ONE MAN, ONE VOTE

To conform to the High Court's formula of "one man, one vote," the eminent Justices - if correct in their opinion that State apportionments as they now exist are unconstitutional because they do not conform to that formula - would seem to conclude that the Constitutional itself is un-Constitutional through the process of the Electoral College in the naming of a President.

Accepting the Court's "one man, one vote" as being the "supreme law of the land" (as interpreted in school segregation), let's have a look at the 1960 election when John F. Kennedy became the Nation's twelfth minority President; that is, received less than one-half the popular vote, but moved on into the White House just the same.

The popular vote for Mr. Kennedy was 34,266,096, a scant 119,450 more than the 34,107,647 cast for Mr. Nixon, while another 190,539 voted for five "splinter" candidates. Add these splinter ballots to those received by Mr. Nixon and we find that a grand total of 34,309,987 voted against Mr.

Nixon, and we find that a grand total of 34,309,987 voted against Mr. Kennedy.

Turning to the Electoral College, Mr. Kennedy received 303 of that body's votes, Mr. Nixon, 219, and Senator Harry Flood Byrd, Virginia Democrat, garnered 15, but not on the basis of any popular or written votes - one State with an uninstructed slate of electors cast its ballots for the distinguished Virginian.

Divide Mr. Kennedy's Electoral College total of 303 by Mr. Nixon's 219 and we come up with 1.39, that popular vote for Mr. Kennedy was worth 1.39 times that of one for Mr. Nixon.

One man, one vote? Don't be so naive.

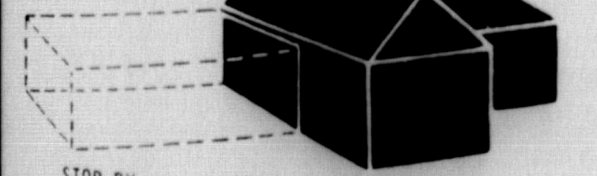

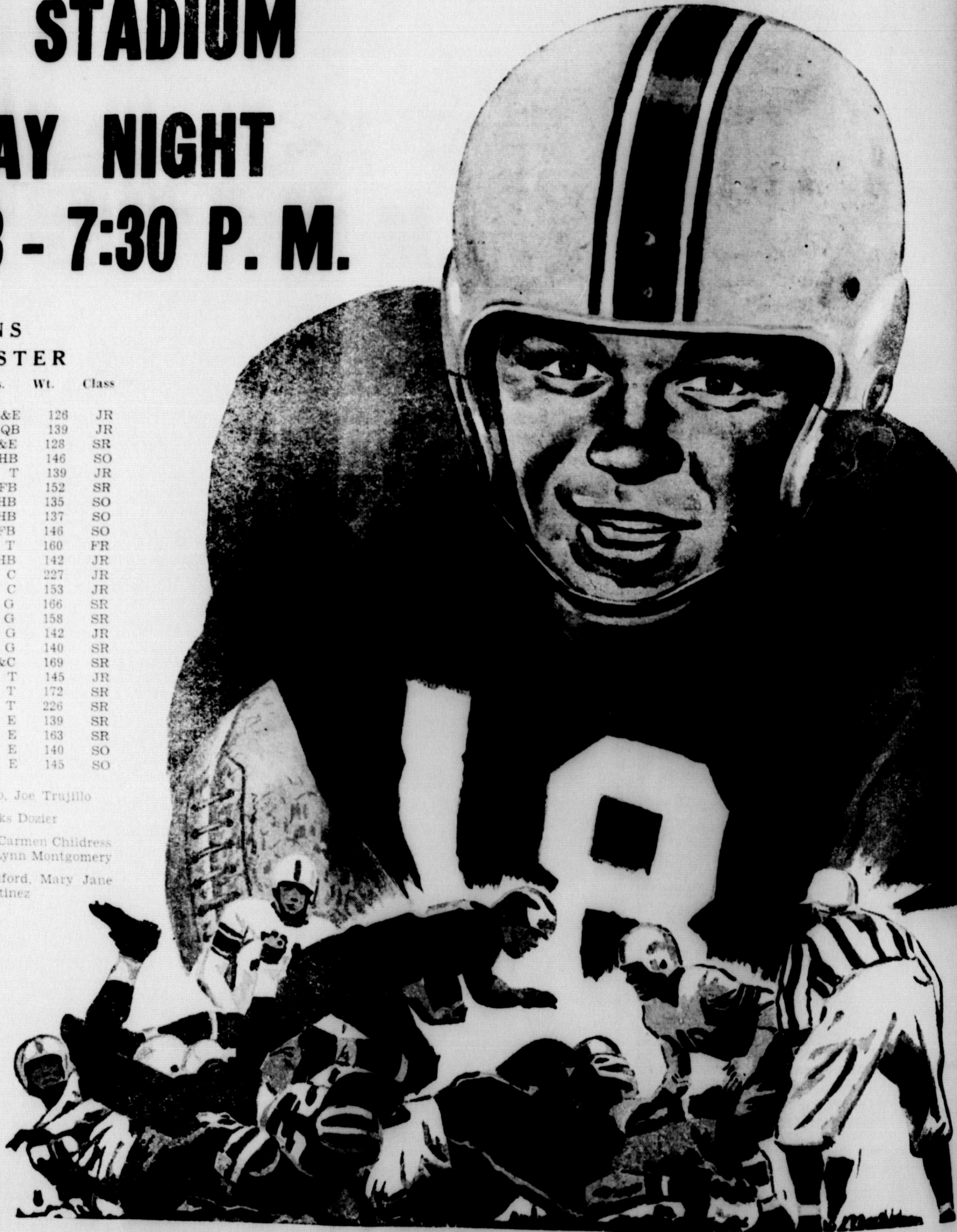
