County Employs Sleuth To Find Sources

Johnston, graduate geologist and specialist in water hydrology, has been employed jointly by the county Commission and directors of the Crockett County Water Control District, to conduct a study of Crockett County underground water resources and to police their use and purity.

Johnston will conduct the study of Crockett County underground water resources begun by Hillary Johnston under authorization of the Texas Water Commission. Mr. Johnston's study will be in a short time and will be an immediate aid in the county's program to maintain a high standard of purity of its underground water, its volume, movement and of purity or pollution.

Mr. Johnston will be working with companies and drilling companies to see that drilling methods and plugging operations comply with the practices in preserving the purity of the state's underground water, County Judge Jones said. He will also attempt to locate its source and, if possible, bring about a change in the condition of the water.

Johnston will seek cooperation of all oil and gas operators in the county and adjoining territory to pursue the best practices in all drilling operations," Judge Jones said. He will also need the cooperation of ranchers in checking on water and pollution, in the case of the water study.

Johnston comes to Ozona from Kermit where he has been a ground water hydrology consultant. He is a graduate of the University of Texas and served time with the U. S. Geological Survey and was several years with the Engineering Co. of Houston, working in ground water studies in West Texas and New Mexico.

Crockett Grass Judging Team To State Meet

Ernie Boyd To Be Principal At Big Spring

Ernest M. Boyd, a member of the Ozona school faculty for the past twelve years and principal of the South Elementary School here the last ten years, this week accepted a position as principal in the Big Spring Public School system.

Mr. Boyd resigned from the local system recently effective with the close of the present school year.

Supt. Sam Anderson of the Big Spring system said that Mr. Boyd would be assigned as principal of one of the 11 elementary schools in Big Spring, a city of approximately 35,000 population in Howard County. It is the site of Webb Air Force Base and of Howard County Junior College.

Mr. Boyd will receive a substantial raise in pay over the salary he received in the Ozona system and in addition will receive an automatic annual increase in salary.

Big Spring High School is Class 4A and is presently in process of building a \$2.5 million addition to the plant.

Mr. Boyd is a graduate of Baylor University, holding the B. A. and Master's degree from that institution. In addition, he received extra training in education and school administration at East Texas State in Commerce.

Mr. Boyd started his teaching career in Wortham, Texas, where he taught four years while Ozona's Superintendent L. B. T. Sikes was superintendent. (Continued on Last Page)

100,000 Pounds Wools Sold In Bid Sales Here

Ozona's two wool houses sold approximately 100,000 pounds of wool in sealed bid sales here Tuesday morning and afternoon but found prices on eight-months wools unsatisfactory.

During the morning, the Ozona Wool and Mohair Co. owned by Beall Barbee, offered about 80,000 pounds in 12-months and more than 300,000 pounds of 8-months. None of the eight months wool was sold, however, bids being rejected on the first 100,000 pounds offered and the sale terminated.

Approximately 32,000 pounds of 12-months wool sold, prices ranging from a low 47 to 53 cents per pound grease basis. Bulk of the wool went at an average of 49-50 cents per pound grease basis. Mr. Barbee described the wools as the best he has seen since being in the warehouse business here.

In the afternoon, buyers went to the Crockett County Wool & Mohair Co. warehouse where they bought approximately 40,000 pounds of 12-months wool and 21,000 pounds of eight months fleeces. Prices on the 12 months ranged from 47 cents to 51 1/2 cents per pound in the grease. Price range on the eight-months was 47 1/2 to 51 1/2 cents per pound. Jim Carpenter, manager, said bids were pending on about 9,500 pounds.

Perner Horse Is Winner At Sonora; Tied World Record

P. C. Perner, Ozona Quarter Horse fancier and breeder, evidently picked a winner at Ruidoso Downs last September.

It was then that the Ozonan bought "Talent Bar" who as a 2-year-old is showing a lot of talent on the race tracks of West Texas.

Talent Bar won the West Texas Quarter Horse Futurity 220-yard race for 2-year-olds at the Sonora race meet last Saturday. In the Futurity trials a week earlier, he tied the world's record in the 220-yard run for two-year-olds with a time of 12.3. Although he does not get credit for it because the track is not official, Talent Bar beat the world's record with a 12.2 at San Angelo Downs on April 4.

Talent Bar, by Royal Bars out of Della's Queen, has been in training only since Feb. 1 and has won three out of his first five starts in racing. James Chapman is his trainer.

Coach Mosley, although he failed to win any title in his three years at Elgin, did field a team each year which won the title of "giant killers". Elgin fielded a team each year which in the three years under Coach Mosley beat the district winner each year. Mosley was picked by Austin newspapers as "Coach of the Week" in Central Texas a couple of times each year and in his first year at Elgin was runner-up for the "Coach of the Year" title in Central Texas.

The new coach started his coaching career at Hillsboro Junior High School in 1958 where he had a perfect ten-win no-loss record. After one year at Hillsboro, Mosley was named assistant coach at Plains High School where his teams had a two-year record 21-2-0. He was next assistant football coach and head track coach at Triple A Brewer High School in Fort Worth and went from there to Elgin.

Coach Mosley, a 6-foot, 3 in. 210 pounder, is married and the father of three children, Karen, 12, Judy, 10, and Mike, 6. They are members of the Presbyterian church. The new coach will take over his duties here August 1.

3 Ozona Track Performers Bid For State Title

The Ozona Lions will bid for the state Class A track title Friday night in Austin, with three boys entered in four events.

Those who will compete from Ozona are David Childress in both the high and low hurdles, Gary Pagan in the shot, and Billy Carson in the pole vault.

The Lions have a possibility of scoring 40 points should all three win all four events, but it is expected that between 25 and 35 points will win the meet, and meets have been won with less than 25, thought not often.

According to times posted over the state by those advancing to the state meet the Lions will not be favored to win any of the four events, but in both high and low hurdles and in the shot the differences in times and distances are slight and a top performance by an Ozona performer might equal or better any of those marks.

David Childress was clocked at 19.5 in the regional 180 low hurdles by a number of watches but was given a 19.9. Gary Pagan has posted better distances than the one at the Lubbock Regional but he was not pushed there.

One state qualifier posted a 13' 7" pole vault but only one or two others exceeded by an inch or two Billy Carson's 12 foot mark and the pole vault as much as any event depends on how well the vaulter likes the (Continued on Page Six)

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DISASTER BY DIRECTIVE

The first American famine is now in the making. Eight million dollars worth of citrus fruit lies rotting on the ground in Florida. The colossal fruit and vegetable crops of California are in danger of withering in fields and orchards. In 24 other orchard and truck-farming states a similar picture is developing. Farmers cannot plant seasonal crops with any certainty of getting workers to harvest them.

The nation whose God-given bounty and whose generosity of spirit have fed the world's hungry will tighten its own belt before the year is out — and for how many years to come, no one can say. The history books may call it the Willard Wirtz Famine, since it was triggered by the Secretary of Labor's decision that skilled and seasoned workers from Mexico, Canada and the British West Indies are no longer to be depended on for harvesting fruit and vegetable crops.

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Young Japanese Men Visit Families While Touring U.S. Observe Agricultural Methods

Japanese agriculture manager of the Educational Exchange project, called Mitsunobu Akiyoshi, and Tsuneharu Funaki, whose main interest is beef cattle, have been visiting with Mr. and Mrs. Pleas Childers and Mrs. Pleas Childers while visiting in the county. Mitsunobu Akiyoshi is in charge of the lodge on the Kiyosato experiment project and last year the lodge housed over 24,000 overnight guests, not to mention thousands of others who did not spend the night and all of whom came to observe the operations of the project.

Tsuneharu Funaki, does not as yet speak English but in the less than three month stay thus far has learned to understand a great deal of English.

The two young men flew to the United States early in February and began a tour of the United States on Greyhound buses, traveling from one area to another and visiting with American families along the way, while observing the various methods of livestock production and breeding over the country.

From Ozona, the two young Japanese will travel to Tucson, Arizona, where among others they will meet with the Governor of Arizona and the Governor of the State of Sonora in Mexico.

Among the distinguished men with whom the two have visited are the President of General Mills, Chairman of the Board of the John Deere Corp. and J. F. Cavanaugh, President of the American Jersey Cattle Association.

Akiyoshi stated that they were enjoying the trip and

the visit very much. Neither of the young men considered the Ozona cool snap to be very cool and both said that they did not find the food strange since both have become accustomed to western type foods in Japan.

Akiyoshi and Tsuneharu were speakers at the Rotary Club Tuesday and at the Woman's Forum Wednesday.

Crockett Test Flows At Rate Of 50 Bbls. Hr.

C. L. Norsworthy, Jr., Dallas, No. 1 C. T. Harris, in 3-HH-L&SV, Crockett County Pennsylvania detrital prospect, 10 miles northeast of Iran and six miles west of the Escudido (Pennsylvania, Fusselman and Ellenburger) field, flowed oil to pits at the estimated rate of 50 barrels per hour and reversed out a full string of oil with approximately 220 feet of drilling mud in the bottom, on a drillstem test between 8,380-8,410 feet.

Gas surfaced in five minutes, mud in 15 minutes and oil in 20 minutes, flowing the above gauge on 5/8 by 1-inch chokes. Gavity of the oil was 43.3 degrees; gas-oil ratio 550-1.

Flowing pressure was 3,015-3,425 pounds; 40-minute initial shut-in pressure 3,694 pounds; and 120-minute final shut-in pressure, 3,515 pounds.

Drilling was scheduled on a 10,200-foot Ellenburger contract.

Production was indicated earlier when operator attempted to take a test at the above interval when a leak was encountered in the drillpipe. Operator pulled the remainder of the pipe and found 1,300 feet of fluid of which the top 90 feet was 39.4 gravity oil. Operator had started back in the hole and had seven stands with collars in when the well started flowing a heavy stream of oil and gas, with the stream of oil estimated to be in excess of four inches.

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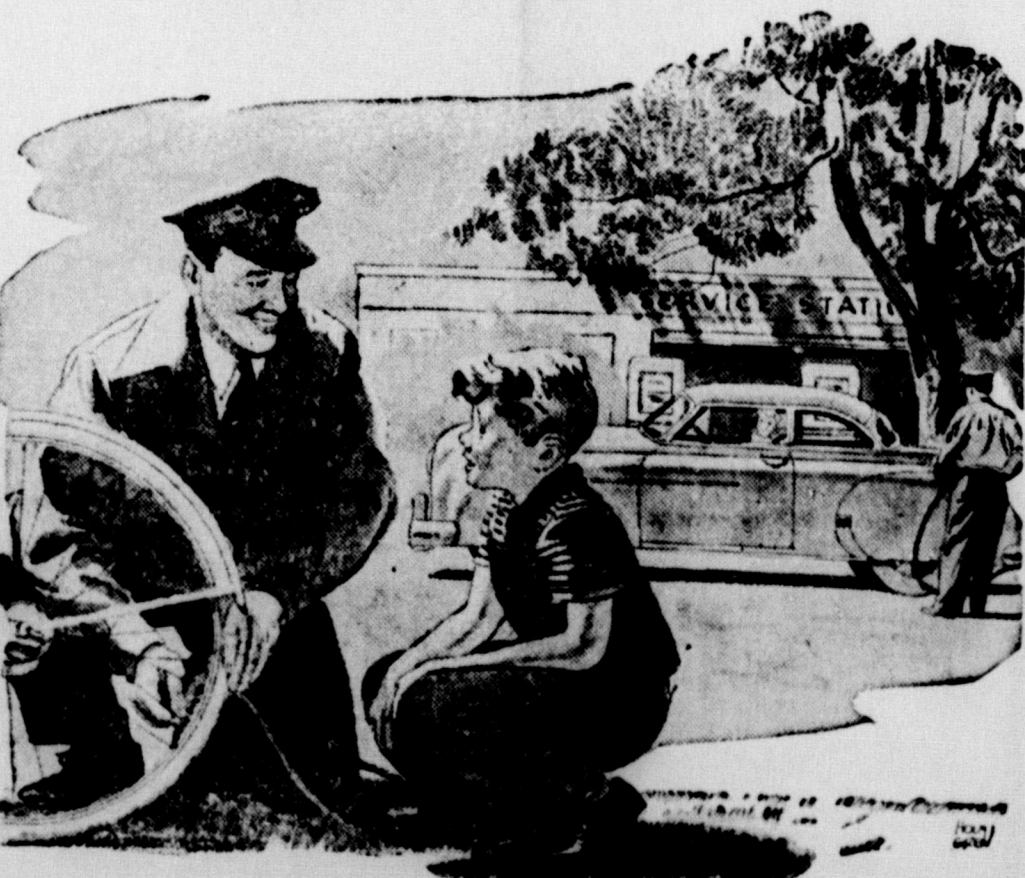
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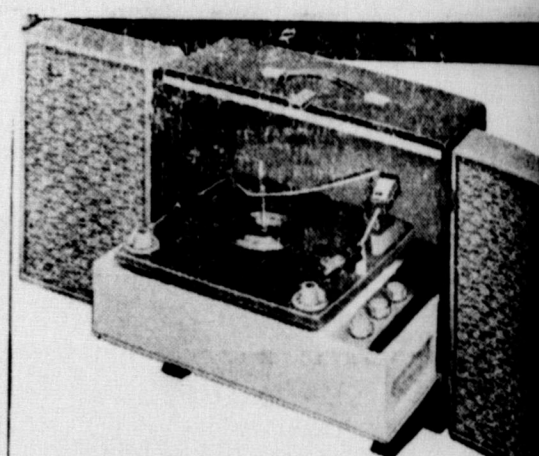
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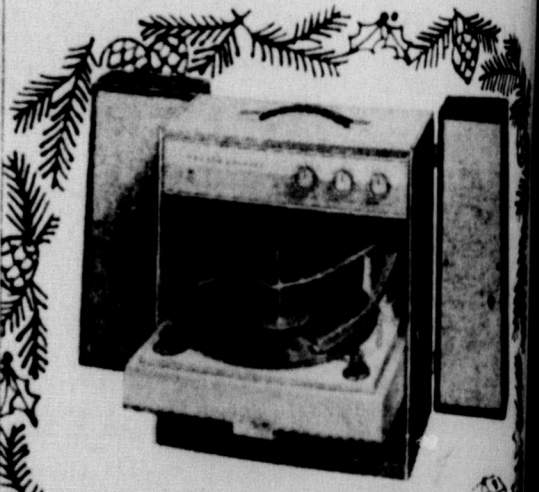

there. He came to Ozona system with Mr. Sikes twelve years ago, teaching the first year and a half in the fifth grade in North Elementary. He was assigned to the principalship of South Elementary in Feb. 1955.

Before Mr. Boyd's tenure as South Elementary principal, there was an average of only one or two Latin-American students a year graduating from high school in Ozona. The average has now been raised to around 15 a year with prospects of the number reaching twenty or more. An improved reading program, and the addition of a 4-year-old school-sponsored kindergarten to the system is credited with contributing to this advance in educational advantages for pupils from the school. The

emphasis has been on a firmer foundation in the primary grades which has strengthened students in their pursuit of a higher education.

Mr. Boyd is a combat veteran of World War II. As a member of the Third Infantry Division, he landed with American combat forces at Anzio Beach and fought in Italy through Southern France and into Germany. He was captured a little over three months before the war's end in Europe and spent 93 days as a prisoner of war of the Germans. He and other Allied prisoners in the German camp were released on April 27, 1945, by Boyd's own division, the Third, commanded by Major General Iron Mike O'Daniel.

In an emaciated state from starvation, Mr. Boyd was sent back to the States and was hospitalized at Walter Reed Hospital in Maryland for nearly a month, finally receiving his discharge in December of 1945.

Mr. Boyd has been associated as a part time and summer full time member of the staff of the Ozona Stockman, since coming to Ozona, handling sports year round and general reporting. He is a talented newsman as well as a capable school administrator and teacher, and will be sorely missed around the Stockman office.

Mr. and Mrs. Boyd have three daughters, Susan, Carol and Emily. The family will move to Big Spring in August.

Ozona Youths Explore Cave On Chas. Black Ranch

When a trio of Ozona's budding spelologists went into a cave on the Charlie Black ranch in northwest Crockett county last week, they took no chances on being marooned at the bottom of a 90-foot drop from the surface to the first landing. They had three ropes dangling from the surface and one of them wound through a well anchored pulley at the surface.

These elaborate precautions were the result of the experience of some of the group in a recent tour of the 09 cave when the boys depended on their ability to climb the ropes about 60 feet to the surface only to find the rope had become wet and was impossible to climb hand over hand.

At the bottom of the cave on the Black ranch the boys Larry Williams, George Cox and Randy Upham, found a room 40 feet wide, about 200 feet long and about 40 feet from ceiling to floor. The cave has a number of living formations, stalagmites and stalagmites, and some very pretty formations, according to the explorers.

These Ozona boys were not the first to explore the cave, and other cavers, oil field workers in the area, are now engaged in widening a hole found in the bottom of the big room hoping to find more cave below it.
