## Screwworm Fund Drive Slow Here

With the critical period and in the screwworm control program and a \$300,000 contribution from Texas and sportsmen nearby to assure interim financing of the program under the federal government's over in full July 1, fund drive among producers is dragging woefully here and throughout state, reports indicate.

Out of a possible near 200 stock producers in this county, only 50 had contributed to the fund to yesterday, according to a tally being kept by county Agent Pete Jacoby, acting as secretary for the screwworm fund committee.

These 50 contributions swelled total local contributions to \$3,525.48, an unmet half of the extended quota from this county, based on the suggested contribution scale of \$550.00 per head for sheep and goats and 10 cents per head for horses and cattle.

The \$300,000 in producer contributions must be raised before state appropriation of \$500,000 becomes available to match an emergency federal appropriation of \$550,000 in matching funds to meet estimated costs of maintaining the program through July 1.

At the request of the committee, funds are being sent in as rapidly as possible as they are received so that a maximum amount can be made to meet the deadline, set for April 15.

## Incumbent Trio Re-Elected As School Trustees

While apparently dissatisfied voters scattered their shots among fourteen different write-in candidates, the three incumbent members of the district school board were re-elected by comfortable margins in Saturday's annual election.

Board President Bill Carson led the ticket with a total of 235 votes. Chas. E. Davidson, III, was second with 233 and Taylor Deaton had 224. R. B. (Bob) Stephens, running the second year in a row, polled 82 votes. There were a total of 276 votes cast.

Wayne E. (Cap) West was the leading write-in candidate with 11 votes to his credit. Other write-ins were Dick Webster, Woody Mason, Al Ramirez, Troy Williams, Bekie Diaz, Lawrence James, Jerry Hayes, George Glynn, Jack Baggett, Bud Coates, Bill Watson, Napoleon Vitela, Oliver Payne.

For the county board Hilary Phillips for Precinct 1 trustee, and Wayne W. West for trustee at large each received 268 votes.

## Funeral Sunday For Billy Ward, Accident Victim

Funeral services are scheduled for 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon in Brackettville for Billy Ward, about 60, long time Ozona resident, well known colored ranch hand, who was killed instantly late Sunday afternoon about a mile north of Comstock when the pickup he was driving went out of control and turned over.

Ward suffered a broken neck in the accident. His wife, Gertrude, who was a passenger in the truck, was not seriously injured. She is under treatment in a Del Rio hospital, however, for shock and minor cuts and bruises. Cause of the accident was not learned here.

Ward was employed for seven years on the C. O. Walker ranch north of Ozona and for the past two or three years has worked on the Ralph Jones ranch east of here. His wife has worked as maid and housekeeper for the Roy Hendersons several years.

## Phone Committee Enlists Interest In Cleanup Drive

In an effort to interest every resident of Ozona in doing his or her part in seeing that the town undergoes a thorough Spring house-cleaning during the annual Spring Clean-Up Campaign, telephone committees have been at work this week calling every telephone subscriber to ask cooperation in the clean-up.

The clean-up is sponsored by the Ozona Woman's Club and members of the telephoning committee yesterday reported a great deal of interest, and even enthusiasm, is being expressed by residents when informed of the clean-up drive.

"I'll call all my neighbors and we'll get with it," was the enthusiastic response of one householder, a newcomer, a committee member reported.

Residents were being told that a citywide effort is being made to enlist the help of all residents to clean-up around their home premises and owners of vacant lots to see that such places are cleaned of winter accumulations.

They are also being told that all accumulated trash will be hauled to the city dump ground without charge if it is properly stacked and placed by the time the county trucks make their gathering and hauling rounds, by next Monday, April 12.

Trash should be placed in a spot convenient to the truckers so that it can be loaded with a minimum of effort and without crossing over private property. That's all that is required — there will be no charge for the hauling, the Commissioners Court joining in the sponsored effort to make Ozona a little more attractive place in which to live.

Let's all "get with it" as the newcomer said.

## Motor Vehicle Registrations Set New Record

Auto registrations zoomed in Crockett county this year as compared to previous years, Mrs. Gertrude Perry, office deputy in the office of Sheriff Billy Mills, reported this week as she was completing final reports on the registrations through the March 31 deadline.

Passenger car registrations for the 1965 registration year totalled 1,398, a jump of 159 from the same date a year ago. Commercial trucks registered to the deadline totalled 507 and 238 farm trucks were registered in the county.

The county is permitted to retain the first \$50,000 of vehicle registration fees and until this year, Crockett county had not reached a total to require a remittance to the state before the last of April or early May. This year the total registration fees had passed the \$50,000 with the March report to the state from the local collection office, Mrs. Perry said.

PROTEST NOW — OR WEEP LATER

Only a tidal wave of public protest, rolling on Washington from all sections of the country can now prevent passage of what is probably the most vindictive law ever presented to the Congress of the US. This is the "Voting Rights Act of 1965 (H. R. 6400 — S. 1564), the "President's law," a punitive law and a law that could well dismember the US even while we fight our deadliest enemy on the other side of the world.

It is an ex post facto law — as forbidden by Article I of the Constitution — that proposes to make a crime of yesterday's violations (for ten years back) or voting registration practices that are to be outlawed! And its provision to deprive states of the South of the power to establish a literacy test for all voters irrespective of race or color further violates the Constitution.

In depriving the South of any voter qualification other than age and residence Liberty Lobby sees the punishment as a death sentence — by stages:

"First, the rise of a new class of southern state politicians — a breed of demagogues — coming into political power on a wave of pie-in-the-sky promises of free state money for everyone.

"Next, the futile attempts to carry out those promises by taxing the farms, business and industry of the South at ever-increasing rates, even while failing to satisfy the demands of the poor for more ... and more and more and more.

"Then, the flight of business and industry from the unbearable demands of the welfare state, and the tra-

gie streams of white refugees — following their jobs to the North and West

"Finally, the necessary establishment of the all-black states as Federal "reservations," populated only by government bureaucrats and their negro dependents, but — unlike their counterparts on the Indian reservations in Washington by a powerful voting bloc of nearly forty congressmen and eight Senators."

Unless every thoughtful American who dreads the dismemberment of his country as much as Abraham Lincoln did will write his Congressman and both Senators in protest they are unlikely to be able to withstand the pressure for passage.

And if this bill passes, it will be a greater victory for the Communists (whether or not they have had anything to do with it) than our defeat in Korea.

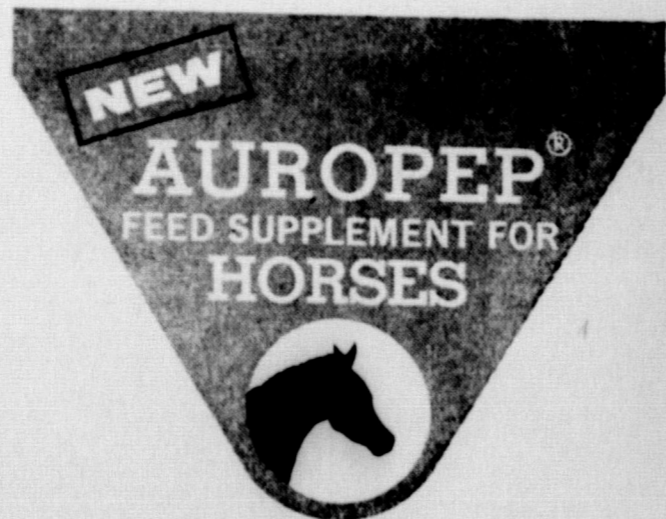

We not only win such engagements, spare the unhappy people, but with prisoners to grill are finding out the enemy's plans.

Only the Viet Cong — and the other Reds — could object to this.

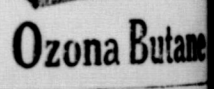

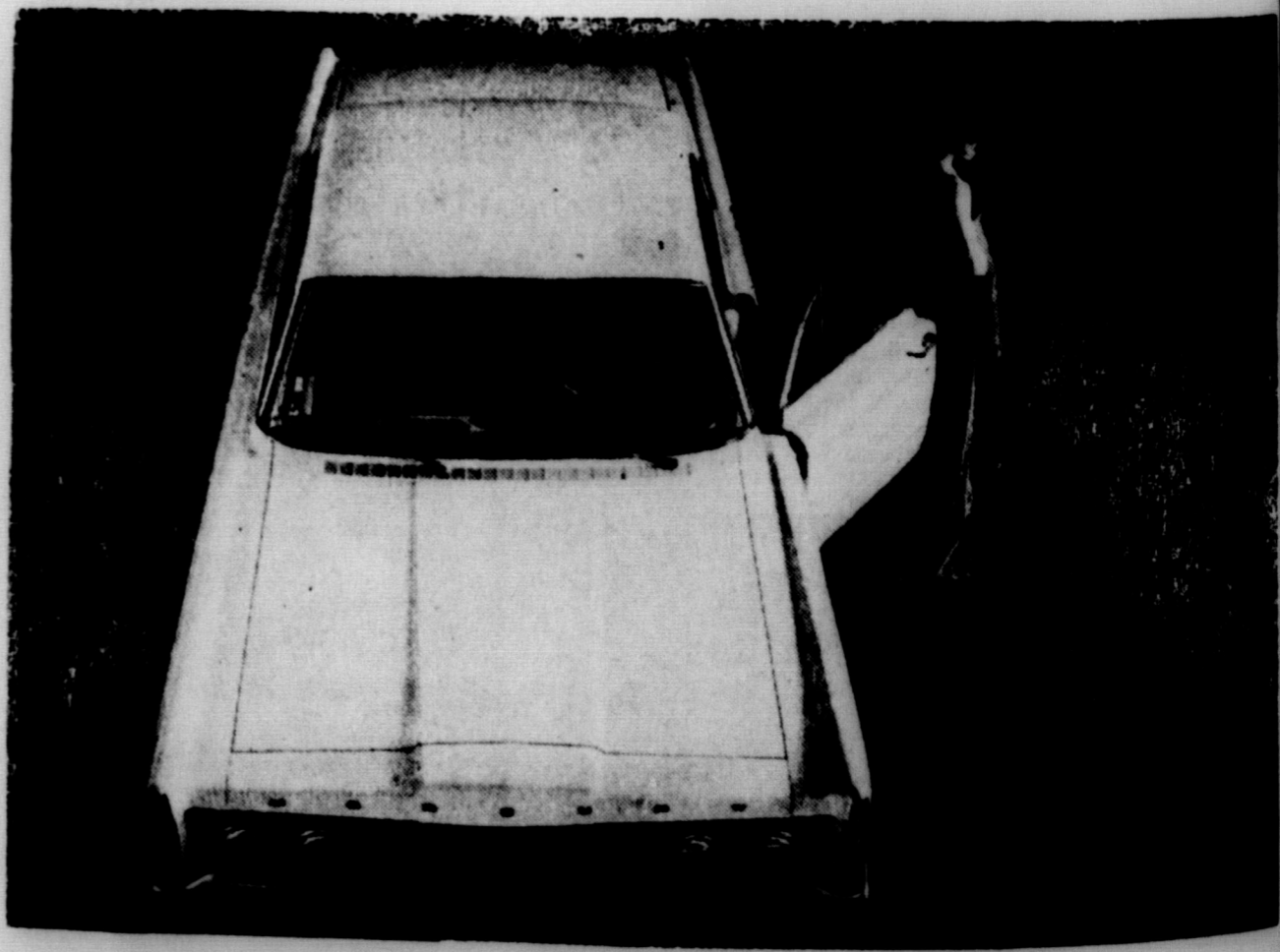

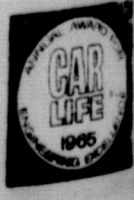

### HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

#### From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — You probably didn't know it, but 291 holidays will be celebrated in Texas in the coming six months.

Most of the holidays aren't statewide observances. But Munday's June 18 Vegetable Festival, the May 7 Panola County Queen Pageant, Boerne's April 24 Saengerfest, and Ozona's horse show May 29 and Junior Rodeo July 8 and 9 are in the offing, as well as 287 other local celebrations.

In order to help Texans and tourists keep track, and plan their travels accordingly, the State Highway Department has published a Texas Calendar of Events. It covers the period from April 1 through September.

**Federal Dollars Flow** — Legislative budget writers nearing the end of a long trail, are confronted with a new problem. Question is how to anticipate the effect on state finances of an unprecedented flood of federal dollars flowing into a variety of programs.

Some think a special session of the Legislature may be necessary, after final congressional action, in order to the down overlooked matching-fund requirements.

**Enlarged Senate Re-Approached** — Senators saw bugs in the plan they passed earlier to enlarge their membership from 31 to 39, guaranteeing all but five incumbents terms extended through next year's elections.

So, Sen. Louis Crump of San Saba introduced a new version which would require all Senators to run for re-election in 1966 if they want to keep their jobs. New measure quickly won com-

mittee approval. Increasing terms from four to six years still is a feature of the "big senate" plan. If approved by the Legislature, it will go to voters July 24. Senators think it will be a relatively painless way out of re-districting for them.

**Horses Stopped at the Gate** — After the longest committee hearing thus far this season, the bill by Rep. Maurice Pipkin of Brownsville to legalize parimutuel bets on horse races in counties which approve by local option was sent to a subcommittee.

Whether it is reported out of the subcommittee depends on how many votes Pipkin thinks he can garner on the House floor. Right now, the odds are that the bill would be defeated in the House by about 2-to-1.

**Grocers Fight Labeling** — Texas retail grocers raised strong objections at the public hearing for Rep. A. C. Atwood's bill to require labeling of imported citrus fruit, dating original packing of fruits or vegetables and marking "cold storage" any bin in which produce has been under refrigeration for as long as 60 days.

Atwood and Bob Lilly of the (Rio Grande) Valley Farm Bureau told the committee that the bill is intended to help build consumer acceptance of fresh Texas fruits and vegetables over the cold-storage and imported products.

Grocers argued that the provisions of the bill would be a nuisance and would serve no useful purpose.

### Two Wildcat Tests Staked In County

Jack Caudle Drilling Co., Mertzon, will drill a 1,600-foot Grayburg wildcat in Crockett County, 10 miles south of McCamey and 3/4 mile east of Leonard production in the Tippett multipay field. It is the No. 1 Thorp, et al.

The project will be drilled with combination tools with operations beginning immediately.

Location is 2,503 feet northeast along the line from the south corner of 42-31-H&TC, thence 702 feet southeast to location is 43-31-H&TC.

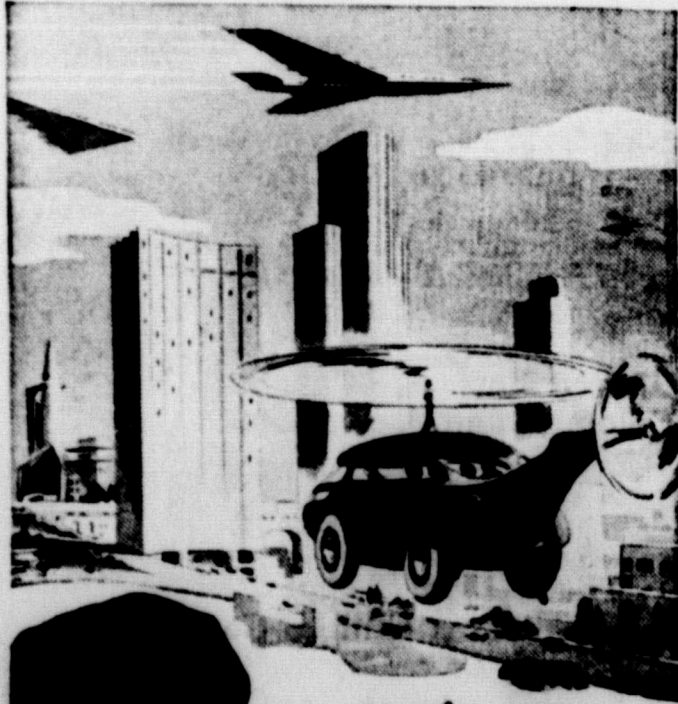
Marlin Farris gave Ozona another first place by tossing the shot 41 feet 3 inches for first place.
