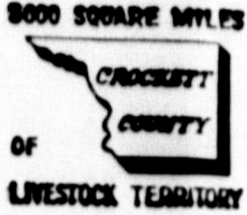

## Lions Confront Sonora Friday In Season Highlight

It may be the most important game of the year tomorrow night when the Ozona Lions travel to Sonora to face the defending state champions in the first district game for both teams. Game time in Sonora is 8 p. m. and school officials expect a capacity crowd to be on hand for this vital contest.

A win for either club would go a long way toward an 8A championship. And Coach Sam Massey's Lions could put themselves in the driver's seat with a win over the potent Broncos as well as a top for a couple of non-district setbacks. The Lions have been hampered by fumbles, interceptions, and bad breaks; and hope to get things going their way and pull an upset over the champs.

But the Lions must stop the running of All-State Ed Renfro and fullback Mike Gooney as well as the passing attack built around QB Mike Wuest. And the Broncos have a seasoned line with the extra experience of 5 playoff games last year.

In linemen Wesley West, Gary Sutton, John DeHoyos, Johnny Barber, Tom Davidson, Martin Farris, and Larry Kilgore, Ozona could have the answer to the Bronco running attack. A healthy line secondary of Rodney Pagan, Fleet Coates, and Donald Huff will be ready for the Broncos.

The Lions may be in their best shape of the year when they encounter the champs as several of the boys, hand-dropped the past two weeks, appear ready to give the biggest effort of the year.

In last week's 33-6 loss to Bronte, halfback Patan galloped over 90 yards, and Pagan and a well-placed halfback in Clepper, along with the tough fullback Clepper will be running into the big veteran Sonora line.

The starting lineup for Ozona has Donald Huff and Kilgore at ends, Sutton and West, tackles, Davidson and DeHoyos, guards, Farris, center, Pagan and Coates, halfbacks, Clepper, fullback, and David Huff, QB.

On defense, Beto Vargas will come in at corner spot, and Barber will be at a line-backer post.

## Harvick Ranch Gets Location For Gas Wildcat

The Rodman Corp., Odessa, will drill the No. 1-47 Harvick, an 8,000-foot Canyon and Wolfcamp wildcat, in southwest Crockett County, 30 miles southwest of Ozona, 5 1/2 miles south-southeast of the Ozona (Canyon sand) gas field, nine miles northeast of the one-well Morrison (Wolfcamp gas) field and three miles south of the firm's No. 1 A da Pierce, deep test which has assured gas production in the Permian.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 47-A-TCRR. Ground elevation is 2,161 feet.

The Tippett, West field of Crockett County gained its seventh McKee producer and a location southeast and southwest extension to that field and the lower Leonard pay and the lower Leonard production was extended 1/2 mile northwest in the Tippett field with dual completion of Chambers & Kennett. ## Heavy Property Damage In Three Auto Accidents

Three accidents were reported in Crockett County over the past week. There were no personal injuries, but property damage amounted to several thousand dollars.

The first and least serious of the three occurred Thursday afternoon around 4:00 o'clock at the intersection of Ave. J and Fifth St. when a 1966 Buick driven by Jacques Clark was in collision with a 1967 Chevrolet driven by Betty Baker. The Buick was damaged to the 11th, hit the rear of the Chevrolet, and the Chevrolet sustained damage around the intersection. The Chevrolet was traveling north on Ave. J, and the Buick was traveling south. Both vehicles were estimated at \$100 each.

Barber Hill, 29 miles west of Ozona, on Hwy. 290 was the scene of the second accident which occurred Thursday evening when a late model sports car and a truck collided almost head-on. A Lee-Way truck traveling east veered over into the west-bound lane when the tandem wheels struck Capt. Kenneth Welsh, USAF and a passenger traveling west in a new cloth top Triumph hit the truck. The sports car spun around in the highway several times before rolling down a 20-foot embankment. However, both men were unhurt and standing at the side of the highway when officers arrived upon the scene. Damage to the car was \$3,900.

Tuesday shortly after noon two men narrowly escaped serious injury in a two-car accident 14 miles north of Ozona. Donald P. Newman of Ozona was making a U-turn on Hwy. 163 in a 1962 Chevrolet when Alan A. Spinks of Midland, driving a 1963 Buick, and traveling north, applied his brakes, slamming the left rear of the Buick into the left rear fender of the Chevrolet. Neither man was injured, but damage was estimated at \$500 to the Chevrolet and \$400 to the Buick.

Highway patrolmen Orville Perry and Dale Copeland, DPS investigated the accident.

### Grand Jury Urges County Look Into Jail Improvements

A recommendation that the Commissioners Court of Crockett "look into improvement of jail facilities to comply with statutory regulations" was made by the grand jury when it reported to 112th District Judge Charles Sherrill at the September term.

The statutes require that counties provide separate facilities for juvenile and for women. The present county jail, built in 1892, is so constructed that separate facilities are impossible. Women prisoners and juveniles must be taken to neighboring counties if they are to be held by Crockett county authorities.

Word was received here Thursday of the death of former Ozonan, Paul Jacobs, in a Hobbs, N. M. hospital Wednesday night. Services for Mr. Jacobs were held at 3:00 p. m. Friday in Hobbs.

Mr. Jacobs was with Continental Oil Co. here for many years before moving to Hobbs in 1961. He had been in ill health for the past year.

Surviving are his wife, Ina, 2 sons, Jerry Jacobs of Santa Fe, and Joe Jacobs, 1 daughter, Jan Jacobs, of Hobbs.

### Bronte Attack Overcomes Lions In Final Warmup

A quick-striking Bronte team subdued the Lions 33-6 last Friday night in the last non-district warmup for the Lions. Ozona saw a first quarter lead of 6-0 disappear before halftime as the Longhorns struck quickly for three scores to hold a 19-6 at the half.

Doug McCutchen, 195 lb. All-Stater, led the Bronte scoring with 3 TD's, but it was the passing attack built around QB David Glenn, End Davis Corley, and McCutchen that did most of the damage as the trio combined for 200 yards total passing yardage.

The Lions scored first as they drove 34 yards for the TD with 5:30 remaining in the initial quarter. With Clepper, Pagan, and Diaz totting the ball, Ozona moved to the 1 where Clepper punched it over. The try for the extra point was good.

Recipe of the Week

From Kitty's Kitchen

Hot Orange Coffecake

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1/4 cup brown sugar  
1/2 teas. cinnamon  
2 teas. baking powder  
1/4 teas. soda  
1 teas. salt  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
grated rind of 1 large orange

2/3 cup orange juice  
1/2 cup and 1 tbs. melted butter or margarine  
2 eggs unbeaten

Combine one tablespoon flour, brown sugar and cinnamon in a small bowl and set aside. Turn oven to 350 degrees and grease 9-inch layer-cake pan. In large bowl combine 2 cups flour, baking powder, soda, salt, sugar and rind, then stir in, all at once, orange juice, 1/2 cup melted butter and eggs. Stir until just blended.

Spread batter in pan. In to brown-sugar mixture stir 1 tbs. melted butter, sprinkle this mixture on top of batter. Bake about 30 minutes or until cake tester comes out clean. Serve warm.

Gas Discovery in West Crockett

James L. Lamb, Jr., Midland, No. 1 Owens Crockett County Soma sand gas discovery, 10 miles southeast of Iraan and 1 1/2-mile southwest of a Soma gas producer in the Noelke field, has been completed for a calculated, absolute open flow of 225,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day.

Production was from open hole between 1,270-79 feet, which had been washed with 300 gallons of mud acid. Operator ran 4 1/2-inch casing to 1,270 feet, on total depth of 1,285 feet, and plugged back to 1,279 feet. The following tops were picked on derrick floor elevation of 2,539 feet: Yates, 1,106; Seven Rivers, 1,235 and Soma sand, 1,273 feet.

Location is 1,200 feet from the north and 990 feet from the east lines of 19-GG-GC&SF

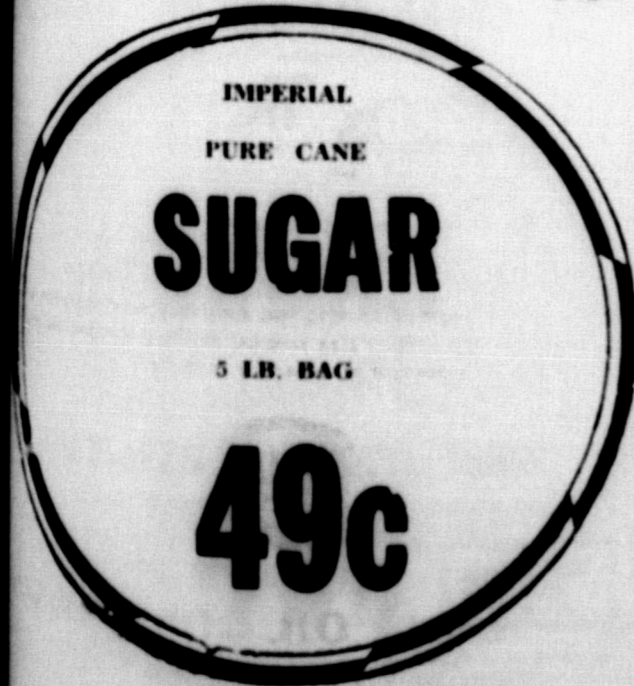



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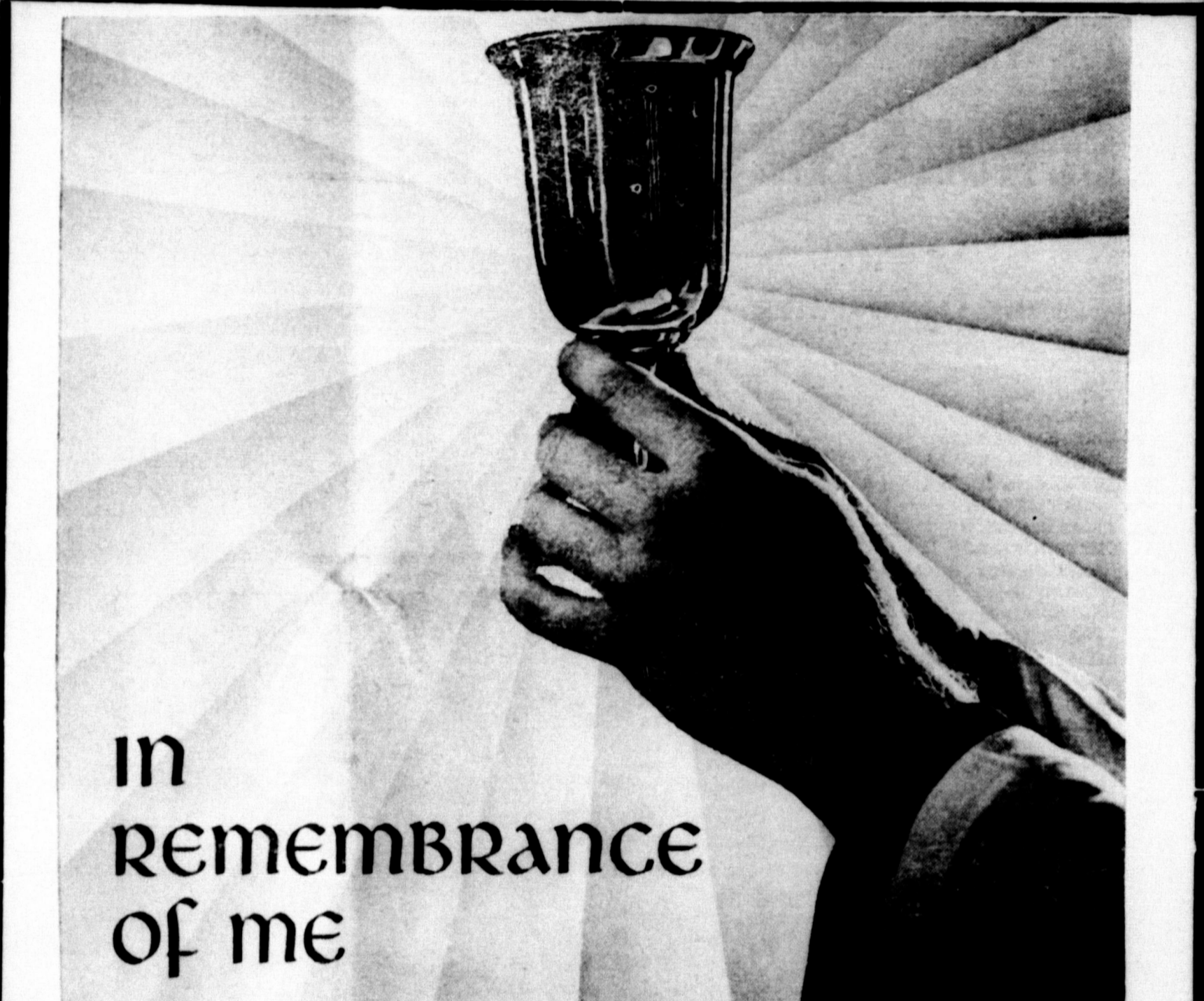

The attempt for the extra point was not good. The 78-yarder accounted for the majority of the 141 yard rushing total of the Longhorns as the Lions defense against the ground game was extremely tough.

On the first play following the recovery of an Ozona fumble, QB Glenn hit Corley with a 53 yard scoring pass. McCutchen kicked the extra point. Score Bronte 13 Ozona 6.

Three minutes later following a short Lion punt QB Glenn threw a scoring pass to McCutchen covering 30 yards. The extra point try no good.

Bronte scored its 4th TD in the 3rd quarter, driving 33 yards following an Ozona fumble. Charles Masterson capped the scoring drive with a 10 yard dash to paydirt. Again the attempt for extra point failed.

The final Longhorn score found McCutchen on the receiving end of a 42 yard scoring bomb from Glenn. Glenn then passed to end Corley for the 2 points. Bronte 33 Ozona 6.

Halfback Rodney Pagan, hard running Lion junior, was the workhorse of the Lion ground attack as he dug out 97 yards on 24 car-

ries into the strong Longhorn defense. Pagan's yardage accounted for a large portion of the Ozona total of 159.

Statisticwise the teams were even in first downs with 11 each; both teams attempted 15 passes with Ozona completing 5 for 82 yards and Bronte 9 for 200 yards. The Lions had 1 intercepted. The Longhorns punted for 36 yard average, and Ozona had a 21 yard average. The Lions led in rushing yardage 159 to 141. Ozona was penalized 4 times for 50 yards while Bronte had 90 yards on 7 penalties.

From the McKee it was finaled for 227.47 barrels of 41.8 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 629-1, was through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,830-848 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons.

From the lower Leonard, it was finaled for 114.25 barrels of 41.2 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,112-1, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,702-712 feet, which had been acidized with 1,250 gallons and fractured with 10,000 gallons.

Location is 3,558 feet from the northeast and 467 feet from the southeast lines of 34-31-H&TC.

Shell Oil Co. will drill the No. 1-37 Cowden one location south and slightly east of 5,000-foot detrital production and lower Leonard production and 1/2 mile west and slightly south of Hueco, 5,000 foot detrital and 4,950-foot Wolfcamp production in the same area.

Location is 467 feet from the northwest and 772 feet from the northeast lines of the southwest quarter of 37-31-H&TC.

The 5,000-foot detrital pay is in the Tippett, West field; the other zones, the Tippett field.

Gulf Oil Corp. No. 6-E Tippett, recent ninth 5,000-foot detrital producer in the Tip-

pett, West multipay field has been dually completed as a location southeast extension to lower Leonard oil production in a west area of the Tippett multipay field.

It was finaled for 66.93 barrels of 31.7 gravity oil, plus 4.83 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,494-1. Production was through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,705-09 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons.

Triple completion is scheduled from the McKee through perforations at 5,858-60 feet.

It was finaled Sept. 19 from the detrital for 210.45 barrels of oil, through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,008-10 feet.

Location is 2,630 feet from the northeast and 660 feet from the southeast lines of 36-31-H&TCT.

Shell Oil Co. was waiting on cement after running 4 1/2-inch liner from 11,779 feet to 15,000 feet, the total depth at its No. 1-111 Mitchell, in 111-1-I&GN, 1/2-mile west and the same distance southwest outpost to the Crockett County portion of the Brown-Bassett multipay field.

Tested in open hole at 12,704-12,733 feet, possibly Connell or Ellenburger, using 1/4 by 1/2 inch choke, it flowed gas at the rate of 35 million cubic feet daily.

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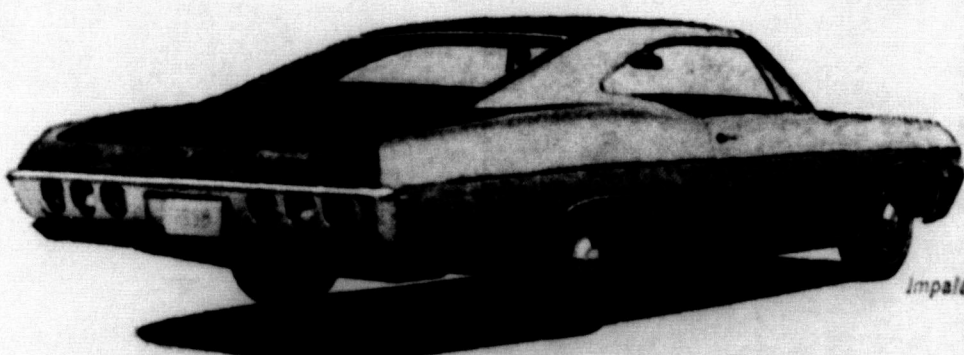
