considered that last year the team had only Pete Garza, Joel Huff and Richard Vargas back from the 1962 club, one can get an idea of how much difference there is in returning material between those two years.

Among those who were not regulars or full time subs last year the Lions will have Larry Williams, Charles Farris, George Cox, Darrel Maney, Tomas DeHoyas, Humberto Ramos, Randy Upham and Bill Carson who will be playing a good bit this year and who have some degree of experience. In addition to these, there are others who are doing well even though they may get most of this year's playing time in on the B team, where they could be better than anything in a reserve line that the Lions have had to offer in several years.

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LBJ'S FORTUNE

Look Magazine has reported the nation's first family's total wealth at \$14 million by its own estimate and at \$4 million by the estimate of A. W. Moursund, trustee for President Johnson and his family.

By Moursund's own estimate, ownership of 85 percent of a radio and television broadcasting station in Austin is listed as worth \$3-230,000, while Life's estimate of this same asset is given as \$7.6 millions.

This broadcasting monopoly was acquired by Mrs. Johnson, the magazine relates, in 1943, for a cash price of \$17,500, while Johnson was then a U. S. Representative in the national Congress from Texas. Thus an initial investment of \$17,500 was rocketed into a comfortable fortune by either Life's or Moursund's estimate of its value.

Meanwhile, the people of the Texas capital city will tell you that they would like to have more than one

television station to watch but somehow the Federal Communications Commission has never granted another franchise. Recently, the city had a chance to have multiple station reception via a cable system such as Ozona has, but the FCC withheld its approval until the second group of promoters announced that LBJ family had an option to purchase a half interest in the cable system. This option, Life Magazine estimates, is worth another million dollars.

Pointing out that the Johnson family "has become notably wealthy during his years in high public office," Life adds:

"this process of accumulate violated no tradition in a republic which is founded on the principles of free enterprise and which has never demanded of its servants . . . that they practice economic celibacy."

True, but how many other single broadcasting stations in a moderate sized city do you know that have



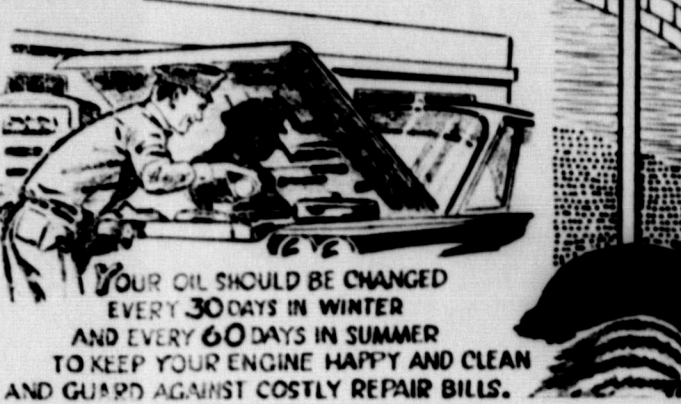
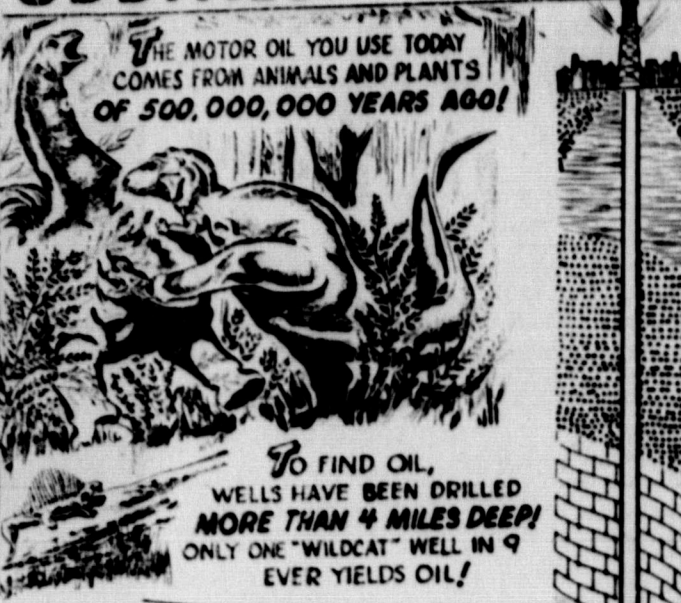

Political pundits are still having a field day interpreting what Senator Goldwater meant in his now-famous two-sentence quote on extremism. But there is another quote which deserves the same scrutiny, it seems to us, and perhaps right here is the place to give it some of the exposure it rightly deserves.

In a Jan. 15 speech in the White House, LBJ said: "We are going to try to take all of the money that we think is unnecessarily being spent and take it from the 'haves' and give to the 'have nots' that need it so much."

Just what "have nots"? The tenant farmers on his wife's plantation? The Yugoslavs? The registered Democratic voters in New York's Harlem? The starving Cubans?

And what is "money that we think is unnecessarily being spent"? Who decides what is unnecessary spending? Bureaucrats or taxpayers? Internal Revenue officials, maybe? A \$25,000-a-year federal judge? A jury?

And, finally, who are the "haves"? Until there's some clarification, we'll have to think that the gentleman is talking about our own bank account savings and pocketbook. And yours.

You know, we just read that quote again, and now we have a whole new set of questions to ask about it. Haven't you?

reading a newspaper article, magazine story or for that matter an instruction book, would be foolhardy. Learn the sport under the guidance of an expert skin diver.

In areas where organized instruction courses are not available, it is often possible to contact an individual who is qualified and willing to act as an instructor. Several skin diving clubs have been formed in Texas and most of the major cities have one.

Before you even think about taking up skin diving consider your physical condition. Age is seldom a factor but people with heart or chronic respiratory ailments should not become skin divers. It is a rather rigorous sport and should be attempted only by people in reasonably good health.

Skin diving is governed by several easily learned common sense rules. Perhaps the most important piece of advice a beginner should remember is never dive alone. Skin diving is safer and a lot more fun when the buddy system is used.

Once you have mastered the basic diving techniques, a whole new world will be opened to you.

Perhaps your cup of tea is spearfishing. This is fascinating sport which requires stealth and a good shooting eye. In a way, it is hunting underwater. Texas permits only the taking of rough fish like gar and carp by skin diving.

The diver is equipped with a spring-type gun which drives a spear with tremendous force. Flipping quietly through the water, the diver approaches as close as possible to his quarry, aims and lets fire.

After your elementary education in nearby lakes, maybe you would like to try something bigger and more demanding. Many inland divers head to the coast occasionally to try their skill

at spearing the salt-water species.

A favorite spot for hunting is around one of the many oil wells lying off the Texas coast. Often the diver will find a huge jewfish lurking there.

A diver who tangles with a 200 - pound - plus jewfish will have a real tussle. Several divers often team up to try and bring these huge fish to the surface.

Divers are called on occasionally to aid in underwater searches. They look for valuable articles which have been accidentally dropped into the water. Also for the bodies of drowned persons.

Sometimes parties are organized to travel to far-away places—like the coast of Mexico, Florida or the Bahamas — to explore colorful underwater reefs.

Anyway you take it, skin diving is a fascinating, exciting pastime.

WTCC Executive Urges Business Men In Politics

Jack Springer, executive Secretary of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, with headquarters in Abilene, spoke to the Ozona Lions Club last Thursday urging business men to pay more attention to politics.

Who said it? Lyndon B. Johnson at his July 30 press conference. All clear everybody?

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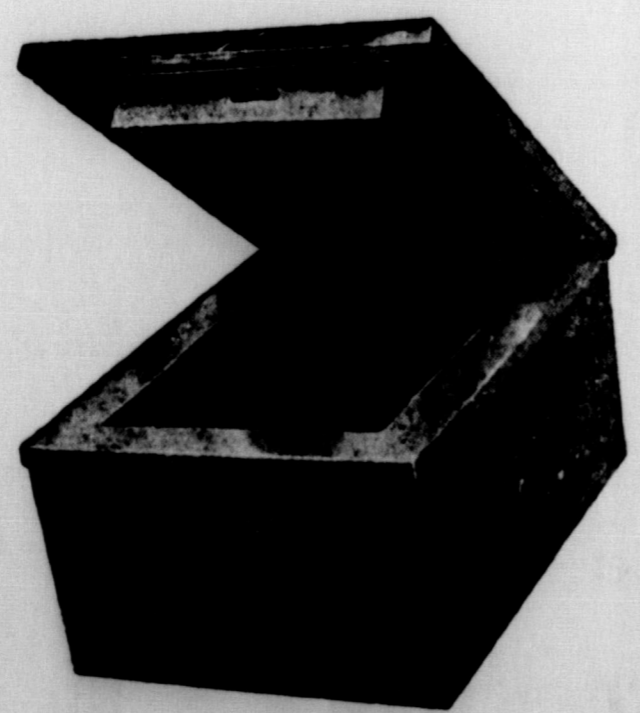
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MISS PAM JONES plans September wedding

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — All available money and manpower of the Texas Water Commission is being dedicated to a long-range state water master plan.

Gov. John Connally authorized the agency to transfer money already appropriated by the Legislature for other purposes. Existing state plans, in Connally's opinion, "fall short of satisfying the water needs for all of Texas".

In 1961, the Commission produced a plan for meeting Texas water needs to the year 1980.

Both the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, are coming up with their own long-range plans covering parts of Texas. They propose diversion of water from surplus areas like the

Sabine to water-shy areas like the Nueces.

Connally said the federal government is considering a water pollution control bill which would supplant state authority in the field.

He urged the Commission to explore "all reasonable alternatives", including those contained in preliminary reports of U. S. Agencies.

Sales Tax Raise Suggested — a Texas State Teachers Association spokesman last week suggested the Legislature raise additional funds for education through increasing the sales tax rate or removing present exemptions.

New Ranger Named—Toliver H. Dawson of Del Rio was named a Texas Ranger by Department of Public Safety Director Homer Garrison, Jr.

Dawson, who first served as a highway patrolman at Alpine, will be stationed in the Carrizo Springs area. He succeeds the late Wiley Williamson of Gonzales on the 62-man force.

Results Noted In Texas Tourism Ads

Texas' first travel advertising campaign, launched by Texas Tourist Development Agency this spring in national magazines and newspapers, produced 8,746 inquiries in its first four months. Each inquiry brought one of the Texas Highway Department's "Fun-tier Follies" with information about things to see and do in Texas. A follow-up campaign later in the year will seek to determine how many of those getting the information actually came to Texas. Thus TTDA will get a projection of the volume of "new dollars" generated for the state's economy in response to each advertising dollar made available.

TTDA's spring-summer campaign included full page four-color ads in Reader's Digest, Redbook and Sunset as well as 1,000-line black and white ads in The New York Times and The Chicago Tribune. Response has

come from every state and several foreign countries.

Wildcat Slated, Test Flows Gas In Ozona Area

A wildcat was scheduled in Crockett County and a Crockett wildcat flowed gas on a drillstem test. Also a conformer was slotted in a Crockett field.

Texaco Inc., Midland, will attempt to open Wolfcamp sand production in the Ozona, East multipay field of Crockett County with the scheduling of the No. 3-B A. R. Kincaid, an 8,750 foot test, three miles southeast of Ozona, one mile east of a Canyon gas-distillate producer and 1 1/2-mile east-southeast of a dual Canyon and Ellenburger gas-distillate producer in the field.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of 1-KL-G C&SF. Contract depth is sufficient to test the Ellenburger.

The field produces, in addition to Canyon and Ellenburger, from the Spraberry gas and Leonard oil.

Texaco Inc., Midland, No. 1-C E. Davidson, in 5-KL-GC&SF, Crockett County Ellenburger wildcat, six miles southeast of Ozona 3 1/2 miles east-southeast of Ellenburger gas production in the Ozona, East multipay field, and five miles west-southwest of the two-well Clayton Ranch (Ellenburger gas-distillate) flowed gas on a drillstem test in an unidentified formation, possibly Ellenburger.

Gas surfaced in five minutes, flowing at the maximum daily rate of 650,000

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an Amendment to Section 51a of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-2; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain means relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical care service or assistance; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for

Demos Challenged To Support State Right to Work Laws

Atlantic City, N. J. — A railroad conductor from Cincinnati believes the Democratic Party is in danger of becoming the party "of a new privileged class — the union hierarchy." S. D. Cadwallader, a conductor on the B. & O. Railroad, challenges the Democratic Convention, in a statement drafted for presentation to the Platform Committee Friday, to support the right of states to enact Right to Work laws as authorized in Section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act.

George Meany, president of the AFL-CIO, has demanded that the Party pledge itself to repeal the Section, thus destroying Right to Work laws in 20 states, including Texas.

"A political party which today would advocate the

destruction of the Right to Work safeguards that 58,000,000 American citizens have established in their 20 states must face the possible judgement of the electorate that it has become the party of a new privileged class — the union hierarchy — and that it is forsaking its historic role as a part of the American way of life," Mr. Cadwallader says.

Questions Arise When Powell Field Repairs Considered

A lot of questions arose when the Crockett County Commissioners Court opened discussion on what to do about repairing the roof of the Powell athletic field grandstand, unroofed by a recent freak windstorm.

The discussion arose when it was reported to the Court that the insurance company had paid off on the loss. Then the court began to consider the question of replacing the roof.

Two factors, each sufficient to prevent immediate action, arose. One is the present uncertainty of location of Interstate Highway 10 through Ozona — there is a possibility the road might cross the city over the athletic field. Another and combination consideration was the question of whether or not a roof is needed on the grandstand (night games being the present vogue) and is the present roof safe without rebuilding the entire structure.

With these presently un-

answered questions arising, the court disposed of the matter by appointing a committee — a committee of Commissioners to study the matter and report to the court at a later date.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of the bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or providing a particular conservation and reclamation district of such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

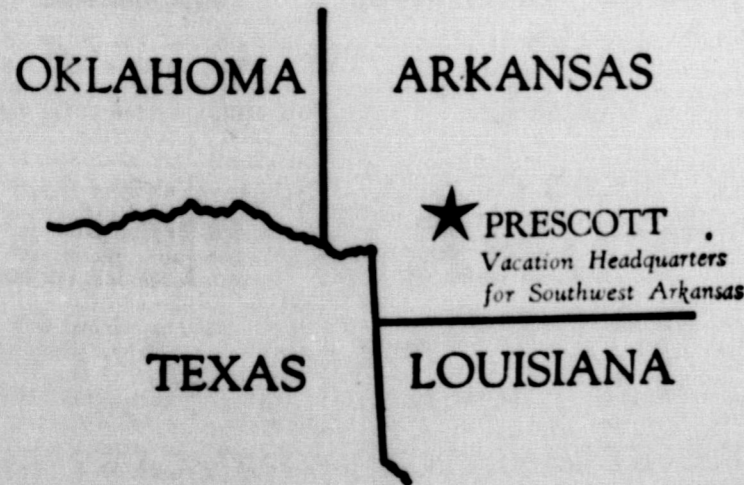

Ozona Historical Marker Signs To Be Erected On Hiways

The Texas State Historical Survey Committee has announced that two 'Historical Markers in City' signs will soon be erected in Ozona.

Ozona, is one of 125 Texas cities in which these new reflectorized signs will be placed. They are authorized by the State Building Commission, which recently signed the contract for their manufacture.

These markers, designed to inform tourists of historical sites in Ozona, will be placed on the city limit signposts on U. S. 290 East and U. S. 290 West by the Texas Highway Department. They measure 24 by 24 inches and are made of steel with white reflective letters reading "Historical Markers in City" on a black

background.

Town selection was determined by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee according to official Texas Historical Markers previously erected there.

The program also calls for the erection of 260 Official Texas Historical Markers in three sizes to relate the history of Texas in the Confederacy. These markers will be made of east aluminum with Swedish steel effect.

The State State Historical Survey Committee recommended the marker topics, determined locations, researched and wrote the inscriptions.

The erection of these four types of state markers is part of a five-year plan of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and its affiliate, the Texas Historical Foundation, to record, appreciate, mark, preserve, and survey Texas history.
