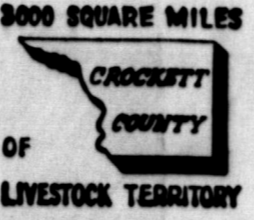

El Paso Natural Plans \$8.5 Million Pipeline to Tap Mitchell Field

Natural Gas Co. last week in that it is asking Power Commission to tap sub-reserves in the Basin of West Texas. The gas will be purchased from Shell Oil Co. in the JM (Mitchell) Elenburger dry gas area of Crockett, Terrell and Val Verde Counties. This is a part of reserves recently acquired by El Paso.

The gas to be bought from Shell has high delivery pressure and deliverability and will support average daily deliveries ranging from 100 million to 125 million cubic feet, with a maximum approaching 150 million cubic feet, the company said.

Howard Boyd, chairman of El Paso, said that all of Shell's development of the JM area in southwestern Crockett 55,000 acres has been committed to El Paso.

Boyd said, El Paso, under terms of its agreement with Shell, will obtain rights to all additional reserves discovered up to an aggregate of 3 trillion cubic feet, with an option on all such reserves in excess of 3 trillion cubic feet.

The purchases from Shell, the announcement noted, will be within the framework of prevailing area rates recently established by the FPC. The application will call for the construction of 72.2 miles of pipeline and related facilities.

Job Corps Pair Arrested After Highway Chase

Officers took two 16-year-old boys into custody Tuesday morning after they had chased them at speeds up to 100 miles per hour on highway 290 west in a futile effort to stop them. Startled by a shot fired by officers above the stolen Mustang they were driving, they finally came to a stop in the bar ditch.

Stationed in San Marcos with the Job Corps, the pair stole the Mustang and started for California. They drove away from a Johnson City service station around 2 a. m. Tuesday without paying for gasoline. Local officers had been on the lookout for the two, but had decided they had taken another route when they got a call from Johnny Ramirez at the Shamrock station here reporting the pair had departed without pay after they filled up with gas. Officers picked up their trail as they doubled back through town and headed west.

They were turned over to the San Marcos sheriff Tuesday afternoon.

Incumbents Are Re-Elected To Trustee Posts

In the school board election Saturday, Crockett County voters returned all three incumbents to office and elected one new member by the largest majority of votes, W. P. (Bill) Seahorn.

Seahorn polled 309 votes followed by Celestino Fuanzoz with 266, P. C. Perner and L. B. Cox, III, the other incumbents, received 260 and 252 respectively.

Other candidates included Armond Hoover, Jr. with 207 votes, Henry Miller, 141 and Perry Hubbard with 84.

George Bunker, Jr. received 89 write-in votes with Bill Clegg receiving 3.

Members of the county school board who were returned to office unopposed are Charlie Black, Jeff Owens and Marshall Montgomery.

The 483 votes cast were around 100 off the 1960 election when 584 votes were cast and less than 40 off the last school board election in 1964 when 521 voters cast their ballots.

Ft. Lancaster Development Plans Laid With Enthusiasm At Meeting

Fort Lancaster in far west Crockett county. Dr. Tunnell and Dr. Jelks had spent Monday and Tuesday at the site with Scott Hays, a student majoring in archeology at SMU, and Mrs. Norma Hoffrichter and Mrs. Kathleen Gilmore, both graduate students in the department at SMU, and with local history buffs who are interested in the development of the ruins as a tourist attraction and for the preservation of what is left of this memento of the early west.

Using techniques of the archeologist, the experts probed the ruins in cursory examinations in the time allowed in the two-day visit and were enthusiastic in relating their findings and in outlining the possibilities of uncovering the foundations and floors of enough of the fort's former 20 odd buildings to turn the site into a permanent attraction for homefolk and tourists for all time to come, stressing, in their account, the need for a caretaker living at the site to guard against further depredations.

"Fort Lancaster was built to last for hundreds of years and but for the depredations of people, it would still be standing almost as it was a hundred years ago," Dr. Tunnell said. "For the history it can tell us, it is worth preserving the authentic and actual remains of the fort, aside from the economic benefit that it will be as a tourist attraction."

Dr. Jelks, who assisted in the archeological work at Jamestown settlement, recommended that only experts be employed in uncovering and preserving the ruins. In its naturally beautiful setting in the Pecos valley, what remains of the site should be authentically and fully developed with the help of all available information from government archives, Dr. Jelks said. He said that in the four weeks of work he and Mr. Hays and a crew of locally recruited workers will do this summer, archeological techniques will be employed in exploring the ruins and developing outlines of the original buildings and other features.

Crockett Wool Producers Share In Incentive Pay

\$455,574.99 DISTRIBUTED — Crockett county wool producers shared in the distribution of \$455,574.99 in incentive payments made on April 1 through the local office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The payment was based on a percentage figure of 31.6 of total receipts for wool and mohair sold during the 1965 marketing year in the county. This percentage figure was determined as the basis for payment to bring the sale of wool to the support level of 62 cents per pound and mohair to 72 cents per pound. The national average price for wool sold during the year was figured at 47.1 cents per pound and mohair averaged 60 cents.

The incentive payment, from which \$24,582.25 was deducted from wool incentive checks an \$5,682.35 from unshorn lamb sales, to be added to the national wool promotion fund administered by the National Sheep Producers Council.

A total of 148 Crockett county producers shared in the payments, money for which is derived from import duties levied on foreign wool sold in this country.

Crockett county ranchers produced a total of 2,458,255 pounds of wool which they sold for a net total of \$1,163,465.84. There were 105 producers sharing in the distribution of mohair incentive, the second payment on mohair sales in the ten-year history of the program. Payment for wool on unshorn lambs sold was at the rate of 60 cents per hundred-weight of live animals. Net sales of mohair in this county totalled \$555,495.58.

For the next marketing year, the incentive levels will be increased from 62 to 65 cents on wool and from 72 to 75 cents on mohair.

Both Junior and Senior grass judging teams took second places to Sutton County winner of both contests.

Members of the Senior team who qualified to compete in the state 4-H grass contest at Texas A&M in June were Jesse Deaton, Steve Taliaferro, Donny Edgerton and Janie Edgerton. Junior team members were Kathy Williams, Cyndie Whitehead, Eugene Vinson and Alton Everett.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Federal authorities think Texans should get two more chances to register for voting in this year's elections.

Department of Justice motion before a three-judge U. S. court requests supplemental registration periods of April 8-19 for primaries, and August 22-October 8 for the November general election.

Justice Department attorneys consider the March 3-17 registration period "inadequate." "Frivolous harassment" or an attempt by the federal agency to destroy all state authority over voting procedures, said Gov. John Connally.

Road Beauty Bill Hit — Outdoor advertisers, motel owners, tourists attraction operators and salvage dealers at a public hearing here vigorously attacked standards for implementing new federal legislation aimed at beautifying highways by policing billboards and junkyards.

In two days of testimony before Paul E. Warren, U. S. Bureau of Public Roads Examiner, 61 witnesses hammered at the detailed standards, although many said they supported the original intent of the bill.

Texas Grows — Texas is 13,511 square miles bigger

than anyone thought. New acreage was discovered after the first detailed study of Texas' area in 20 years was completed by Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler. Report shows the state contains 177,052,700 acres, or 276,500 square miles.

However, Alaska's 571,065-square-mile-area still makes Texans live in the second largest state in the Union.

Industry, Banks Growing — Last year was a record year for industry and bank growth. Texas Industrial Commission reported 327 new manufacturing plants opened and 485 expansions of existing plants during 1965.

Governor Connally said the growth "is the result of public and private organizations to encourage industrial expansion."

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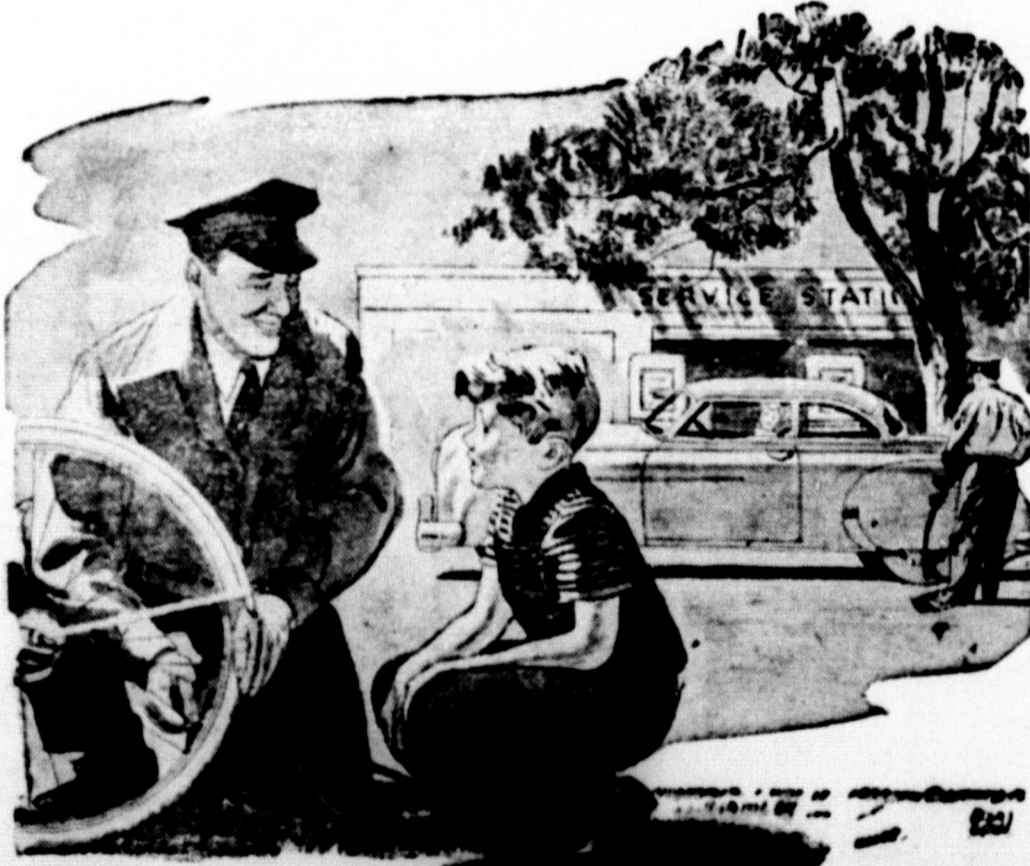

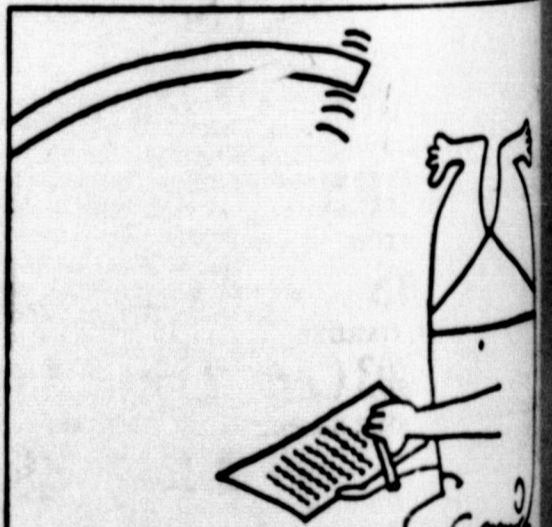

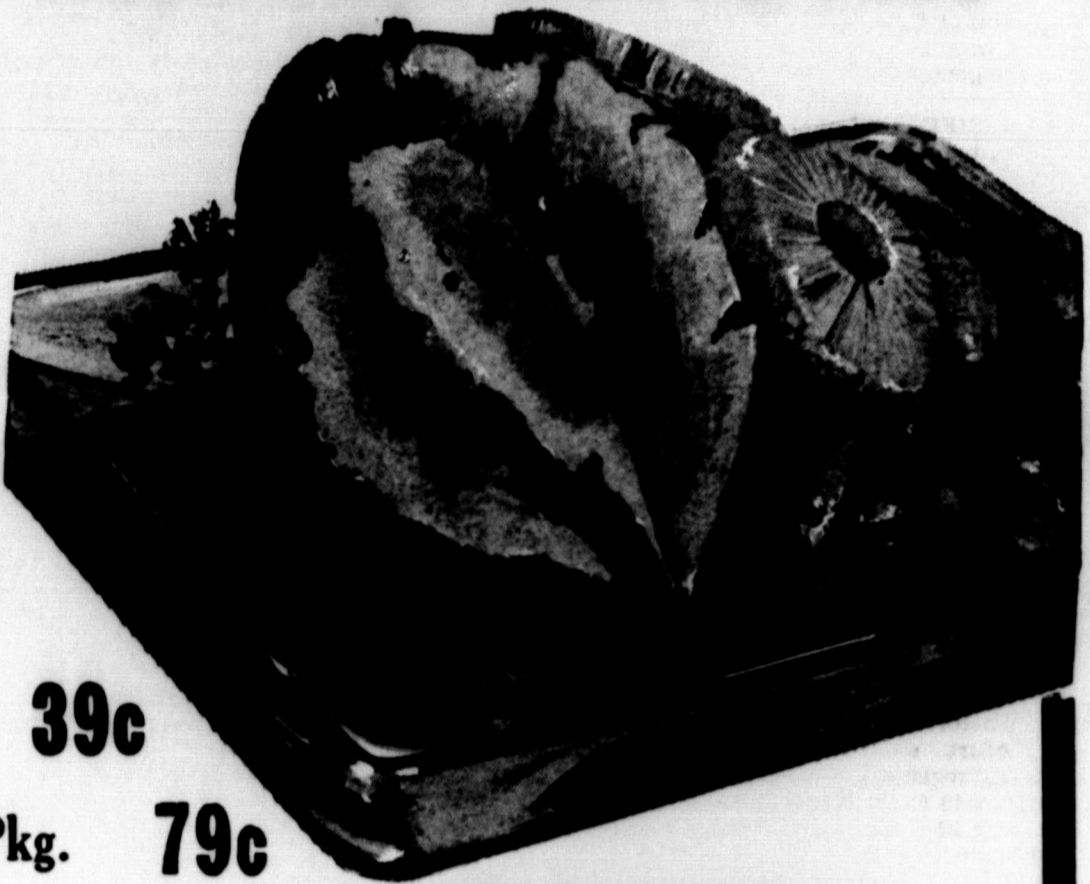

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

JUMBLES

"Miss Parloa's New Cook Book" published in 1880, included a recipe for Jumbles. These were rolled cookies with holes in the center. Some 75 years later a recipe for Jubilee Jumbles was published in a Gold Medal Cookbook. We'll give you both the recipes and you may add them to your collection.

Jumbles — (1880) "Three cups of sugar, two of butter, five of flour, one egg, half a teaspoon of soda, flavor to taste. Roll thin, sprinkle with sugar, cut in round cakes, and cut a small piece from the center of each. Bake in a quick oven."

Jubilee Jumbles (75 years later)
 1/2 cup of shortening
 1 cup brown sugar (packed)
 1/2 cup granulated sugar
 2 eggs
 1 cup evaporated milk, or

thick sour cream
 1 tsp. vanilla
 2-3/4 cups flour
 1/2 tsp. soda
 1 tsp. salt
 1 cup chopped pecans or moist coconut

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Mix thoroughly shortening, sugar and eggs. Stir in evaporated milk and vanilla. Sift together flour, soda, salt and stir in. Blend in nuts. Drop rounded tablespoonfuls 2" apart on greased baking sheet. Bake about 10 minutes, until delicately browned. Frost with Burnt Butter Glaze. Makes 4 doz.

Burnt Butter Glaze
 Heat 2 tbsp. butter until golden brown. Beat in until smooth 2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar and 1/4 cup evaporated milk.

ilities. He advised the local committee to employ an architect to plan any restorations and any such restorations should be planned with full archeological probing as a guide.

"People for the most part are interested in the original installation and what is left of it. In its picturesque and lovely natural setting, and with proper landscaping and working of paths through the ruins, uncovered with archeological techniques, Fort Lancaster could be made a fascinating attraction."

Both Dr. Tunnell and Dr. Jelks stressed the responsibility of ownership which rests with local people and both advised against any work toward uncovering the ruins without first making sure of the employment of a caretaker.

Since county funds could not be made available for the purpose until another budget is drawn, the Historical Survey Committee assumed the responsibility of raising funds for a caretaker until next year's county budget can go into effect. A campaign for monthly donations for this purpose was under way yesterday.

The Historical Society has also assumed responsibility for raising a \$600 fund to provide help needed by the geologists in this summer's digging operations at the site. This fund, too, is being raised this week.

Coffee and cookies were served at the conclusion of the meeting.

Lion Tracksters Win Third Place In Cactus Relays

The Ozona Lions' track team garnered 84 points last Saturday as they took third place behind Sonora and Eldorado at the Cactus Relays in Iraan.

Coach Chick Womack's tracksters will be idle over the Easter Holidays but will be making final preparations for the District track meet to be held in Ozona on April 16.

As the district meet draws near, the Sonora Broncos appear to be the favorite, but both Eldorado and Ozona hope to battle right down to the final race. This year's district meet promises to be of the most exciting in recent years. District coaches will be jockeying for points, hoping to place the right boys in the events that will gain additional points — as well as qualify for that regional track meet. First and second place finishers in each event qualify for regional.

The Lion cause in Iraan was led by George Cox. Although being handicapped by a minor leg injury the past two weeks, the Ozona speedster chalked up first places in the 220 and 440 yard dashes as well as running the anchor leg of the mile relay. Cox won the 220 in 22.5 seconds and the 440 in 53.2. In the preliminaries Cox turned in a 52.5 in the 440.

Ozona received second places from Maggie Galindo in the mile run and Billy Carson in the pole vault. The sprint relay team of Carson, George Parker, Thomas DeHoyos, and Mike Parter grabbed a fourth place finish.

Carson actually tied with Noe Chavez of Sonora as they both cleared 13 feet, but Chavez was awarded first because of fewer misses. The 13 foot vault by Carson was six inches higher than his school record of 12'6".

Ozona took third place in the mile relay behind Eldorado and Sonora; Gary Sutton placed third in the discus and 6th in shot put; George Parker and Carson took third and fifth places in the 180 yard low hurdles. Carson added a 5th in the high hurdles.

Other Lions taking points for Ozona were Mike Prater with a 4th in the 220 yard dash; Ernest Vargas got a 6th in the open quarter; Randy Upham added a 4th in the broad jump, and Catarina Cervantez picked up a 5th in the broad jump.
