## ONZONA RADAR STATION SOLD FOR \$178,000

Three Central Texas men whose business is the purchase, development and rental of surplus government property, paid \$178,000 for the abandoned Ozona Radar Station, located on the Air Force Station, which cost the United States taxpayers \$3 million to build and equip, at a public auction in Crockett county court last Thursday night. High bidders out of fifty registered bidders were Dutton of McGregor, Texas, Vic Newman of Waco, Texas, and E. Gromatzky of Dallas, Texas. The district courtroom was packed to capacity with interested spectators and bidders as Col. George Apple's Auction Service of McKinney announced the terms of the sale. A number of questions concerning water for the base, minerals and other subjects of interest to a prospective buyer were answered by Apple and his assistants or by two representatives of the General Services Administration, under whose supervision the property was being sold. O. W. Gas and Paul Flynn, both city officers with the Real Property Division of the city, guaranteed a bid of \$50,000 made by a group of Ozonians assured the auctioneer that the bidding started at \$60,000 and like a kite in a high wind, went to \$175,000 by leaps of \$25,000 and then by \$1,000 steps reached the knock-out price of \$178,000. The next highest bid of \$77,000 was submitted by Homer Nickel of San Antonio. Mr. Newman and Mr. Dutton, here in person to bid on the property, said they intended to develop the base as a residential area rather than by sale or rental of the 27 residential houses on the base, and seek tenants or buyers for the commercial buildings. The government agency told the buyers that possession will be given in a maximum of 60 days and that the base could possibly be turned over to them in two weeks if desired. The new owners of the former air base will employ a manager to administer the sale and rental of the property. He is Henry Gas of Alexandria, La., a (Continued on Last Page)

## Reagan Owls Top ACCHS In Thrilling Finale To Ozona's 34th Tournament

The Reagan County Owls put together a number of timely foul shots and an effective delay game in the fading seconds of a tension-packed championship game last Saturday night to cop a 61 to 58 decision from the hot shooting ACCHS Panthers and capture the title in the 34th annual Ozona Invitational tournament. Johnny Howard, the Owls all purpose pivot man, was the key to the Owl victory, with his splendid rebounding, great back court play, and all-around defensive excellence, in recognition of which he was named the tournament's most outstanding player for the second year. ACCHS, in dropping the championship, got some rough calls in the fading moments that most likely turned the tide, but in any case, cracked a number of tournament records and placed two men on the all-tourney team. The Panthers and Owls, playing before a near capacity crowd, in which only a few seemed to be neutral, waged a hot see-saw battle all the way, with never more than four points between the ball clubs, after a strong Big Lake rally led out an early Panther lead of some six or eight points in the first quarter. In other final results, Miles popped an ice cold Ozona 59 to 42 to cop third place, and Norton, in the tourney for the first time, belted Sanderson with surprising ease to capture the consolation title. David Porter, a fine shooting guard, paced the Norton attack with 28 points in the final game as eight of the eleven boys in Norton High School saw action. Among the marks that fell under the deadly assault of ACCHS shooting were, most points scored by The old record of 262 was set by Eldorado in 1963 but the new mark set this year is 298. Also falling by the wayside in the record department were largest combined score in one game, set by Grandfalls and Iraan in 1959 and set this year in the ACCHS vs Christoval game which saw a combined total of 155 points. The record for the most points in one game scored by one team fell as ACCHS hit for 99 points against Christoval, and in that same game the mark for most field goals in a game, set by Junction in 1955, also fell. Big Lake's B team set the final record in the tournament when they made 26 free throws in a game against Christoval to break the mark of 23 set by Mason in 1953 and tied by Grandfalls in 1959. ## Kidnapping Car Thieves Caught In W. T. Dragnet

West Texas officers in the Crockett county area set a network of road blocks that caught its fish last Sunday afternoon after two California men kidnapped an El Paso man and stole his car near Balmorhea. The two California youths told their victim they had taken part in a number of robberies between California and Texas. To lend support to their story they moved a small arsenal of four rifles and two pistols from the abandoned California car, which they had stolen in Oceanside, to their newly acquired auto. The victim, Frank Lynch, told officers that the pair refused to take his billfold but did take his clothes and abandoned him near the D. K. McMullan ranch in Crockett County. Lynch told officers that he found no one at home at the McMullan ranch but went in and used the telephone to call the police who set up road blocks in every direction as well as sending men into the area to search for the car thieves. The road block paid off, however, a few hours later when the two men were arrested at Comstock. Crockett County Sheriff Billy Mills, who had been up all night Saturday with break-in attempts, joined in the search of the by roads around the McMullan ranch area. Mills lauded the cooperation of area officers, not only in this but in many other areas having to do with his work.

## PAROLE VIOLATION — Man Charged In Burglaries Here Held In Big Lake

Curtis Lee Wilson, about 20, Big Lake Negro, should have stayed in bed Saturday. But he didn't and that's what caused his troubles. Instead, he came to Ozona and early Sunday morning landed in the Crockett county jail on a charge of burglary of three Ozona places of business. But that wasn't so bad, because it wasn't long until San Angelo lawyer Bill Davenport arranged \$2,500 bail and he was released to return to his home in Big Lake. But then, he might as well have stayed in jail because no sooner had he landed in Big Lake than officers there had him back in the pokie, this time on parole violation and a possible trip this time to the state penitentiary for five long years. Wilson was free under a five-year probated sentence meted out in district court at Big Lake on conviction of a charge of burglary. Crockett County Sheriff Billy Mills reported. Wilson was in violation of his parole when he left Big Lake without permission. He is charged here with burglary of the South Texas Lumber Co., the Foxworth - Galbraith Lumber Co., and Stuart Motor Co., Saturday night. All three places were entered and a total in money estimated at \$35 taken. At South Texas Lumber Co., the company's safe was badly damaged when the knob and handle were knocked off with a hammer and chisel. It was a couple of days before the firm could get a safe expert here to open the safe. The intruder failed to open the safe. An amount known to be at least \$20 was taken from Stuart's. ## Delta To Drill Seven Wells In Ozona Gas Area

Delta Drilling Co. and Panley Petroleum Inc., Odessa, filed applications to drill seven 7,100-foot Canyon sand projects in the Ozona, Southwest multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County, ranging from eight to 11 miles southwest of Ozona. The No. 127 Roy Henderson, a link well 1 1/2 miles southwest, but separated by a 7,133-foot Canyon failure and 3 1/2 miles northeast of production, 850 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of 27-ST-HE&WT. The 1-22 Couch, 3/4-mile southeast of the nearest production, is 660 feet from the south and west lines of 22-QR-R-G. Sandoval. The No. 2-22 Couch, 3/4-mile northwest of the nearest, is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the east line of the same section. The No. 1-30 Couch, 1 1/4-miles south - southeast of the nearest, is 760 feet from the south and 850 feet from the east lines of 30-ST-G. Sandoval. The No. 2-30 Couch, 3/4-mile south-southwest of the nearest, is 1,880 feet from the north and west lines of the same section. The No. 2-31 Couch, 1/2-mile southwest of the nearest, is 660 feet from the south and west lines of 21-QR-HE&WT. The No. 2-0 Couch 3/4-mile southwest and northeast of the nearest, is 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of 10-ST-William H. Greenwell.

## Wildcat Slated, Fields Extended, Oil Discovered

Continental Oil Co., will drill the No. 1-6-28 University, a 10,760-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 11 miles south of Texon and 6 1/2 miles northwest of the Escondido multipay field, but separated by the depleted Lula (Devonian) field and a 9,644-foot Ellenburger failure. Location is 1,831 feet from the south and 1,836 feet from the west lines of 26-6-University. Canyon sand gas-distillate production was extended 1/2-mile southwest in the Ozona, South west multipay field of Crockett County with completion of Texas American Oil Corp., Midland, No. 2 Henderson, 20 miles southwest of Ozona and 3/4-mile north of the discovery of the Ozona, Southeast (Canyon gas) field. It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.1 million cubic feet of gas per day, plus 108 barrels of 66 gravity distillate per day, through perforations at 6,203-845 feet. Location is 990 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 9-TCRR. Delta Drilling Co. and Panley Petroleum Inc., Odessa, will drill the 60. 2-C Couch as a 1/2-mile north-west outpost to Canyon sand gas-distillate production in the Ozona, South (Continued on Last Page)

## Sunday Deadline For Payment Of 1965 Poll Tax

If you want to vote in any election during the coming year you will have to have a poll tax receipt and if you haven't paid that \$1.75 poll tax yet, time is running out. Sunday midnight is the absolute deadline — if you haven't paid by then you just don't vote, unless you are over age exempt. The sheriff's department tax office will be open all day Saturday for the convenience of those who wish to pay the poll tax. The office won't be open Sunday but if you can't get there until Sunday, you may contact any member of the sheriff's department and you will be issued a poll tax receipt. But better still, if you can't make it in person, you can mail your remittance in time to be post-marked Saturday, Jan. 30, and you will receive your receipt by mail. But don't wait until Sunday to mail your remittance — the law says the application must be in the office by January 31 or it is not valid. (Continued on Last Page)

**Foreigners Now Hold \$27.4 Billion** in short-term dollar credits Redeemable in Gold, according to the Federal Reserve. And this is \$12.2 billion more than we have in our \$15.188 billion gold reserve. But Federal law requires a 25 percent gold backing for Federal Reserve note and deposit liabilities, which pre-empt all but \$1.7 billion of our reserve. So how do we support the dollar and meet our foreign obligations?

Within days, according to the Citizens Foreign Aid Committee (to aid American taxpayers), the President will ask repeal by law of this 24 percent gold reserve requirement! This will keep foreign creditors quiet while the Treasury does out \$4 billion more in gold — as confidence in the dollar wanes. In this context, the President's \$3.4 billion foreign aid request is not modest — but utterly reckless. On the face of it, only a favorable balance of payments can save the US economy.

The Iraan Braves cashed in on 17 of their 37 trips to the foul line at Davidson gym Tuesday night, which is not particularly good but in this case was good enough, to give the Braves a 49 to 41 decision over the Ozona Lions.

Both teams hit for 16 field goals but the difference came as the Lions made 9 of their 17 free shots.

The loss was the third in district play for the Lions as they completed the first half of district play and was most surprising in that the Lions were still in the game up to the final minute when excessive fouls put the contest out of reach.

Coach Brooks Dozier alternated three members of the B team, recently promoted to the varsity, into the game in the second and fourth quarters. On both occasions, with the strong aid of veterans David Childress, Winn Saunders and Richard Vargas, the Lions fought back, going into the final lead 41 to 39 with just

under two minutes left, on two shots by George Cox and a fielder by Pon Seahorn.

Led by the shooting of George Kyle and David Childress, the Braves fought to toe with the Lions throughout the first half, with the score tied 12 and 12 at the quarter and 23 all at the half.

The Braves pulled away in the third quarter with Smithson and Reel leading the way, but the Lions rallied in the final period, finally forging ahead late in the fourth quarter only to see foul shots push the Braves out to win.

In all, the Lions were charged with 25 fouls, with two regulars going to the bench with excessive fouls, while the Braves sent one to the bench and had 13 fouls called against them.

David Childress led the Lions with 10 points followed by Pon Seahorn with 8. The Braves were led by Chuck Reel and Ricky Armstrong each of whom had 12.

In the B game, Coach H. O. Hoover's five responded to the loss of three regulars by thumping the Iraan reserves 51 to 31 in a rout.

David Lewis led the attack with 15, followed by Rex Bland with 12 and Ernest Vargas with 10.

The reserves led 22 to 15 at the half but pulled ra-

pidly away in the third quarter and ran off with the contest in the final period, with all 14 reserve members seeing extensive action.

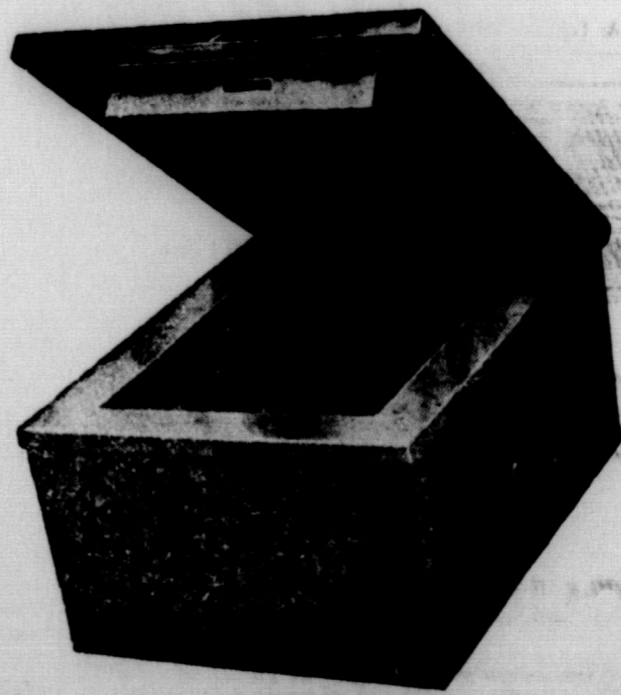

**1965 Edition Of Texas Hiway Maps Being Distributed**

Austin, Texas — The 1965 edition of the Official State Highway Map of Texas, now rolling off multicolor presses for free distribution worldwide, makes new use of an old notion: A straight line is the shortest distance between two points.

The Texas Highway Department has this axiom to grind in its concept of short-line mileage computations appearing on the popular map for the first time this year. Mileages shown in the map's mileage chart will indicate the shortest distance between all principal cities in the State. Some of these short-line routes may include partial travel over Farm to Market roads.

Eighteen brilliant photographs depict Texas in living color and Scene-orama in the 1965 version of the Texas Highway Department's most popular publication.

Last year 764,000 copies of the map found their way to auto glove compartments — and homes of potential tourists — from Bangor to Bangkok. The Highway Department forecasts a circulation just as high or higher for the 1965 map.

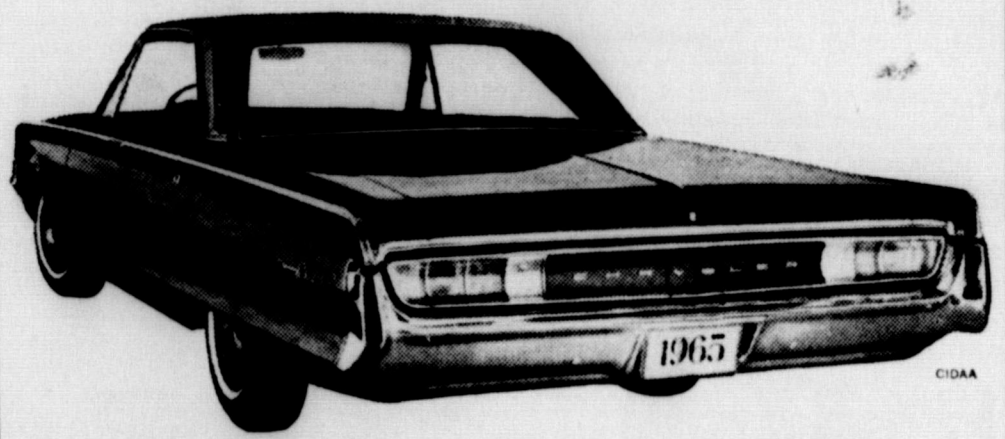
