New Production In Refoil Field; Gas Area Extended

One Crockett County field gained a confirmation, an extender was assured in an- other and a plugging back operation set in still another.

The Refoil multipay field gained its third 3,056-foot Clearfork producer and a 3/4-mile northeast extension to that pay with completion of American Petrofina Co. of Texas No. 5 Suburban Propane Gas Corp., et al, nine miles southwest of Ozona.

It was finalized to pump 35.25 barrels of 31 gravity oil no water, with gas-oil ratio of 490-1, through perfora- tions between 3,070 - 3,101 feet, which had been frac- tured with 20,000 gallons and 24,000 pounds of sand.

Slated to 3,600 feet to test the Spraberry, it was drilled to 3,595 feet, with 4 1/2-inch casing set at 3,594 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and west lines of 2-I-GC&SF. Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1 V. I. Pierce, in 2-BBB-TCRR, 1/2 mile north of a 1 1/2 mile southeast extension to the Ozona (Canyon sand) field, 22 miles southwest of Ozona apparently has assured pro- duction in the upper Canyon zone with the flowing of 64 barrels of condensate, along with 109 barrels of load salt water, in an unreported time.

"There can be no doubt that diseases of the heart and circulation, accounting for about 54 percent of all deaths, constitute our coun- try's foremost health prob- lem," said Mr. Held. "Apart from this, latest statistics show that 14,600,000 people suffer from heart disease. An additional 6,900,000 people suffer from high blood pres- sure."

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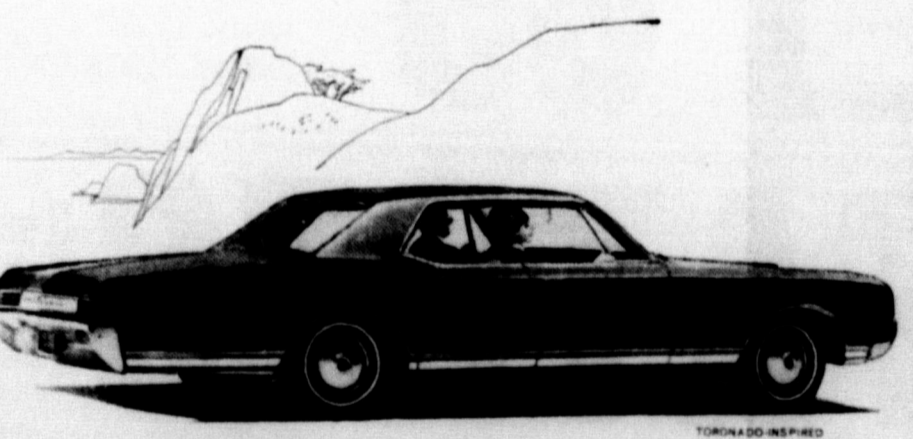
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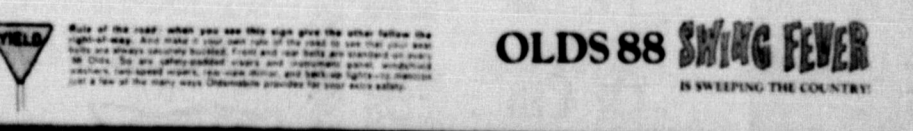

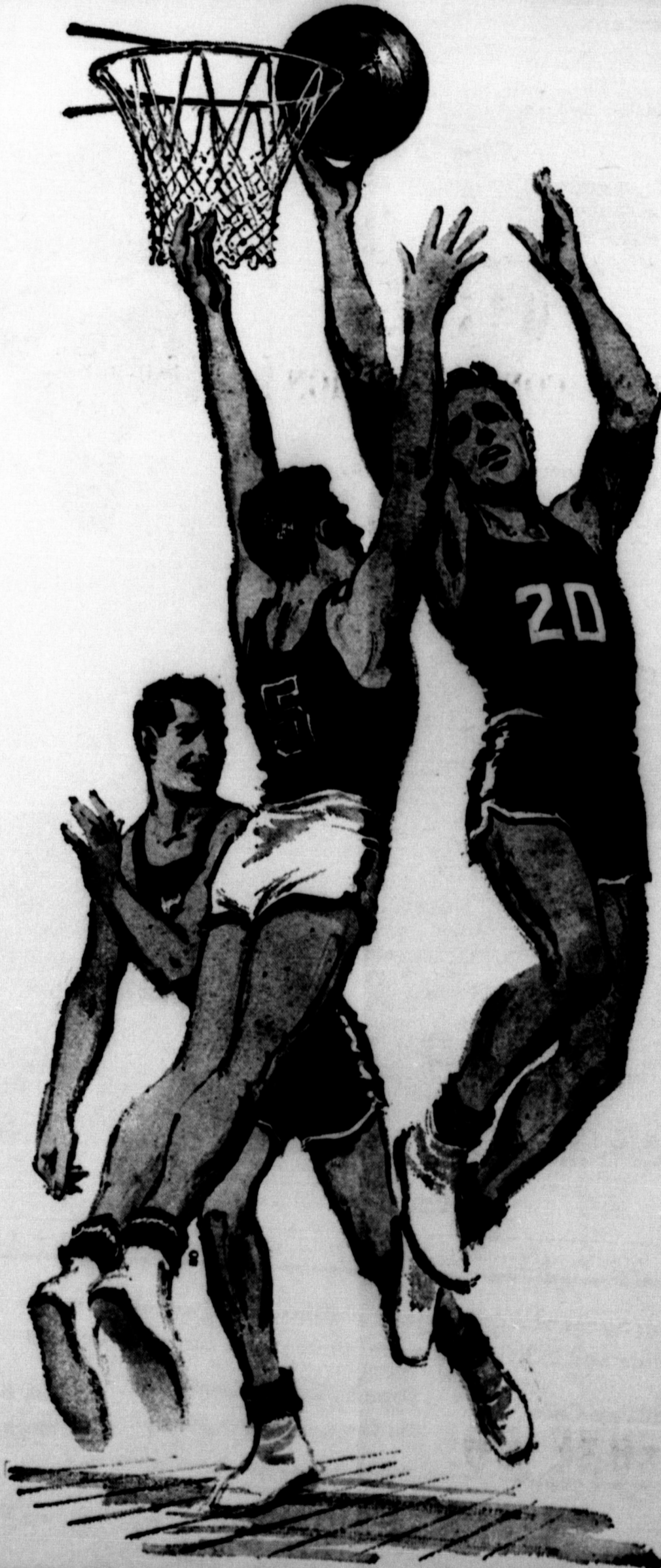

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Spley Sour Cream Apple Pie
(Makes one 9" pie)
1 cup graham cracker crumbs (about 12 crackers)
2 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 cup butter, melted
2 1/2 cups (1 can) sliced apples
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 pint sour cream
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/8 teaspoon nutmeg
2 tbs. flour
3 tbs. brown sugar
1 egg

Mix together cracker crumbs, sugar, cinnamon and melted butter. Press evenly into a 9-inch pie plate; chill. Place sliced apples and brown sugar in saucepan. Bring to the boiling point, stirring constantly; lower heat and simmer, about 5 minutes, or until apples are tender. Remove from heat and drain well. Mix sour cream, cinnamon, nutmeg, flour, brown sugar and egg until smooth and well blended. Four half of the sour cream mixture into chilled crumb crust. Arrange drained apple slices over sour cream mixture, reserving 6 slices for garnish. Top with remaining sour cream mixture. Arrange remaining apple slices on top. Bake in a hot oven (400 degrees F.) until sour cream mixture is set, about 10 to 12 minutes. Chill and serve.

This is a new version of America's number 1 dessert, and I promise you, a most delicious one.
