Local Firm Plans Construction Of Apartment House

Plans for the construction of a multi-unit apartment house in Ozona, at least two stories in height were announced this week by W. Whitaker of the South Texas Lumber Co. of Ozona. The apartment house, containing 16 units, with plans for expansion in case future need, will be built on property formerly owned by the late Mr. and Mrs. R. Patton on which was located a tourist court, badly damaged by the 1954 Ozona flood, and later demolished. The lumber company officials are in process of acquiring the property, the plans to be closed as soon as abstracts are complete. The new apartment house is located on 11th street north on 11th street across the street south of the Church of Christ. At present, the property along U. S. Highway south of the apartment house will remain open to development. The new apartments will be tailored to suit tenants who sign leases in advance of construction. The structure will be brick veneer and will be modern in every respect, with grounds to be maintained by the management. Construction is scheduled to start possibly before the end of the present month and the apartments to be ready for occupancy the spring, Mr. Whitaker said.

Mothers March Set For Sunday January 24th

The annual January March of Dimes campaign in Crockett county will come to a climax when a half hundred or more Ozona Mothers Marchers visit Ozona homes in Sunday afternoon campaign which is expected to produce several hundred dollars in contributions to the National Foundation's fight on birth defects and arthritis research. Mrs. Vic Montgomery is chairman of the Mothers March this year, and has announced that the March will be held Sunday afternoon, January 24. All volunteer workers will meet at 3 p. m. that Sunday at the Hiway Cafe where they will receive instructions and assignment of territory. The workers will fan out after being served coffee by John Held of the Cafe, and hope to complete the drive within an hour or two, returning to the cafe to report results. The mothers will leave return envelopes for residents who are not at home when they call. "More than anyone, perhaps, the mothers can realize the tragedy that birth defects can bring into a home," Mrs. Montgomery said in announcing the drive. "They want to do something about preventing these conditions which cripple limbs and retard minds, and disrupt what should be a happy family life." (Continued on Last Page)

Miss Lee Smith Ozonan 70 Years Is Buried Here

Funeral services were held at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon from the Ozona Methodist Church for Miss Leona (Miss Lee) Smith, 89, a resident of Ozona 70 years.

Miss Lee died Friday, Jan. 1, in the Golden Years Nursing Home in Christoval. Services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. Leonard Garrett. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Miss Smith was born near Austin Feb. 21, 1876. She moved to Ozona in 1895, just four years after the county's organization, and for many years operated a boarding and rooming house. Her home, one of Ozona's landmarks, located on Water Works drive just east of the First Baptist Church, was the "town home" of many Crockett county ranch families in the early days. It was a place to eat, for an overnight stay or leave the kids while parents attended a social function while in town. Survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Tom Casbeer of Ozona and Mrs. Bell Toole of Monahans.

S. Elementary PTA Plans Fund Raising Event

The South Elementary P. T. A., in its regular monthly meeting held at the South Elementary cafeteria Monday night, set February 12th as the night for their fund raising activity, which is to be called "A Night in Mexico."

Due to the nearness of the recent holidays and to a great deal of sickness in the community, the attendance was at one of its lowest points of the year with about 30 members on hand. Mrs. Maria Torres presided at the business meeting and Luis Martinez made the report from the activity committee, which has planned the fund-raising night. Before a vote was taken on the activity night, a short discussion of the P. T. A.'s mission for the year, which is to buy additional library books, was held.

Principal Ernest Boyd told the group that it was hoped that space for a library would be available since plans are being made to expand the South Elementary buildings so as to afford several new classrooms. Coffee, punch and cookies were served the group following the close of the meeting.

Gas Gathering System Planned Here By Texaco

A reduction in previously indicated plans for construction by The Texas Company of a gas processing plant south of Ozona was announced this week in a letter to the Chamber of Commerce here from J. H. Markley, Division manager, Domestic Producing Dept., at Midland. "Present plans include only the installation of a central-point delivery to a gas purchaser," Mr. Markley replied to a Chamber letter of inquiry. "Like you, we are hopeful that future developments in the area will lead to the installation of a larger processing facility."

Representatives of the company, here in recent weeks, have indicated that the company will install a separator unit on the site for the eventual construction of the gas processing plant. This will dry the gas for delivery to the gas pipeline, presumably the North-east Natural Gas Co. line which picks up gas from the gas producing areas south, southwest and southeast of Ozona. It is understood that Texaco has acquired a site on the Kincaid Estate land about five miles south of Ozona, near Highway 163, on which the processing plant may eventually be built.

C of C Plans Ozona Population Count

A complete Community Census will be taken January 14 in Ozona, under the sponsorship of the Chamber of Commerce, Luther Walker, manager, announced this week. Every attempt will be made to get an exact count of the number of people living in Ozona now. The population has shown a sharp increase during the past year. Estimates run from 3,500 to 5,000. Vital information will be obtained to bring all Chamber of Commerce files up to date, and to use in an industrial survey.

A number of community organizations are volunteering their assistance in order to complete the survey in one day, Walker said. Anyone willing to assist in this project should call the Chamber office at 2-3066 for further information.

Shallow Wildcat In Vaughn Field

Ray Morris Exploration Co., Odessa, will drill the No. 1 Vaughn, a 1,600-foot rotary San Andres wildcat, in Crockett County, 10 miles northwest of Ozona, 1/2-mile north and slightly west of San Andres production in the Pure-Bean field, but separated by failures, and 2 1/2 miles north an slightly east of San Andres production in the Pure-Bean, South field. Location is 933 feet from the north and 467 feet from the east lines of 83-OP-GC & SF.

Two Held After Coin Machines Are Looted Here

An alert Ozona night deputy brought about the capture of three men at Sonora after they had allegedly broken into the coin machine and cigarette machine at Thorp's Laundry here.

Night Deputy Jack Hyde noticed a 1959 Ford drive away from the vicinity of the self-serve laundry about 2:30 a. m. and followed the car as it left Ozona going east and took down its license number. Sheriff Billy Mills, notified by the deputy, called Sonora and the car was stopped there and the men brought back here for questioning.

After several hours of questioning, a statement was secured by officers from one of the men admitting the local burglary and also confessing similar robberies in Iraan and Mertzon in recent nights, the Sheriff said.

The men were Thomas Faulkner, 24, his brother, Arthur Faulkner, 19, and Wilburn B. Clark, 19, all of San Antonio. The men have been charged with burglary and theft here and at Mertzon and they posted \$500 bonds each in each place and were released pending action of grand juries in the two counties.

Ozona FFA, tenth annual commercial show, benefit barbecue, and invitational livestock judging contest will be held on Saturday, January 16th, at the Junior livestock show barn. Thirteen champions and thirteen reserve champions will be selected from the five classes of fat lambs, range

finewool ewes, fat calves, and four classes of Angora kid goats.

Five Ozona Teenagers Spend 9 Hours At Bottom Of 120-Ft. Deep 09 Cave

After spending nine uncomfortable hours at the bottom of the 120-foot deep crack northeast of Ozona known as the 09 cave, five Ozona boys welcomed the arrival of worried parents who brought them to the surface one at a time means of a cable and a pickup truck. One safety precaution the five boys did heed was to tell their parents where they intended going. Otherwise the search might still be on for the vanished quintet, which included Sandy Moe, Moe Barbee, David Lewis, Larry Williams and Annie Mason. But the spelunker's law never enter a cave equipped with adequate equipment to insure safe return the party was shunted these intrepid explorers and the result was a long day spent in waist deep water and mud, with dripping ceilings above and the crickets all about. About the first 80 feet of the cave can be negotiated a good mountain climb-but the last forty feet the crack widens out, the result of water erosion, and the last rock ledge descent is by rope or ladder. It was easy dropping that 40 feet down a hemp rope, but after exploring the cave about two miles upstream, and some distance downstream, the five boys turned to find their rope water-soaked from the overhead drip and as slick as greased rope. One of another they tried to

make the climb, but the best height was about 30 feet and — back down the rope to the bottom. Each try made the rope muddier, wetter and slicker.

Then the boys attempted to climb the pipe from the windmill which is perched on the surface to pump water from the underground stream. But the pipe was covered with moss and slime and more non-negotiable than the rope.

"We were not worried that somebody would come for us but the big question with us was when?" Larry Williams said of the experience.

The boys considered the possibilities and, already hungry as most teenagers are, their first concern turned to food, as the boys reported it.

"We decided that the first thing we would eat would be the crickets," said Larry. "When somebody looked down at little Ronnie Mason, Ronnie began to urge caution before we made any hasty decisions on survival techniques."

The boys reached the top about 10:30 that night after Moe's father, Beall Barbee, went to the cave about 7:30 o'clock and discovered their plight. He went to the DeLong ranch and got help and a steel cable. This was lowered into the hole and the boys lifted with the aid of a pickup truck. Troy Williams and Ted Lewis, fathers of two of the other boys, arrived too late to participate in the rescue and found their sons at home when they returned.

Politics Still Holds Interest, Foreman Says

Greetings and good cheer to you as we start the New Year. May you and yours enjoy good health, happiness and abundant success this year and in the future. This will be my last official newsletter to you—at least, for a while.

Barbara, the children and I are moving back to our home in Odessa at 1312 Emerald Avenue. Kirk and Rebecca are both in school now and looking to moving back. I plan to re-enter business along the lines similar to what I was doing before moving to Washington — oil service, transportation, distribution, LPG purchase and sales, etc. We have leased our home in Arlington, Virginia, for two years, to the new Republican Congressman from Idaho, Geo. Hansen and family.

Political Plans

The recent rumors and news stories concerning my political plans are strictly newspaper speculation. I have made no commitments, plans or announcements, whatever, regarding my political future — except that I intend to maintain an active interest in politics and continue my work and efforts in behalf of sound, responsible government. I plan to continue to work closely with the Congressional Committee and, from time to time, speak for conservatives Representatives and Senators, et al. I will keep a Washington office (P. O. Box 1504, telephone, Area Code 202, 864-2211) in order to finish up some case work and to keep in close contact with activities and developments on Capitol Hill.

Reflections & Projections
The 85th Congress comes to a close on January 4, 1965, and the 89th Congress convenes. The past two years have been eventful and interesting for me — and historic and memorable for our nation. I deeply appreciate the signal honor and privilege you have afforded me to serve as your Representative in the United States Congress. I have worked diligently to uphold the pledge I made when I ran for Congress in 1962 — and although we didn't accomplish all our aims, we did make some progress — progress toward stemming the growing power of federal government — and progress toward increasing the power, freedom and liberty of individual American citizens. Regardless of the outcome last November, I still believe that the majority of the American people do really love our Constitution and do prefer the private enterprise system over a socialistic welfare state.

However, as a result of the election, particularly in view of the defeat of so many conservative Congressmen, the 89th is going to be a little tougher row to hoe! In the new Congress, the Democrats out-

number the Republicans 295 to 140 in the House and 68 to 32 in the Senate — and for the first time since 1936, the majority party has a greater than 2 to 1 margin. This probably means that the "Great Society" will have little, if any, trouble gaining approval by Congress — and by 1966, Medicare, federal aid and regulation of education, revised and more liberal immigration laws, repeal of section 14-B of the Taft-Hartley Act, et al., may very likely be enacted into law as realities. Instead of the present prospects, wouldn't it be wonderful if we had a Congress overwhelmingly weighted in favor of decreasing the size, cost and control of government — a Congress weighted in favor of the creation of new jobs and real, lasting employment opportunities through an expansion, encouragement and unleashing of our free enterprise economy? Yes, it was American freedom, and that alone, which

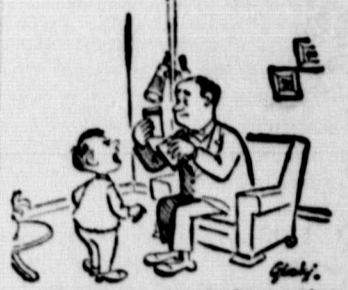

POLL TAX

Since Texas has not repealed its poll tax law, you will need a valid poll tax receipt this year to vote in any election — school trustee elections, bond elections or any special election which might be called. January 31 is the last day for paying a poll tax to qualify for a vote.

Since there will be no national election this year, the voter registration will be meaningless. But we are equipped and will issue registration certificates to those who demand them.

The over-60 exemption applies to persons who were 60 years old on January 1, 1964. No exemption certificate is required for over-age voters in this county. Those who have reached or will reach their 21st birthday this year may secure exemptions any time up to 30 days before an election. Exemptions are required for those reaching voting age in the year.

Remember, the deadline for paying poll tax is January 31, 1965.

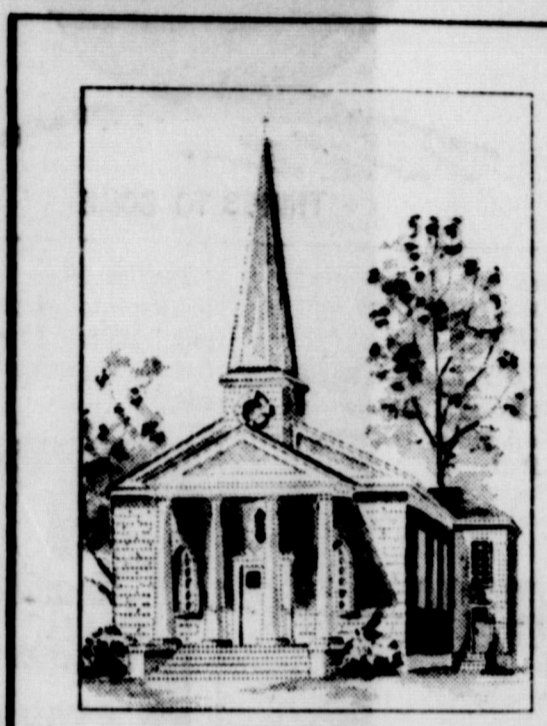

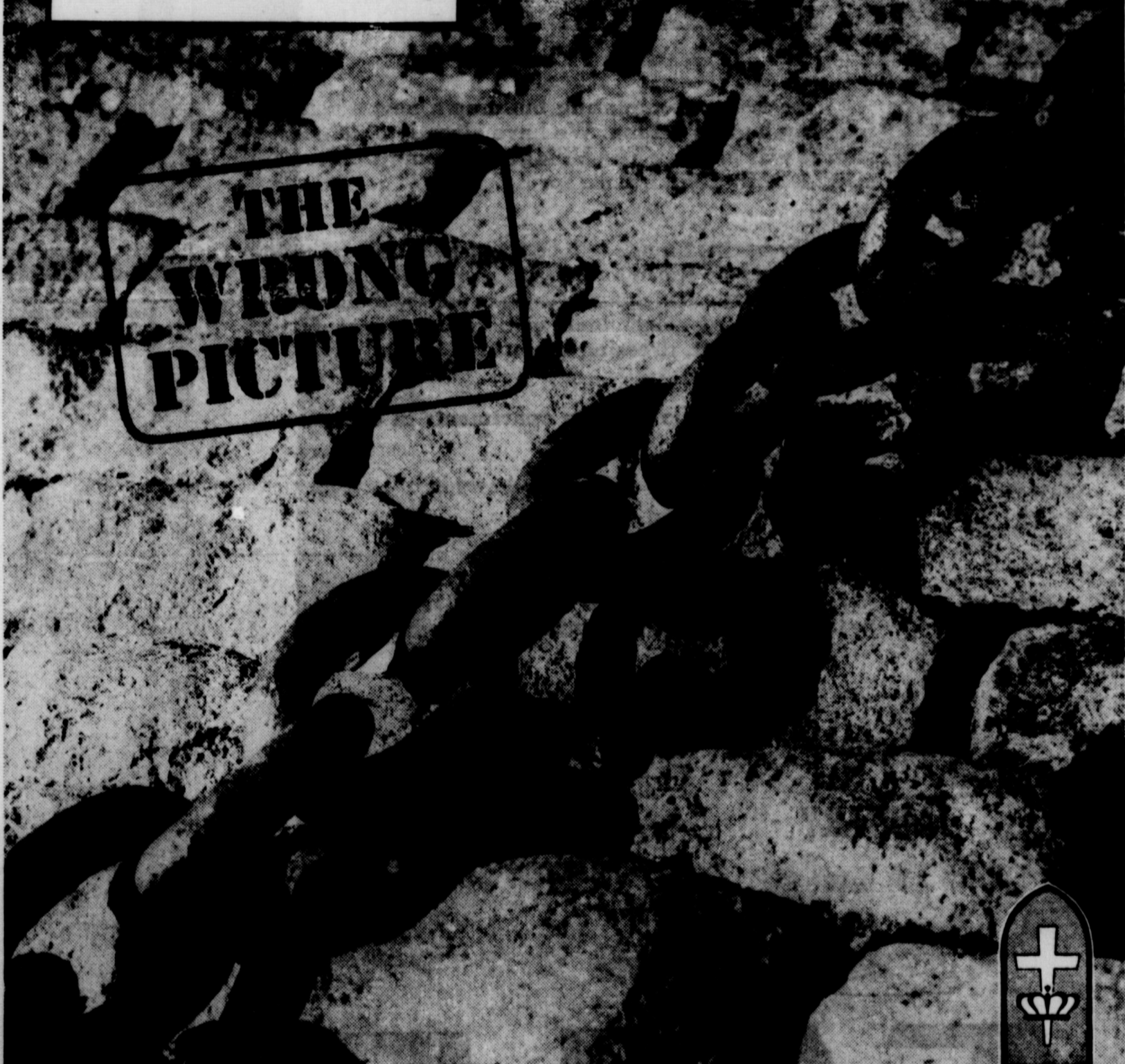

Keeping Hunting Season 'Open' May Be Expensive Says Warden

The following report on the recently closed 1964 hunting season and comments on game law violations was prepared by Norman H. Hooten, State Game Warden Crockett county.

The 1964 Hunting Season for deer and turkey officially closed 30 minutes after sundown Dec. 31. But history shows that certain game violations will continue. The most serious of these violations is hunting deer at night.

There have been nineteen (19) game violations brought before the courts in Crockett County since October 21st, 1964. All of the violations committed were major ones involving hunting and killing wild deer at night. Most of the violations occurred along the rural roadways in the county. The number of violators, apprehended is considered to be a small percentage of the actual violations occurring.

This night hunting is one of the most serious game violations that can be committed and has strong penalties provided for violators. The fact that night hunting is dangerous to livestock is a fact that all ranchers know well. Many head of valuable livestock are lost throughout the state every year because of illegal night hunters.

The only way this type of violation can be curbed is by strict law enforcement

and good cooperation from citizens seeing such a violation occurring. Anyone witnessing a violation should call the nearest Game Warden or Sheriff's Dept. giving them the location, the time, and a description of the car involved in the violation. No further action should be taken by the citizen. Do not by any means attempt to apprehend the violator. Leave the apprehension up to Law Enforcement officers trained and authorized to make arrests.

AIRPLANE PRESENTED TO TEXAS RANGERS

A twin-engine aircraft has been presented to the Texas Department of Public Safety for the use of the Texas Rangers by Col. D. Harold Byrd of Dallas.

The Lockheed Lodestar, which seats ten passengers, was accepted on behalf of the Texas Department of Public Safety by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director. "We are grateful for Colonel Byrd's generosity in presenting this airplane to the State of Texas to be used to enhance the State's law enforcement effort and emergency services," Col. Garrison said.

"This aircraft will be utilized to great advantage on occasions when speed is of the essence in transporting law enforcement and other personnel and equipment from one part of the State to another," Col. Garrison said.

This is the second aircraft that Col. Byrd has presented to the Texas Department of Public Safety. The other was a Twin Beech which he gave to the Department in 1958.

Col. Byrd, who has been active on behalf of aviation in Texas and the nation for many years, is an honorary captain in the Texas Rangers.

the inauguration of Governor Connally and Lt. Gov. Fiebron Smith on January 29.

Redistricting Delay? — High Texas political leaders have not given up on thwarting federal court-ordered legislative redistricting on the basis of population alone.

Connally, Smith and Tunnell all have made known their support of efforts to amend the U. S. Constitution permitting state senators to be selected with consideration given to geography, as well as the count.

Tunnell was chairman of the resolutions committee, at the recent General Assembly of the States, which called on all states to petition Congress for a constitutional convention on reapportionment.

Lock for two resolutions to be introduced on this subject during the 1965 session of the Texas Legislature.

One will call for a constitutional convention to consider an amendment reserving to states the right to determine makeup of their subordinate political subdivisions.

Another version may simply urge Congress to submit such an amendment for ratification by three-

fourths of the states.

Actions by 34 state legislatures would be necessary to require Congress to call a federal convention. Apparently, a simple majority vote of Congress could set the convention in motion. A two-thirds majority in Congress is necessary for outright submission of an amendment to the states.

Under a federal court decision, Texas lawmakers have an August 2 deadline staring them in the face for completion of legislative redistricting. Nevertheless, some continue to hope that they will find a way out through a constitutional amendment.

Biggest Lease Sale Set — On February 2 Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler will offer 1,000,000 acres of land for oil and gas leasing. It will be the largest sale in general land office history.

Some 800,000 acres of the land lie in the Gulf of Mexico out to the three-marine league line. The rest is in bays, riverbeds and uplands.

School Land Board authorized the sale at its December meeting.

Sadler released a complete listing of the property together with maps. Sealed bids must be received at the land office by 10 a. m. February 2.

Austin, Texas —

Egg Producers Get Reminder — Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reminds egg retailers and industry men that after January 1 all egg containers must bear the license number of the grader-packer.

Number identifies eggs and fixes responsibility for grading or labeling violations White, said. Also it is aimed at preventing out-of-state firms from shipping into Texas without paying required fees.

Producers who sell eggs from their own flock on an ungraded basis do not have to have a license number.

Bob Hope Talks Texas — A special premiere of a film designed to tell the "true story" of Texas will be held in Austin on January 13, when "Bob Hope Talks Texas" will be shown to Gov. John Connally, members of

the Legislature and other State officials.

Film was produced through efforts of the Texas Industrial Commission. E. B. Germany, chairman, said the commission hopes that the film will have some impact on plant location decisions — and that it will "hit at the image that Texas is all cowboys, Indians and sage brush."

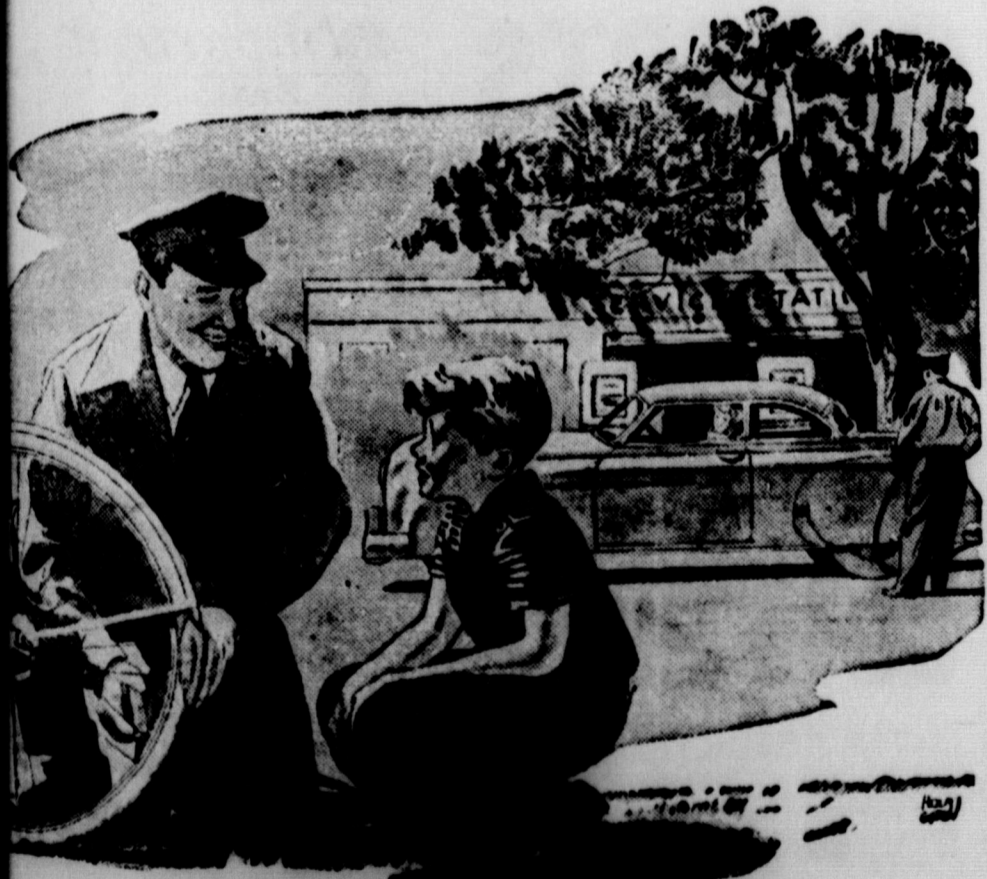
Optimistic Note For Oilmen — Dr. Robert B. Williamson, research associate with UT's Bureau of Business Research, says Texas oil producers have grounds for cautious optimism concerning 1965.

He notes that while mid-December stocks of Texas crude were at the lowest point in 16 years, prospects for greater demand were in view. State crude oil production allowable for January was raised to the highest level in two years.
