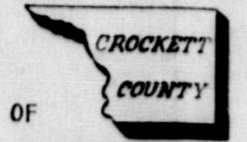

Subject To Few Changes

Civic Center Building Is Accepted By County

Subject to addition of a few omissions, repairs of a few mistakes and the usual corrections any new building requires before it is finally pronounced complete, the Crockett County Commission's Court Tuesday afternoon accepted the newly completed Ozona civic center from Contractor J. L. Traywick of San An-gele.

The acceptance paved the way for the Ozona Chamber of Commerce to go ahead with its plans to hold its first annual membership banquet in the new civic center auditorium. The building had actually been used a week before, by the Junior class for its annual banquet for the Seniors, but that was by special permis-sion of the contractor and arrangements with the county to avoid disappoint-ing a group of youngsters.

While the contractor is installing a few fixtures, making a few repairs, etc., as outlined in the accep-tance agreement, the county is withholding 10 percent of the contract price to guarantee performance.

Screwworm Fund Still Short Of County's Quota

With the deadline near, Crockett county ranch operators picked up a little momentum in their contribu-tions to the screwworm eradication fund special collection during the past week, but the total collec-tion was still some \$2,500 to \$3,000 short of the expected quota for the county, County Agent Pete Jacoby, secretary for the county screwworm committee, re-ported this week.

A total of 89 ranch operators and interested individuals had contributed a total of \$5,981.98 to yesterday. Not yet heard from and the expected source of the county's balance of its quota are 65 ranch operators in the county. This number from previous contribution lists had not contributed to the new emergency fund this week.

Union Texas Petroleum Corp., Midland, will drill an 8,400-foot Ellenburger wild-cat in Crockett County, eight miles southeast of McCamey, 4 1/2 miles north-northeast of the Tippett multipay area and 3/4-mile northwest of a depleted Wolfcamp discovery. It is the No. 1 Robbins.

Location is 1,920 feet from the north and 689 feet from the west lines of Nancy J. Everett No. 24, Abst. 5478. Elevation is 2,800 feet.

The depleted Wolfcamp discovery, Broseco Corp. No. 1 Robbins, was finished May 19, 1964, to pump 72 barrels of 37.1 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 576-1, through perforations be-tween 6,762-763 feet. 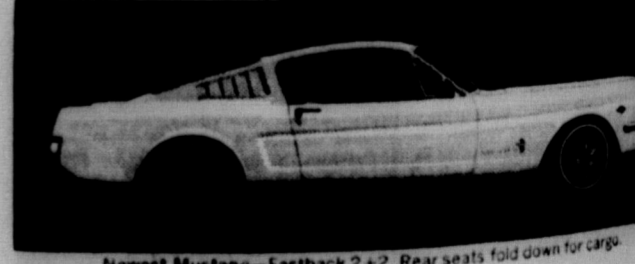

Junction's Easter Pageant April 17

Junction's fifteenth annual Easter Pageant will be presented next Saturday, April 17, 1965 at 10 p. m. on the eve before Easter Sunday, in a natural amphitheatre on the hillside below The Everlasting Cross, one mile south-east of Junction.

Presentation is by five-score Kimble County people, all laymen, women and children in colorful costumes, typical of the dress of Biblical times. Here they will reenact Jesus Christ's last Days on Earth, so timed that the Scene of the final Ascension will take place shortly after midnight on Easter morn.

This Holy Spectacle will be presented in pantomime, supported from a broadcasting booth by readers and background music. A dozen stages have been arranged among the rugged rocks of the hill-side, and changes of scenes are effected by the shifting of spot and flood lights.

The production is entirely amateur and non-commercial. Members of the cast are all local people, with no professional or paid actors. The cast contains men and women from many walks of life, who take time from their business for several weeks to participate in this consecrated service.

Mrs. Jack Reeves, accomplished ranch woman, directs the Pageant for the fourteenth consecutive year. In 1951, a group of about twenty inspired people enacted the first Pageant from a single stage.

From year to year the Spectacle has grown, with changes and improvements in scripts, scenes, staging and props. Attendance has yearly increased and last year over 7,000 people came from far and near. The excellence of the production is perhaps attested by the ever increasing attendance. Many think there is nothing finer this side of Oberammergau.

Todd Field Gets Confirmer; Final Helbing Gasser

One Crockett County field gained a confirmation and another an extender.

The Todd, Southwest (multipay San Andres) field gained its second upper San Andres producer and a 1/2-mile northeast extension to that pay with completion of Southland Royalty Co. No. 3-8 Todd, 26 miles northwest of Ozona, and one location northeast of the lower San Andres opener and lone producer from that pay.

It was finalized for a daily pumping potential of 36.7 barrels of 28 gravity oil, plus 30 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 750-1. Production was through perforations between 1960 - 2,018 feet, which had been fractured with 35,700 gallons.

Top of pay was picked at 1,960 feet on ground elevation of 2,534 feet. Total depth is 2,157 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set; plugged-back depth, 2,055 feet.

Location is 2,609 feet from the north and 467 feet from the west lines of 9-WX-GC & SF.

The Atlantic Refining Co. has completed from the Canyon its No. 1-25 Ruby Helbing, six miles southwest of Ozona, two miles east-southeast of Canyon gas production in the Ozona, Southwest multipay oil and gas field and the same distance west-northwest of the Hunt-Baggett multipay field.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 410,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations between 6,263 - 756

feet. Operator tested the Strawn through perforations at 8,697 - 723 feet, which had been bedfized with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 45,000 pounds of sand. No gauges have been reported.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and west lines of 25-QR-J. H. Gibson.

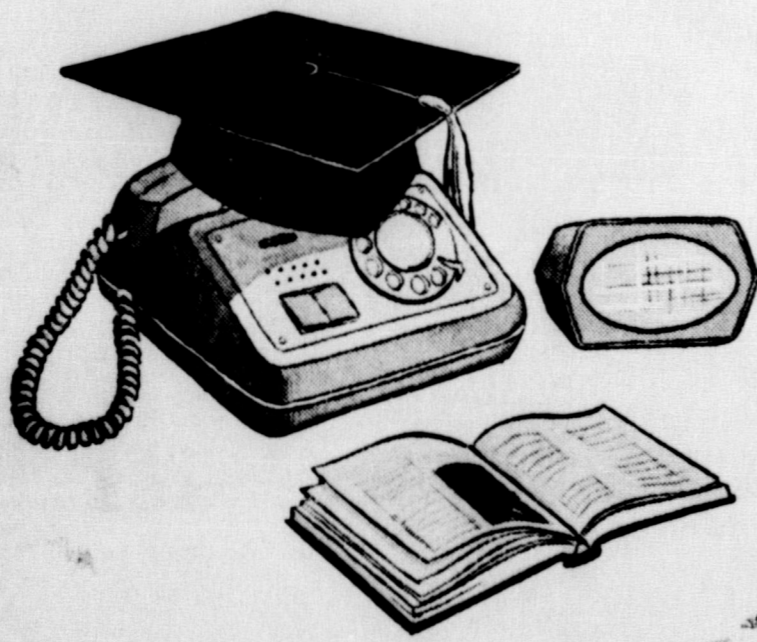

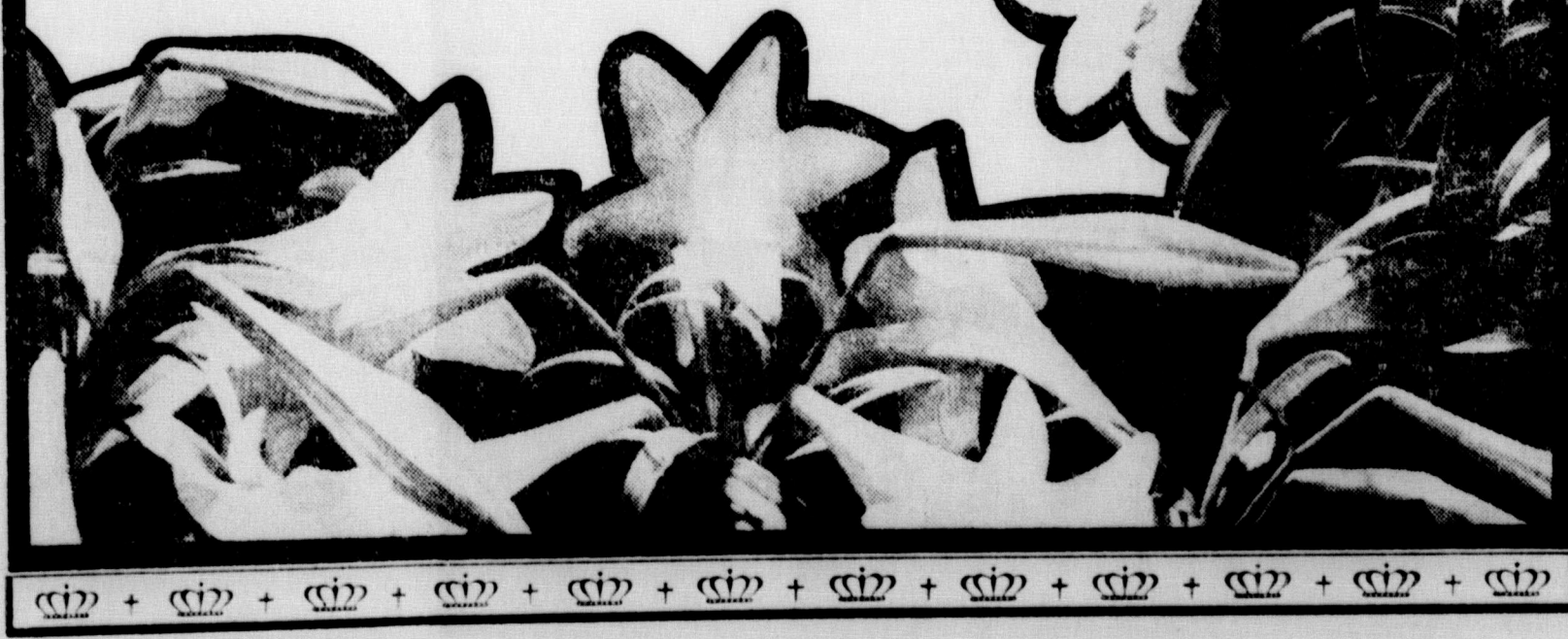

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Former Ozonan, Sybil Cook, Now Mrs. C. F. Hamilton, Elected to City Council In Dallas City Election

A former Ozonan is now a member of the Dallas City Council, or will be on inauguration day May 1, elected April 6 on the same slate with Mayor Erik Johnson and the ticket sponsored by the Citizens Charter Association.

Mrs. C. F. Hamilton, wife of a Dallas physician, elected to the Council from Place 7, at large, in the April 6 city election, is the former Sybil Cook, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Fred Cook of Ozona and a sister of Mrs. Dollye Cook Williams of this city. She was the only woman on the ticket.

Long a worker for the Republican party in Dallas and a consistent supporter of the ticket sponsored

by the Citizens Charter Assn. of Dallas, a dominant force in Dallas politics and largely responsible for the absence of scandal in the city politics over the years, Mrs. Hamilton found herself in the thick of a spirited campaign this Spring, this time as a candidate.

Featured in an article by Mary Brinkerhoff in Friday's Dallas News, Mrs. Hamilton attempted to dispel some campaign rumors that had been spread. She denied ever having been a member of the John Birch Society.

"I do not consider myself a right-wing conservative," she said. "I'm more of a moderate conservative. And this is not just a switch for convenience. It's always been so." In any case she feels, "We must keep party politics out of City Hall."

Born in McLennan County, Sybil was reared in Ozona and after receiving nurses training in San Angelo she enlisted as an Army nurse in World War II and served four years, including 18 months in Australia. She and the doctor from Iowa, then a captain, met in California, while both were on active duty. They have resided in Dallas since 1949 where he is a practicing physician and vice president of the Dallas County Medical Society.

The Hamiltons, who own two small farms in Collin county where they ride horses and raise cattle (Sybil bought one of them through the veterans land program) have three daughters, Lea, 19, a student in Trinity University in San Antonio; Becky, 17, Woodrow Wilson High School student, and Vicky, 14, a Junior High student.

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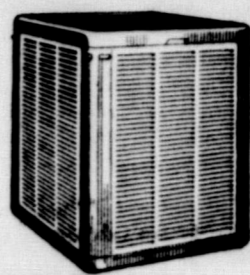
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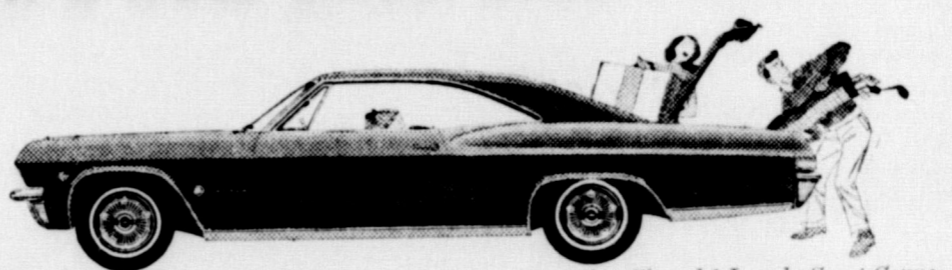
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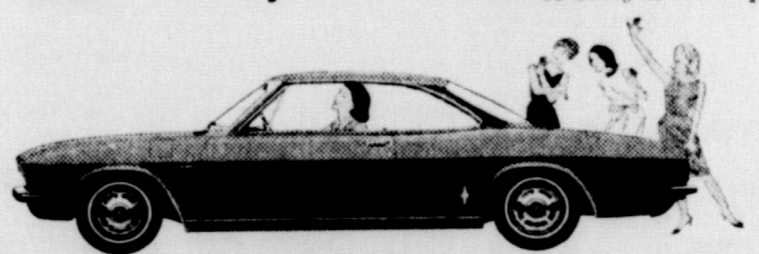

1,400 feet of gas, 280 feet of 30 gravity oil, 180 feet of oil and gas-cut mud and 220 feet of drilling mud.

Gulf Oil Corp. will drill the No. 17 Isabel Vaughn, as a ½-mile southwest offset to Morris A. Antwell & Associates No. 1 I. Vaughn (Deep), opener and lone producer in the Vaughn, North (Ellenburger) field, 11 miles northwest of Ozona and surrounded by shallow production in the Pure-Bean field.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and west lines of 85 - OP - GC&SF. Contract depth is 8,000 feet.

The discovery was finalized July 21, 1964, for a daily pumping potential of 74 barrels of 42 gravity oil, no water from open hole between 7,344-561 feet. A re-entry operation, it originally was drilled by Gulf as the No. 1-A Vaughn, and finished Oct. 7, 1962, as a Wolfcamp opener in the Vaughn field, gauging 238 barrels of 43.1 gravity oil through a 21-64-inch choke and perforations between 5,320-340 feet.

The Atlantic Refining Co. Midland, will drill the No. 2-15 Ruby Helbing as a ½-mile south - southeast out-post to Canyon gas production in the Ozona East multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County, three miles south of Ozona.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 467 feet from the east lines of 15-QR-TTRR. Contract depth is 6,800 feet.

Frio-Tex Oil & Gas Co., San Antonio, was running 5½-inch casing to an unreported depth for completion attempt at the No. 3 Sue Hunt in 4-J-GC&SF. Crockett County scheduled Ellenburger wildcat, 12 miles southwest of Ozona, 1¼ mile southeast of Canyon gas production in the Ozona, Southwest field and 1¼ - mile southwest of Strawn gas production in the Hunt-Baggett multipay field.

Scheduled to 10,500 feet, it was drilled to 9,745 feet. Reports on a drillstem test are not being released at the present.
