

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

3 lb. fryer quartered It. OPA

1 cup dry white wine to cup soy sauce 1 teas, powdered ginger

1 clove garlie, crushed

Put wine, soy sauce, ginger and garlie in a jar and shake well. Place the chicken pieces in a glass bowl, pour the marinade over, and chill several hours. At serving time drain chicken pieces on paper towels, and grill over a good charcoal fire, turning of gas per day, from open several times and basting with the marinade. Cook 2 to 3 inches from heat for 25 to 30 minutes. This recipe can be easily doubled, serves four as is.

Roasted Corn

This is an easy way to roast corn on an out-door

Pull the husks back, not off, remove all the silk from each ear. Replace the husks. Soak the ears 10 minutes or so in a bucket of water. Shake off the water and lay the ears on the grill, over hot coals but not on them, and let them steam about 20 minutes if the corn is young. 25 minutes if on the mature side. Turn occasionally
