## Crockett Co. Hospital To Stay Out Medicare Program 'At This Time'

Members of the Crockett County Hospital Board of Directors, in a called meeting Monday evening at the civic center, voted unanimously against entering the hospital in the Medicare program at this time. The board meeting was called to consider the signing of a contract with the Social Security Agency to take care of patients under the Medicare program.

The law creating the Medicare program leaves the decision up to each individual hospital as to whether or not it participates in the program. A news release from the San Angelo office of the Social Security System carried in last week's Stockman, declared the Crockett County Hospital as one of 14 hospitals in the 13-county San Angelo area listed as "eligible under the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to participate in Medicare."

Hospital officials and board members declined to elaborate on the announcement that the board had "voted unanimously not to have the hospital enter the Medicare program at the present."

Board members present for the meeting were Nat Read, president; Mrs. James Burnett, secretary; Mrs. Fred Hagelstein, L. D. Kirby and Bud Hoover. Absent was W. O. Reeves, vice president of the board.

Others present were Drs. E. L. Dyers, Lloyd H. Sherrill and Joe B. Logan, and Hospital Administrator Norman Olson.

Special invited guests were Dick Kirby, county auditor, who explained the reimbursement policies of Medicare, and Fred Chandler, county attorney, who explained the law of the contract.

## Street Dancing Grand Finale Of Jubilee Festival

Winding up with a street dance in front of the gym, with crowds packing the area of two blocks square plus the tennis court, following the final performance of the historical pageant at the football field, and a mile-long parade earlier in the afternoon, Ozonans and their guests ended a week of celebration of Crockett County's 75th anniversary.

The week had begun the Saturday night before with a Queen's ball at the civic center when Miss Esther Williams was crowned Diamond Jubilee queen. It had progressed through union church services Sunday evening at the football field, merchants ballyhoo Monday and Tuesday, youth activities Tuesday and Wednesday, style shows, cooking schools, class reunions and all kinds of activities through the week.

An Ohio firm, the Rogers Company, employed to stage and direct a historical pageant, presented its version of a Crockett county historical pageant at the football field the final four nights of the week. Some 200 or more local men, women and children took part in the pageant, presented in a pantomime.

## Charley Coates Laid To Rest In Service Saturday

Funeral services for Charles Edward Coates, 72, were held Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock from the First Methodist Church with Rev. Leonard Garrett, pastor, conducting services. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

Mr. Coates was born in Ozona on July 5, 1893, the first boy born in the county after it was organized. His mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Coates, came to this part of Texas in 1890 in a covered wagon and took up ranching north of Ozona, one of the oldest pioneer families in Crockett county.

Mr. Coates was a veteran of World War I. He enlisted in June of 1918 and trained in Georgia until his discharge June 11, 1919. Returning to Ozona, he married Miss Ora Taylor in August of 1919, the couple moving to the Howard Well ranch south of Ozona in 1920. Four sons were born to the couple, two of them, Charles, Jr., and Bobby, dying in childhood.

Before his marriage, Mr. Coates kept books for his father's leather business after attending Waco Business College.

In 1950 Mr. Coates sold the Crockett county ranch to Ira Carson and bought a ranch near Hugo, Colo., and moved there with his family. Mr. Coates and his sons operated the Colorado ranch until 1960 when he retired from active management and with Mrs. Coates returned to Ozona to make their home. He had been a member of the Masonic lodge since 1918 and of the Methodist church for 63 years.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Lloyd and Jack Coates, both of Hugo, Colo.; a brother, Ford Coates of Ft. Stockton; two sisters, Miss Dolly Coates of Ozona and Mrs. Clark Barton of Ozona. Pallbearers were Phillip Schneemann, P. C. Coates, Eddie Bower, Taylor Deaton, Bud Coates, Oscar Kost, Roy Coates, Tommy Harris, and Bill Coates of Ft. Stockton.

## Antiques And Heirlooms Show Proves Popular

One of the most popular spots in downtown Ozona during the celebration week was the elaborate display of antiques and heirlooms arranged in the Tom Harris building between Ozona Dress Shop and the Baggett Agency.

Ozonians brought family heirlooms, pictures, antique furniture, crystal, pottery and handwork to display during the week.

Several of the wedding gifts of Mr. and Mrs. Pon Seahorn, married in 1907, were on display, with the original gift cards of the donors still in them. An ancient Bible of the J. W. Friend family was another interesting display.

A hand-made trunk, which Max Schneemann's father brought with him from Germany and which he pawned in London and later redeemed after reaching the United States, was among the fascinating items displayed. A quilt made by the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, with names of members and their families embroidered in squares forming the pieced cover had been raffled as a money raising stunt was loaned by its purchaser, Paul Perner. He paid \$100 for the curio.

## Three Hurt When Car Overtuns On Rain-Slick Hiway

The second step in its plan to erect a modern banking house in Ozona, the Ozona National Bank this week employed an architect to begin preparation of plans for the structure to replace the 61-year-old building now housing Ozona's only financial institution.

The bank directors recently completed successful negotiations for purchase of the Lee Wilson garage building and lot on the corner of 11th Street and Avenue D in downtown Ozona. The property purchased includes the presently vacant lot south of the garage building and extends west to the Meinecke property, thus affording extra building area and parking for the new bank building.

William E. Parrish of San Antonio, one of the state's outstanding architects, was employed by the bank at a called meeting of the board of directors here Tuesday.

Mr. Parrish was chief architect with the Wyatt C. Hedrick firm of Fort Worth for ten years. Following Mr. Hedrick's death, Mr. Parrish started his own architectural firm in San Antonio in 1964.

He has designed a number of outstanding bank buildings in the state including the American Bank of Commerce in Odessa, the City National Bank in Colorado City, the First National Bank in Brownwood, the First National Bank in McGregor and the Union National Bank at Laredo, among others.

Mr. Parrish's biggest project as an architect, however, was the 7 million dollar Scott & White Hospital and Clinic, recently completed in Temple. He also designed and supervised construction of a large drive-in bank in Temple.

Lowell Littleton, executive vice president of Ozona National, said the directors were pleased to have been able to secure Mr. Parrish's services in planning the new bank building. Officers and directors will begin immediate consultations with the architect so that he may prepare preliminary plans and begin discussions looking toward final approval plans for the new banking home.

## Ozona 4-H Team Wins Natl. Wool Judging Title

The Crockett County 4-H Wool Judging Team was named National Champions in wool judging last week at Sonora when they nosed out a Larimer County 4-H Team from Fort Collins, Colorado, by one point, 1526 to 1525.

This was the sixth year that a National 4-H Wool Judging Contest has been held in connection with the Sonora Wool Show. Three of the Crockett county team members placed in the top ten high individuals; Steve Taliaferro, 2nd high individual; Jesse Deaton, 3rd high individual; Duwain Vinson, 8th high individual; and Donny Elgerton completed the team roster.

Placing third in the contest was a Sutton county team, who won the state wool & mohair judging contest three weeks ago and were the favorites to win the National. Out-of-state teams furnished strong competition to Texas teams as the Niobrara County, Wyoming, team placed 4th and a team from Chaves County, New Mexico, placed 5th in the contest.

Training the National champion team was county agent Pete W. Jacoby, assisted by Jimmy Davee, Jim Carpenter, Billie Rose Whitehead and Tom Everitt.

## Area Historians Convene here Saturday Dedicate Marker

Approximately sixty visitors were added to the Diamond Jubilee celebration week crowd Saturday when the Permian Basin Historical Society held its convention in Ozona, and at the same time ceremonies of dedication were arranged for the installation of interpretive plaques on three Medallion buildings in Ozona.

John Ben Shepperd of Odessa, chairman of the Texas Historical Survey Committee, and president of the Permian Basin Historical Society, presided at the afternoon meeting at the civic center. Featured speaker was Dr. Grover Cleveland Ramsey of Austin who spoke on old Camp Melvin in northwest Crockett county.

During the morning, plaques were dedicated on the Crockett County jail, the courthouse and the Ozona National Bank building. State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman dedicated the plaque at the jail; State Representative elect Hilary B. Doran, Jr., of Del Rio dedicated the courthouse plaque and Representative Gene Hendryx of Alpine dedicated the bank building plaque.

But the outstanding event for the historians was the presentation of a Texas Award for Historical Preservation.

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POVERTY COMMUNIQUES

For those who are wondering if we can expect victory or at least a negotiated peace in the war on poverty, we can only advise patience. And a strong stomach.

In Fort Lauderdale, Florida, 16 boys were persuaded to defect from the other side of the tracks and wear tuxedos to a high school function, courtesy of Sargent Shriver's Office of Economic Opportunity, with the taxpayers picking up a \$290 tab. However, there may be some subtle symbolism here and hope for the future. If poor boys can get used to wearing tuxes they may be influenced to become capitalists. Some time they may even be able to contribute to \$100-a-plate political dinners.

Thanks to OEO, wages are going up. At least in the OEO. A welding instructor worth \$3,200 on one payroll became worth \$9,780 when placed on the OEO payroll. A physical education instructor who had earned \$4,600 found he could command \$9,480 as a poverty warrior. Teachers are being pirated away from dollar-conscious school districts at Great Society salaries that are usually twice what they had earned.

There's more than money involved, too. Some of Shriver's happy warriors are showing a dedication to duty that is not just outstanding but downright stupifying. An OEO official was invited to address a graduating class of Head Start scholars, non-pets aged 5 and 6. The class was located 200 miles away—a trip that would have taken a few hours of the official's valuable time had he elected to travel by bus or car. Conscious of the importance of his mission he chartered a twin-engine plane to get to the kindergarten about to be graduated in a hazy, extremist world. For such gallantry in action, we trust that Sargent Shriver will award this intrepid traveler the Bobby Kennedy Award, sold brass.

On lower echelons, too, the Poverty Corps is shaping up. Certainly the troops are developing the same attitude towards ordinary taxpayers as their bureaucratic superiors. Not long ago a mob of Job Corps enrollees armed with clubs and rocks stormed into New Bedford, Mass., to go battle with teenagers there.

Police action averted serious bloodshed but a request from the townspeople that the camp be closed got this reply from the All-Highest, Sargent Shriver. Job Corps has no intention of leaving Fort Rodman.

There's one Sargent who'll never retreat.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Auto insurance rates in Texas may rise an average of \$2.11 a year per motorist.

State Insurance Board is testing testimony given at a public hearing on rates last week. Decision probably will be announced soon, since new rates usually are effective August 1.

Look for these rate changes if the Board follows staff recommendations.

Liability (bodily injury and property damage) up 11.9 per cent.

Private passenger \$50 deductible collision, up 24 per cent.

Full comprehensive coverage, up 0.3 per cent.

Private passenger \$50 deductible, comprehensive coverage, up 17.7 per cent.

Rates, of course, will vary widely among 26 rating districts.

Among strong recommendations to the Board were:

A driving record classification plan to reward the safe driver with lower rates and hit the "bad" driver with higher premiums.

A more flexible rate schedule for drivers under age 25 — with highest rates for young males of 17.

A private passenger classification plan to produce a lower rate for drivers with less exposure to accident conditions.

A means by which a driver in the "assigned risk plan" could purchase additional coverage over normal \$10,000-\$20,000 limits.

Oil Production Reduced — Because of gloomy testimony and statistics, the Texas Railroad Commission again has reduced Texas oil production after a statewide prorotation hearing.

July order will hold prorated wells to 33.3 per cent of total ability to produce.

This is down 1.2 per cent from June's rate and 1.7 per cent below the April high of 35 per cent.

A recalculation of the actual oil production resulting from the July cutback produced an estimate that it will be 2,734,835 barrels a calendar day from allowables of 3,118,042 barrels a day.

Translated into actual barrels of oil in the pipelines, the new production figure is below the 2,749,135 the wells produced in January.

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Fudge Ribbon Cake

- 2 tablespoon butter
1 pkg. cream cheese (8 oz.)
2 1/4 cups sugar
1 tbs. corn starch
3 eggs
2 tablespoons, plus 1 1/2 cups milk
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract
2 cups flour
1 teas. salt
1 teas. baking powder
1/2 teas. soda
1/2 cup butter
4 envelopes Nestle's Choco-bake

Preheat oven to 350 degrees and grease and flour bottom of 13x9-inch pan. Cream 2 tablespoons butter with cream cheese, 1/4 cup sugar and corn starch. Add one egg, a tablespoons milk and 1/2 teas. vanilla extract. Beat at high speed until smooth and creamy.

Combine flour with 2 cups sugar, salt baking powder and soda in a large mixing bowl. Add 1/2 cup butter and 1 cup milk. Blend well at lowest speed of mixer. Beat 1 1/2 minutes at low speed or 225 strokes with a spoon. Add 1/2 cup milk, 2 eggs Choco-bake and 1 teas. vanilla extract; continue beating 1 1/2 minutes at low speed. Spread half of batter in pan. Spoon cheese mixture over batter, spreading carefully to cover. Top with remaining batter; spread to cover. Bake at 350 for 50 to 60 minutes or until cake springs back when

touched lightly in center. Cool and frost.

Chocolate Frosting

- 1/4 cup milk
1/4 cup butter
1 cup semi-sweet chocolate morsels
1 teas. vanilla
2 1/2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar
Combine milk and butter in saucepan; bring to a boil. Remove from heat. Beat in chocolate morsels. Stir in vanilla and confectioner's sugar. Beat until of spreading consistency. If necessary, add with a few drops milk.

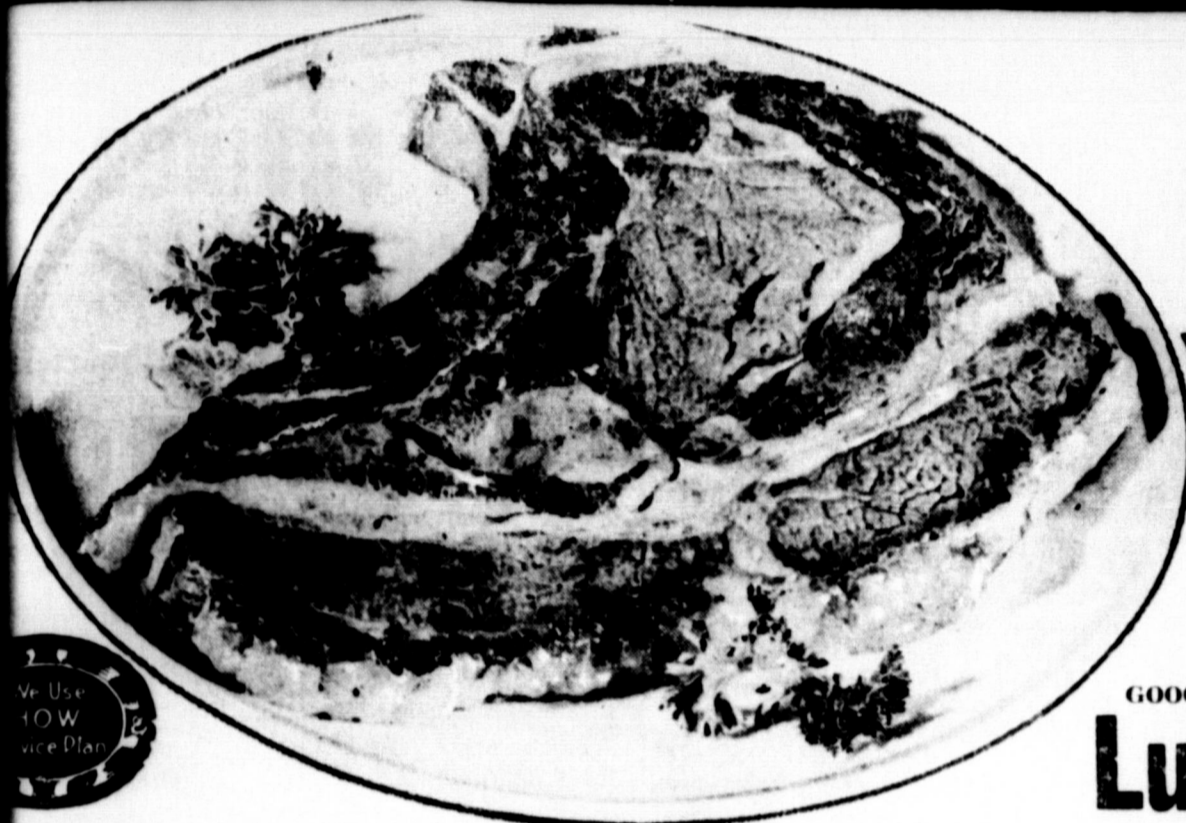

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held on the 7th day of July, 1966, in Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, and in the hereinafter described territory proposed to be annexed to said District, in accordance with the provisions and upon the questions contained in the following resolution and order passed by the Board of Directors of said District on the 24th day of May, 1966:

**Resolution and Order**  
By the Board of Directors of Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 calling an election upon the question of ratifying the annexation of certain territory to said district, and upon the question of the assumption by said added territory of its proportion of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of said District.

Whereas, on the 19th day of April, 1966, there was presented to the Board of Directors of said District a petition signed by more than fifty (50) landowners in the territory in said petition praying for the annexation of said territory to Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1; and Directors passed an order setting said petition down for hearing before the Board of Directors on the 24th day of May, 1966; and

### J M Ellenburger Gas Field Adds Third Producer

Two Crockett County fields gained confirmations and tests continued at another.

The JM (Ellenburger gas) field of southwest Crockett County gained its third producer and a 3/4 mile north-northeast extension with completion of Shell Oil Co. No. 6 Mitchell, 35 miles southwest of Ozona, for a calculated absolute open flow of 11.3 million cubic feet of gas per day.

Production was from open hole at 12,130-13,630 feet (corrected from 12,130-13,360 feet) which had been fractured with 40,000 gallons.

Location is 2,370 feet from the south and 350 feet from the east lines of 11-NNN-T. Brown. (A. W. Fowler on some maps.)

Ashmun & Hilliard, Midland, No. 1-G Chambers County School Land, in Chambers County School Land, location southwest offset to the firm's No. 1 Chambers County School Land, recent dual Atoka and Strawn pay opener in the shallow Midland Lane field of Crockett County, 12 miles northwest of Ozona, flowed 24 hours making 90 to 95 barrels of distillate, plus an unreported amount of gas.

Flow was through an 18-64-inch choke and unidentified perforations between 7,463-7,505 feet, possibly Atoka. Flowing pressure was 500 pounds.

Testing continued. The discovery was finalized Feb. 15 from the Atoka for a calculated, absolute open flow of 15 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 19,100-1 through perforations between 7,384-434 feet; and March 15 from the Strawn for a calculated, absolute open flow of 17.3 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 38,100-1, through perfora-

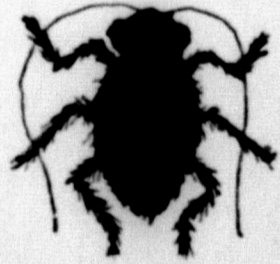
