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HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — If you want to sit in on the committee hearing for the bill which would legalize the sale of miniature bottles of liquor in restaurants, you better come early.

That's what Sen. Jim Bates of Edinburg, sponsor of the bill in the upper house, is saying. He expects as many as 3,000 persons will be at the Capitol to testify or to listen when the bill comes up before the Senate Committee on Jurisprudence at 2 p. m., Tuesday, March 16.

Congressional Redistricting — Texas Republicans, whose lawsuit resulted in present congressional districts being invalidated, have offered their version of how the lines should be redrawn. Plan is embodied in a bill sponsored by Rep. Frank Cahoon of Midland, only Republican in the 59th.

The GOP product satisfies many objections raised to others introduced so far, since it disturbs fewer incumbents than any plan to date.

Only U. S. Reps. Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls and Omar Burleson of Anson would be facing each other as opponents in a newly-created Congressional District 13, and U. S. Reps. John Dowdy of Athens and Lindley Beckworth of Gladewater, in a newly-defined District 3.

Three new districts would be developed: A District 23

giving Harris County a third congressman; District 17, giving Bexar County and a group of South Texas Counties another representative; and District 7, giving Dallas County a second congressman. U. S. Rep. Joe Pool, who lives in District 7, but now is elected statewide, could thus retain a seat.

Land Program Renewal Proposed — Voters will get another chance to say whether they want to continue the veterans land program under which thousands of Texas veterans have purchased farm property at low interest.

A proposed constitutional amendment to extend the program — first amendment cleared this session — was approved by the Senate and sent to the governor. Amendment will be voted on in November.

Guadalupe Park Asked — Senate adopted a resolution by Sen. W. E. Snelson of Midland urging fast action by Congress to appropriate funds for buying land to create a Guadalupe Mountain National Park.

A federal agency has recommended that the park be created, and an area man has offered to sell 72,000 acres. Area contains the only stream in Texas where mountain trout thrive and is stocked with bear, mountain lion, elk, bighorn sheep, deer, turkey and a great variety of birds.

Interest Bill Up Again — Rep. James Nugent of Kerrville has reintroduced the amendment to the state conflict of interest statute which failed to pass during the last session.

Among the changes is addition of a section which would prohibit any member of the Legislature from introducing or causing to be introduced legislation which would directly affect any client or employer from whom the legislator receives a retainer fee or any other financial consideration during his term in the Legislature.

Integration Compliance Noted — Texas Education Agency notified federal authorities of compliance with school integration requirements of Federal Civil Rights Act.

All but 160 of 1,350 Texas school districts also have agreed to comply, according to Dr. J. W. Edgar, state education commissioner.

Agreement is necessary to continue receiving \$40,000,000 in federal school aid.

Eight Texas school segregation laws now are under court challenge, Edgar re-

A V-8 car belonging to Rachle Schrader, from Stevens Motor where it was stored, was the night of the mysterious disappearance of W. Thomas, filling operator at the Stearns, was recovered on Rock street last week.

30 years ago— Body of Mrs. Elam, 79, a long time resident of Ozona until 1923, the family moved to Worth, was laid to rest in Cedar Hill Cemetery last afternoon. Mrs. Elam died Sunday evening at her home in Fort Worth.

30 years ago— W. McLaughlin, mail carrier on the Ozona-Barnhart route, is another of the adult victims of the epidemic.

30 years ago— Margaret Ella Drake, sister of Mr. and Mrs. Drake, will graduate with highest honors as valedictorian of the class of 1936. Her grade average was 92. Imogene Baker, sister of Mrs. Vera Baker, with a grade average of 94 won salutatory honors. Joe Whatley was the top scoring boy, with a grade average of 92.5, in second place.

30 years ago— The fact that less than three weeks remain in the year to secure 1936 auto plates and the new required driver's license for every person who operates a motor vehicle, registrations are coming in unusually slow, the tax collector's office reports. Less than a hundred vehicles had registered this week of an expected 700 to 800.

30 years ago— The Couch, Ozona grocer, purchased the Live Oak station at the west approach to Live Oak bridge on Highway 27, 35 miles from Ozona.

30 years ago— Teams employed in the wide cleanup sponsored by the Ozona Woman's Club financed through collection of the Commissioners Court, will start Monday morning.

30 years ago— Education leaders from best Texas counties are gathered here Saturday for District 13 Curriculum Conference to be held in the high school auditorium.

30 years ago— Recent rate reductions granted by the West Texas Utilities Co. to the Ozona school plant will result in a saving of about \$10 a month, Supt. C. S. Denham announced.

30 years ago— Mrs. Miller Robison is among this week's victims of the mumps.

30 years ago— Leslie Nance, merchandise salesman for West Texas Utilities Co. has been transferred to Ozona and is now making headquarters here.

30 years ago— B. W. Hutcherson, Sutton county sheriff, tells a story of seeing a man's car turn over several times on the roads between Ozona and Barnhart several years ago.

When Mr. Hutcherson got along side the car, on its wheels again, the driver was still grasping the steering wheel. But let the sheriff tell it:

"I told him — you're dead even though you may not know it. I'll see that your folks are told and that you are given a decent burial. That's the way these things happen. You'll realize in a minute that you're no longer a living, breathing citizen, but just a corpse ready for Old Mother Earth."

The driver hardly knew how to take such words from the stranger for he was uninjured. There hadn't been the sign of a smile on the face of the stranger. Finally he became angry and broke out with:

"I'm not hurt and I'll show you I'm not dead either."

He crawled from under the wheel and ran about fifty yards out in the pasture "just to show he wasn't dead" as Hutch tells it.

### NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP TEST TO BE GIVEN SATURDAY

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test will be given Saturday, March 13 in the high school library. The test will begin at 8:30 a. m. and last until 12:00 a. m.

The NMQST is a three-hour examination of educational development. The test is the first step in the seventh annual competition for a four-year Merit Scholarship provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundations, colleges, associations, unions, trusts, and individuals.

The number of scholarships awarded in any year depends upon the extent of student participation. In 1964-1965 Merit Scholarships were awarded 1,145. In 1965-1966, 1,227 spots were provided by 327 sponsors and 396 of the Merit Scholarships were awarded to 485 students in the event across the four

The test scores of students who are examined in March will be reported to their schools before May 15. The scores are used by counselors in many high schools to help students make decisions about college attendance and field of study. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses in the areas measured by the test.

Delta Drilling Co. and Pauley Petroleum Inc., Odessa, will drill the No. 4-

B Henderson as a 1/2-mile northeast outcrop to the five-well Ozona, Southeast, (Canyon gas) field of Crockett County, 18 1/2 miles southwest of Ozona and 1/2-mile southeast of Canyon production in the Ozona, Southwest multipay oil and gas field.

Location is 1,542 feet from the south and 1,231 feet from the west lines of 8-TCRR, Abst. 5678. Contract depth is 7,200 feet; ground elevation, 2,417 feet.

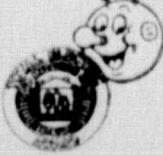

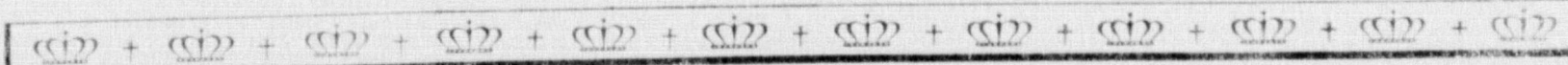
You've been speeding, and you get a ticket. You don't like it, but you know you've been wrong. With little or no argument, you pay your fine.

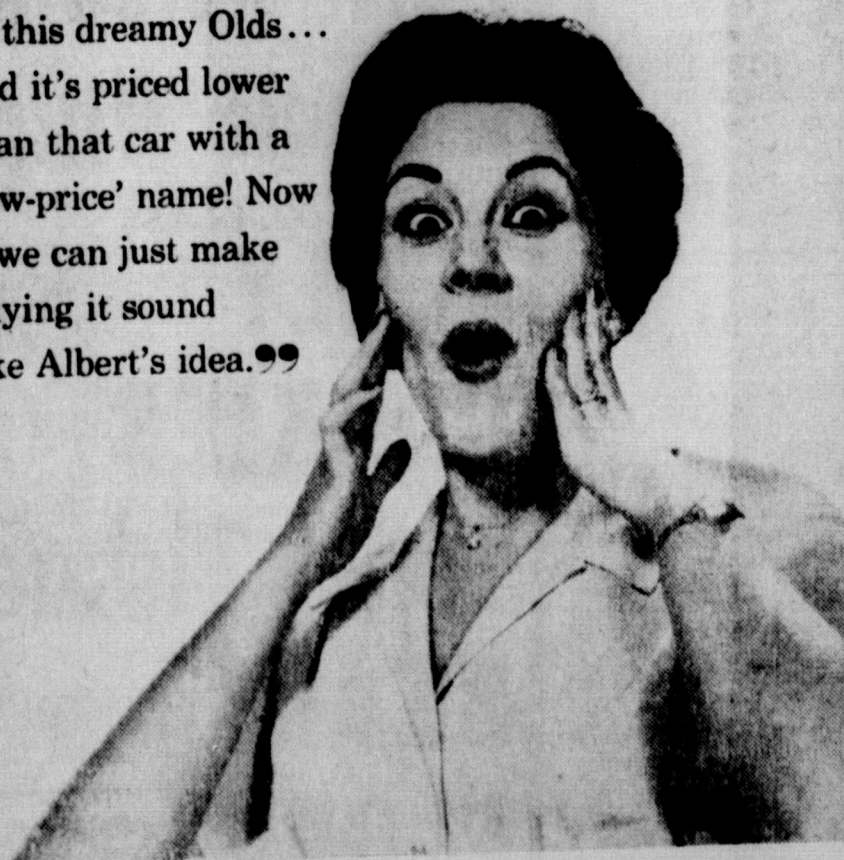
