## Lions Win Two For 4-1 Record; Meet Iran Fri.

Coach Charles Spieker's Lions picked up two wins last week and ran their district record to 4 wins and 1 loss.

In Sanderson Friday night the Lions picked up a 72-66 victory behind the hot shooting of Marlin Farris who hit for 35 pts. to take scoring honors. Beto Vargas added 13 points for the Lions, and David Huff swished the nets for 12.

Tuesday night the Lions beat Rankin 65-50. Vargas was high point man with 24, followed by Farris with 14.

The B-team won 54-40 over Sanderson with Mike Jenkins hitting for 14 points. Tuesday night they took a 65-43 win over Rankin with Arturo Torres hitting for 20 points, followed by Jenkins with 16. Coached by Ned Fowler, the B-team is undefeated in district play and has a record of 5 wins.

The Lions will journey to Iran tomorrow night for their last district game. A win over Iran would throw the two teams into a tie for the West Zone championship. Iran is 5-0 for the season and the only team to beat the Lions in district play. The B-team will try to close out their season with an unblemished record. They beat the Iraan-B here earlier in the season.

A win for the Lions would mean a play-off game with the Iraan five for the zone championship and a chance to meet Sonora, East Zone Champions, for the district title.

The heavy machine began sliding on a grade and overturned. Puente was strapped to the seat when the machine overturned, but managed to free himself. He was not seriously injured, but the machine was damaged to the extent of \$20,000.

## Driver Suffers Leg Fracture In Pickup Spinout

One man was seriously injured and several hundred dollars worth of property damage done in automobile accidents during the past week.

Sunday noon, Raymond Martinez suffered a compound fracture of the left leg when the old model Chevrolet pickup he was driving went out of control on loose gravel on a county road south of town and overturned. The pickup was a total loss.

Thursday night Arvel Gilliam backed his 1965 Chevrolet station wagon out of a drive at 1206 Hereford St. and hit the door of a parked '66 Plymouth belonging to Ed Collett. There was no damage to the station wagon and damage to the Plymouth was \$45.

A two-car collision at the intersection of Ave. 1 and 5th St. Saturday afternoon caused an estimated \$1250 damage to the automobiles involved but there were no personal injuries. The mishap occurred when a 1964 Ford driven by Sandra Welch and traveling north on Ave. 1 collided with a 1963 Chevrolet driven by Wesley Key and traveling west on 5th St. Damage to the Ford was estimated at \$600 and to the Chevrolet \$650.

## Kenny McMullan Candidate for No. 3 Precinct Post

Kenny McMullan, Crockett County rancher, this week announced that he is a candidate for commissioner of precinct 3.

Mr. McMullan, a lifetime resident of Crockett County, operates the Mrs. Floyd McMullan ranch, northwest of Ozona. He is a director of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association and has served a tour of duty in the U. S. Army. His wife is the former Glenda Friend of Ozona.

"While we are experiencing the influence of Federal control in Government at all levels, I consider that the principal emphasis should be placed at the local level," McMullan said in his announcement statement. "Homegrown government is vitally important to those of us in Crockett County who wish to retain our identity as a responsible, self-sufficient community."

"Being a native, I am particularly aware of the needs of the people in Crockett County and I stand ready to give of my time and efforts to conscientiously carry forward the strengthening of our county government," McMullan concluded.

McMullan's candidacy is subject to action of the Democratic Primary.

## Sheriff Believes Robbery Suspect Fled Into Mexico

Sheriff Billy Mills reported this week that the suspect in the Jan. 25 burglary of the Dairy Mart had not been apprehended, but investigation revealed that he is an escapee of the Indiana State Penitentiary. He was serving a term for armed robbery when he escaped in 1966.

Sheriff Mills said leads indicate that the suspect might have fled into the interior of Mexico.

### County Political Posts Sought By GOP Candidates

Two Republicans broke the ice in Crockett County and filed for commissioner's posts in precinct 1 and 2 before the filing deadline Tuesday. James Baggett filed for Commissioner in precinct 1 and Charles Applewhite filed for the precinct 2 post.

Both men will be assured of a place on the ballot in November for the general election since they are both unopposed in the May 4 Republican Primary.

Baggett resides with his wife, Willie V., at the ranch south of town where he was reared. He is a lifetime resident of precinct 1 and has operated the ranch there for many years. The Baggetts have three children, two daughters, Ann and Sally, who are married and have families; and a son, Jimmy, who is presently serving with the Special Forces in Viet Nam. Always active in the civic affairs of Crockett County, Baggett is a past Republican county chairman and served as general chairman of the Diamond Jubilee in 1966.

In announcing his candidacy he stressed the importance of a two-party political system at the local level as well as the national level.

Charles Applewhite, who will be the Republican candidate in precinct 2, has lived in Ozona the past 22 years and is part-owner and manager of Ozona Butane Co. He came to Ozona after serving four years in the Army, where he saw action in the European theatre during World War II. He resides at his home in precinct 2 with his wife, Elizabeth. The Applewhites have four children, Johnny, Vicki, Jack and Jill. All four children are presently attending various colleges and universities in Texas.

Applewhite is no stranger to county government, being the son of a former county judge of Concho County where he was born and reared. Armed with a good knowledge of the operation of county government and with his experience in business, he feels he is ably qualified for the office he seeks.

In announcing his candidacy, Applewhite said he felt his seeking the position on the Republican ticket would give voters a choice in the general election in November.

Attorneys for Crockett County Water District No. 1 were preparing an answer here today to the suit filed yesterday in U. S. District Court in San Angelo by the United States government alleging the district owes the government \$88,159.72.

When Ozona Air Force Station was under construction in 1958, the district agreed to install water facilities for the base and the government provided \$97,490.70 for cost of construction and water connections. Under the agreement the district would repay the government by giving the air station a 50 per cent credit on each bill for water service.

### Brother Of Ozona Dr. Sherrill Dies In Houston Wed.

Word was received here yesterday of the death early Wednesday morning of Dr. E. Allen Sherrill, Jr., in Houston, brother of Dr. Lloyd Sherrill of Ozona. He had been ill for some time.

Surviving are the widow and one daughter; three brothers and three sisters. Dr. Sherrill was one of four doctor brothers of Houston all sons of a doctor. Two of the Sherrill brothers are practicing in Houston and Dr. Lloyd Sherrill was associated with the brothers in the Houston practice before deciding to move to Ozona.

Dr. and Mrs. Sherrill left Ozona early Wednesday morning upon learning of his brother's death. Funeral arrangements were pending.

### Canyon Sand Test Spotted In County

B. W. Wiseman, Jr., Midland, will drill the No. 1-101 Crystelle Childress, a 6,600-foot Canyon sand wildcat, in southwest Crockett County, 23 miles southwest of Ozona and two miles south and slightly west of production in the Ozona (Canyon sand gas) field.

Location, on a 320-acre lease, is 1,320 feet from the south and 1,600 feet from the west lines of 101-WC-A Vasquez, Abst. 5036. Estimated ground elevation is 2,250 feet.

When the station was abandoned in 1963, the directors of the district elected to leave the water system intact in order to make the property more saleable for the government. Without the water system, the salvage value of the property amounted to \$50,000. However, with the system the government sold the property for \$178,000 for on site use.

The district has made several attempts to settle with the government, but had received no reply until yesterday when the suit was filed. The suit alleges that under the agreement the district agreed to repay the remainder of the loan in event the base should be closed down. Petition alleges the district has failed to do so.

The water district was serving the air station on a non-profit basis and has continued to serve the area, now known as Crockett Heights, operated by purchasers of the property, under the same arrangements as customers in Ozona, although the site is 5 miles from town.

In its many attempts to settle with the government, the district offered to pay salvage value and leave the equipment usable. However, since the government did not reply to any of the district's correspondence, it has continued to serve the area.

### Louis Powers Operates Sonora Livestock Pens

Louis Powers, brother of Ozonan Tom Powers and frequent Ozona visitor, recently assumed operations of the Sonora Stockpens Inc. The new company will be known as the Powers Livestock Sale company.

Powers has participated in the Annual Ozona Junior Rodeo for many years and is an avid rodeo fan.

Powers said his company will provide extensive facilities for livestock buyers and sellers in this area and hopes they will make his company their headquarters.

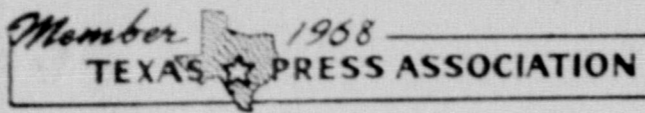

WHAT A BIRTHDAY!

Sunday, February 25, is an anniversary which few people, if any, will celebrate by baking a cake!

On this date, in 1913, the federal government was authorized to levy an income tax. Congressional leaders felt at the time that rates could never reach 10 per cent and, indeed, the first year of tax brought the government only \$40 million, or a per capita rate of 82 cents.

By contrast, in 1966 revenue from corporate and individual income taxes totaled \$85.3 billion, and the per capita tax total was \$434. While the per capita disposable income in 1966 was \$2584 or 7.2 times the \$358 of 1913, the per capita tax payments were 529 times the 82 cents of 1913.

In 1913, a single man earning \$5,000 a year paid a \$20 tax; in 1966 he paid \$671. In 1966 the rates ranged from 14 to 70 per cent, a far cry from Congressional predictions back in 1913.

Of Mr. Taxpayer's total tax bill in 1913, 70.5 per cent went for state and local government and 29.5 per cent for the federal government. In 1966, 66.5 per cent to federal, 17.9 to state and 15.6 to local.

In 1913, people did locally what they wanted done. Today, they give their billions to tax money to the federal government and fight among themselves to see who can get the most back.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Around and around goes the Texas Liquor Control Board inquiry — and where its stops nobody knows.

Threatened with disclosures that would "blow the top off" irregularities in operations of some of its field personnel, the board heard just enough to rattle its windows at a one-day public hearing here.

Widely-heralded fact-finding proceedings before the three-member board developed little evidence.

Budget — State agencies now are in the process of presenting their 1968-69 budget requests to the Legislative Budget Board and the Governor's Budget Office.

Staffers in these offices have indicated they can be ready for a special legislative session by the end of February if that time should strike the fancy of Governor Connally.

Constitutional Revision — blue-ribbon constitutional revision commission has set itself a late-May deadline for the processing of study-group proposals for changing the state constitution by sections.

Commission granted its study sub-committee broad leeway as to whether to recommend sweeping "philosophical" rewriting or simple updating of basic laws and elimination of deadwood. Most members appeared to lean toward the latter and some warned that the legislature is going to do as it pleases anyway with the final handwork.

Car Inspection Slow — More than 4,250,000 vehicles still have not been inspected for 1968 auto safety stickers reports the Texas Department of Public Safety April 15 is the deadline.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS director, said only 1-574,367 cars have been through inspection lines. A total of 5,702,862 were inspected in 1967.

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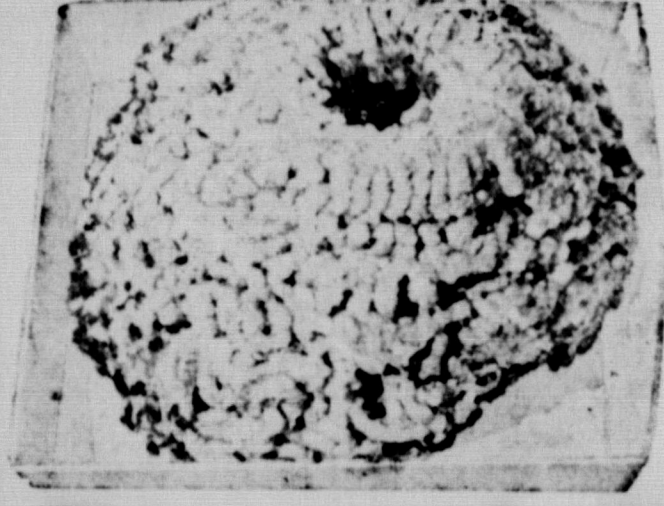

**Wise and Otherwise**  
 Rambling Reflections  
 By Dr. R. F. Curl

Occasionally Inez Robb has a relevant word in her syndicated column. Such was the case recently when she brought up the whole question of dissent in a democratic society as she spoke so plainly advising draft protesters they must be both willing and ready to accept the lawful consequences of their protest if their witness against majority opinion was to be worth its salt.

We have never had uniformity in our American society. Even in colonial and Revolutionary War days there were wide divergences of opinion.

I grew up in a typical rural southern community while the cruel aftermath of the Civil War rang from political rostrums and furnished topic of endless conversation and disagreement. My memory serves me well that this typical white, Anglo, Protestant community was by no means in agreement.

My own family was divided. My great-grandfather had to smuggle his sons through the Confederate lines to enlist them in the Federal forces and send his women folks as refugees to Illinois during the violent conflict of the War. The atrocities committed against the minority "Tories"—i. e., the Union sympathizers—were many and grievous.

Yet the right of dissent was recognized. And, the minority understood that they must pay for their protesting consciences. Good Republicans, as hundreds of my mother's kith and kin were, well aware that their conscience would demand that they put a slate for their party and support it. Yet they also were prepared to see their candidates defeated seventy-five per cent of the time.

But these strong disagreements did not alienate individuals of different opinion. For example, my widowed Unionist grandfather had married a second time into one of the strongest Confederate families of the section within five years of the close of the Civil War. And my own mother, nursed on the bottle of Federalism and loyalty to the Republican

party, had within twenty years after the end of the War, married the son of a devoted Confederate soldier.

My points are: 1. Dissent has always existed; 2. dissenters in the past have expected that when their convictions carried them past the law of the land they must be ready to bear the consequences; 3. and that these violent disagreements in opinion and even conviction did not disrupt communication and acceptance in communities.

But now we see growing numbers in protest who seem utterly unprepared to accept the consequences of such dissent and rather seem to expect to wear the mantle of a noble martyr. Martin Luther King is prepared, according to the news media, to carry a massive march of protest into Washington with thousands marching and demonstrating and building shacks to live in to illustrate concretely the real facts of poverty in this nation.

Certainly Dr. King and his followers have the constitutional rights of assemblage and mass protest. They have the right to use every legal means to make vivid their complaints.

If their consciences compel them to violate the law in doing this, then they must follow their consciences.

No doubt in marching and demonstrating, and in building shacks in the District of Columbia Dr. King and his followers will come into conflict with police and sanitation laws in the District. If they do, they should go to jail and pay the same penalty that you or I for a similar individual violation. And they should expect not the status of martyrs but of ordinary law breakers.

Which brings me to the nub of what Robb said by way of quotation from Joseph Wood Krutch, one of the most respected liberal philosophers of present day America.

He is talking about Dr. Spock and draft demonstrators. But the same principles apply to both draft dodgers and civil rights demonstrators. Krutch, writing in The American Scholar, official journal of Phi Beta Kappa, says: "In practice those whose conscience demands that they defy authority in ways that involve great consequences must be willing to accept some penalty. They have no right to expect to be exemplary martyrs without

suffering some degree of martyrdom. No cross, no crown. But a crown without a cross is precisely what many seem to demand as a right."

He goes on to say: "How, unless refusing to register for the draft involves some penalty, can one distinguish between the truly conscientious objector and the youth . . . who just prefers the comforts of home to the discomforts and dangers of war? . . . I doubt the deep sincerity of anyone who believes himself a victim of cruel persecution because he is assessed some penalty that has . . . the effect of testing his sincerity."

Our society under the growing impact of modern forces is bound to become more and more a pluralistic culture. This will not matter and may indeed enrich life for us all if we keep in mind that in our democratic society change must be effected by persuasion rather than by violence and that minorities seeking change—even though the change may be for good—must expect often to pay the price of not being understood and of suffering for their disagreements with accepted majority opinions. For them, as for many others across the long sweeps of history, the cross may oft bring the

crown and with their crown a blessing to humanity.

Let us remember that even a pluralistic culture, if it is to be a culture and not simply a chaos of personal individualism run wild, must be held together by some basic uniting cement. And in America this has always been the regency of rule by the majority.

Decay Prevention Methods Outlined By Dentist Here

This being National Dental Health Week, the following recommendations of measures to be taken to prevent dental decay have been prepared by local dentists:

Consume optimally fluoridated water (1ppm), particularly during the period of tooth mineralization. Communal water fluoridation is the cheapest and most effective way of ensuring this. In areas where this is not feasible and where the fluoride content of drinking water is known to be less than 7-ppm, alternative methods of fluoride administration for children from the time of infancy to twelve years of age should be prescribed. Here in Ozona, we have about 7-ppm.

The topical application of fluoride solutions to the teeth by a dentist or hygienist, every six or twelve months, is recommended for children and young adults, particularly when the teeth have developed during a period of low fluoride intake.

Eliminate between-meal snacks of sweet foods. Reduce the intake of carbohydrates, particularly sugar-containing foods, at regular meal times.

End each meal with a food which has a cleansing effect on the teeth and which stimulates the flow of saliva: raw apple, pear, carrot, celery.

Brush the teeth thoroughly with a stannous fluoride dentifrice within ten minutes of eating. If this is not possible, rinse the mouth vigorously with water. When

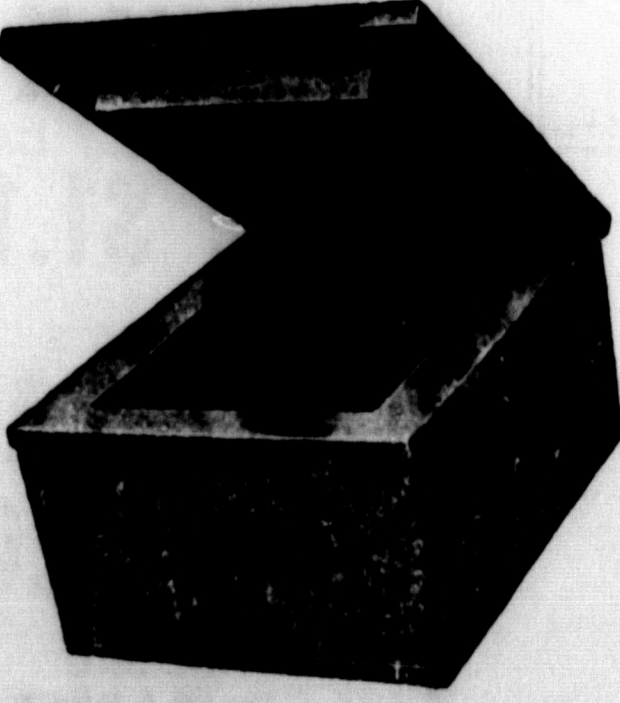
