Postmaster Asks Early Mailing Of Cards, Packages

Beginning December 1 and continuing through the end of the year, the postoffice department is asking for early Christmas mailing.

Postmaster Floyd Hokit urged mail users to use zip code numbers on envelopes and letters to insure against loss due to improper addressing.

Please wrap packages properly and include an address on the inside of the package as well as outside. This helps assure delivery and the outside address will be lost. The postmaster asked, "Zip coding means more direct routing, less handling, reducing chance for damage."

The suggested mailing dates for parcels between Dec. 10 and 15; gift parcels to distant states by Dec. 5 and local and nearby points Dec. 14. Greeting cards to distant states by Dec. 10 and to nearby points by Dec. 15.

Again this year we will be cooperative mailing packages in the lobby, Hokit said. "These will be packed for your convenience. As in the past, we will suggest that you use the zip code on the envelope and the cards be mailed whenever possible. Mail often and early the day.

If you are late with your package mailing, utilize the mail service, especially the week preceding Christmas. This is a good time to use zip coding in return address."

Postage on local cards will be 4 cents and out of state unsealed, 4 cents and sealed 5 cents. Unsealed cards that cannot be delivered will not be returned. If you wish them forwarded, return them, use 5c postage, and, of course, a complete return address. The department also urges you to take advantage of special delivery and special handling.

If a firm having a large mailing of advertising material is asked to let the postoffice pre-cancel the stamps. This will save handling.

"We would like to ask for continued cooperation in mailing your packages and greeting cards as early as possible," Hokit said. "Mailing early will insure your package or card arriving in time for Christmas."

Buck Bailey Fund Established At Washington State

A scholarship fund to benefit outstanding student athletes at Washington State University has been established in memory of University's veteran baseball and football coach, late A. B. "Buck" Bailey, who, with his wife, was killed recently in an auto accident near Albuquerque, N. M.

E. G. Batterson, director of the University's scholarship and development fund, is in charge of the new memorial fund. T. J. Bailey, Ozona, brother of the former coach and West Texas sports figure, of the fund's establishment and expressed hope of University officials that the fund would grow until it "will be sufficient to provide an annual scholarship for an outstanding student athlete at Washington State University." It is to be known as the A. B. "Buck" Bailey Memorial Scholarship Fund.

Lighted Bells Again Go Up To Herald Christmas

Christmas decorations are now being installed throughout Ozona. Bill Cooper, manager of the Crockett County Water Department, is in charge of installation.

An additional \$1600 of Christmas decorations were purchased this year. Funds were raised by a Chamber of Commerce Committee, headed by Bill Watson. This brings the total value of Ozona Christmas decorations to \$6,000.

The lights will be turned on as soon as installation is completed. Bill Watson expressed his appreciation to all who had a part in the Christmas decoration program.

Ag Statistics To Be Brought To Date With 1964 Census

The 1964 Census of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, in Crockett County will bring up to date the farm and ranch statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 agriculture census for this County:

There were 123 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 147 in 1954. The average size of farm and ranch was 14,120.1 acres in 1959, compared with 13,426.4 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by the County's farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$3,749,380. The value of all crops sold was \$89. The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$3,749,291.

The 1964 national Census of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1840. Because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years, Census Bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken. They ask every farmer and rancher to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls.

Warn Motorists Traffic Hazards on RM 33 Project

The Texas Highway Department has announced the reconstruction of R. M. 33 in Crockett County from 0.3 mile south of Reagan County line to 7.6 miles south. Proposed work consists of grading, structures, base and surfacing. The Texas Highway Department and the contractor, Maupin Construction Company of San Antonio, stated that construction began November 24, 1964 and will be completed by June 1965.

H. L. Bailey, Supvr. Resident Engineer in charge of construction of the project, stated that traffic will be routed through the work for the entire project. Although adequate barricades and warning signs will be prominently displayed, motorists should use extreme caution while passing through the area as it will be heavily traveled by large construction equipment.

Motorists are further cautioned that only temporary detours are provided on this project and speeds should be reduced accordingly as many points cannot be negotiated at the usual rate of speed.

Cooperation of the public is requested in obeying all traffic signals and warning signs.

Girls And Boys Cagers Lose In Eldorado Stand

Ozona girls and boys basketball teams came on hard times in Eldorado last Tuesday night as the Eldorado boys and girls walloped the local units with comparative ease.

The Ozona boys dropped their fourth straight contest and were never really in the ball game as Eldorado's six-foot-six Richard Preston hit for 19 points to lead the Eagles to a 61 to 38 win.

Despite the performance of the tall Preston, which was below his normal output, the Lions would have had a chance had they been able to control the other Eagles. But three of the other four starters broke into double figures against the Lions whose rebounding on the defensive board ranged from bad to miserable.

David Childress led the Ozona attack with 12 points while Bill Carson picked up 7 and George Kyle 8.

The girls did not fare any better than the boys and Eldorado, with sharp shooter Chrissy Moore leading the way with 33 points, kept the score at least doubled most of the way, with the locals only able to make a little progress when the reserves were in.

In the B game, Ozona probably could have won in dropping a 42 to 47 decision, the B's however subdued freely and in doing so found some good and some not so good combinations, the latter of which resulted in Eldorado's success.

David Lewis had 12 points, Sandy Stokes 10 and David Jacoby 9 in the losing cause none of the three more than parts of three quarters.

Making Out Income Tax Returns Being Taught In Schools

The Ozona Junior High School is among the 1700 schools in Texas that are training students in how to prepare their income tax returns this year. Principal Roy Killingsworth says that 120 students will receive several hours income tax instruction early in February. In Texas, 235,000 students will get this training. The free material furnished by the Internal Revenue Service will be taught by teachers Ron Murdoch and Mrs. R. L. Bland.

Elli Campbell, Jr., District Director for Internal Revenue in the Northern half of Texas, feels that the schools and teachers are doing an outstanding job with the simple tax course. He explained, "Taxpayers pay 47% of all federal taxes through voluntary compliance. Teaching Taxes teaches the student to pay all the taxes he owes. It also teaches him to keep records and take all the deductions he has coming to him. This course teaches students to pay the right amount - no more, no less. We started offering free materials to our nation's schools 12 years ago. Last year 38,000 teachers taught 3 1/2 million students in approximately 25,000 schools throughout the nation. Students taking this course make only one fourth as many errors as their parents make on their tax returns."

Conoco Finals Ellenburger Find In Shannon Area

The Escondido multipay field of Crockett County gained its second Ellenburger producer and a 3/4-mile southeast extension to that pay with completion of Continental Oil Co. No. 4-8 J. M. Shannon, 14 miles northeast of Iraan, for a 294 barrels of 42 gravity oil, no water.

Production was through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations between 9,066-116 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons.

Location is 660 feet from the south and west lines of 8-2-GC&SF.

The Ellenburger opener, the firm's No. 1-7 Shannon, was finished Nov. 12 for 318 barrels of 40.6 gravity oil through a 7-64-inch choke and perforations between 9,216-35 feet.

The Refoil multipay field of Crockett County gained its second 2,850 foot Clearfork producer and a 3/4-mile west extension to that pay with completion of American Petrofina Co. of Texas No. 2-B Roy Miller, eight miles southwest of Ozona.

It was finished for a daily flowing potential of 123 barrels of 31.6 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 985-1. Production was through a 16-64-inch 2-838-868 feet, which had been fractured with 30,000 gallons and 30,000 pounds of sand.

Location is 362.5 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines of 38 1/2-O-Sallie Renshaw.

The discovery American Petrofina (Cosden Petroleum Corp.) No. 1-B Roy Miller was finished Sept. 7, 1961, to pump 77 barrels of 27 gravity oil, no water, through perforations at 2-847 to 2,876 feet.

Screwworm Fight Carried To Mexico In Winter Months

Mission - Eradication workers are plotting their strategy for combating screwworms this winter which they hope will eliminate the threat of reinfestation of the United States by the livestock pest in 1965.

Their plan is to release all available sterile screwworm flies up to 200 miles or more below the international border along both east and west coasts of Mexico where large numbers of native screwworms live throughout the winter. Sterile males mate with native females and prevent reproduction. This action is expected to weaken Mexican screwworm colonies which form the principal threat to the Southwest and slow the northward migration of the insects next spring.

IN GOD WE (STILL) TRUST

We think it is about time that our Supreme Court refused to hear some of the silly, feckless appeals that have been addressed to it—such as the New York non-sectarian school prayer case the invocation of God in a Federal oath of office and the Court's intervention to protect innocent children from subversion by the Lord's Prayer and Bible readings in schoolrooms.

Furthermore, we hope the Justices are setting a healthy precedent for themselves in refusing to review the ruling of New York's State Court of Appeals upholding the inclusion of the words "under God" in the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

It should be mentioned, however, that the attorneys-general of 30 out of 50 states had previously filed a brief as "friends of the court" urging the Justices "not to remove from our public life every vestige of our religious heritage."

BACK-BENDING INVESTIGATION

The last Congress, in a noble gesture to make more jobs available to our own unemployed, voted awhile back to let Public Law 78 die on December 31. This is the law that regulates wages, working and living conditions under which Mexican workers, "braceros," may be temporarily imported to pick the crops of US farmers.

It now looks, however, as if they may still be brought in under P. L. 414 which gives no protection against exploitation. Thus, the Labor Department is soon to begin hearings to learn whether US workers are now willing to accept "stoop" labor.

We predict the Mexicans will be back—as legal braceros if they can, as illicit "wetbacks" if they must.

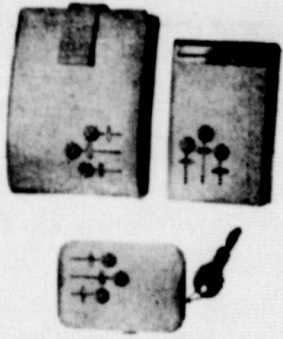
From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — A post-election review of statewide voting totals shows that only 89 per cent of the 3,100,000 Texans who were qualified to vote actually made it to the polls on November 3.

Total number of ballots cast — 2,760,788.

Not all of those who went to the polls voted in all the races. In Travis County, for instance, 3,461 of the 67,419 who cast ballots failed to vote in the presidential race. Elsewhere around the state, 52,304 Texans who voted in the governor's race did not vote on the lieutenant governor's race, which placed next on the ballot.

Highest vote getter, in this election and in Texas history, was Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr. He racked

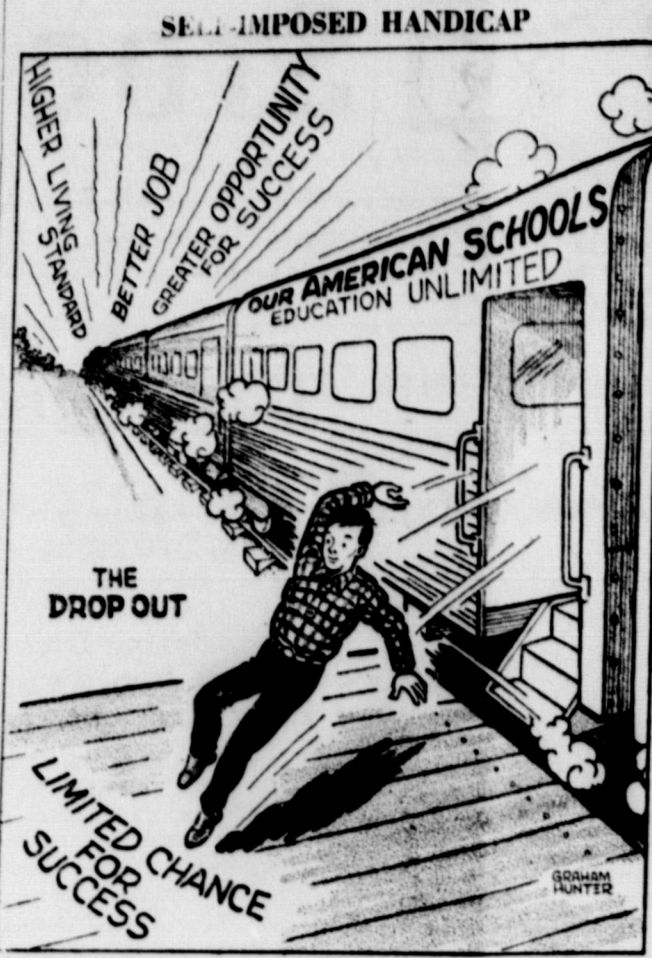


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up 1,901,308 votes. Gov. John Conally was next with 1,877,137. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith was third, with 1,833,747.

Train Hearing Set—Right after the order was issued allowing the Texas and Pacific Railroad to discontinue two passenger trains that ran between Ft. Worth and El Paso, the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railway Company filed a request with the Railroad Commission to discontinue two trains in West Texas.

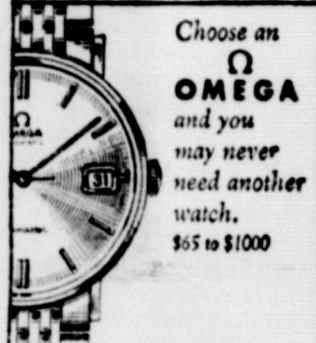
Company said it wants to stop service of passenger trains Nos. 77 and 78 between Brownwood and San Angelo because Railway Post Office service was halted on them September 26. Company said government failure to renew the postal contract will increase the railroad's already substantial net annual "out-of-pocket deficit" by more than 75 per cent.

Hearing on the application will be held in the Tom Green County Courthouse on January 14.

Pollution Jurisdiction Where Wise Shoppers Shop

Ruling — State Water Pollution Control Board is appealing a ruling by Judge Herman Jones held in a Superior Oil Company suit against the State, that the Railroad Commission has exclusive jurisdiction over disposal of oil and gas field waste.

Under the ruling the Water Pollution Control Board does not have authority to issue orders with regard to the use of open unlined salt water disposal pits designed to handle oilfield waste.

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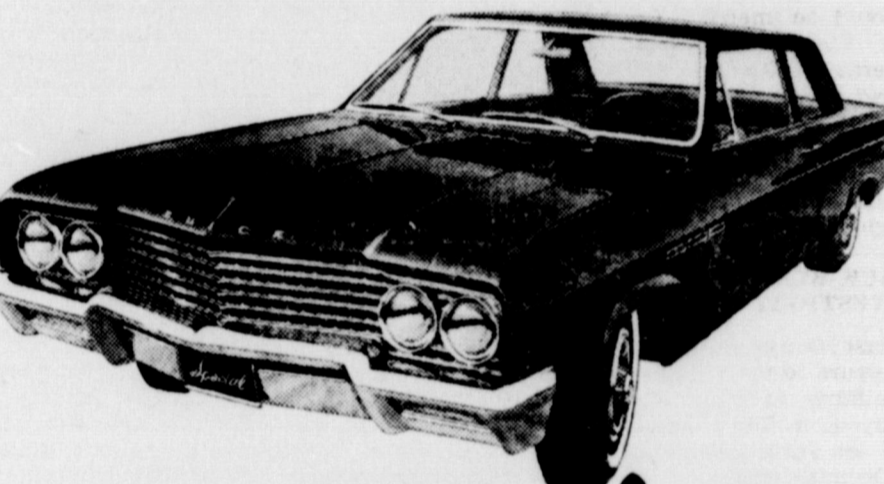

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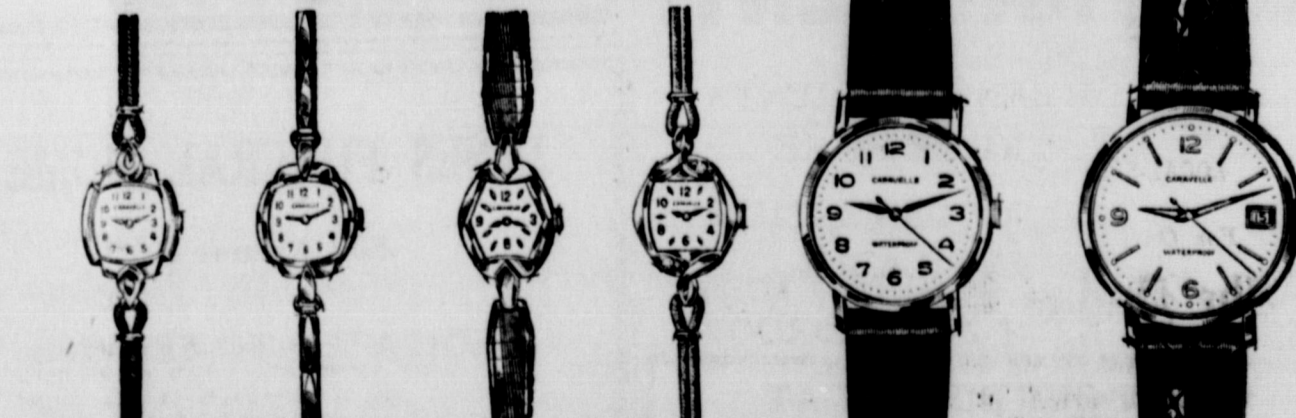

IN GOD WE (STILL) TRUST

We think it is about time that our Supreme Court refused to hear some of the silly, feckless appeals that have been addressed to it—such as the New York non-sectarian school prayer case the invocation of God in a Federal oath of office and the Court's intervention to protect innocent children from subversion by the Lord's Prayer and Bible readings in schoolrooms.

Furthermore, we hope the Justices are setting a healthy precedent for themselves in refusing to review the ruling of New York's State Court of Appeals upholding the inclusion of the words "under God" in the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

It should be mentioned, however, that the attorneys-general of 30 out of 50 states had previously filed a brief as "friends of the court" urging the Justices "not to remove from our public life every vestige of our religious heritage."

BACK-BENDING INVESTIGATION

The last Congress, in a noble gesture to make more jobs available to our own unemployed, voted awhile back to let Public Law 78 die on December 31. This is the law that regulates wages, working and living conditions under which Mexican workers, "braceros," may be temporarily imported to pick the crops of US farmers.

It now looks, however, as if they may still be brought in under P. L. 414 which gives no protection against exploitation. Thus, the Labor Department is soon to begin hearings to learn whether US workers are now willing to accept "stoop" labor.

We predict the Mexicans will be back — as legal braceros if they can, as illicit "wetbacks" if they must.

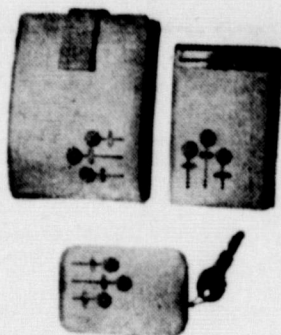
From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — A post-election review of statewide voting totals shows that only 89 per cent of the 3,100,000 Texans who were qualified to vote actually made it to the polls on November 3.

Total number of ballots cast — 2,760,788.

Not all of those who went to the polls voted in all the races. In Travis County, for instance, 3,461 of the 67,419 who cast ballots failed to vote in the presidential race. Elsewhere around the state, 52,304 Texans who voted in the governor's race did not vote on the lieutenant governor's race, which placed next on the ballot.

Highest vote getter, in this election and in Texas history, was Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr. He racked

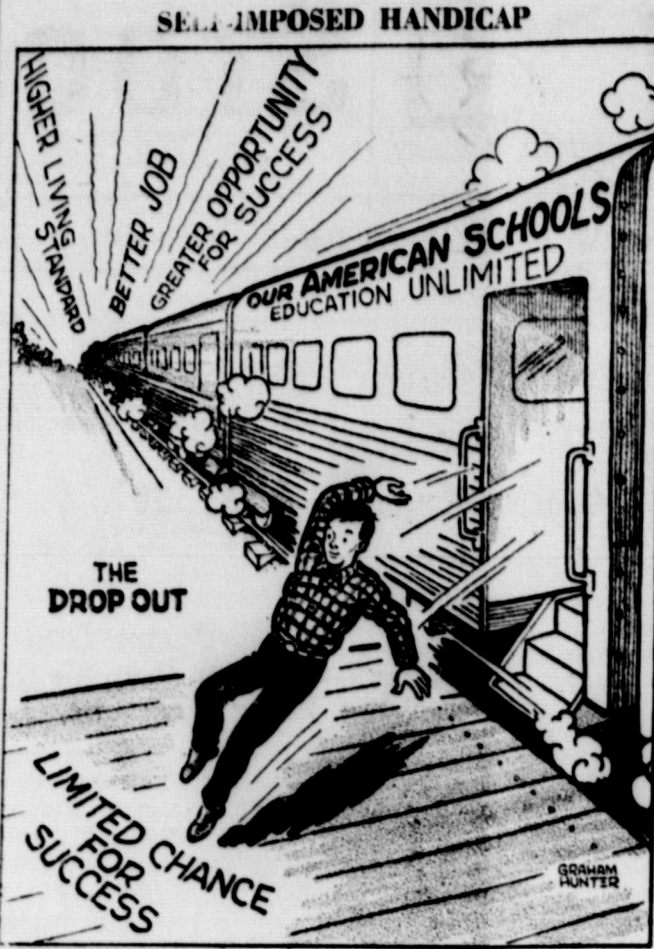

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up 1,901,308 votes. Gov. John Conally was next with 1,877,137. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith was third, with 1,833,747.

Train Hearing Set—Right after the order was issued allowing the Texas and Pacific Railroad to discontinue two passenger trains that ran between Ft. Worth and El Paso, the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railway Company filed a request with the Railroad Commission to discontinue two trains in West Texas.

Company said it wants to stop service of passenger trains Nos. 77 and 78 between Brownwood and San Angelo because Railway Post Office service was halted on them September 26. Company said government failure to renew the postal contract will increase the railroad's already substantial net annual "out-of-pocket deficit" by more than 75 per cent.

Hearing on the application will be held in the Tom Green County Courthouse on January 14.

Ruling — State Water Pollution Control Board is appealing a ruling by Judge Herman Jones held in a Superior Oil Company suit against the State, that the Railroad Commission has exclusive jurisdiction over disposal of oil and gas field waste.

Under the ruling the Water Pollution Control Board does not have authority to issue orders with regard to the use of open unlined salt water disposal pits designed to handle oilfield waste.

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

For Better Pictures

Every boatman's camera should have a medium yellow filter to darken the sky and help enhance clouds and water texture.

Filters may be of the screw-on or slip-on type. Adapter rings are available to fit most any camera lens.

Small Motor Convenient

If you own an outboard motor sufficiently portable to carry in the trunk of your car, it will pay you to take it along on vacation. It will cost you \$5 to \$15 per day to rent a fishing motor. Some places won't rent motors at any price.

Boats, on the other hand are plentiful and normally rent for \$2 to \$5 per day. So, take along your motor.

Air Mattress Handy

On small boats, the soft spot for sleeping is atop an air mattress. It offers considerable comfort. Furthermore, when deflated and rolled up, it doesn't require much storage space.

Before leaving on a cruise check the mattress for leaks. There's nothing more disgusting than a mattress that runs out of air in the middle of the night.

"Bisque a la Outboard"

Here's an easy-to-fix delectable dish for cruise-campers.

It's appropriately dubbed "Bisque a la Outboard": Mix one can each of condensed tomato soup, cream of celery soup and condensed milk, as well as one can of

either crab meat, shrimp or lobster. Combine all ingredients in the top of a double boiler. Then heat, stirring occasionally. Season to your taste.

It will serve three.

Photos Help Police

If you haven't a recent photograph of your outboard rig, better have one taken.

In the event your boat and motor are stolen, you'll have something to show police that will help them considerably in tracking down your rig.

Carlights in Camp

Trying to erect a tent after dark is an irritating business which the veteran camper avoids like poison ivy. But it happens to the best woodsman once in a while.

If you find yourself in the predicament of setting up camp after nightfall, don't fumble around doing the job by lantern light. Use your car's headlights to illuminate the area.

Safety in Shoes

Leather-soled shoes slip very easily on boat decks, wet rocks and the pine needles and leaves that fall on forest floors.

Outfit everyone on your camping cruise with a good pair of rubber-soled boat shoes.

Check and Double Check

Before casting off, a wise skipper makes a careful inspection of his rig.

He should make sure there is ample gas aboard, as well as life preservers and emergency gear.

Also he should check to be doubly certain that steering controls and fuel lines are properly connected . . . points often overlooked.

Beaching the Boat

If you ordinarily run your boat onto a beach when you come in from boating, lay an old auto tire flat on the sand. Dig a depression in the beach and sink the tire to half its thickness. Then fill it with sand. This gives you a firmly-anchored rubber "landing field" and prevents scratching the bottom of your boat.

Participation builds interest. To hold junior's interest on a cruise, make him an active participant.

Assign him specific navigational and household duties, such as spotting buoys (especially good if he can use binoculars), putting out fenders and securing dock lines.

Keep him busy and he'll enjoy himself more. And so will you!

Simple Fire Rig

One of the fastest and simplest fire rigs for cooking outdoors can be made by driving three or four steel pegs into the ground in a perimeter the size of the pan you intend to use.

Build a small fire underneath the pan, and you're in business.

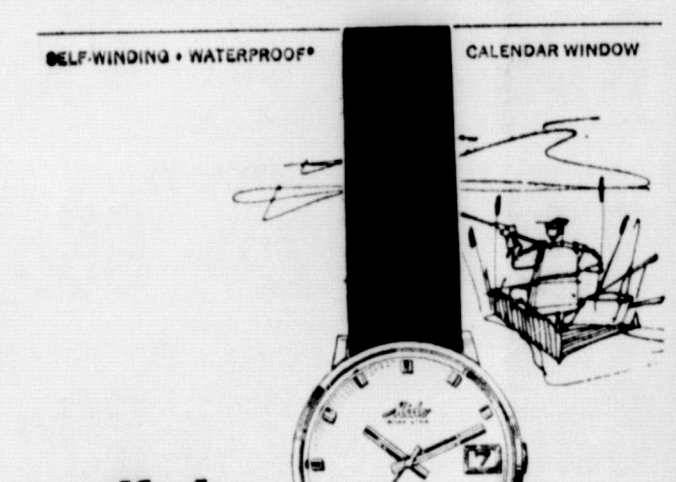

carry out this plan hinges on whether the number of screwworm cases in Texas can first be brought to an absolute minimum. If screwworm persist in Texas, it will require diverting sterile flies, airplanes and manpower from the task of strengthening the barrier zone in Mexico to fighting small, but costly, outbreaks in Texas.

Each infestation in Texas costs approximately \$750 to treat with sterile flies, field inspection and spray. For the same amount of money, one million sterile flies could be dispersed in Mexico where they would help protect against reinvasion from the south in 1965.

A mild winter, which would allow screwworms to survive and build up in numbers in much of the

southern part of the state would be particularly harmful to the program, authorities said. They fear stockmen may stop looking for low number of cases experienced this year and the prospects of cold weather.

Success of their strategy therefore, will depend on farmers and ranchers detecting and reporting screwworm infestations before they can multiply, so that emergency treatment can be provided. Treatment of animal wounds with smears is also called for ward off screwworm attacks.

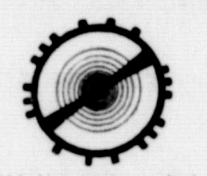

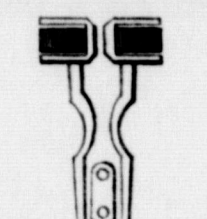
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
