September Date Set For Direct Distance Dialing

On September 10, customers in Ozona and 13 other General Telephone towns in West Texas will become the first to have a new long distance service called EDDDD. (Expanded Direct Distance Dialing) according to R. R. McCullough, district manager. The facilities which make it possible for approximately 40,000 customers in Ozona, Big Lake, Bronte, Carlsbad, Eden, Eldorado, Mertzon, Miles, Robert Lee, Rowena, San Angelo, Sonora and Sterling City to dial person to person as well as station to station calls will be located in the office at 14 West Twohig, San Angelo.

Cost of the project making the new service available will be over \$1,200,000. Plans for a project of this magnitude must be laid well in advance, McCullough stated. During the past three years, new central office buildings have been built in Carlsbad, Christoval, Eldorado and Sonora. New central office equipment has been placed in these buildings. Additional long distance circuits have been added between San Angelo and the area towns that will have access to the EDDDD network. All customers in the exchanges involved now have seven digit telephone numbers except Sterling City. Sterling City customers will be assigned seven digit numbers at the time of the EDDDD conversion.

Expanded Direct Distance Dialing (EDDD) is different from the conventional Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) in that it allows customers to dial person to person, collect, credit card or special calls as well as station to.

26 Million Annual Economic Boost To Crockett Co. From Oil Industry

Rutherford Named Area Director Of Auto Dealer Assn.

Reappointment of A. R. Rutherford, Rutherford Motor Co., Ozona, as Area Director of the Texas Automobile Dealers Association was announced in Austin today by H. C. Pittman, Executive Vice President of TADA.

In accepting this appointment, Mr. Rutherford stated, "I am proud to represent my fellow franchised dealers in this area. Our major program this year will be to work with state officials in implementing the Texas Traffic Safety Act passed this year by our Texas Legislature, and to promote a high standard of integrity and assist the automobile dealers in better serving the public by making driving safer, more convenient and more economical."

Rutherford will serve as Area Director until the next TADA Convention in Dallas in May, 1968. The association, with headquarters in Austin, celebrated its 50th anniversary this year and is the largest statewide new car dealers association in the nation.

Run-Away Trailer Narrowly Misses Enormous Damage

A run-away stock trailer stopped a few feet short of the new Ozona National Bank building after knocking over a fire plug, barely missing a pickup truck parked at the curb and crashing down the builder's sign in front of the bank construction project Friday.

The empty 14-foot trailer was being pulled by Jesse Marley behind his pickup. Traveling west on U. S. 290, the trailer jumped off its hitch in front of the court-house annex, zoomed past Marley's pickup and headed at an angle across the street. The run-away rig veered sharply to miss the parked pickup but the toppling sign board damaged the parked vehicle slightly. The trailer jumped the curb, sheared off the fire plug, crashed the sign and then buried its hitch into a pile of new dirt unloaded in front of the bank's newly laid brick wall only that morning. The dirt pile stopped the trailer before it crashed into the brick wall or the Stockman building.

The trailer was badly damaged but, considering the potential ahead of the run-away vehicle, the actual damage was relatively light. Because of its break-away (Continued on Last Page)

More than \$26.2 million a year of economic stimulation for Crockett County flows from its oil and gas wells each year, an annual study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association showed today.

"As one of the 206 producing counties in Texas, Crockett County's economy is sensitive to fluctuations in the oil industry generally," commented W. A. Landreth, Fort Worth, Association president. "Long range, the demand for oil looks strong and current production rates continue to provide Texas a major source of its income."

Moore Oil Leads Pack In Little League 2nd Half

League leading Moore Oilers defeated B&B Grocers Thursday night 6-0 to remain undefeated in second-half Little League play and to take a tighter hold on this year's championship, they downed Ozona Oil 4-3 in Monday night's play. B&B Grocers and Flying W Ranchers are tied for second place with 2 wins and 3 losses. Ozona Oil is bringing up the rear with 1 win and 4 losses.

The Ranchers picked up a 19-12 win over Ozona Oil Thursday night and lost a close one, 11-9, to the Grocers Monday night.

Ned Stephens was the winning pitcher for Moore Oil Thursday night and Sammie Tambunga took the loss. D. Higginbottom, Mike Wellman and Charlie Ramos had three hit apiece, a lead the Oilers attack, while Gary Mitchell collected 2 hits for B&B. In the second game the lead changed hands several times before the Ranchers wrapped it up, scoring 7 runs in the bottom of the fifth. Timmy Evans was the winner and Rick Webster took the loss for Ozona Oil.

It was a pitcher's duel all the way Thursday night as Moore Oil picked up their sixth straight win by downing Ozona Oil in a tight ball game. T. Borrego was the winning pitcher and Rick Webster the loser. Stephens and Borrego gave up only three hits during the 6 innings for the winners and Webster allowed only 6. Charlie Ramos homered for the Oilers.

In the second game, the Grocers took the lead in the top of the second, scoring 5 runs, and led all the way. The Ranchers rallied in the third and came up with 6 runs, but never could catch up. Gary Whitley was the winner and Gerald Olson the loser. Gary Mitchell and Whitley led the hitting with 3 hits each, Whitley hitting his second home run of the season.

In Minor League play last week, the Giants defeated the Astros 4-2 and the Yankees pounded the Dodgers 19-12 Tuesday night. Friday night's play saw the Yankees downing the Astros 6-2 and the Giants trouncing the Dodgers 12-4.

Ball games in the major and minor leagues will be cancelled for Monday and Tuesday, July 3-4. Play will resume Thursday, July 6.

On the other hand, Texas operators are beset by competition from other oil producing areas, government ceilings on natural gas prices, heavy tax payments, and a price for crude oil that is insufficient to encourage the amount of exploratory drilling that is needed to find future reserves."

Based on latest U. S. Bureau of Mines production figures, Crockett County in 1965 produced 7.6 million barrels of crude oil, valued at \$23.4 million and 29.3 billion cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$3.8 million, and ranks 43rd among Texas counties in production.

In addition, plants which process natural gas for liquids such as natural gasoline, butane and propane in 1965 produced more than 46.3 million gallons of liquids valued at \$2.2 million.

A major distribution of income from sales of oil and gas went to county landowners in royalty payments totaling more than \$3.3 million.

In 1966, a year that saw drilling in Texas fall to its lowest level since 1947, oil and gas operators drilled 145 wells in Crockett County. Of these 21 were wildcats seeking new fields.

The Association estimated that operators in the county spent more than \$11.4 million in drilling last year, of which \$2.0 million was lost in dry holes.

Sharing heavily in the county's production each year is the State Treasury, which received \$1.3 million in production taxes in 1965 paid by the producers and royalty owners. Crude oil production paid \$1.0 million and natural gas production, \$265,727.

Texas Employment Commission figures for 1966 show that some 116 workers directly employed in oil and gas operations accounted for a payroll in excess of \$918,808. Additional value is given oil and gas from the operation of processing plants. The Oil and Gas Journal lists 4 natural gasoline plants with a capacity of 82.0 million cubic feet per day, and 1 cycling plant in the county with a capacity of 15.0 million cubic feet per day.

July 11 Meeting To Hear Report On Water Survey

Bernard B. Baker of the Ground Water Division of the Texas Water Development Board, will be in Ozona July 11 to present to the Commissioners Court and interested citizens the Board's water development report for Crockett county, completed in May of this year.

The July 11 meeting date was tentatively agreed on at a special meeting of the court on May 23 when Fred Osborne of the Board's staff presented copies of the report to the court.

Mr. Baker will summarize results of the ground water survey made in Crockett county under the supervision of Hilary H. Iglehart last year and will discuss information contained in the report and invite questions on the subject.

All interested citizens are invited to attend the meeting in the courthouse starting at 3 p. m.

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ONE-MAN TROIKA

Thanks to his incredible bungling of the Middle East situation the real U Thant now stands exposed for the little man he really is. And we can't for the life of us see how he can be retained any longer in his very big job, no matter how much the Soviet Union would like to keep him there.

It will be remembered that the USSR wanted a troika to head up the UN. But it settled for U Thant as a compromise choice with a suspicious alacrity. And he it said for U Thant that he has proved that he can cause as much trouble as any three other men possibly could.

He was greatly esteemed by the liberal-left, the neutralists and Moscow so long as he kept muttering threats about South Africa and Rhodesia and trumpeting endlessly about the iniquities of the United States in Vietnam. But he alienated a lot of erstwhile supporters when he took it upon himself to pull the UN peacekeeping forces out of the Middle East without even consulting the members of the East River Minstrel Show. Thanks to that kind of diplomacy, the traditional antagonists accept the invitation to have at it, and did. Neither Moscow nor Nasser liked the outcome and now seek to recoup with propaganda sessions at the UN.

This is not the first U Thant boo-boo. More than once in recent years it has seemed as though the imperturbable Secretary General had earned retirement

from his one-man troika job. But not only did he hang on to his job, he made it appear that he was doing so at great personal sacrifice.

Let it not be forgotten that the only possible beneficiary of U Thant's retreat was Nasser. That Nasser could not exploit the advantage in no way alters the Secretary General's delinquency. It was boneheaded diplomacy at best. It triggered a tragic and unnecessary war. As a result, the free world nations which must always spend money and men to preserve freedom, finance binding up the ugly wounds of war, and suffer the economic privations growing out of it, will not soon again rest confidence in the judgment of U Thant.

The futility of the UN was never more apparent than in the Middle East crisis. But the fact that the Secretary General of the United Nations was the agent-provocateur who triggered the war is an even more valuable lesson for all of us.

The sooner U Thant goes back to teaching school in Burma, the better.

POWER OF PUBLICITY

"I'm tired of having my leaders selected for me by NBC and CBS television networks."

This complaint, voiced by Clifford L. Alexander, a prominent Negro lawyer, sums up a situation that deserves the attention of the reading and viewing public. Mr. Alexander was talking specifically about the rabble-rouser Stokely Carmichael, who has a highly developed genius for creating disension. "We can't take care of Stokely," said Mr. Alexander, "because he's not responsible to us — and he is described as our leader. Well, I'd like to pick my own leaders so I can kick them out when they get out of line."

This raises a significant point. Carmichael is no "Negro leader" because of the democratic process. No one elected him to anything. He's active in an outfit called the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, but it would libel the Negroes of this country to say that SNICK speaks for them. This is what the Communists call an "agitprop" operation, designed to agitate and propagandize, and that is precisely how Carmichael has played it. to the free publicity they have given the ineffable Stokely, he has been lifted to national eminence as "a Negro leader."

It will be said that Carmichael is "news" and that neither he nor his threats against "Whites" can be ignored. But Carmichael is news only because of the buildup he has received. This is what causes crowds to gather when he shows up, and this is what provides the tinder that constantly erupts into riots wherever he meanders. HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

Year State Capitol
 Texas — Exercise of veto power to cut appropriations, Gov. John Connally saved off \$3,214,121 from the one-year general appropriation bill and killed 37 bills passed by the 60th Legislature.

Year State Capitol
 One of the vetoed bills called for total annual expenditures of \$12,819,780 beginning September 1, 1968.

Year State Capitol
 Extension of the federal minimum wage act to state hospital and school employees would cost the state government in 1968 at least \$14,000,000 according to Asst. Gen. Harold C. Martin.

Year State Capitol
 Martin says he intends to fight inclusion of state institutions under the act all the way to the Supreme Court.

Year State Capitol
 Three federal judges in Texas recently handed down conflicting opinions on the issue but not a final order.

Year State Capitol
 Careless drivers will pay more for their car insurance on July 1. They will be charged more because of their accidents or traffic law violations during the nine months which ended May 1.

Year State Capitol
 Penalties which range from 15 to 90 per cent, depending on the number and severity of the law violations, will add up to \$6,000 during the year ending August 1.

Year State Capitol
 These penalties, feeding into much more money into the auto insurance "kitty" will prevent rate increases for most drivers.

College Tuition — Instead of doubling tuition as requested by the Coordinating Board of the Texas College and University system, the Legislature made it easier for poorer youngsters to get tuition and fee exemptions. Exemptions would go only to students from families with gross incomes of \$4,800 a year or less. No student would be allowed to attend college more than six years under the exemption plan. To be eligible, students must be graduated in the top 25 per cent of their high school classes. Or score in the top 20 per cent in a nationally standardized college admission examination.

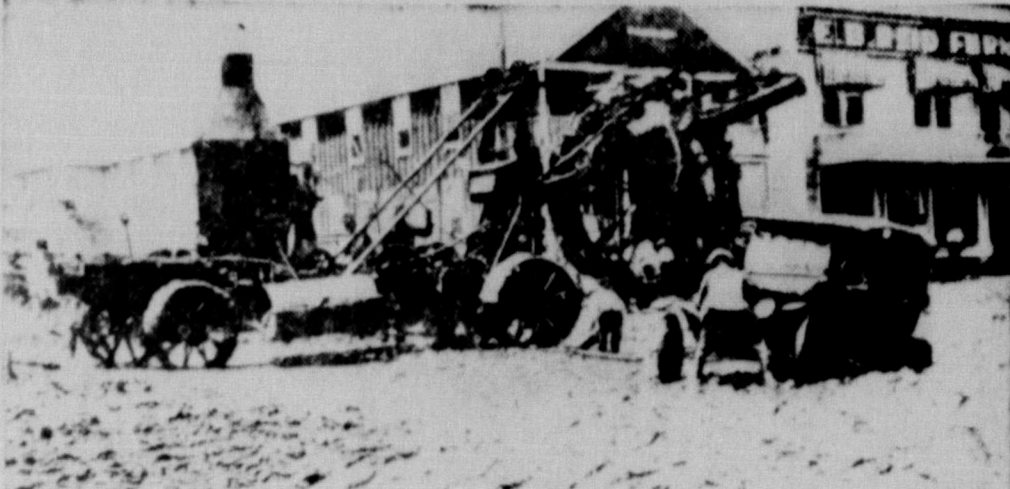

Crockett Wildcat Slated; 2 Fields Get Confirmers

A wildcat was slated in Crockett County and confirmers assured in two fields during the past week.

Southwestern Natural Gas Inc., Midland, will drill the No. 3 Tippet, a 5,200-foot detrital wildcat and a 5,000-foot detrital confirmation, 1-200 feet northeast of the firm's No. 2 Tippet, recent Hueco opener and 4,950-foot Wolfcamp confirmer in the Tippet field and 5,000-foot, detrital confirmer in the Tippet, West multipay field 10 miles southeast of McCamey.

Location is 660 feet from the southeast and 3,420 feet from the northeast lines of 37-31-H&TC. Contract depth is 5,200 feet; ground elevation, 2,319 feet.

The No. 2 Tippet was finished April 12 for 240 barrels of oil through a 16-64-inch choke and Hueco perforations at 4,880-4,930 feet; for 192 barrels of oil through a 16-64-inch choke and 5,000 ft. detrital perforations at 5,017-030 feet; and for 168 barrels of oil through a 16-64-inch choke and 4,950-foot Wolfcamp perforations at 4,971-982 feet.

Fourth McKee producer and 2 2,400-foot northwest extension to that pay was assured in the Tippet, West multipay field with the flow of 55 barrels of new oil in 17 hours at Shell Oil Co. No. 1-34 Tippet, in 34-31-H&TC, nine miles south of McCamey.

Flow was through perforations at 5,812-22 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons. Tubing pressure was 175 pounds. Testing continued with nine barrels of load water to recover.

Gulf Oil Corp. No. 5-E J. H. Tippet, n 36-31-H&TC, one location east-southeast of dual McKee and Ellenburger production in the same field recovered shows on two drill-stem tests in the Ellenburger.

Recovery was 15 feet slightly off cut drilling on a 50-minute test at 589-6,650 feet, and 10 of slightly oil-cut drill mud on a 30-minute stem test at 6,580-6,680 feet.

Operator was moving completion unit.

Production was indicated earlier with the flowing 30 barrels of oil in 30 minutes, plus gas at the rate of 465,000 cubic feet daily, test at 5,037-77 feet; with the recovery of oil heavily oil-and-gas-cutting mud, plus some salt water, on a test at 4,922 feet.

A 1 1/2-mile south extension was assured in the (Ellenburger gas) field southwest Crockett with flowing of gas through sets of perforations at Shell Oil Co. No. 11-1-A Mitchell in 11-Q3-TERR, 36 miles southwest of Ozona.

Tested one hour on an -64-inch choke through perforations at 14,041-503 feet it flowed 28 barrels of water, plus gas at the rate of 6.5 million cubic feet daily.

Operator perforated opposite the Ellenburger at 168-494 feet and then tested both sets together.

Tested 12 hours on an -64-inch choke, it flowed 64 hours, making 125 barrels load water and gas during the last 10 hours at the rate of 7.4 million cubic feet.

Acidized with 35,000 gallons, and opened four hours on a 16-64-inch choke, it flowed 45 barrels of load water and then flowed 64 hours, on an 18-64-inch choke making 10 barrels load water and gas during the last three hours at the rate of 9,900,000 cubic feet daily, with tubing pressure of 4,700 pounds.

Estimated 55 To Die In Holiday Traffic Mishaps

Austin — Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reported today that the DPS Statistical Services estimates 55 persons will die in traffic accidents during the four-day Fourth of July holiday.

Garrison said the estimate was compiled on the basis of past experience and the present trend of traffic deaths. Deaths so far during 1967 are running about six percent ahead of the same period for 1966.

"Operation Motorcade," a special emphasis program designed to focus attention on the added dangers of holiday travel, will be placed in effect from 6:00 p. m. Friday, June 30, through 11:59 p. m. Tuesday, July 4. Traffic fatalities will be tabulated by the DPS throughout the period, and the totals will be announced officially three times daily as a means of keeping safety uppermost in the minds of the motoring public.

Also, as a part of the DPS operation, additional personnel from other uniformed services will augment the regular Highway Patrol.

Grande carrot farmers are able to develop a new crop. Their crop Carrots are fish bait may be the largest offshore fish. Carrots should be appealing.

How they serve it. The vegetable is frozen. When it thaws it becomes easy to thread on wire leader. By running the top end away from the hook, there is little resistance. Or, if the position is reversed, the end can be cut at an angle to give resistance in trolling. I haven't tried it. If it doesn't work, don't try it.

It sounds interesting. There are many other similar lures which have been used both in fresh and salt water fishing.

For instance it has been used for years that cubes of soap make good catfish bait. Bream have been known to take small wild eggs. And there have been cases of bass striking small blue worms impaled on hooks.

Other fishermen have used bananas or even banana peels successfully. These are old ideas, but if they work, they are well worth trying. No doubt fish get tired of the same old diet of plastic worms or imitation worms. It is easy to believe that they will fall for something new.

There is one thing for certain, fish sometimes have minds of their own. A group fishing on Sam Rayburn in East Texas recently were told a certain lure was hot. It had been producing big crops for about 10 days, but in our party tried it.

Apparently the fish had grown tired of that particular item.

Finally one angler put on a blue with a dark blue. He tossed it alongside the other lures and right then and there a fast lure changing program began. We all went for blue baits and all caught fish.

Blue were found near logs where greenery was growing out of the decayed places which had been filled with blue. These bass just were not interested in green. But blue and purple on that particular day turned the trick.

Could be that the weather had something to do with it. There was a heavy overcast that day with dark rain clouds in the heavens most of the time.

We're anxious to get back to that same lake and try blue again. If blue doesn't work, we'll offer 'em brilliant gold, resembling a sunburst with featured edges in red. They might be just the thing on a bright sun-shiny day. Who knows?

Fish have been known to hit on many improvised lures. For instance the beverage can opener, an old teaspoon or even a bottle cap sometimes will work.

A bass fisherman in Florida uses the snap-type clothespins. He puts a screw eye in the heavy end and attaches a tail hook to the other end. He swears they beat any lure he has ever bought. Especially when he adds an Alka Seltzer tablet to the clamp of the clothespin.

A well known fishing guide carries in his boat several cans of spray paint in six different colors. If weather or water conditions warrant he will change the color of his lures in the middle of the lake.

A Texas manufacturer of spoons went to Florida recently to experiment with color. He found that big bass there consistently hit one of his spoons that had a purple plate. He went back to the factory and began turning out purple spoons by the thousands.

lures and the colors, the most effective fishing results from properly working the lures. Some fishermen go strong for this and insist that the only way to consistently catch fish is to work the lure properly — slowly and life-like.

Then there's always the dub in the boat who gets a backlash. His lure rests on the bottom for five minutes while he straightens out the birdnest. Then the instant he moves the lure there's a walloping blast and he comes up with the biggest bass.

That's the way fishing goes!

It would be against the federal law to desecrate the U. S. flag if a bill enacted by the House last week becomes law. station call.
Here's how EDDD works: On September 10, two new numbers — 112 and 110 — will become a part of the telephone long distance routine. Dialing one of these two numbers first connects you with equipment which permits you to dial your call. To dial a station to station call, you simply dial the access code — 112, then the area code of the town you are calling — then the 7-digit number you are calling. To dial a person to person or special call, you dial the access code — 110, then the area code of the town you are calling — then the 7-digit number you are calling.

McCullough noted that instructions for EDDD service will be in front of the new telephone directory which customers will receive in September. In addition, an EDDD instruction booklet will be mailed to all customers at the time of the conversion outlining how to use this convenient, modern telephone service. The Co. also has speaking teams to explain this new service which will appear before civic clubs and other groups upon request to McCullough's office.

McCullough indicated that the overall conversion to Expanded Direct Distance Dialing which will involve 14 exchanges and 40,000 telephone between now and the cutover on September 10 is the largest and most complex project ever undertaken in San Angelo. When the project is complete, West Texans served by General Telephone Company will be able to dial to most points throughout the United States and Canada.
