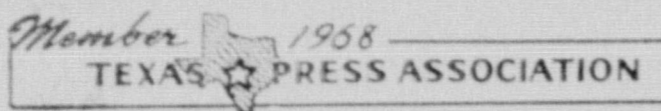

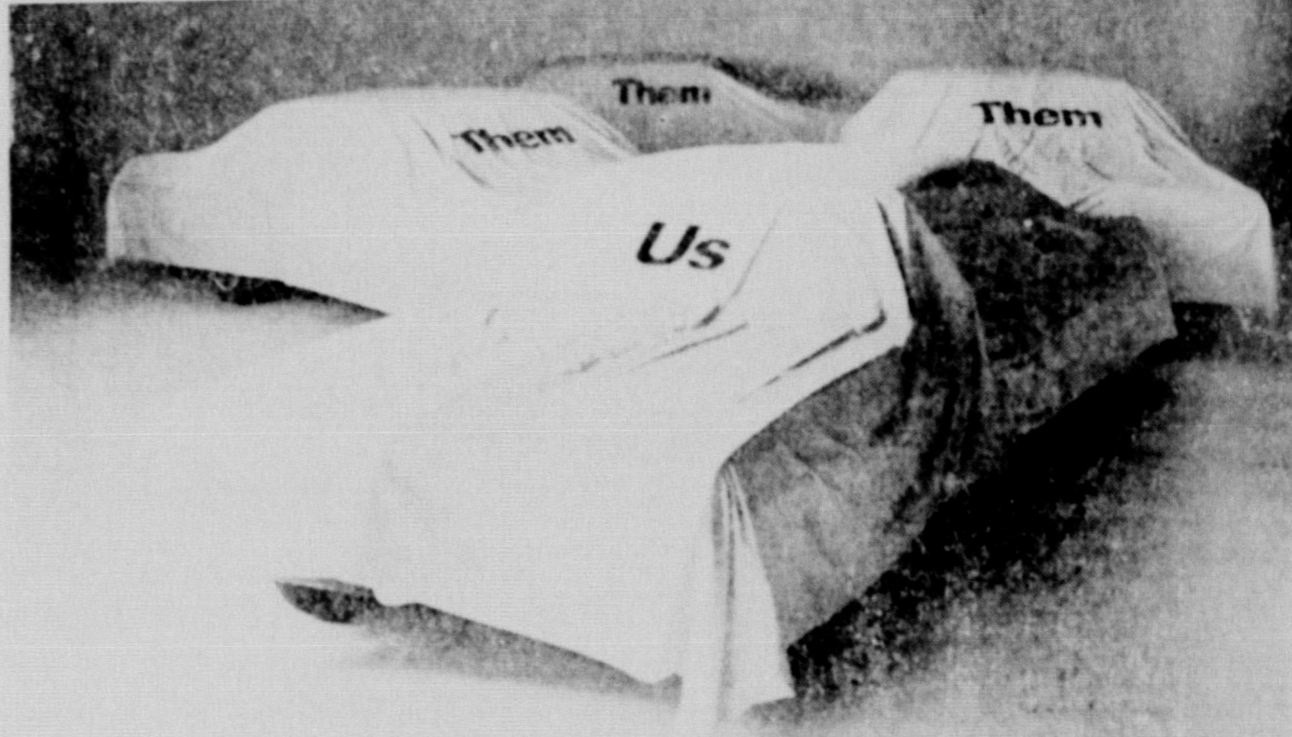

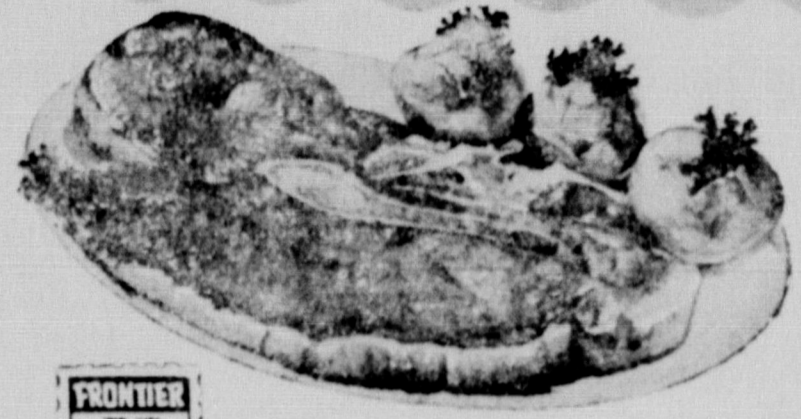

7 Million Motor Vehicles Will Be Registered In '68

Austin - State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall today announced that Texas will register approximately 7 million vehicles during 1968.

All 1968 Texas license plates have been delivered to the 254 County Tax Assessor-Collectors for issuance during February and March of 1968.

Of the estimated 7 million vehicles to be registered, the Texas Highway Department believes that 4.75 million will be passenger cars and 1.9 million will be commercial trucks and truck-tractors.

Trailers and motorcycles will account for the balance.

The most dramatic increase is expected in the motorcycle category, based on the past two years' experience. While passenger car and commercial truck registration will increase about 3 1/2 per cent, motorcycle registration is expected to increase 16 per cent.

Motor vehicle owners can avoid long lines by registering during the month of February, rather than waiting until the March rush.

Owners should bring four items to the Tax Collector's office when registering vehicles: certificate of title 1967 license receipt, current resident address, and zip code.

State law requires each owner to register his vehicle

Crockett Draws Wildcat Test, 2 Field Extenders

Continental Oil Co., Midland, will drill a 9,450-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 14 miles northeast of Iraan and 1 1/2 miles south of the Escondido (Ellenburger and Fusselman) field, but separated by Ellenburger failures, and 2 1/2 miles southwest of the World, West (Strawn) field.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and east lines of 35-1-GC&SF, Abst. 1746.

Shell Oil Co. has reclassified as a 5,000-foot detrital oil producer its No. 1-36 Tippet, former gas-distillate discovery from that pay and from the 5,050-foot Wolfcamp zone in the Tippet.

It was potentialized for 82 barrels of 50 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 7,927-1, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,862 to 4,960 feet.

Original completion was July 31 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3,750,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 174,000-1, through the above perforations.

From the 5,050-foot Wolfcamp gas zone, it was finaled at the same time for a calculated, absolute open flow

of 9.4 million cubic feet of gas daily, plus 3.15 barrels of condensate and 7.35 barrels of water, through perforations at 5,050-60 feet.

Location is 467 feet from the northeast and 660 feet from the north west lines of the southwest quarter of 36-31-H&TC.

The Farmer (San Andres) field of Crockett County was extended 1/2 mile south and southwest with completion of Hanson & Allen, Inc., Midland, No. 2-12 University, 15 miles south of Big Lake.

It was finaled natural for a daily pumping potential of 22 barrels of 32 gravity oil, plus 60 barrels of water, through perforations at 2,299-531 feet.

Location is 1,787 feet from the north and 467 feet from the east lines of 12-50 University Lands.


