## Expect Light Vote Tuesday In General Election

Ozonans will go to the polls next Tuesday to vote for candidates of their choice at the stat level, the local races having been decided by the Democratic Primary held earlier in the year, except for Commissioner of Precinct 4. Roger Dudley is running against incumbent Glenn Sutton on the Republican ticket in that precinct.

Being an off-year election the vote is expected to be light all over the state and the only race most political-ly minded Texans will be watching with interest will be the one between Senator John Tower and Waggoner Carr for United States Senator.

Both the Republican party and the Constitutional party have candidates for the first eight and nine offices listed on the ballot. However, most pollsters agree that the incumbents will be returned to office including Senator Tower, who has served 6 years in the Senate.

Confronting the voter also will be the formidable task of voting for or against a total of 16 proposed amend-ments to the Texas constitu-tion. Most of the propos-als, as usual, would increase the taxpayer's burden if ap-proved, such as those pro-viding pensions for various appointed and elected officials of the state and to their descendants, for new bond issues sponsored by the state and for new welfare handouts. Exceptions are Amendment No. 7 which re-lates to the repeal of the poll tax and No. 14 which would allow members of the armed forces who are residents of Texas to vote in the state.

Others of the proposals have local or regional application or are innoxious.

Voters may cast their bal-lots at any of the regular voting places in the county. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

The Citation reads: "By direction of the president the Bronze Star Medal is presented to Specialist Four E-4, Edgar D. Holden, United States Army, for dis- tinguishing himself by out- standing meritorious service in connection with ground operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam during the period August 12, 1965 to July 31, 1966.

"Through his untiring ef- forts and professional abili- ty, he consistently obtained outstanding results. He was quick to grasp the implica- tions of new problems with which he was faced as a result of the ever changing situations inherent in a counterinsurgency operation and to find ways and means to solve those problems. The energetic application of his extensive knowledge has materially contributed to the efforts of the United States Mission to the Republic of Vietnam to assist that coun- try in ridding itself of the communist threat to its free- dom. His initiative, zeal, sound judgment and devo- tion to duty have been in the highest tradition of the United States Army and re- flect great credit on him and on the military service."

"I am looking forward to my remaining years in 4-H work," said Duwain. "I plan to follow an agricultural ca- reer, and I feel that my range management projects have given me a good back- ground in such a field."

Don and Dan Rowan, twin sons of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Rowan, have been chosen to at- tend the 12th World Jamboree of Boy Scouts to be held August 1-9, 1967, at Farragut State Park, Idaho. They are 2 of the 5 Eagles Scouts chosen from the Concho Valley Council to take part in the Jamboree in which 5,000 Boy Scouts from all over the free world will attend.

- 1/4 cup firmly-packed brown sugar
- 3/4 cup boiling water
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1 medium-sized lemon, thinly sliced

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

Polishing Deer Antlers — Deer antlers make fine and useful decorations for any sportsman's den.

Improvised Reloader — Reloading your .22 magazine tube can be an aggravating job.

Glaring Arrowheads — Sometimes a glaring reflection cast by a newly-sharpened arrowhead can scare away game at a crucial moment.

Clever Shot-Testing Device — A simple way to test velocity and penetration of shot shells is to set up an old telephone or city directory at the proper distance.

Conditioning Hulls — After shot shells have been reloaded several times they tend to lose their waterproofing wax.

Duck Boat Launch — There are many types of boat launchers. For a simple launching device, take a wood-slat packing-crate, unfold it and spread it out at the water's edge.

Treat Crappie with Care — Crappie fishing can be great fun. But, you will catch more of the tasty critters by following this advice: Don't jerk your line too hard when a crappie strikes.

Wide-Area Fishing — In fast moving water let the current work your lure. By simply moving your rod tip from side to side, stretching out as far as you can reach to either side, you can cover approximately 18 feet of water.

Star-Drag Care — When storing a star-drag reel, always completely back off the tension. Prolong storage with the drag tightened down will ruin the drag discs, causing them to chatter and slip when again put to use.

Keeping Food Cool — For a makeshift camp refrigerator, try digging a hole about a foot and a half deep in a shady area. Place your per-

Egg Breakage Insurance — If you wrap fresh eggs in aluminum foil and reinsert in the regular cartons, the eggs that may break in transit to camp will still be fryable or scrambleable and not soaked into the upholstery of your car.
