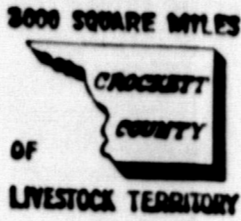

State To Take Over Fort Lancaster As State Park

A meeting last Thursday of local citizens and officials of the State Parks Board climaxed a three-year effort to have Fort Lancaster developed as a state park when state officials agreed to accept a deed for the property.

Arriving by plane around 11:00 a. m. Thursday, J. R. Singleton, executive director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Mark Good, director of the park service, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Meadows, land donors, and Dr. Edward B. Jeiks, archeologist at Southern Methodist University and chairman of the Fort Lancaster planning board, were met at the airport by members of the local planning board and Historical Survey committee, along with County Judge Bernice Jones. They proceeded to the fort site by automobile where they were joined for lunch by Sen. Dorsey Hardeman, Henry E. Meadows and son, Robert of Midland and other members of the Crockett County Historical Survey committee.

Others on hand for the luncheon at the fort were

Mrs. W. E. Friend Jr., Mrs. L. B. Cox, Jr., Mrs. E. H. Chandler, Mrs. Joe Clayton, Mrs. K. R. Stanton, hostess at the fort, and Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Harrell.

Claude Meadows of San Angelo, Henry Meadows of Midland and Mrs. Charles Benkenstein of Beaumont gave the 40 acres of land to the county. Since acquiring the land, the county has built a road to the site from the highway and some excavation of fort building foundations has been done under the direction of Dr. Jeiks.

The Historical Survey Committee has been in charge of the site since the county became the owner of the land. Under the direction of the committee the fort has been protected from tourists, who took many artifacts in years past.

It was agreed that deed to the land will be transferred to the state for development as a state park as soon as it can be drawn up and signed. After working out minor details, the formal signing of the deed is expected to take place.

Manuel Perez, 19 Dies In Wyoming Truck Accident

Funeral services for Manuel Perez, 19, were held at 4 p. m. Tuesday from the Catholic Church here with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home.

The youth was killed Friday morning in a truck accident near Arvada, Wyo. Another Ozona youth, Jesus Uriegas, 20, son of Mrs. Maria Uriegas, was injured in the crash. Both young men were employed by Teledyne Exploration Co. of Houston.

Perez was driving the truck which plunged down a steep embankment a mile north of the Wyoming town. He apparently died instantly.

He was born Feb. 4, 1948, in Ozona and attended Ozona schools. He was a Youth Corps graduate.

Both Engines Dead, Falling Jet Aircraft Narrowly Misses Ozona

SAYS 7-YEAR-OLD SON — Bravo, Pop! You Finally Got To Use The Chute

Major Wm. E. Hitchcock, who escaped without injury Monday afternoon when he and Lieut. Col. James Mullins were forced to eject from their two motored jet fighter plane over Ozona, found some consolation in his experience.

It was the first time for either officer to parachute from a plane.

"My 7-year-old son will be proud of me," Major Hitchcock said. "I have been flying planes in the Air Force for 14 years and my son can't understand why I have never used my parachute."

Two Arrested On Charges Of Cattle Theft

Two men were arrested in Big Lake Monday and charged with cattle theft in connection with the killing of three cows and the butchering of one at the Vic Montgomery ranch northwest of town late Friday night or early Saturday morning.

Arrested were Robert D. Hutchinson of Big Lake and James R. Hill of Big Spring. Hutchinson made bond and was released. Hill is still in Crockett County jail, in lieu of bond.

Sheriff Billy Mills was notified when the ranch foreman found a cow near one of the ranch roads that had been shot and had the hind-quarter removed. Investigation revealed two more dead cows. One had apparently been hit by a car and had its throat slashed.

Sheriff Mills was alerted by Big Lake authorities by radio on his way back to town. An investigation of one of the men's lodgings led to the arrest in Big Lake.

What might have been a major tragedy for Ozona was narrowly averted shortly after noon Monday when a U. S. Air Force jet fighter plane lost both engines at 20,000 feet directly over the city and plunged to earth just 3 1/2 miles southeast of downtown Ozona.

The plane's pilots, Lieut.

Record Numbers Attend Firemen's Assn. Convention

A larger attendance than was expected marked the Hill Country Firemen's Assn. Convention last Saturday here in Ozona. In expressing his appreciation to the merchants, local organizations and others who helped make the affair a tremendous success, Fire Chief Jim Marks said about 60 more participants than were expected arrived Saturday for the all-day affair.

Approximately 215 people had registered by noon Saturday and around 310 attended the barbecue after the races Saturday afternoon.

The races, which highlighted the convention, were held Saturday afternoon at North Elementary School. A large crowd of spectators watched the Brownwood Fire Department capture most of the first-place awards.

The six-man race was the third win in a row for Brownwood, giving them the revolving trophy to keep. In turn, they will donate another trophy. They also took first place in the one-man race and the men's water polo, taking home \$60 in money.

Santa Anna won the three-man race, collecting \$15 in prize money and were awarded the \$25 prize for the most man miles traveled.

In the ladies auxiliary races, Eldorado made a clean sweep. Eldorado took the \$10 ladies pumper race and water polo. Bell Harris of Eldorado collected first place prize money for the ladies nozzle race.

Other towns represented included Ballinger, Bangs, Brady, Coleman, Del Rio, Eden, Junction, Mason, Sterling City, Winters, Early and Sonora.

State Rep. Hillary Doran Jr. of Del Rio spoke at the morning business session. A dance at the country club climaxed the fall convention.

Col. James Mullins of Austin and Major William E. Hitchcock of Sacramento, Calif., parachuted safely from the stricken plane at 8,000 feet and landed without serious injury about a half mile from where the plane crashed on the W. E. Friend ranch. Colonel Mullins suffered a slight back injury and was flown back to their base at Bergstrom Air Force Base in Austin by ambulance plane. X-ray examination at the Crockett County Hospital revealed no bones were broken.

The Air Force officers reported that both engines "conked out" simultaneously while they were flying west at 20,000 feet directly above Ozona. The delta winged fighter craft, the type now in use in Vietnam, fell in a circular dive that barely veered away from the center of Ozona. The fuel laden craft exploded with terrific force on impact with the ground, blasting out a crater about five feet deep, down to solid rock. The plane disintegrated from the force of the explosion, bits and pieces of the craft from the size of a dime to a shattered motor being scattered as far away as 1,000 feet.

Remains of the craft in the crater burned and fire singed grass and brush for several hundred feet around the point of impact. Two trucks from the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department went to the scene and extinguished the flames.

Sheriff Billy Mills and his deputies, Highway Patrolmen and members of the Border Patrol unit stationed here rushed to the scene. Witnesses reported seeing the men parachute from the plane and officers spread out over the area to find the pilot.

Major Hitchcock was unhurt except for a small cut on his nose caused when the rush of air crushed his glasses to his nose upon ejecting from the plane. Colonel Mullins landed about a half mile from the spot where the plane struck and Major Hitchcock, communicating via walkie-talkie included in the parachute kit, found him and made him comfortable until the Janes ambulance arrived to bring him to the hospital. Major Hitchcock rode into Ozona with Sheriff Mills.

Sheriff Mills said Major Hitchcock was high in his praise of Ozona. "I have never seen a prettier place nor one with finer, more friendly people," the

PM Announced Early Holiday Mailing Schedule

Postmaster Floyd Hokit announced this week the schedules for overseas Christmas mailings. Surface mail should be posted before November 11, in order to reach its destination before Christmas. Space Available mail requires a December 1 mailing and airmail packages need to be in the mail before December 11 for Christmas delivery.

All articles to be mailed boxes of wood, metal, solid overseas should be packed in fiber board or strong corrugated boxes. A list should be attached to the box showing contents, name and address of the sender and the addressee. Customs declarations are required on many destinations. Information on customs may be acquired at the post office.

Restricted articles to all APO numbers are matches and lighter fluid. Cigarettes and tobacco are prohibited to some destinations. Domestic rates apply to APO numbers and must be fully prepaid. All APO numbers are 5 digits and are identical to zip codes. Airmail packages not in excess of 8 ounces are charged at 8 cents per ounce. Gift parcels weighing five pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, addressed to members of the Armed Forces overseas will be provided airlift service on a space available basis from either coast even though paid on a surface rate basis.

Domestic mail should be mailed to distant states before Dec. 4 with parcels to nearby areas mailed by Dec. 13 to insure delivery by Christmas. The name and address of the sender should be placed inside the package along with the addressee. Place outside label on one side only.

Information on greeting cards will be announced at a later date.

None Seriously Hurt In Rash Of Area Accidents

A rash of accidents in the area kept Highway Patrolmen Orville Perry and Dale Copeland busy the past week.

The officers investigated an accident just east of Barnhart in which a 1962 international truck and a 1965 GMC pickup figured in a rear-end collision. The truck was driven by Robert Allen Davis of Big Lake which up driven by Ira A. Wright struck the rear of the pick-up of Goldthwaite. There were no injuries and damage was light.

The same day a 1963 Mercury driven by Wm. C. Shirley of Odessa overturned on a double curve 34 miles south of Ozona on Highway 163. Shirley and a passenger, Dub Green, also of Odessa, were scratched and bruised but suffered no serious injury. Damage to the car was estimated at \$1600.

Another freakish accident occurred 9.7 miles west on U. S. 290. Euna Lee Covington was towing a 1953 Chevrolet belonging to Albert Lee Moody of Mobile, Ala., to Ozona for repairs in his father's garage. A Buick car driven by Isaac C. Corns of Northridge, Calif., was attempting to pass the double rig when the Chevrolet veered toward the center of the highway and sideswiped the Buick, throwing it into a bridge abutment. Corn's car was damaged about \$150 and about \$100 to the Chevrolet.

A minor collision on the Dairy Mart parking lot involved a 1961 Ford driven by Byron Stuart and a 1956 Plymouth driven by Mrs. Annie Bell Patrick. A bent fender and door resulted.

Yesterday morning, Mrs. Dorothy Friend intercepted a deer crossing Taylor Box road about 9 miles east of Ozona. Mrs. Friend was not injured, her car was damaged about \$100 and the deer was a total loss.

H. O. Akin, Jr., of Big Lake and Raymond Shattuck of Merton miraculously escaped serious injury yesterday afternoon when Akin lost control of the 1967 Ford, belonging to Shattuck, in attempting to miss a Crockett County road department dump truck. The car swerved off the highway to the left and then crossed back over the highway and turned over on the right barrow ditch. Akin and Shattuck wore safety belts and were only slightly hurt. Bobby Sanchez of Ozona was driving the highway truck.

Lions Gobble Junction Eagles, Sanderson Next

The Ozona Lions surprised the Junction Eagles with a 44-0 thrashing last Friday night in Junction, and tonight will be out to stretch their winning streak to three games when they meet the Sanderson Eagles at Lion Stadium at 8 p.m.

Coach Sam Mosley's crew is expected to handle the game with ease, and the Lions are in good physical shape.

They finished and passed 45 net yards against Junction while holding the Eagles to a mere 54 yards all on the ground as the Eagles could not connect with a pass.

Although the Lions dominated play in the first half, they could not get on the scoreboard, and the first half ended scoreless. But in the second half, the Lions roared across the goal line 5 times, three via the airways and two on the ground.

Starting for the Lions were Larry Kilgore (2 TD's) and Danny Maness and halfbacks Feet Coates and Rodolfo Pagan. David Huff passed for two of the scores and Buddi Clepper hit for one. Larry Webb added 1 extra point.

The most serious Lion error in the first half came after a 72 yard sprint by Buddy Diaz that carried to the Junction 14 yard line. A fourth down try at the five yard line, and the Eagles stopped the Ozona threat.

On the second play following the second half kickoff, the Lions picked up a loose chaction fumble at the Eagle 4 David Huff hit Kilgore along the sidelines with a pass and Kilgore pushed aside the Eagle defensive back and sprinted to the end zone. The pass and run was good for 41 yards. The extra try was good.

The second score came on the Lions' next possession. Feet Coates darted 23 yards of tackle to make the score 14-0. Only four minutes later QB David Huff passed from the Ozona 32 to Maness who grabbed the ball behind the defender at the Junction 13 and raced untouched into the end zone. The play covered 68 yards. Webb added an extra point as the Lions took a 19 point advantage at the end of the third quarter.

The Lions added 12 more points in the final stanza on a five yard pass from QB Clepper to Kilgore and a 22 yard scamper by Pagan, which ended a Lion drive of 47 yards.


