## Grand Jury Will Probe Accident Which Took Life of Five-Year Old

Crockett county grand jury will investigate the accident which took the life of five-year-old Shauna Montgomery, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Montgomery, in the Little League parking lot two weeks ago, District Attorney Dixon Mahon said.

Whether or not grand jury will be called into special session for the investigation will depend on the plans of District Judge Charles Sherrill of Fort Stockton, Mr. Mahon said. The judge will attend a judicial conference lasting several weeks this summer and his schedule may preclude the calling of the jury before the regular fall term.

Entitled simply "Ozona", a historical treatise on Ozona and Crockett county, is off the press last week, finding ready acceptance throughout this territory and as interested persons find the books are ready.

In an attractive binding, a well drawing done by Mrs. Marion Robertson, depicting the old time wooden tower, wooden saw windmill, spring trough and wooden saw tank, plus a West view, the book contains 116 pages, 16 pages of historic scenes in Ozona.

The compilation of historical data is not meant as a complete history of Crockett county but was an attempt to put into book form some of the voluminous material which has been gathered up in the 75 years of community

growth enjoyed by Crockett county might be gained by the reader.

Although the project was headed up and largely the brain child of Mrs. Ira Carson, it is a collection of stories, articles and factual material on the county and its people contributed by a number of persons and gathered from numerous sources. The book was originally compiled for use as background material for shaping the theme for the 75th anniversary pageant, titled "From This Rugged Land," to be presented June 15-18.

"History has passed swiftly for more than 75 years and we have tried to evaluate this heritage," says a Foreword in the volume. "We are not infallible, mistakes have certainly been made and time has erased a wealth

## Blustery Rain Drops 7 Inch Of Moisture In Ozona

A blustery rain shower Saturday night dropped a much needed 7 of an inch of rain in Ozona and treated a wide swath of ranch country to as much or more moisture as a cool front swept in to trigger the weather disturbance.

One countywide contest, one precinct race and one statewide race are all on the ballot to attract the voter. But interest is expected to be intense in the Crockett county judge's race and in the Precinct 4 Commissioner race so it may be a hefty vote in spite of the pessimistic guesses.

The Ozona voting place for voters who live in Precincts 1, 2 and 3 will be the courthouse and for Precinct 4 at the South Elementary School building. The South Elementary box will be the only voting place for Precinct 4 voters. Other voting places will be at the Pecos River Power Plant, at Powell Field and the Jeff Owens ranch.

Voters in Precinct 4 will have a decision to make in choosing between Glenn Sutton, incumbent, and Jake Young for Commissioner from that precinct. The two survived the five-way first primary to win a place in the run-off.

Of countywide interest, however, will be the race for the office of county judge. Incumbent County Judge Mrs. Bernice Bailey Jones is being opposed in the run-off by Troy Williams, who lost the run-off election to Mrs. Jones' late husband, M. Brock Jones, for the office four years ago. Both have campaigned vigorously and their race is expected to draw out the voter to ballot in the run-off next Saturday June 4.

The only statewide race not decided in the first primary was that for attorney general. Crawford C. Martin, former secretary of state for Texas, and Franklin Spears, State Senator from San Antonio, are waging a spirited battle for the nomination in the coming run-off.

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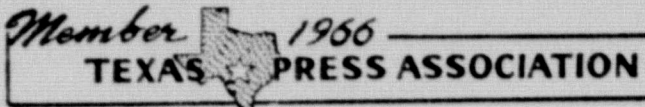

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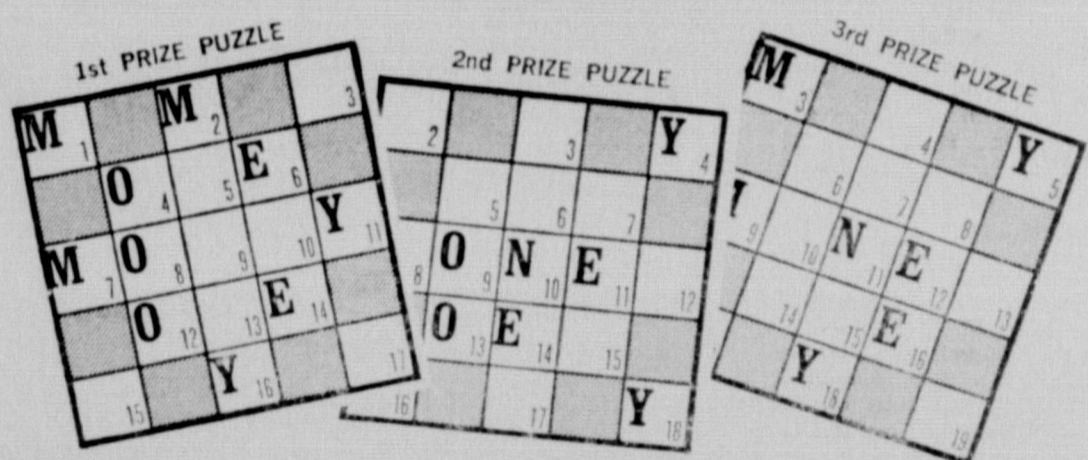

Mr. Womack, a 1952 graduate of Ozona High School, Ozona, Texas, received his

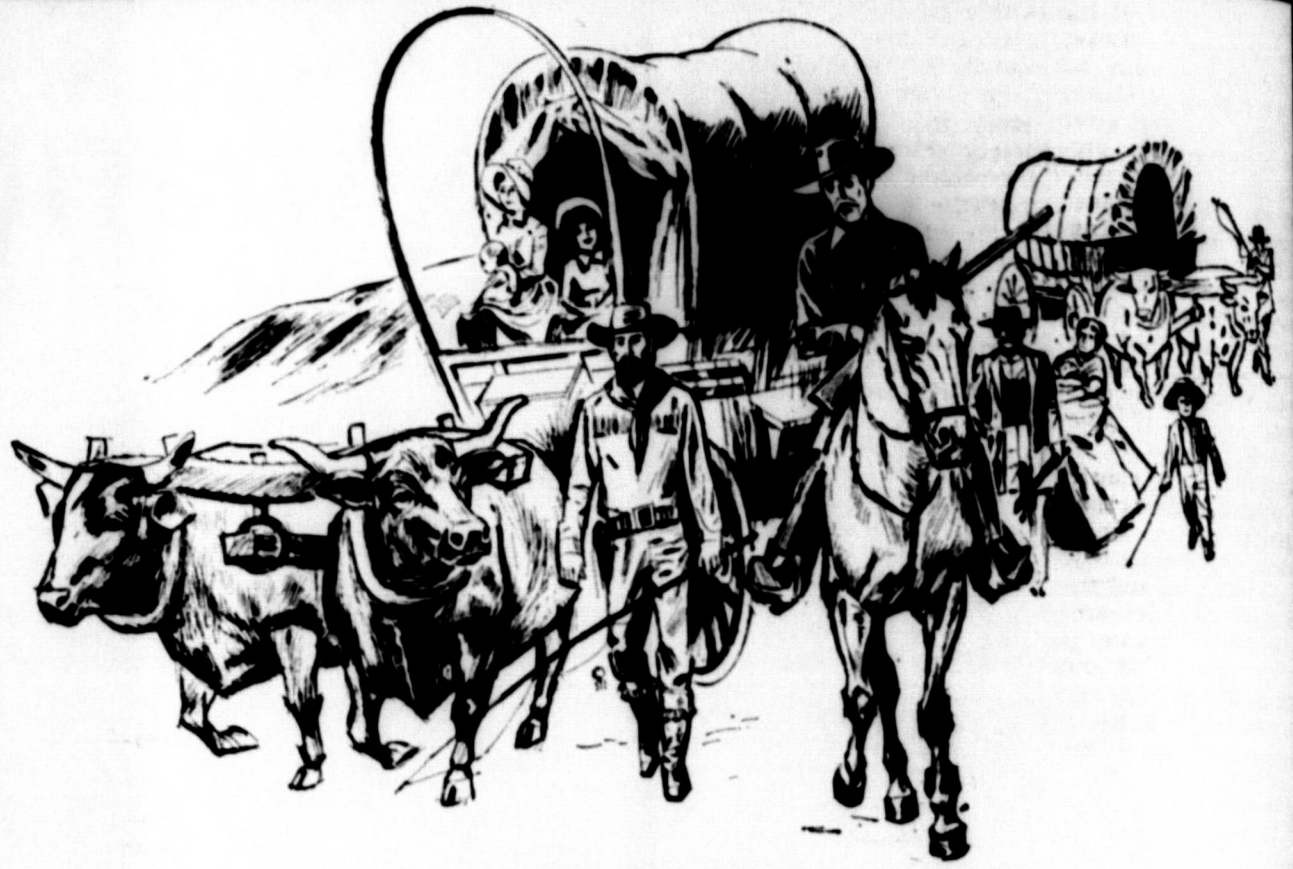
B. S. degree from Texas Technological College in 1956. He is married to the former Nita Rae Newman, Alburnett, Iowa and they are the parents of two children.

### Archaeologists Making Progress At Lancaster; Many Contribute Toward Making Success of Project

Through the fine spirit and generosity of many people working at Fort Lancaster, progress is being made toward making success of the project. Mrs. Harrell, chairman of the Fort Lancaster Historical Survey Committee, announced this week.

An archaeological team from the Southern Methodist University, headed by graduate student, Scott Hays, and including three local boys, Stokes, Billy Carson, James Donham, have worked parts of the site. The excavation of one large area which may ultimately be restored.

A fine water well at a depth of only 115 feet has been drilled by W. T. Stokes, who has donated both his time and equipment. Casing for the well has been given by Seahorn who also provided a tent for the temporary use of the caretaker, Hendricks, B. B. Ingalls, Jr., hauled water for the site and has donated materials for use of the archeology group. A motor water tank was provided by Henry Miller for use until a well can be pumped from the new well.

Many others have contributed to the Fort Lancaster Development Fund which is to pay the Ozona boys living at the site and the salary of the fulltime caretaker. Mrs. Joe Clayton is treasurer for this fund and hopes that further contributions will help improve the site in the future.

The Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative System of Ozona is providing electricity for the site at a small rate per month. At the State level, funds given by the State to the Southern Methodist University are being used for the archeological work. Ben Shepperd, State Historical Survey Chairman, is making it possible through the El Paso Natural Products Company plan, for architect, William H. Clift, to spend a full day at the site developing the area so that it can be enjoyed by the public.

If funds permit, trails will be built, small shaded shelter for those walking over the area will be provided, building foundations will be identified with appropriate signs. All work is done only as directed by Edward B. Jelks and the Archeologists, Dr. Cur-

work in Farm Electrification in the Agricultural Engineering Department. His research and field work carried him over the entire state so that he is familiar with all types of electrical problems on the farms and ranches.

The short course at Ozona High School is scheduled to begin June 6 at 8:00 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building.

Persons interested in attending the short course should write or call Jimmy Davee, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture. An entry fee of \$3.00 will be charged. Farm Electrification Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each person who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Jaska states that the short course can be adjusted to wishes and interests of the people enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety, how to properly choose wire sizes and install motor circuits, how to choose, protect, and ground electric motors, how to reverse and change motors from 120V to 240V, and how to calculate the cost of operating electrical equipment. Demonstrations will be given and class enrollees will have the opportunity to perform the skills demonstrated.

### PENGUIN-DOWN DRI - DIE

#### Versatile Dust Developed by Scientists

Researchers have discovered a new method of protecting houses and apartments against roaches and a hundred other insects for the lifetime of the occupants.

Professors of entomology said that a new dust called "Amorphous Silica Gel" has been developed that is harmless to humans and animals but lethal to roaches, silverfish and a hundred other insects. The dust literally dries the insects to death by removing a protective wax on their bodies and causing death through evaporation of body moisture.

Once applied it can last indefinitely without losing its ability to kill pests.

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
