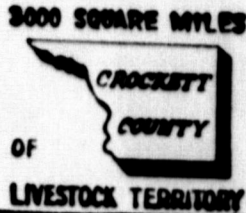

## Producers Praise Wage-Hour Law Work of Officers

Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association members and directors meeting in Ozona unanimously voted for an expression of gratitude to officers and individual members who carried on an extensive campaign on behalf of the ranch industry in respect to the new Wage and Hour Law. Included in the expression were officers of the National Wool Growers Association, who worked closely with the Texas group.

"At a time when all the odds seemed to be against us, and when many organizations saw no hope and offered little help, these men carried on the battle", declared Gaylord Hankins of Rock-springs, chairman of the TS & GRA ranch labor committee.

He said exclusion of range livestock employees from the new law, and exemption of ranchmen from responsibility for most contract labor, was due to the determined efforts of these men in the two wool-and-mohair grower organizations.

Ranchmen will find themselves having to keep more records than ever and comply with regulations they have never known in the past, he continued, but even so the TS & GRA and NWGA won important concessions the industry would not otherwise have had.

The official commendation lauded officers and members who worked with Texas Senators Yarborough and Tower, with individual members of Congress, with labor committee members of both Houses and with the U. S. Department of Labor.

It recognized the effect TS & GRA and NWGA had upon the final writing of various safeguards in the law.

## Good Attendance Marks Saturday TS&GRA Meet

A good attendance marked the quarterly meeting of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association held here Saturday.

Saturday morning 309 members registered at the high school building before various meetings got underway. Around 450 were present for the noon meal at the Civic Center.

The highlight of the meeting was an address by W. E. (Hi) Overton, president of the National Wool Growers Association. Overton, prominent ranchman of Yeso, N. M., spoke to the General Assembly in the final meeting of the afternoon. He is a native of Texas and played football at Texas Tech.

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HOLY COWS

Here is this country we find it impossible to understand the thinking of superstitious millions in far-off India who starve to death as they watch well-fed sacred cows roaming the streets of their towns and cities. However, there's no reason why we should feel superior since we, too, have some sacred cows on which we lavish a large measure of superstitious ignorance.

One of these is "academic freedom", which is supposed to place the academic community above criticism. In some countries, notably in Latin America, this ridiculous principle is carried to such an extreme that the police are not allowed to enter upon university campuses, even when it is known that Communist agitators use such sanctuary to plan and stage riots against the law-abiding community.

Now, thanks to the erudite gents of our Supreme Court — or at least the liberal Five, Warren, Douglas, Black, Brennan and Fortas — we have taken another step toward the kind of academic freedom that makes propagandists and agitators virtually untouchable if they can get themselves a teach-

ing position. In the latest of their decisions upholding the "rights" of Communists, the Supreme Court has ordained that teachers cannot be fired if they happen to be members of the Communist conspiracy.

Employing their familiar Alice-in-Wonderland logic, Warren, Douglas, Black, Brennan and Fortas offer the concept that, in the market place of ideas, democracy should be able to hold its own even when children are pitted against glib and skillful Red persuaders. Apparently our youngsters are expected to be a lot smarter than the majority of the Justices of the U. S. Supreme Court. This could be.

We're not predicting that this ruling is going to cause an early outbreak of revolutionary activity on campuses and playgrounds. But we do maintain that Communists have no business teaching, because they are, first, last and always, propagandists for a world soviet. It's as simple as that, even if our Supreme Court can't grasp that elementary idea.

Come to think of it, maybe another of our sacred cows is that the edicts handed down by this segment of the Supreme Court should be ac-

2 cans (16 size) kidney beans, drained  
1 can tomatoes undrained  
1 1/2 teas. chili powder  
1 teas. salt  
dash of pepper  
1 cup grated sharp Cheddar cheese

Add onions to bacon drippings in skillet and cook stirring occasionally, until tender. Add beans, tomatoes, chili powder, salt, and pepper, mixing well. Cook, uncovered, over low heat, stirring occasionally, 20 minutes. Stir in cheese and cook until cheese is melted. To serve: Turn into serving dish. Sprinkle bacon over top. Makes 6 servings.

Brush Control Booklet Published By Standard-Times

The San Angelo Standard-Times has published a 24-page illustrated booklet, "Brush, The Water Thief", dealing with brush and its relationship to West Texas water supplies.

The booklet is based on a series of articles written by Standard-Times science writer Jean Gillette and published on the Sunday science page in September and October, 1966.

Fresh material and more illustrations have been added to make up the booklet.

Included in the brush publication are contributions by Ottis Bobbitt, meteorologist in charge of the Mathis Field Weather Bureau; Richard U. Grozier, San Angelo subdistrict chief for U. S. Geological Survey, and James Powell, Fort McKavett ranchman and past president of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association.

Topics covered in the publication include the water cycle, factors which influence the movement of water in the cycle, discussion of the history of vegetative changes in West Texas, means for controlling brush, programs which aid landowners and others in conserving soil, water and plant resources, economic factors, brush control research and research in "vegetation management."

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Texans may be a lot closer than they think to paying city taxes. But, in any event, they will have the final say at the local level.

A bill to permit authorization of a one-per-cent sales tax by cities, where voters approve, received a state committee endorsement. It didn't find such a warm welcome in a House committee.

For consideration is likely in both houses within a short time, say legislative leaders.

Drivers Bills — Modernization of Texas' license plates and driver's licenses would be accomplished by a pair of bills introduced in the House by Reps. Milton Schiller of Cameron and Dickery of Victoria.

Schiller's bill would provide for a color photograph of the licensee on the driver's license. Persons under 21 years of age would be issued different-colored licenses. Proof of birth date and fingerprints would be required for the applications.

A bill by Schiller calls for authorized license plates. Motorists would pay the additional 30 cents cost per plate.

Law Proposed — A twist to the old Sunbelt "blue laws" is proposed in a bill by Rep. Billy Williamson of Tyler. It would prohibit an occupation tax on the selling or renting of personal property on Sunday.

Actually, the tax would be as high as to prohibit Sunday sales. It would be at the rate of 10 percent of the receipts from the sale or rental with some deductions provided. Anyone violating the measure would be fined less than \$25 nor more than \$500 for each violation.

Originally drilled by John P. Wagner as the No. 1-B Shannon, it was abandoned April 11, 1953. Elevation is 2,531 feet.

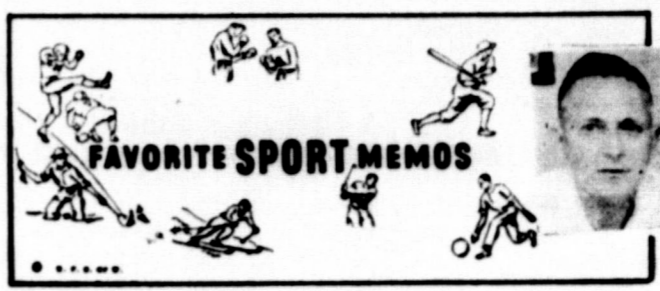
