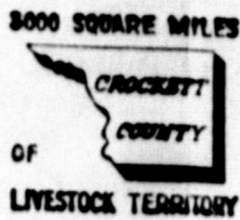

Don Edgerton Winner Of State 4-H Award

Don Edgerton, 16 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles B. Edgerton, has been named the 1967 state winner of the 4-H Range Management Awards Program. Don will receive an all-expense trip to the annual Range Camp at Junction next year. The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association is sponsor of the 4-H Range Management Program.

Don was a member of the 1967 State Champion 4-H Range Judging Team, member of the champion range judging team of this year's Crockett County Invitational Range Judging Contest, and has been a member of the second place grass judging team in the state 4-H grass judging contest at Texas A&M for the past two years. In 1966, Don was a member of the National Champion Wool Judging Team.

Young Edgerton is very active in all phases of 4-H club work in the county and holds the office of vice-chairman of the county 4-H council. He has been a member of the District-6 4-H Council for the past two years.

Increase In Gas Rates Effective November 15th

Gas used for domestic and commercial purposes after November 15, 1967, will be billed at new rate by Pioneer Natural Gas Company. In June, the company applied for an 11.5% increase in rates in the West Texas service area, and by late September all of the cities and towns had approved the new rate.

Since it began serving the area in 1928, Pioneer has applied the same rate in the West Texas service area, and this new rate will become effective in all cities and towns simultaneously.

Domestic and commercial customers in rural areas will also be billed at the new rate after the November 15th date. The Texas Railroad Commission approved the rate for areas outside the city limits on September 26, 1967.

There will be no change in rates for gas used for irrigation or other classifications of consumers.

The Ozona Lions will be in Rankin tomorrow night looking for their fourth straight win. Game time in Rankin is 8 p. m. Last Friday night the Lions crushed the helpless Sanderson Eagles 58 to 0 after easily running up a 42 point lead at the half.

After a 7-13 setback at the hands of the Sonora Broncos in the first district game, the Lions have come roaring back and have whitewashed Menard 47-0, Junction 31-0, and Sanderson 58-0. A win over the Rankin Red Devils would set up an all-important clash between Ozona and Iraan the next Friday night. Iraan is sure to remain undefeated in district play this week as they play Sanderson. Rankin tomorrow night's opponents, upset Junction 18-14 last Friday night.

The Ozona offense, improving with every game, got four touchdowns last Friday night against Sanderson and then the scoring was turned over to the always tough defensive unit for three TD's.

Forcing Sanderson to punt after 3 plays, the Lions lost no time before scoring when they scored on their first possession. Halfback Beto Diaz got the score on a 41 yard reverse play as he scored untouched. Larry Webb added the extra point.

Brownie Scouts Troop 56 will play host to the annual Halloween parade next Tuesday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock.

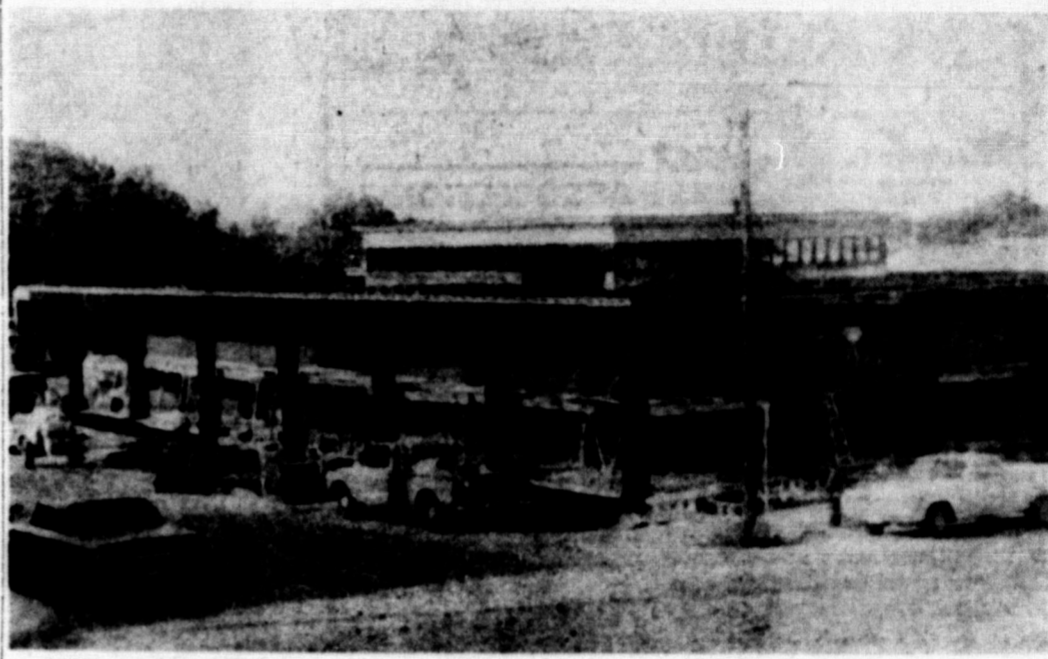
All children are invited to participate in full Halloween costume. Participants will meet at the band hall at 4 p. m. and the parade will begin at 4:45.

Ozona High School Moved Up To Class A A Effective Next Fall

Oct. 30-31 Dates Set For Issuance Doe Deer Permits

Crockett county land owners who wish to secure permits for taking antlerless deer this year, must secure permits two days only, Oct. 30 and 31, at the courthouse in Ozona Game Warden Raymond Davee announced this week.

Permits will be issued from 8 to 5 each of the two days and will not be available any other days, the game warden said.

The new policy for drawing antlerless deer permits was established by an act of the last legislature, whose intent, as written into the Act, is "to produce a greater degree of uniformity."

J. R. Singleton, executive director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said that 49 percent of landowners in certain counties did not draw their permits at the scheduled time in 1966. Requests after the deadline are difficult to honor since field personnel are away from headquarters. Written authorization may be given for a friend or neighbor to draw for the landowner.

Two relatively small areas of Crockett county will not be issued doe permits, these are the extreme northwest neck of the county and the northeast section from Highway 163 east and from State 29 north. The north central section of the county between these two areas and down to Highway 290 will be permitted to harvest 1 doe for each 300 acres and in the south part of the county, from Highway 290 south, the quota will be 1 doe for each 100 acres.

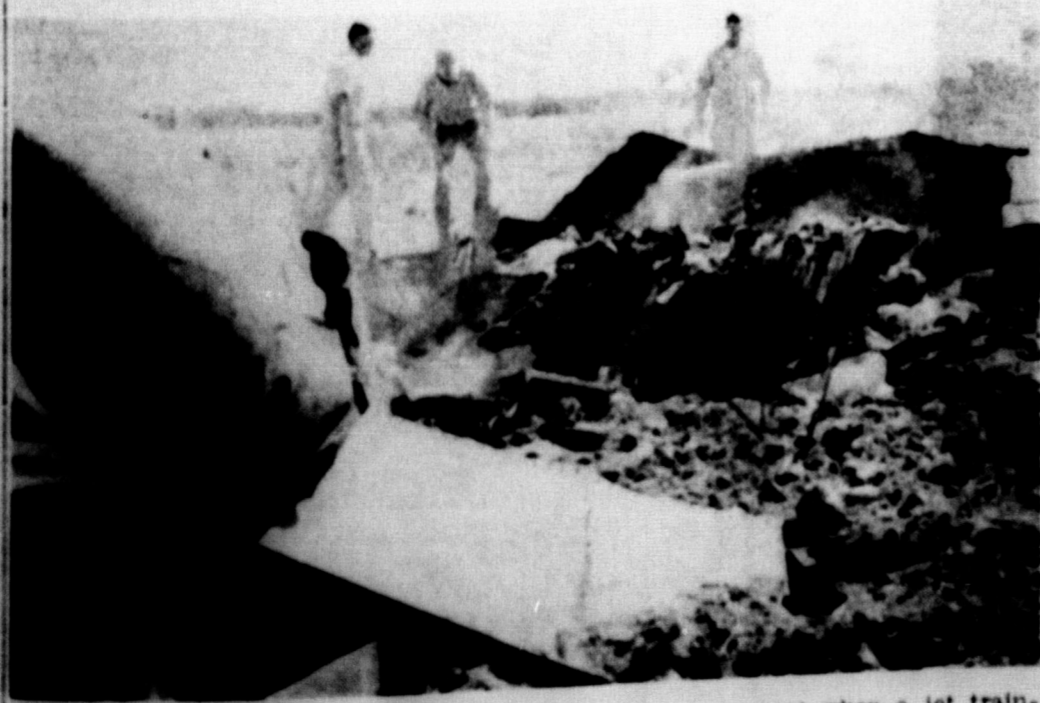
Mother Of Two Ozonans Buried In Hamlin Sun.

Surviving are three sons, five daughters, eighteen grandchildren, forty-seven great-grandchildren, one great-great-grandchild. Grandsons acted as pallbearers.

Crockett Wildcat Tests Ellenburger

It is the No. 1-14-32 University.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and east lines of 14-32- University, Elevation is 2,368 feet.

The failure, Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1-BW University, was abandoned Aug. 18, 1961, after unsuccessful tests of the Simpson through perforations at 9,272-282 feet and the Strawn through perforations at 8,503-551 feet.

Ozonan Helps Land Marines On Coast Of South Vietnam

USC Torraga (LST-26), Esmeralda's Mate, Fireman Jerry H. Johnson son of Mr. and Mrs. Felix Rivera of Ozona, Texas, participated in a operation "Patrol-Sentry" concentrated effort at determining the enemy's flow of men and materials from North Vietnam.

As a crewmember aboard the dock-landing ship USC Torraga, he helped land Marines along the northern coast of South Vietnam (near the Demilitarized Zone).

Leathernecks of the Second Battalion, Third Marine Regiment were moved into the area by amphibious landing craft and helicopters as two Navy destroyers stood off shore and provided support. The small craft patrolled near the shore to prevent the enemy's escape by sea and Marine Corps jet planes provided close air support for the ground forces ashore.

Tippett Field Gains Confirmer 11th JM Producer

The Tippett, West multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County gained its second 5,800-foot Wolfcamp gas producer and a 1/2-mile north-northeast extension to that pay with dual completion of Chambers & Kennedy, Midland, No. 2-A A-nacker, previously completed 5,800-foot detrital oil producer, eight miles south of McClain.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.94 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 45,338:1. Gravity of the liquid was 58.6 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 5,076-588 feet which had been acidized with 1,600 gallons.

It was finalized Aug. 30 from the 5,000-foot detrital zone for 127 barrels of oil through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,991-996 feet.

Location is 960 feet from the northwest and 3,250 from the northeast lines of 35-31-HATC.

The discovery Shell Oil Co. No. 1-35 Tippett, was finalized Aug. 30 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 9.4 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 175,000:1, was through perforations at 5,050-060 feet. It was dually completed as the 5,000-foot detrital gas-diatillase opener for 3.75 million cubic feet of gas, with gas-liquid ratio of 174,000:1, through perforations at 4,862 to 4,960 feet.

Shell Oil Co. No. 12 Mitchell, in 12-Q3-TCRR, assured 11th producer and a 3/4-mile south and very slightly east extension to the JM (Ellenburger gas) field of Crockett County, 37 miles southwest of Ozona, flowed 20 1/2 hours, making 265 barrels of load water, plus gas at the rate of 3.4 million cubic feet daily.

Flow was through a 17-64-inch choke and perforations at 13,467-14,790 feet, with tubing pressure of 2,400 pounds. Testing continued.

Shell Oil Co. No. 1-11 Mitchell, in 11-1-1&GN, 1/2-mile west and the same distance southwest, outputs to the Crockett County Ellenburger area of the Brown-Bassett multipay field 39 miles

Fourth Ellenburger Producer Assured For Tippett Field

Fourth Ellenburger producer extension to that pay has been assured in the Tippett, West multipay pay field of Crockett County with the flowing of 348 barrels of new oil, no water, in 16 hours, at Shell Oil Co., Midland, No. 2-34 Tippett, in 34-31-HATC, nine miles south of McCamey.

Flow was through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations at 6,439-637 feet, which had been acidized with 2,900 gallons. Gas-oil ratio was 29:

Earlier, it flowed one hour through a 24-64-inch choke making 21 barrels of fluid, out 40 to 50 per cent water.

Operator was preparing to put the well on a 10-64-inch choke and continue testing.

Southwest of Ozona, flowed 24 hours, making five barrels of load water, plus gas at the daily rate of 658,000 cubic feet.

He previously served at England AFB, La. The sergeant attended Ozona High School.

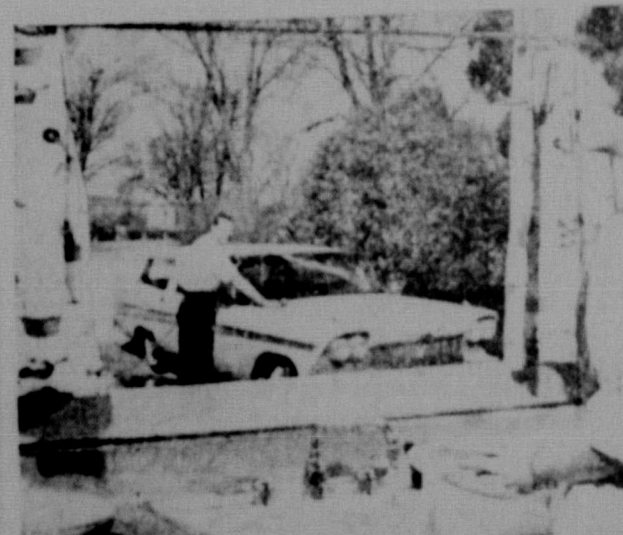

Rodman To Drill Four Outposts To Pierce Discovery

The Rodman Corp., Odessa, will drill four outposts to its No. 1 Ada Pierce, opener and lone producer of the proposed V. I. P. (Clearfork) field of Crockett County, 21 miles southwest of Ozona.

The No. 1-42 Pierce, 1 1/2 miles southwest, is 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of 42-A-TCRR. Contract is 2,600 feet; elevation, 2,277 feet.

The No. 1-105 Pierce, 1/2 mile north and very slightly east, is 1,320 feet from the south and 2,021 feet from the east lines of H. C. Fryer No. 105. Contract depth is 2,700 feet; elevation, 2,236 feet.

The No. 1-45 Pierce, 1 1/2 miles south and slightly east, is 1,320 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of 45-A-TCRR. Contract depth is 2,600 feet; elevation, 2,191 feet.

The discovery was finalized Oct. 9 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.6 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations at 2,090 to 2,433 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 60,000 pounds of sand. A 2 1/2-mile southeast outpost to the Ozona (Canyon gas) field, it was drilled to 7,600 feet and plugged back to 2,690 feet.

Adobe Oil Co., Midland, will re-enter, clean out to 8,200 feet and test the Canyon sand in No. 1 Childress, 600 feet from north and west lines of section 16, block CD, GC&SF survey, a former 8,510-foot Ellenburger failure in Crockett, six miles north of Ozona, 1 1/2 miles southeast of the Holt Ranch Ellenburger pool and 3 1/2 miles south of its North Ozona Canyons and oil pool opener. Tucker Drilling Co. originally drilled the wildcat and plugged at last April 18.

Dangerous Spread Screwworm Flies Cited By Stockmen

A potentially dangerous spread of screwworm cases over Texas Sheep and goat areas has followed Hurricane Beulah and extensive flooding.

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association has endorsed the urgent call of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation for stockmen to watch herds and flocks closely and to spray livestock for protection, said Worth Durham of Sterling City, president.

"The snowballing infestation since the rains puts us in danger of losing much of the ground we have gained," he declared. "Being rid of the screwworm has saved stockman hundreds of millions of dollars. But the sudden size of the problem is straining the physical and financial resources of the eradication program to the limit. It could get away from us, especially if we have a mild winter and screwworm flies survive."

"No one is safe. Screwworm cases can leapfrog across the state in a hurry. Individual stockmen can help hold our ground by spraying all their livestock and watching them closely."

This would be far cheaper than going back to doctoring screwworm cases the way we used to. Every case that goes untreated increases our danger."

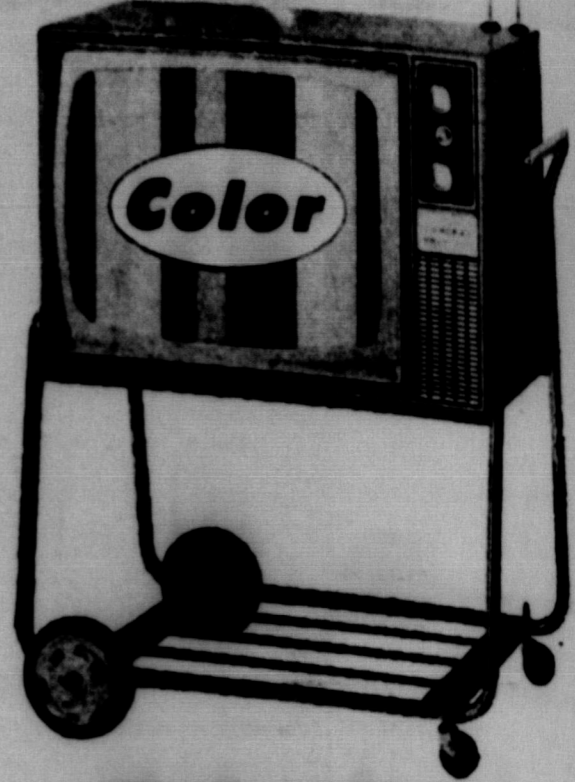
