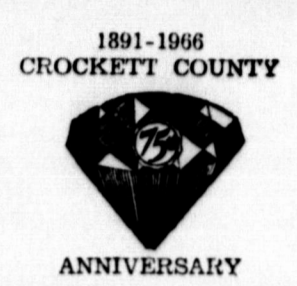

Ozona Hi School English Teacher Fired From Staff

John Oliver, Junior and Senior class English teacher in Ozona High School, was summarily dismissed from the school's faculty early this week by Superintendent of Schools L. B. T. Sikes.

In a conference with the teacher in his office Monday morning, Mr. Sikes advised Mr. Oliver that his contract was terminated "as of that moment" following a discussion of two books which had been assigned to pupils of the two grades, one to pupils of the Junior class and another to the Senior class.

Mr. Oliver had requested a grant from school funds to provide books for class members as outside reading and was told that such funds were available and that before such books were assigned it would be necessary to have the approval of school authorities, Mr. Sikes said. The books in question were assigned without clearing through the school administration, the superintendent declared. An investigation followed complaints from parents that the books contained "cheap vulgarity" and objected to their children's reading them. The dismissal from the staff "for insubordination and other reasons," Mr. Sikes said, followed.

Mr. Oliver is in his first year as a teacher. He came to the Ozona school staff at the beginning of the present school year.

The Badgers won the B game and freshmen tussle 60-45 and 38-22. James Apple had 15 points for Ozona B Team while Childress had 5 for the Freshmen.

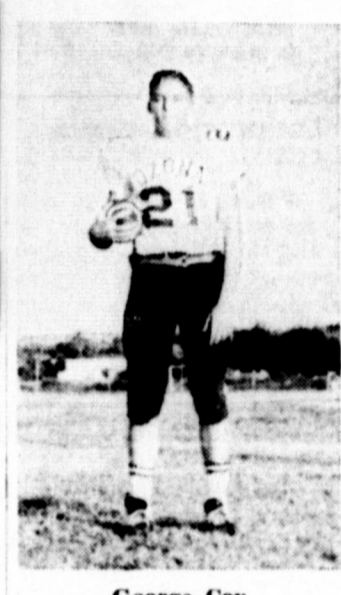

Cox and Sutton were 2 of 4 boys named to both the offensive and defensive team. Noe Chavez and Laney Cook, two members of the Sonora Championship award, were the other 2-way performers. District coaches named 8 Broncos, 6 Rankin Red Devils, and 5 Ozona Lions to the majority of the positions on the first team — offensive and defensive.

Other Lions receiving spots on the second team or honorable mention list were Wesley West, 2nd team offensive tackle; Thomas DeHoyos, 2nd team offensive team halfback; Oscar Flores, 2nd team defensive end;

Junior Cagers Win Two Against Sonora Colts

Coach Ron Murdock's junior high cagers posted wins against the Sonora teams Monday night with the 7th grade five taking a 29-14 victory and the 8th graders chalking up a 47-26 win.

In the first game the Cub 7th graders had the Sonora crew down 17-4 at the half giving the reserves an opportunity to play most of the second half. Monty Pellet and Ruben Tambunga tied for high point man with 14 points each.

The 8th grade Cubs, playing a much improved Sonora team, were paced by Will Collett who chalked up 12 points followed by Philip Perner with 10. David Pagan hit for 9 points and Jim Montgomery 8. Donald Olson, David Williams and Cuatro Davidson were responsible for the remaining points. The entire team played with starters and reserves alternating.

January 5, is the next game scheduled for the Cubs. They will play Iraan here in Ozona.

Sonora Carries Dist. 8-A Banner To State Title

District 8-A football was really in the spotlight last Saturday night when the Sonora Broncos, carrying the 8A banner, lashed Shulenburg 40-14 to capture the State Class A Championship. The San Angelo Bobcats added to the area football glory by winning the 4A title.

The Broncos, coached by Jerry Hopkins, waltzed through 14 straight opponents enroute to the championship trophy, perhaps the first for a district member. Many observers have felt that District 8A football ranked with the best in the state, and this year can point to the winning Broncos and other strong league members such as Ozona and Rankin. The Ozona Lions finished second behind Sonora with (Continued on Last Page)

Larry Kilgore, honorable mention offensive end and defensive linebacker; John DeHoyos, honorable mention defensive guard; and Fleet Coates, honorable mention defensive back.

Cox, a repeater from the 1965 all-district squad, was the Lion offensive spark.

The senior breakaway back scored 15 touchdowns for 90 points, 10 td's by rushing, 3 td's on pass receptions, 2 on kickoff returns, and 1 on a pass interception. Named to the All-West Texas team in '65, the 168 speedster rushed for 9.1 yards per try this season for 807 total yards. Cox returned only two kickoffs all season and went the distance on both occasions.

Sutton, at 6 feet 1 inch and 210 pounds, made the squad at tackle on both the offensive and defensive squads. The strong lineman was rated by many district coaches as the best interior lineman in the district. Sutton paced the Lions with 75 tackles for the season, and many of the opponents' plays were aimed in other directions because of the quick Sutton. Sutton is only a junior.

Ramos, one of the best placekickers in the area, landed a spot at linebacker along with the Ivey twins of Rankin. The 182 pound halfback switched from guard to back for the 1966 season.

Noted And Passed

Reason Why? Recent doings in Darkest Africa have been puzzling. Restless natives abduct foreigners, burn down buildings owned by governments they dislike, notably the U. S. A., carve up political opponents and abscond with any national funds that might be lying around. But now there's a clue to the reason for all these happenings. In a study recently made by Dr. Henry R. Cassirer, the American chief of UNESCO's program for educational use of mass media, he has come to the conclusion that Africa is experiencing a "cultural renaissance," and this, he says, can be credited to the influence of radio and television. Considering what's on the air in this country and how it affects many of those who subject themselves to it, we think the doctor may be right. And now we understand Africa better.

Who Bugs Whom? We confess that it "bugs" us that the opinions and pronouncements of the junior Senator from New York, Boston and Virginia, Bobby Kennedy, rate such rapt attention in the picture magazines and who bugs us, as he does 9-TV commentators.

Maybe it's Bobby himself. J. Edgar Hoover, for example. Recently Bobby came out with a statement absolving himself from the use of wiretaps when he was Attorney General, and since this served to make Mr. Hoover the patsy, the head of the F. B. I. refused to take it lying down. Said Mr. Hoover: "All wiretaps utilized by the F. B. I. have always been approved in writing in advance, by the Attorney General. Mr. Kennedy, during his term of office, exhibited great interest in pursuing such matters, and, while in different metropolitan areas, not only listened to the results of microphone

surveillances, but raised questions relative to obtaining better equipment. . . . F. B. I. usage of such devices was obviously increased at Mr. Kennedy's insistence while he was in office. . . ."

Bell - Bottom Cows. The Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland, is going out of the dairy business. It has been operating its own dairy farm. The most recent count was 377 cows, 262 calves, four bulls, 97 buildings and 45 civilian employees. The General Accounting Office thinks the farm will sell for about \$1,750,000 and that the Navy will save an estimated \$83,803 a year by buying its milk from commercial dairies.

If, like us, you groan, "Holy Cow! How long has this been going on?" . . . the answer is, since 1910. Fifty-six years, at \$83,803 a year. Man, that's a lot of milking, you know who.

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Deathwatch Seeks To Save Lives Of 47 Over Holidays

Austin — Forty-seven persons in Texas will be the focus of one of the most intensive traffic safety efforts ever to be expended during the Christmas holiday weekend, according to Department of Public Safety Director Col. Hommer Garrison, Jr.

"The DPS will be concentrating its efforts more than ever in an attempt to make sure that the indicated death toll of 47 persons is not reached," said Garrison. "This year has been the most terrible in Texas history in terms of lives lost and property damage, and we are working with other state agencies and organizations interested in safety in order to hold down this toll as much as possible."

"Operation Deathwatch" will be conducted from 6 p. m., Friday, December 23 through 11:59 p. m., Monday, December 26, to focus attention on dangers involved in holiday travel. The present traffic trend indicates that 47 persons will die

in traffic during this period. The "Deathwatch" will resume for the New Year's weekend, beginning at 6 p. m., Friday, December 30, and continuing through 11:59 p. m., Monday, January 2. Indications for the New Year's period are that 36 persons will die in traffic accidents. To supplement its enforcement activities, the DPS will place approximately 150 additional men from its other uniformed services on highway patrol duty. Every effort will be made to remove dangerous or irresponsible drivers from the highways for the safety of law-abiding motorists.

Austin, Texas — The state government's budget proposals — each including around the \$4.5-billion mark overall for the fiscal period — were made way to Texas legislators. Legislative Budget Board unveiled its 1967-68 recommendations last week, following a few days of the somewhat-larger appropriations request of John Connally. LBB calculated that approved by board would come to some \$4,000,000,000 — \$834,000,000 in general revenue over the Legislature has control. Connally's budget estimates topped \$4,000,000,000 — \$911,400,000 in general revenue. Present all-funds (including federal earmarked categories as for highways, school welfare) is \$3,900,000,000. \$621,500,000 in general revenue. 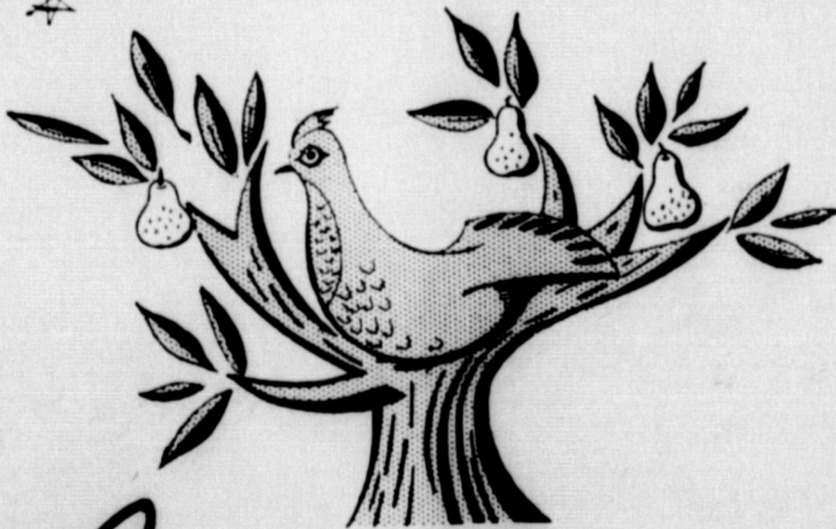

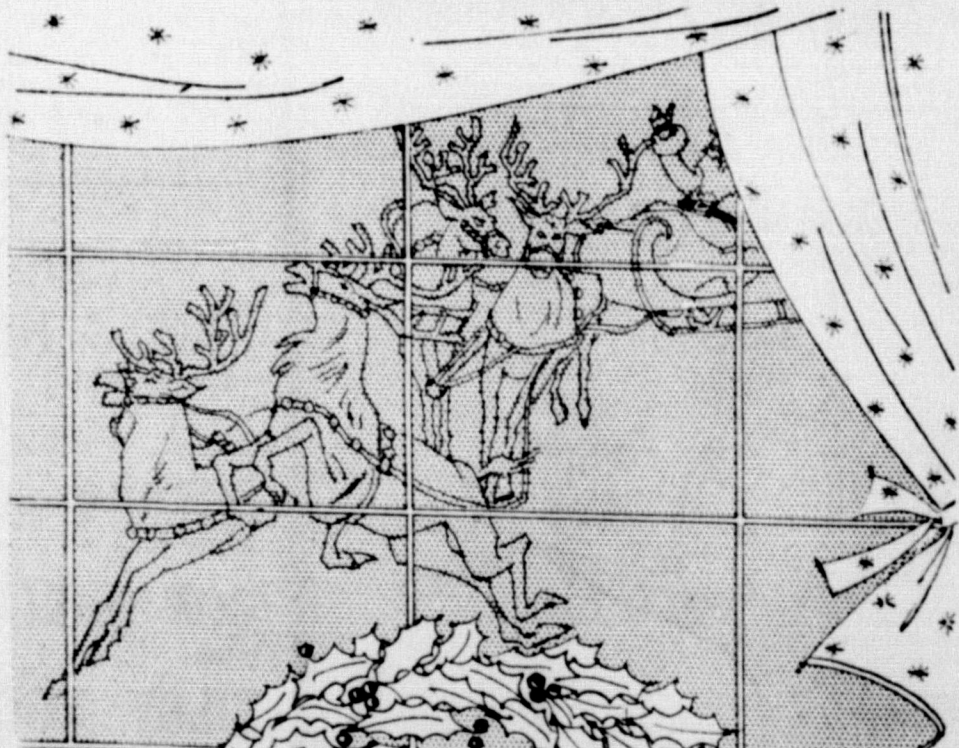

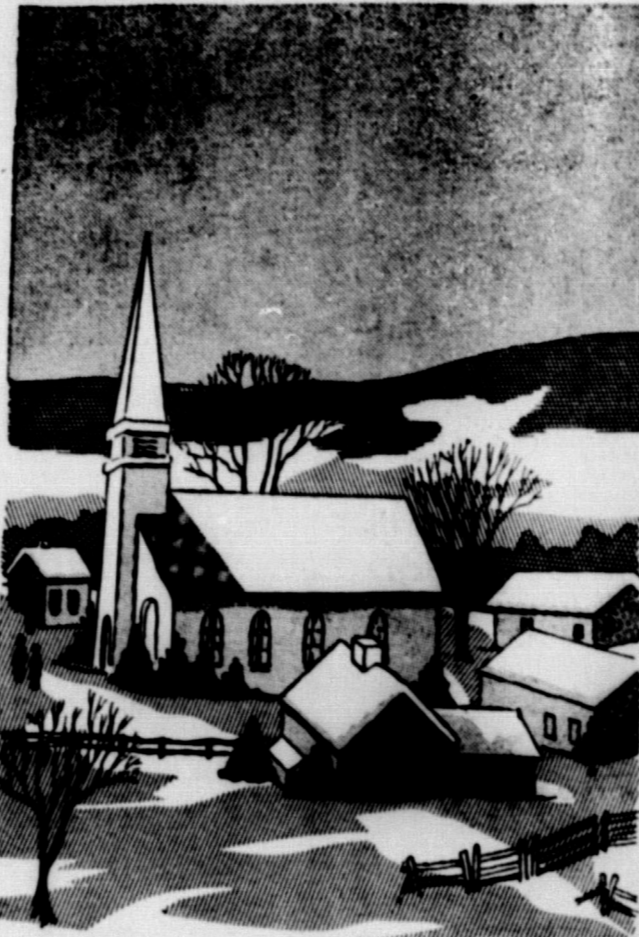

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

by Vern Sanford

PROTECTING tent bottom — Damp ground quickly deteriorates the best of canvas floor covering. However, if you use forethought enough to cut an old rug pad the size of the tent floor you will save the expensive canvas. Just lay the old pad on the ground and pitch your tent over it.

ARROW REST — You archers can make a clean shot every time by using a toothbrush. Mount the head of the toothbrush, cut off just behind the bristles, on the ledge of a center shot bow. Toothbrush head makes a fine arrow rest.

IMPROVED Boat Seat — There never seems to be enough room in a boat. Make an extra seat by whacking off the legs of an old light-weight chair to the proper height. Slip rubber tips on the decapitated leg ends and you have a non-slip extra seat.

PROTECT CAMERA from cold — Now-a-days most sportsmen carry cameras with them to record their trip. In freezing weather the operation of such cameras often is impeded.

To prevent such shutter freezing — and also keep your hands warm — tape a hand-warmer to the camera bottom, or side.

HITTING OVERHEAD objects — Striking an overhead object can seriously damage a high-loaded trailer.

Such damage is uncalled for if you will attach a long radio antenna to your front fender. Pull antenna out un-

on your next camping trip and place it under the center pole of your umbrella tent. It will prevent floor damage and pole slipping.

And, if you don't use this type tent, hubcaps make great ash trays for any camp.

MURDEROUS BAIT — If you want a really deadly bait, dip your bucktail lures in sardine oil. The hunkers can't resist it.

Hunters talk of deer season and shooting fatalities like the two are synonymous. Most believe that the novice is largely to blame for the hunting accidents.

But, many a careless veteran hunter has been involved in a needless mishap simply because he failed to realize that hunting accidents are not the select happenings of a few beginners.

In the typical hunting accident it is not the tyro who is to blame. It is the veteran hunter! Usually the beginner is wary of his weapon and treats it with respect. On the other hand the veteran has hunted to much to be concerned. Familiarity of-

ten breed; carelessness.

It also is ironic to know that most shooting accidents don't occur during the deer season. In fact a great majority happen while hunting birds or other small game.

Nationwide statistics reveal that the typical person who causes a hunting accident is a male over 20 years of age with more than three years of hunting experience. At the time of the mishap he was not under the influence either of drugs or

alcohol. Most such incidents happen between the hours of 1:30 p. m. and 4:30 p. m. and in clear weather. Typical weapon is a shotgun. Victim was standing between 11 and 50 yards from the shooter and discharge of the gun was accidental. Only one out of five victims survive.

a 6-1 district record, losing only to Sonora with two backfield starters on the sidelines with injuries. Although losing 25-0 to Ozona, the Rankin Red Devils gave the Sonora team one of its toughest games of the year before losing 26-14.

After winning the district title, the Broncos, led by quarterback Laney Cook, polished off Wink 47-14 in bi-district, Seagraves 36-0 in regional, White Deer 35-14 in quarterfinals, and number one rated Forney 39-28 in a thriller, before blasting Shulenburg in the finals Saturday night. The powerful Sonora offense averaged 39 points per game for four playoff games.

Both Sonora and Ozona will return several starters next year and could develop into powerful class A teams. But Sonora will lose its quarterback, Cook, while the Lions will be missing George Cox, the most dangerous broken field runner in District 8A for the past two years.

Lion 1966 statistics showed that Ozona scored 207 points while holding the opponents to 71. The Lions rushed for 2,423 total yards for a game average of 242 yards while allowing the opposition an average of only

8 yards per game. Behind

John DeHoyos with 486 yards, Fleet Coates with 442 yards, and Ramos with 361 yards.

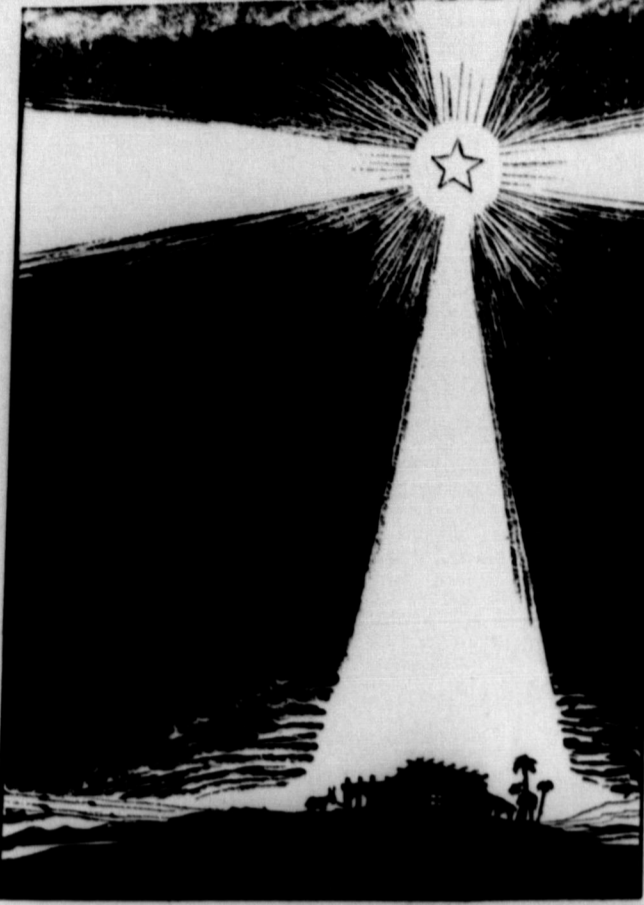
Miss Eva Adams, Director of the United States Mint, says the women included in the 1966 edition "are marked for recognition because they shunned mediocrity."

Wool & Goat Assn. For End To Pollution
 Ranchmen have called for action to pollution and depletion of Texas fresh-water supplies, both surface and underground. The Texas Wool and Goat Raisers' Association in 51st annual convention in Fort Worth decided such waste as a by-product of oil production. The association called for general Railroad Commission

order against use of salt-water evaporation pits, without exceptions. These pits, it was charged, often allow salt water to run into creeks and streams, or to filter into underground strata and ruin water supplies that cannot be replaced for years, if ever. The ranchmen want salt water to be returned to the same deep formations from which it came. This can be done by use of injection wells by the oil industry. Oil operators also can use this

salty or brackish water instead of fresh water in secondary recovery operations, often known as "water-flooding."

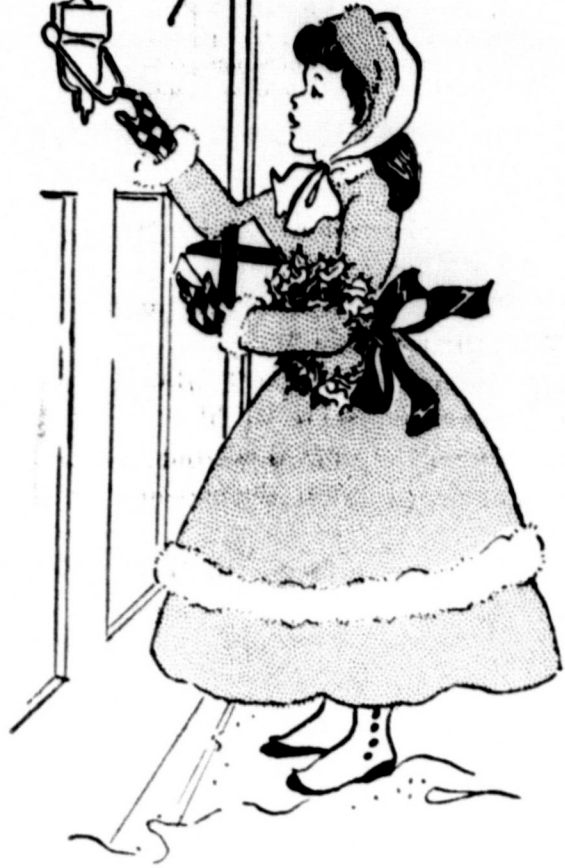

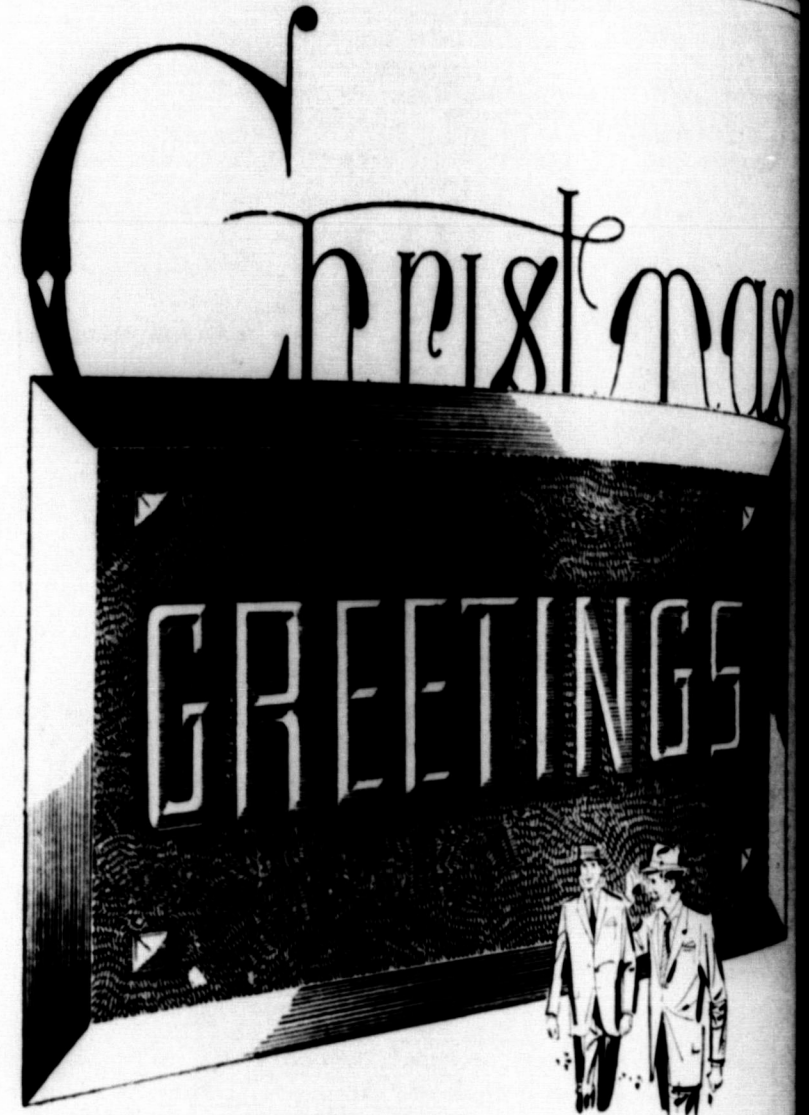

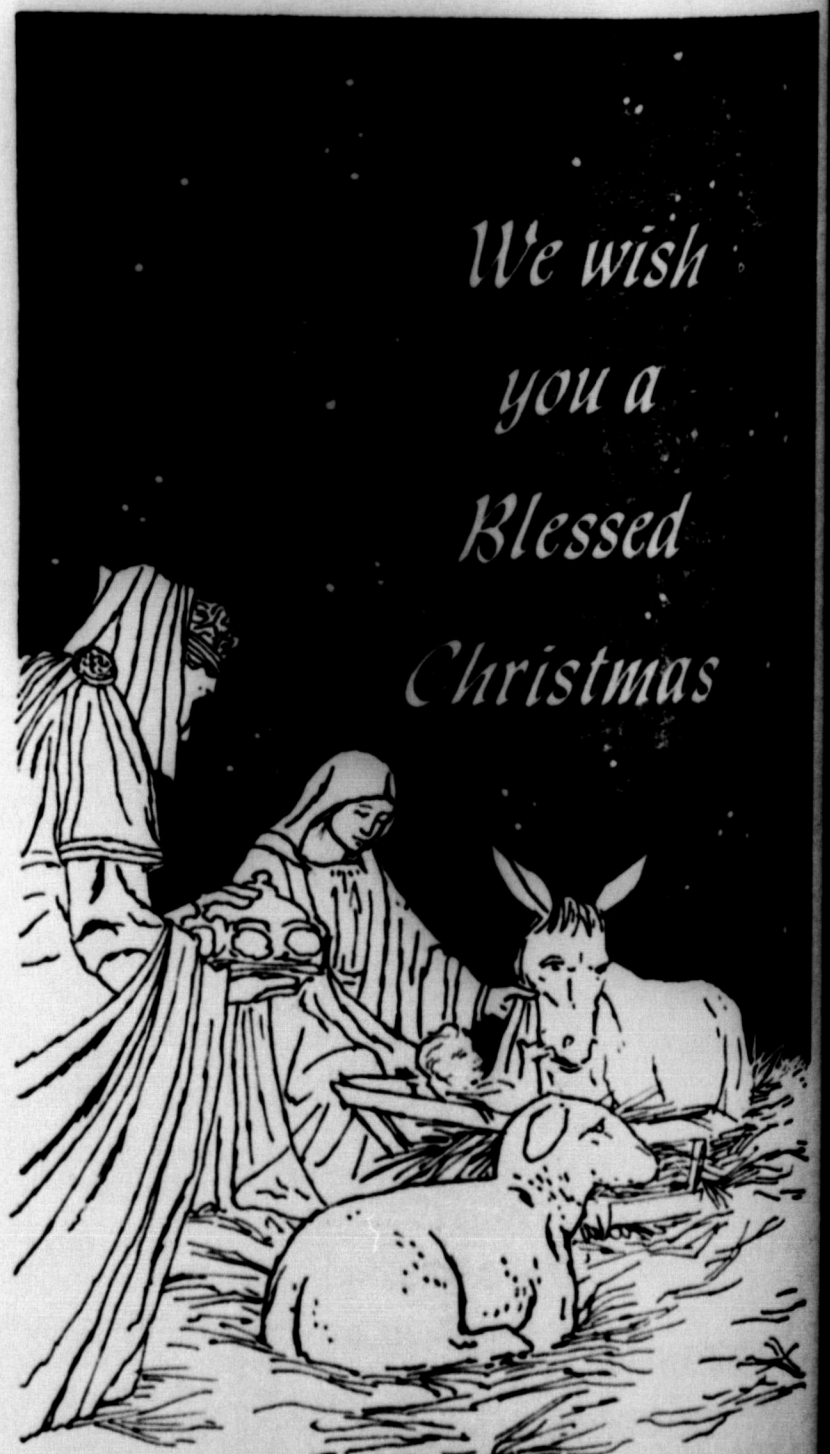

DAY MACAROONS

2 eggs (beaten until foamy)
 3/4 cup sugar
 1 T. melted butter or margarine, cooled
 1 teas. vanilla
 2-3/4 cups moist, flaked coconut
 3/8 cup candied cherries, chopped
 2 oz. sweet chocolate, melted and cooled

1/4 teas. cinnamon
 1/2 teas. grated lemon rind
 Sift flour, baking powder and salt together, add sugar to eggs gradually, beating constantly, then fold in dry ingredients. Combine butter, vanilla and coconut; fold in mixture and stir in cherries. Divide dough in half. To one half add chocolate mixed with cinnamon and to remaining half add lemon rind. Drop from teaspoon onto greased and floured baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (325 to 350) 18 to 29 minutes. (Cookies should just be browned around edges.) Cool few seconds. Remove from baking sheet and finish cooling on cake racks. Makes 5 to 6 doz.
