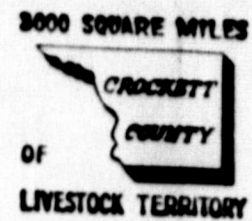

Crockett Gets 2 Gas Discoveries In Noelke Field

M&G and Schneider, Iraan completed as Permian gas discoveries two Crockett County wildcats 6 1/2 miles southeast of Iraan.

The No. 1-C (formerly 1-E) Half, 1/2 mile west of Yates oil production in the Noelke multipay field, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 450,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day from a hole at 1,226-1,720 feet.

The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,329 feet: Soma sand, 1,000 feet; Seven Rivers, 1,240 feet; and Brayburg, 1,650 feet.

Location is 860 feet from the south and 1,250 feet from the east lines of 66-1-I&GN. The No. 1-D (formerly No. 1) Half - Bivins, 2,200-foot west of Yates oil production in the Noelke multipay field, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 210,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day from open hole at 1,369-1,770 feet.

The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,403 feet: Seven Rivers, 1,369 feet; and Queen, 1,460 feet.

Location is 450 feet from the north and 1,090 feet from the east lines of 65-1-I&GN. Shell Oil Co. No. 4 Mitchell in 10-Q3-TCRR, assured producer in the JM (Ellenburger gas) field of Crockett County, 34 miles southwest of Ozona, flowed 3,220,000 cubic feet of gas and 69 barrels of load water in 24 hours.

Flow was through a 48-64-inch choke and perforations at 13,658-14,193 feet. Testing continued.

After leading 11-9 in the first quarter the Lions were soundly thrashed by their McCamey opponents in the feature game of the night. Stamping for Ozona were David Huff, Donald Huff, Randal Clepper, Marlin Farris and Beto Vargas. Donald Huff, Farris and Clepper fouled out and were replaced by Fleet Coates, Rodney Pagan and Johnny Barbee. Farris hit for 15 and Vargas for 12 to head the scoring for Ozona.

It looked as if the Lions were on their way to their first victory here Tuesday night when they were leading 32-28 at halftime. They maintained a slim lead going into the fourth quarter but the Cranes came on to take the win by a 9 point margin.

Beto Vargas was high point man for Ozona, hitting for 16 points. Huff and Kilgore each had 8 points.

Re-Entry, Two Outposts Slated In Crockett Co.

Shell Oil Co. will re-enter and plug back to 13,000 feet for completion attempt as a Bromide (Simpson) pay opener at its No. 1-111 Mitchell, near Ellenburger gas field in the Crockett County portion of the Brown Bassett multipay field, 39 miles southwest of Ozona.

Originally drilled to 15,000 feet, it was plugged back to 14,960 feet and completed Oct. 27 for 2.4 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations at 14,026-819 feet, which had been acidized with 35,000 gallons. While being drilled it tested open hole at 12,704-33 feet, making gas at the rate of 35 million cubic feet daily. Location is 770 feet from the south and 3,985 feet from the east lines of 111-1-I&GN. Derrick floor elevation is 2,468 feet.

The Rodman Corp., Odessa will drill two outposts to the two-well V.I.P. (Clearfork oil and gas) field of southwest Crockett County, 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

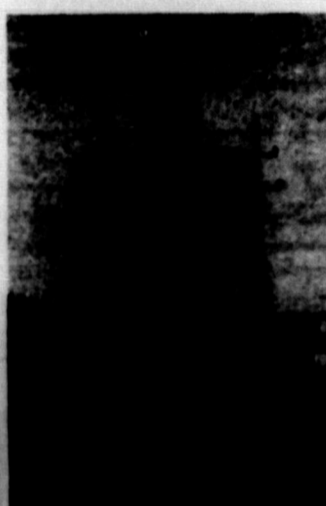
Both projects, on 320-acre leases, will be drilled with rotary to 2,700 feet. The No. 2-105 Pierce, one mile north and very slightly east of the gas opener and 2 1/2 miles southeast of the oil opener, is 3,960 feet from the south and 2,019 feet from the east lines of H. C. Fryer No. 105. Elevation is 2,264 feet.

It is 1/2 mile north of the firm's No. 1-105 Pierce, same section, which reportedly is completed as a gas well. (Continued on Last Page)

Gary Sutton, Fleet Coates, Marlin Farris and Johnny Barbee have been named to the First Team All-District as voted by the District 8A Coaches. Sutton, a senior was one of four players named to both the offense and defensive teams. Others making the squad both ways were Ed Lee Renfro and Nino Perez of Sonora and Pat Gladden of Iraan.

Coates made the first team offensive squad at halfback and Farris and Barbee were named to the first team defensive unit at guard and linebacker.

Other Lions named to the All-District Squad were Wesley West, 2nd team offense and defense; Larry Kilgore, defensive linebacker and offensive end 2nd team offense and defense; John DeHoyos, 2nd team defensive guard; and Farris at a 2nd team offensive center spot.

Receiving honorable mentions were Randal Clepper, defensive halfback; Coates, defensive safety; and Rodney Pagan, offensive halfback. Sutton, a solid 225 pounder was named to the All-District team for the third straight year, making the team both ways the past two years.

Coates, who scored 15 TD's to pace the Lions, finished second in district scoring behind Renfro.

Farris at 6 feet 5 inches, is the tallest player in the district, played offensive center and defensive guard for the Lions.

Barbee, only a junior, as are Farris and Coates, led the Lions in tackles for the '68 season with 88.

Warm Weather Hinders Hunters Harvert Meager

Due to warm weather, deer hunters have fared rather poorly for the most part in this area. In spite of the expected record harvest and the early opening date very few trophies have been brought in and the season has not lived up to expectations thus far.

Around 125 hunters inquired about leases at the chamber of commerce thus far in the season. About one-third of this number were looking for season leases and the remainder wanted day leases. Those interested in leases for the season came in or called around the time the season opened Nov. 11. Some of both types leases are still open at this time, according to a C of C spokesman.

At the beginning of the season there were 14 day leases listed and 13 season leases on the list at the chamber building. The list is kept up to date and posted on the front window, in order to enable hunters to obtain lease information any hour of the day or night.

Some cold weather should bring bucks out into the open and bring better hunting before the season ends January 1.

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THE LESSON OF THANKSGIVING

It was 347 years ago this month that the Pilgrims arrived off Cape Cod after two months on the stormy Atlantic in the small and heavily-loaded Mayflower. Under terms ordained by their creditors, they were obliged to undertake a communal form of organization, and to establish a joint stock. Various troubles and unforeseen expenses, including a false start and abandonment of the Speedwell when she proved unseaworthy, had substantially increased their borrowings from the speculators who financed the colonizing. The Pilgrims were heavily in debt.

After exploring the Cape for a suitable site, but before landing, the 41 adult male passengers signed the famous "Mayflower Compact," providing for the enactment of laws, and promising "all due Submission and Obedience." They landed at Plymouth on December 21, 1620.

During the remainder of that winter and the next, the Pilgrims followed the terms imposed by their creditors, with everything owned in common and put into a "common store." By the end of the winter of 1621-22, more than half of the colony had died of starvation and illness accentuated by malnutrition.

Then, in the words of Governor Bradford, "that they might still thus not languish in misery," it was decided that "they should set corn every man for his own particular." Every family was assigned a parcel of land, to till and to harvest.

"This," the Governor wrote, "made all hands very industrious, so as much more corn was planted than otherwise would have been."

From the bumper harvest the Pilgrims arranged a beautiful Thanksgiving, and gave thanks not only for their material blessings, but also for the system which produced it, and gave them dignity and well-being.

Each of the separate colonies later adopted the New England custom, and the first President, Geo. Washington, at the request of both

Houses of Congress, issued the first national Thanksgiving Proclamation on October 3, 1789.

Let it be remembered on Thanksgiving Day this year, and in every other year of Our Lord, that the custom began because a system was changed — from collectivism to private enterprise. And let us rejoice and give thanks that our nation learned so early the merits of a system which "made all hands very industrious."

UNICEF — ALL TRICK AND NO TREAT

Some startling facts are gleaned from a recent issue of "Free Enterprise" about UNICEF — the United Nations' International Children's Fund.

"The Communists and their socialist allies never quit. They constantly devise schemes to use the efforts and money of free people whom they wish to enslave. It is amazing how many Americans blindly contribute to the efforts and funds that are used to enslave them. A case in point is UNICEF."

"All United Nations agencies are controlled by Communists and socialists. UNICEF successfully extracts

Even presidents of the United States have been fooled into endorsing this 'humanitarian' appeal. Americans are easily touched by the plight of innocent children. The Communists and their socialist allies make such good use of this human appeal that many Americans have their children out on Halloween collecting funds (trick or treat) for UNICEF.

"Also, before and after Halloween, both women and children are raising money for UNICEF by selling Christmas cards which are anything but Christian. All Communists are atheists and not one of these Christmas cards depicts God or Christ in any form.

"In 1960 Castro received \$123,000 collected by American children through the UNICEF Halloween 'trick or treat' drive or through the sale of Christmas cards. Over \$670,000 was earmarked for Communist Algeria.

"In 1962 Communist Poland received \$284,728 and Communist Yugoslavia \$147,430 — just to mention a few Communist nations receiving funds.

"In 1961 the U. N. Armed forces in the Congo used \$10 million of UNICEF funds for munitions and arms to crush the anti-Communist government of Katanga. Some UNICEF supporters deny this but Congressman H. R. Gross of Iowa said (Congressional Record 6-19-61) 'I can tell you that money most assuredly was taken from the Childrens Fund (UNICEF) to finance the United Nations Congo operation.' Thus the Childrens Fund was used to ruthlessly slaughter innocent men, women and children in the Congo.

"May God forgive us for being so naive and trusting of the 'authorities' in the Godless United Nations. Why do we have to help them with our own children and our own money to destroy us?"

Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

A one-year extension of the so-called antipoverty program was voted by the House last week. This multi-billion-dollar depression-type project authorizes \$1.6-billion for the next fiscal year.

Hearings and debate on the issue disclosed that vast amounts of antipoverty money has been expended on agitators, demonstrators, and people with subversive records. Likewise, antipoverty workers have engaged in labor union organizing drives with a good many of them joining picket lines during strikes while on OEO's payroll.

The companion Senate bill, already approved in the Senate, authorizes \$2.2 billion. After a hard battle, the economy bloc in the House managed to cut the amount down to \$1.6 billion. Thirteen Texans voted for the cut while 9 favored the higher spending figure.

The bill was improved a bit with approval of an amendment which will prohibit OEO from spending any of this antipoverty money on unlawful demonstrators or on defending such characters if they commit crimes during riots and demonstrations. All Texans but two voted for that amendment.

Hearings developed instances where OEO has used antipoverty money in defense of anti-poverty enrollees and workers who are accused of various criminal acts. In one case 10 peace-niks invaded St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York during a service, disrupted the services, and condemned the US for our involvement in Vietnam. OEO put up the money to hire lawyers to defend them.

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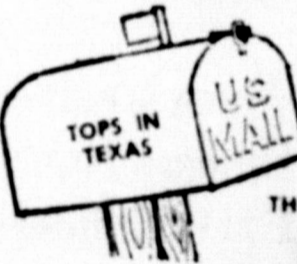
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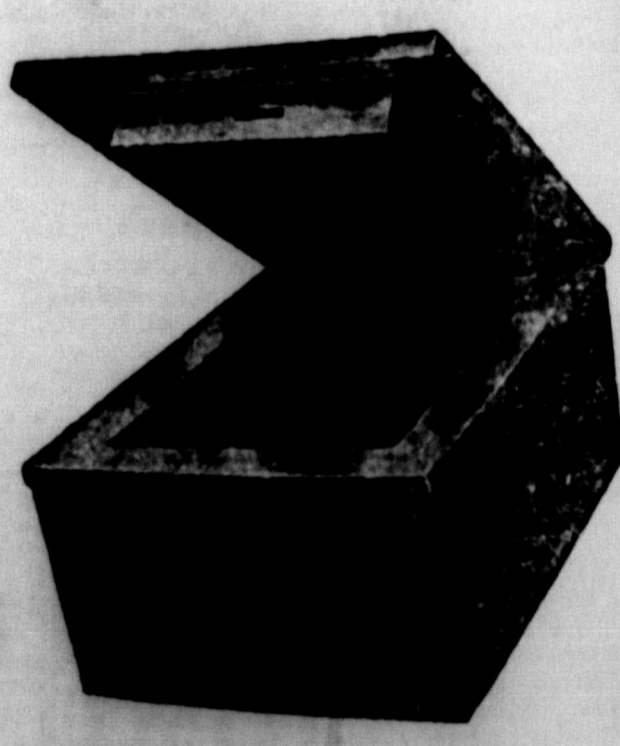

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PUBLIC NOTICE
REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND DEED OF CERTAIN WATER RIGHTS

There is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1907 (Article 7549, Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights under Article 7549, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to divert or use public water for other than domestic or livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued under the Irrigation Act of 1889 and 1895 which were filed with the State of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under the Texas Water Rights Commission, Section 4 does apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined in the Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1967, every person claiming a water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which Section 4 applies shall be returned only if valid under the law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use during any year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant's riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be returned to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to

1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

The No. 1-156 J. M. Baggett, 2 1/2 miles east-northeast of the prospect and 1 1/2 miles northeast of its re-entry, is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 155-0-GH&SA.

The No. 2-155 Clay Adams Estate, 1 1/2 mile north of the re-entry and 1 1/2 miles east-northeast of the prospect, is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 155-0-GH&SA.

The No. 1-125 J. M. Baggett, 2 1/2 miles east-southeast of the prospect and 1 1/2 miles east-northeast of the re-entry, is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 125-0-GH&SA. The firm earlier had scheduled two 5,500 foot wildcats.

The shut-in project, W. W. Meeker, Midland, No. 1-153 Adams, was drilled to 5,000 feet and reportedly made 200,000 cubic feet of gas per lay from unreported Canyon section.

The re-entry, the firm's No. 1 Clay Adams, Estate, recently was scheduled to plug back to 5,500 feet. A 12,827-foot Ellenburger failure, it originally was drilled by Honolulu Oil Corp. and Herman Brown as the 1 Emma Lou Adams, and abandoned March 9, 1961.

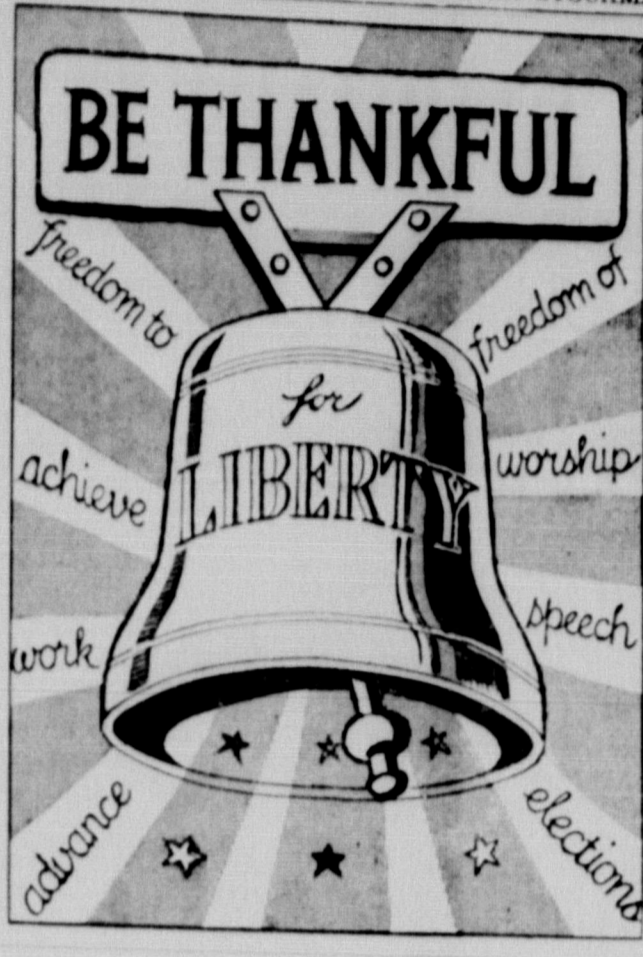

1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1 qt. milk
1/2 cup sugar
3 eggs
1/2 teas. vanilla
1/2 teas. rum (or lemon) flavoring
Nutmeg

Soften gelatin in 1/2 cup milk and scald remaining milk. Dissolve the softened gelatin in the hot milk and add sugar. Separate eggs. Beat yolks slightly and add a small amount of the hot mixture to yolks, then stir in the hot mixture. Cool. Add vanilla and flavoring. Pour into 2 refrigerator trays and freeze until firm. Turn into a chilled bowl and beat with beater until fluffy and smooth. Beat whites of eggs until tips just bend over and fold into mixture. Sprinkle with nutmeg and serve from punch bowl in chilled cups or glasses. Makes about 2 quarts.

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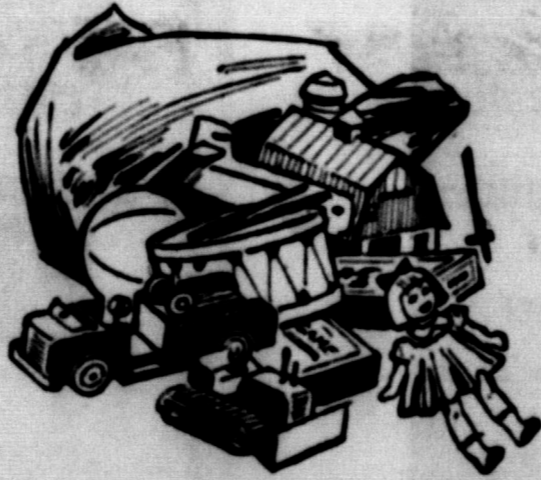

The No. 1-106 Pierce, 1 1/2 miles northeast of gas and 3 3/4 miles southeast of oil, is 6,473 feet from the south and 1,580 feet from the east lines of N. Aquiler No. 106. Elevation is 2,316 feet.

It is 1 1/2 miles east of the No. 1-105 Pierce.

The gas opener, the firm's No. 1 Ada Pierce, was finished Oct. 9 for a calculated absolute open flow of 2.6 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 2,090 to 2,533 feet.

The oil opener, the firm's No. 1 Victor Pierce, was finished Oct. 11 to pump 14 barrels of 33 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 100-1, through perforations at 2,245-331 feet.

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Woman Medical Missionary Speaks At First Baptist

Dr. Kathleen Jones, Southern Baptist missionary, will speak at the First Baptist Church Sunday morning at the 11:00 a. m. service.

Dr. Jones is assigned to Kediri, on the island of Java. She is presently on furlough in the States before returning to her medical ministry which is now based in a 120-bed Baptist hospital. During her past term of service she spent a year on the Indonesian island of Sumatra, where she helped start a medical clinic in Bukittinggi.

Indonesian government officials warned Dr. Jones, an obstetrician, that few people would go to her for treatment because she was a Christian woman doctor.

However, she and her two missionary nurses, working in a pioneer clinic on a Kediri riverbank, treated 10,000 persons (mostly Muslim) during the first year of Baptist medical work in the island nation. The year was 1955.

Dr. Jones says she cannot remember ever wanting to be anything but a doctor, but she was 14 before she knew she had to be a missionary

doctor.

The daughter of Southern Baptist missionaries, she was born in Brazil and lived in that country until she was eight years old. Then her parents returned to the States and she graduated from high school in Richmond, Va., where her father served on the Foreign Mission Board headquarters staff.

She graduated from Baylor University and Southwestern Medical School of the University of Texas in Dallas.

Before missionary appointment in 1953 she was an intern at Baylor University Medical Center, a resident at Baptist Memorial in San Antonio and St. Paul's Hospital in Dallas, and assistant to a physician in San Antonio.
