At the risk of escalating your blood pressrue dangerously, we will remind you again, for only a moment, that a recent decision of the Supreme Court of the United States held that a Communist may not be denied employment in a defense plant in this country. We bring this up again only to a defense job. And we think that this strange contradiction deserves review.

The Supreme Court was overturning the Subversive Activities Control Act of 1950 and it is now the law of the land that Communists may work in our defense plants, if they are dues-paying union members.

But what of patriotic Americans who refuse to pay dues to a union? 
