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## TO LICENSE GS FOR 1965 SALE HERE

The 1964 automobile license plates have about had their beginning last Monday, Feb. 1 and until April they will gradually be replaced — gradually, that is, until the final day when many will feel the need to avoid arrest for driving with outdated license plates and line up at the clerk's office to buy new ones.

License plates have a new look this year. Each passenger plate has a three-letter prefix followed by three numerals, and commercial and miscellaneous vehicles retain their special registration.

The new plates now being used in Crockett County are at GXN 650 to 699. There will also be G X P numbers 10 to 999 and GXR numbers 474. Commercial truck plates will start at 2T5275 and farm truck numbers at 2T528.

Current registration receipts, certificate of title and money enough to pay the plates — are needed to complete the transaction at the sheriff's office.

The new passenger registration system enables the Department of Public Safety to cope with the increasing vehicle registration.

Since World War II, approximately a quarter million vehicles have been registered yearly in the state. This trend should continue, but the new system should provide sufficient numbers for at least the next ten years, information from DPS at Austin indicates.

Texas tags this year have black letters on white. Connected that black and white provide the most readable combination under both day and night conditions.

Two state extension specialists in home economics programs will be in Ozona next week, Thursday, February 11, to conduct an all-day workshop for 4-H adult leaders working in home economics programs with 4-H club members.

Miss Mary Routh, specialist in clothing, and Miss Louise Mason, specialist in Foods and Nutrition, from Texas A&M University, will conduct the workshops at the Ozona Community Center, starting at 9:00 a. m.

Mrs. Roberta Johnson, District Home Demonstration Agent, of Fort Stockton, arranged the workshops for benefit of local adult leaders who are working with some one hundred 4-H members in home economics programs.

A special invitation is extended to all women of the community interested in home economics to attend the workshops and take advantage of the training offered by these two state specialists.

## Two Extensions To Ozona S'west Field Completed

Macdonald Oil Corp., Midland, completed two extensions to the Ozona, Southwest multipay field of Crockett County.

The No. 1-6 C. C. Montgomery Estate, 11,530-foot Ellenburger failure, 17 miles southwest of Ozona, and 2 1/2 miles south and slightly west of Canyon production, was finished from the Canyon for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.8 million cubic feet of gas per day, plus 13 1/2 barrels of distillate per million cubic feet of gas.

Production was through perforations at 6,502, 6,508 feet, which had been fractured with 48,000 gallons and 66,000 pounds.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of 6-P-TORR.

The No. 1-11 Henderson, 13 1/2-mile northwest extension to Strawn production, 15 miles southwest of Ozona, was finished for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1.4 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations at 9,502 - 548 feet, which had been acidized with 6,500 gallons.

## OVER 200 INCHES! West Texan In Africa Amazed At Annual Rainfall

Being a West Texas boy, Roy Harrell, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Harrell of Ozona, State Department employe stationed at Conakry, Guinea, West Africa, recognized the fact that it was an uncommon lot of rain that fell in that part of the world in the eight months annual "rainy season" commencing in May and ending in December.

But even he was somewhat amazed at the result when he put out rain gauges and started keeping an accurate check on the amount of rainfall.

In what he calls a "final rainfall report" received recently, Roy gives some amazing facts about the rainfall in Conakry.

The 1963 "rainy season" produced a total of 155.60 inches of moisture and in 1964 the total reached 221.64 inches.

"That's a lot of rain," exclaims the boy from West Texas who bragged on an annual rainfall average of around 19 inches for his home county — and didn't have much to brag about in recent years.

In his tabulation of results of reading his rain gauges, Roy came up with some isolated information about the rainfall records.

For instance, the heaviest rainfall in a 24-hour period was on July 27, 1964 when it rained 8.7 inches in 24 hours. On July 24 of the year 1963, it rained 5.6 inches in 24 hours. (A fellow could draw in that kind of rain.)

Roy includes a 12-year rain chart for the region, from 1952 to 1964. The average annual rainfall for that period was 202.23 inches. The biggest rainfall year was 1961 with 262.00 inches and 1963 was the "drouthy" year when only 153.60 inches of rain fell.

And remember, these figures are just for the "rainy season" — 8 months out of the year.

## Lions Meet Owls In Crucial Tilt Here Fri. Night

The Ozona Lions will face the Big Lake Owls in Ozona Friday night at 8:00 p. m. with the Owls now trying to hold on to a tie in the West Zone following their Tuesday night loss to Iraan in Big Lake.

The Owls will be returning to the scene of their biggest triumph of the year, the Ozona tourney title, and will be heavily favored over the Lions.

Coach Brooks Dozier's Lions, however, have come alive with the addition of several juniors and sophomores from the B team and in their last home appearance, narrowly missed thumping Iraan.

In bumping off Sanderson in Sanderson last week only seniors David Childress and Moe Barbee had much part in the win as juniors Win Saunders, Pon Seahorn and David Jacoby and soph George Cox carried a major share of the load.

Big Lake opened its West Zone Title chase with a one-sided win over what had been previously regarded as a very strong Iraan team, and then proceeded to sweep through the first round undefeated.

Iraan, after dropping its first game to the Owls on their own floor, won their other games but had to travel to Big Lake Tuesday, and in winning they not only projected themselves into the title picture but also achieved a considerable upset.

After Friday night's game the Lions will make their final home appearance here Tuesday night, entertaining Rankin, and then will close their season Thursday night in Iraan.

In the East Zone, play started late and thus far Sonora has a slight lead. Sonora upset favored Eldorado and then won a close contest with Menard and a one-sided contest with Junction.

Friday, the two leaders, both of whom have won close games with Menard, will meet in Eldorado and that game will determine in all likelihood whether the race drops into a tie or Sonora gets into the driver's seat.

## Poll Tax Payments Off Somewhat from Last Off-Election

Crockett county's potential voting strength for the next year will be around 400 below that of the national election year last year, and only slightly below that of the last non-election year. A total of 871 regular poll tax receipts had been issued at the deadline Feb. 1, a drop from 908 two years ago.

Added to this year's voting strength will be 29 under-age exemptions plus the over-age exemptions who do not have to register for the exemption.

Last year, the year of the presidential election, poll tax payments totalled 1,287 plus a few who registered to vote in the national election, made possible by a federal law outlawing the poll tax in case of elections to fill federal offices. Such registered voters could cast their vote for candidates for federal offices only, a poll tax being required for local and state elections.

## Area Getting Needed Moisture

Skies were drippy in Ozona this morning — a welcome sight in moisture shy West Texas.

The rain had registered a little over one-tenth of an inch at 8 this morning and the slow rain was still falling. No reports were available as to the area covered, but the day's weather map indicated possible rain over an area extending to the northwest beyond Ozona to the southeast coast. No heavy rain was promised in this area but slow, light rain was predicted.

## Lions Win In See-Saw Battle Over Sanderson

Strong play from three recently promoted B teamers, along with fine performances from regulars, Win Saunders and David Childress, and some good relief work by Moe Barbee, sparked the Ozona Lions to a 53 to 47 triumph last Friday night in Sanderson.

The game, a thriller from start to finish, was a see-saw affair which saw first the Lions and then the Eagles lead in the first half, the Eagles winding up with a 27 to 20 lead at the intermission.

David Childress, who led both teams in scoring with 18 points, went on a last-half spree, and with help from five other men in the scoring column in the last two periods paced the Lions into a lead which they held despite a strong Sanderson rally in the final period.

Win Saunders and Pon Seahorn got the Lions off to an early first quarter lead, but Travis Harkins and John Cates pushed the home team ahead by the quarter and the Eagles carried that lead through the second quarter.

Hugh Coates, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Coates, won the championship of the finewool fat lamb division for the second straight year. Hugh also had champion group of three finewool lambs. The Ozona National Bank purchased both champions at \$200 each in the auction sale following the judging.

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HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Education still rates top priority in the State capital. But it was viewed in a new light after Gov. John Connally revealed his program to the State Legislature.

Connally took the suggestions of his Committee on Education Beyond the High School that a strong coordinating board be created to administer State colleges and universities. He adopted its plan to put public junior colleges under that board and then told the Legislators the State should assume full financing of instructional costs of junior college academic programs.

Three-Board College System — Real surprise in Connally's approach to higher education came in his proposal that all existing college and university boards of regents be abolished and the higher education institutions be re-grouped into three systems. Even this idea held an added surprise, since Connally recommended establishment of an agricultural and technical university in San Antonio, to serve all of South Texas.

Teacher's Pay — Connally by-passed a bill by TSTA designed to raise minimum teachers' pay by \$45 a month. Instead, he endorsed a plan already in the form of a bill by Sen. Jack Strong of Longview. It provides for stair-step raises, with sizable pay increases for experienced teachers, and ups maximum teachers' pay some \$650 a year. His recommendation that teachers be allowed to take summer graduate work at State colleges and universi-

ties, free of tuition, received big applause.

Other Recommendations

Governor Connally came out strong for driver education programs in all schools, to be directed by the Department of Public Safety.

He urged passage of an Industry Safety Act; a one-cent cigarette tax increase in 1966; abandonment of the state property tax in seven years; support of the pooling bill to authorize the Railroad Commission to provide for pooling of separately-owned oil and gas interests in a common reservoir; poll tax repeal; and legal rights for women.

Then he asked the Legislature to revise the 1963 Election Code and take out the provision denying the right to vote to those who move their legal residence from one county to another during the six months prior to an election.

Last, but not least, Connally recommended that election laws be changed to provide that the Governor and other state officials run for four-year terms, instead of two-year terms.

Gas Discovery On Shannon; Wildcats Spotted On Bean

Crockett County gained a discovery and locations for two wildcats this week.

Roy E. Kimsey, Jr., Midland, completed a San Andres dry gas discovery his No. 1 Texaco-Shannon Estate, 14 miles northwest of Ozona and 1/4-mile southwest of the Todd, Northwest (San Andres gas) field.

It was finaled for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2,050,000 cubic feet of gas per day through perforations between 1,640-1,709 feet, which had been acidized with 6,000 gallons.

Total depth is 1,930 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set.

It also tested through perforations between 1,881-99 feet, which had been acidized with 3,000 gallons, and fractured with 30,000 gallons and 16,000 pounds, flowing gas at the estimated daily rate of 1 million cubic feet.

The following tops and bases were reported on ground elevation of 2,395 feet; Yates sand, 775-890 feet; Seven Rivers, 890-1,200 feet; Grayburg dolomite, 1,350-1,520 feet; and San Andres dolomite, 1,630-1,930 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of 18-10-GC&SF.

Haskins & Tyra, Midland, will drill two 1,700-foot cable tool San Andres wildcats in Crockett County, 10 miles northwest of Ozona and approximately two miles southwest of the recently opened pure-Bean South (San Andres) field.

The No. 1-90 Bean is 2,589 feet from the south and 550 feet from the west lines of 90-OP-GC&SF. Ground elevation is 2,529 feet.

The No. 1-9 Bean, 3/4-mile to the north-northwest of the No. 1-90, is 2,414.8 feet from the south and 853 feet from the east lines of 9-UV-GC&SF. Ground elevation is 2,610 feet.

Both projects are on 80-acre leases.

**Fly Drops Stop In Texas; Concentrate On Mexico Barrier**

Mission — Sterile screw-worm flies, which have been released by the billions during the three years of the campaign against the costly livestock pest has been in existence, are no longer being dispersed in the United States, but instead are virtually all being airdropped in northern Mexico.

No sterile flies will be released in Texas or neighboring states except for those required to treat isolated screwworm outbreaks that may occur this year, eradication officials have announced.

This action is expected to decrease the possibility of the Southwest becoming reinfested as result of fertile migrating northward out of Mexico where the insect has not yet been eradicated. Fertile flies, when mated with the sexually-sterile, plant-reared flies, do not produce offspring.

The move is part of the second step in the eradication program, that of establishing a fool-proof barrier zone along the international boundary to prevent reinfestation of "screwworm-free" areas. Attainment of the first goal — eradication of the insect from the Southwest — was declared a year ago by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and its partners in the project, the Texas Animal Health Commission and Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation.

Although the barrier zone stretches from the Gulf of Mexico to the Gulf of California, eradicators are presently concentrating their resources on the eastern western coasts of Mexico where colonies of fertile

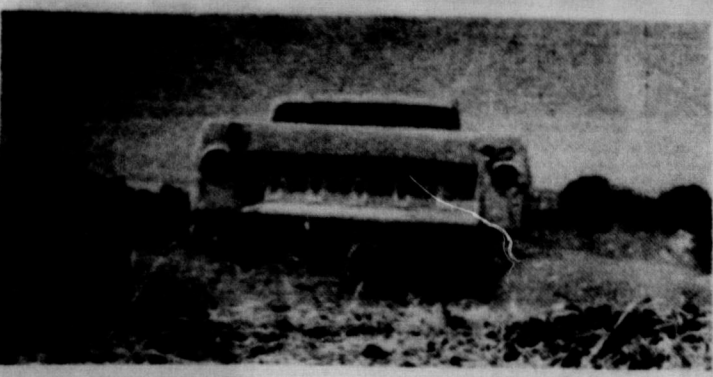
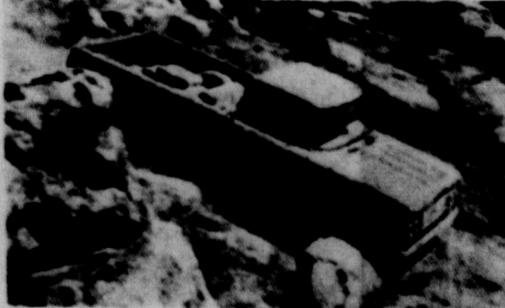
