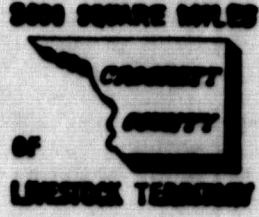

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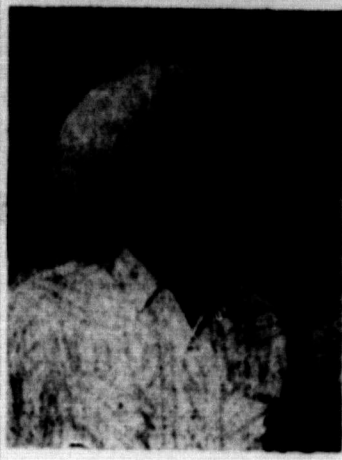
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Frank Mills, 74 Veteran Lawman Buried in Coleman

Funeral services for Frank Mills, 74, father of Crockett County Sheriff Billy Mills, were held Sunday afternoon from Stevens Memorial Chapel in Coleman with Rev. Jim Hancock, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Ozona, conducting services. Burial was in Coleman City Cemetery.

Mr. Mills died Friday at 4:40 p. m. in Shannon Hospital in San Angelo after a lengthy illness.

He was born in Mills County March 27, 1893. He lived in Coleman County for two years before joining the Texas Rangers in 1920. In 1928 he was elected sheriff of Coleman County and served in that capacity until 1938 when he resigned and returned to service with the Rangers. He retired two years ago and moved to Ozona, where he lived until the time of his death. Surviving besides his son

are the widow of Ozona; his mother, Mrs. Callie Mills of Harlingen; two daughters Mrs. Charlyne Griffith of San Marcos and Miss Jackie Mills of Dallas; three sisters, Mrs. Paul Arnold, Mrs. Sarah Meadows and Mrs. Mark Herring all of Harlingen, and three grandchildren. Ozona Band Wins First Place At Brady Festival

The Ozona Lion Band won first place in both concert and sightreading in class A at the Brady Band Festival this past weekend. The event was Brady's 20th annual festival, making it one of the oldest continuing band festivals in the state.

Clear Creek High won the show band competition Friday night. Ozona High, Mahon High, and Winters High were the other bands that competed in the Friday event. Ozona was the only class A school entered in this event. Others were Class AA and Class AAA.

The concert contest winners were Class AAA Clear Creek, Symphonic Band; Class AA, Clear Creek Concert Band; Class A Ozona; Class B Blanco.

Sightreading first places went to Class AAA Fredericksburg High; Class AA Winters High; class A Ozona High; and Class B Blanco High.

Some 2,000 persons attended the performances, with 20 bands from North and East Texas as well as West Texas as providing the music. Judges included Douglas Weihe of North Texas State University in Denton; Merlin Jenkins of Texas Christian University in Ft. Worth; Wayne McDonald, band director at Eldorado High School; and Eldon Janzen of the Irving public school system.

Dr. Joe G. Rape, Former Ozonan, Buried Monday

Funeral services were held Monday in Arlington for Dr. Joe Glenn Rape, 50, a former Ozona resident, who died suddenly at his home in Arlington Saturday morning.

Dr. Rape, who had been a practicing physician in Arlington since 1952, died following a heart attack at his home about 6 a. m. He was associated with the Medical and Surgical Clinic in Arlington and was a school physician for the University of Texas at Arlington and the UTA Rebel football team. Born in Campbell, Texas, May 28, 1917, Dr. Rape was the son of Mrs. I. G. Rape of Arlington and the late Mr. Rape who operated a drug store in Ozona, the former Ozona Drug Store, for many years. Week's Weather Contributes .22 Inch of Moisture

The official weather gauge at the Water District office recorded .22 of an inch of moisture after a rain shower in Ozona Tuesday. Tuesday's rain brought the yearly total to 3.42 inches of moisture for the town. The January total was 2.08 inches and February recorded 1.12 inches of moisture.

No moisture was recorded the first two months of last year.

The Ozona Lions swept to a surprisingly easy win in the 16th Annual Ozona Invitational Track Meet last Saturday at Lion Stadium as they used their overall team depth to compile 117 points.

Junction took second place honors with 76½ points

while Eldorado was third with 73.

Four meet records were broken with the Lions' Gary Sutton getting a record in the shot put (56'1") to add to his meet record in the discus set last year. Sutton added a first in the discus Saturday as he garnered 20 points for the Lions, with a heave of 160'4½".

Charles Stidham of Comstock walked away with individual honors, scoring 26 of his team's total of 27½ points. He took a second in both the 100-yd. and 220-yd. dashes and won the broad jump with a record setting leap of 22'11". In breaking the record, Stidham broke the oldest record of the meeting going back to 1957 when Byron Ritchie of McCamey went 21'11".

J. Perez of Junction broke the 880-yard run record with a 2:01.4. The existing record of 2:05.1 was set by Bernard Gomez of Junction in the 1964 meet. The Junction team broke the existing mile relay record of 3:35.6 set by Eldorado in 1962, by coming in in 3:34.8.

Other first place winners for the Lions were Randel Clepper in the 330-yd low hurdles, and David Huff in the Pole Vault.

Maggie Galindo placed second in the mile run for the Lions, along with Wesley West in the pole vault. Ernest Rios collected 8 points for the Lions B with a second in the high jump.

The mile relay team added points for the Lions with a second place. Team members are Beto Vargas, D. Huff Fleet Coates and Wesley West.

In the high hurdles the Lions chalked up three places, Larry Kilgore, third; Randel Clepper, fourth and Danny Maness, fifth. The Lions 440 and 880 relay teams took third place (Continued on Last Page)

DEMAND AND SUPPLY

The law of supply and demand is known to every American. School children learn it in the early grades in school. It states as an economic principle that if demand exceeds supply, prices rise, thus discouraging demand and enabling the supply to meet demand — and vice versa.

But recently, a new law called demand and supply has come to be almost as inexorable as the old law of supply and demand. This new law of demand and supply is a 100% of pressure groups and it seems to have a special appeal to public officials. The pressure groups demand, and the politicians supply. All established laws of economics are abandoned or circumvented to supply the demand.

Welfare recipients demand increases; politicians supply the increases.

Friendly nations demand foreign aid; politicians supply foreign aid.

Government employees

demand pay increases; politicians supply pay increases.

Poverty pockets demand largesse; politicians supply largesse.

Social Security recipients demand increases; politicians supply the increases.

The list is endless. Demand and supply has been a paramount law of political life for 35 years now.

But the law of supply and demand is beginning to make itself felt again, because the supply of money to meet the demands is running out. The taxpayer who replenishes the public treasury is rapidly approaching dehydration. It's revealed, for example, that in the week ending on January 25, commercial and industrial business failures climbed to 216, a rise from 176 for the preceding week.

Manufacturing failures rose from 34 to 43; retailing from 74 to 85; construction failures from 28 to 42, and service business failures from 17 to 25. The tax burdens on business — and you may substitute the word "em-

ployers" for the word business — are taking a heavy toll.

Somehow we think that the law of supply and demand will outlive the law of demand and supply.

STILL WAITING

At the risk of escalating your blood pressure dangerously, we will remind you again, for only a moment, that a recent decision of the Supreme Court of the United States held that a Communist may not be denied employment in a defense plant in this country. We bring this up again only to point out that a non-union member, on the other hand, is denied such protection in a defense job. And we think that this strange contradiction deserves review.

The Supreme Court was overturning the Subversive Activities Control Act of 1950 and it is now the law of the land that Communists may work in our defense plants, if they are dues-paying union members.

But what of patriotic Americans who refuse to pay dues to a union? Well, they're barred from defense plant employment, for all practical purposes. The real-life application of the Court's decision is that a man may work in a sensitive industry no matter what organization he may choose to identify himself with — even one dedicated to the overthrow of the government of the United States — but his neighbor may not work in a sensitive industry unless he joins and pays dues to a labor union, albeit doing so is against his will. The fact that the worker may consider it an invasion of his privacy and a restriction on his personal freedom to have to join and pay dues to a union is ignored. The result is that we have freedom to join, on the one hand, and the denial of freedom to refrain from joining on the other.

Across the country there is a growing belief among proponents of right-to-work legislation that the Court's decision in the Communist case will bring an end to compulsory unionism in the land. In both California and

in Oklahoma there are presently test cases in the courts which challenge compulsory unionism, and the feeling is that the Court cannot guarantee the rights of a Communist without guaranteeing the rights of the patriotic citizen.

Both the Congress and the Court have side-stepped the compulsory unionism issue for too many terms and there is more than a little irony in the fact that the rights of a Communist could be decided so quickly while the rights of the working men who prize freedom and independence still await protection.

Both logic and the law seem now to be on the side of right-to-work.



Wise outdoorsmen read the weather reports regularly.

They know that sudden weather changes have a great influence on our outdoor creatures. And they put these to their advantage.

A sudden drop in the barometer, for instance, often prods fish into hitting.

Some of my most memorable fishing has occurred just before a front hits. Usually, fishing also is good just afterwards, when conditions are settling back to normal and the barometer starts its rise again.

Getting in on the fast action often calls for timing things just right. There is a flurry of activity before the front hits. But once it arrives you may as well stop fishing.

However the situation will change within a day or two after the front has passed through.

A striking example of this came during Texas eliminations for the World Series of Fishing, held on Granite Shoals Lake (now Lake LBJ) in 1965.

On Friday and Saturday the contestants had fairly good fishing, but on Saturday night a cold front moved in and fishing was all but

dead on Sunday.

Many outdoorsmen realize this about fishing. What they fail to understand is that it often works equally well with wildlife.

I remember the opening of deer season a few years back. It was a warm, still day. But, despite the high temperatures, deer were up and about all day. Even toward mid-afternoon, when the temperature was pushing the high 80's, many deer were feeding out in the open.

Next day a severe norther hit. Deer kill was nowhere as good as it was opening day. At a few days later, when things started warming up again, the deer came out en masse as they had just before the front hit.

Our wild creatures, both fish and fowl, have some sort of built-in weather predicting device. They know when nasty weather is coming and they get ready for it. If it

looks like a severe front that will drop the temperature or perhaps bring heavy rain, they'll start feeding to store up for the lean days ahead.

Once on a fishing trip on the Llano River, I noticed hundreds of wasp nests scattered along a rocky overhang on a bluff. Black and red insects were swarming everywhere. Next morning, when I walked down to the river, I noticed the wasps were inactive. They were bunched on the nests. Not a single one was flying about.

At the time I wondered if maybe this meant the weather was to change.

Sure enough, late that evening a front moved in, bringing severe thundershowers. These wasps knew the change was coming. And they were ready for it.

A few years back, on a warm October morning, I went squirrel hunting. On the way out I heard on my

car radio that a storm was moving in. It was a front, but it was a drop the temperature what and bring light

By the time I was in the woods, there was an overcast from horizon and a light rain falling. But instead of the squirrels being in the tree-tops, I had better squirrels any time, anywhere.

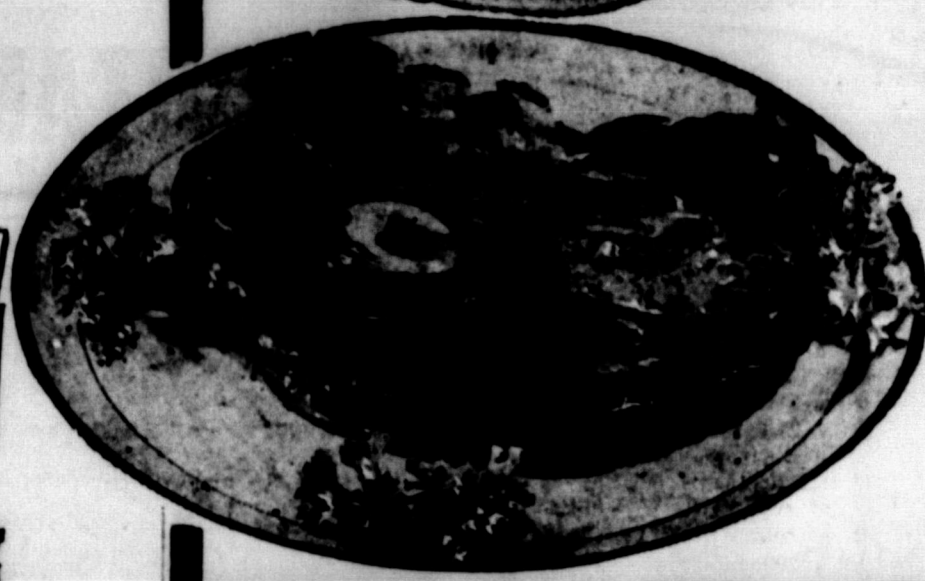
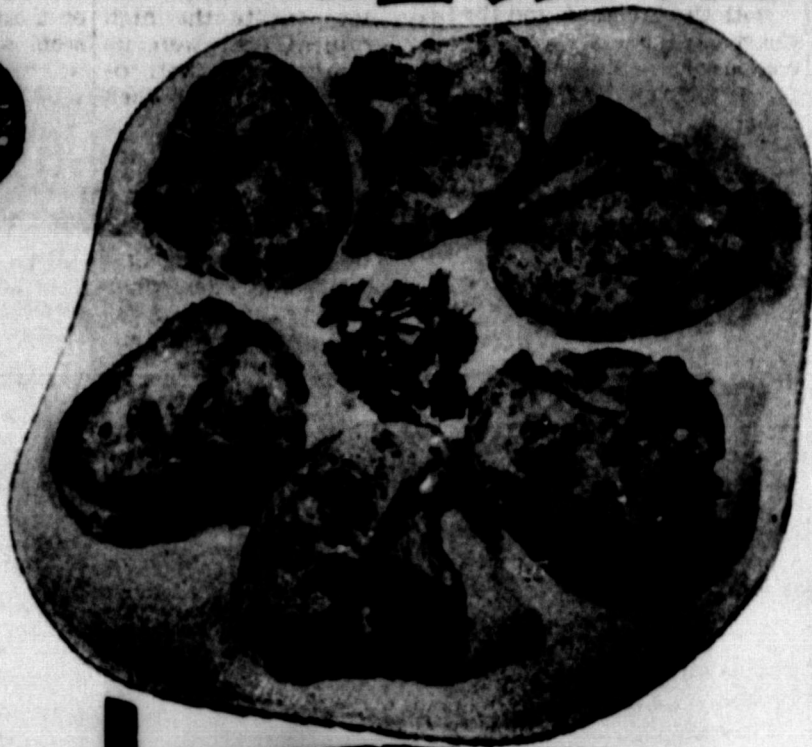
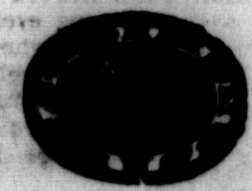

Uvalde, Texas — A \$100-a-plate testimonial dinner will honor Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde, candidate for governor, here March 9.

Briscoe was named one of five outstanding young Texans by the State Jaycees in 1958 and Mr. South Texas in 1967. He organized and headed the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, which virtually has eliminated the screwworm.

In addition, he has served as president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, the South Texas Chamber of Commerce, the Texas State Chamber of Commerce, and the Mohair Council of America.

Briscoe was presented the Knapp-Porter Award for dis-



tinguished service to agriculture in 1966. Also he served as Texas chairman of National Farm-City Week for two years and co-chairman for two more.

He served in the China, Burma and India Theater in World War II. He entered the Army as a private and was discharged an officer.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — a federal court lawsuit filed with little fanfare may have far-reaching consequences for the state's welfare system and finance.

Suit challenges the one-year state residency requirement for eligibility to receive aid to needy families with dependent children. Actually the issue goes considerably farther than a single class of assistance. Texas attaches this residence requirement to all major types of welfare eligibility.

Welfare outlays in the state last year totalled \$257,900,000 of which \$65,600,000 was state money.

Attorneys for Mrs. Angelina B. Alvarez of San Antonio, mother of six children entered the federal court suit to require the State Department of Public Welfare to grant her AFDC assistance, although she admittedly has not lived in the state a year. Suit claims the residence restriction is unconstitutional, since 76 per cent of AFDC funds are provided by federal government.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin, in an answering brief, vigorously defends the state constitutional and statutory provisions requiring a year's residency for welfare beneficiaries. Lack of such restrictions, contends Martin, would create a "nomad" class of state-to-state wanderers.

Tax Bill — Legislative Budget Board staff forecasters see a \$122,800,000 tax bill as necessary to finance the \$468,500,000 general revenue spending bill tentatively recommended by the Board for 1969. This is about \$25,000,000 above 1968's spending level of \$443,800,000.

According to staff predictions, \$345,600,000 in general revenue will be available for spending in 1969 after automatic deductions of money for earmarked purposes.

Gov. Asked for Advice — State Constitutional Revision Commission panel has voted to call on Gov. John Connally and ex-Govs. Price Daniel and Allan Shivers for advice on best standards for deciding how to change the governor's powers and length of term. Executive office committee debated at length whether the governor should be limited to one or two four-year terms and whether Texas should adopt a "cabinet" form of state government with strong governor provisions.

CRIME ON RAMPAGE — Texas Department of Public Safety reports that Texas crime increased 11.8 per cent in 1967 over the previous year, for a new all-time high number of criminal offenses — one every minute and a half.

An estimated 332,986 major crimes were committed in Texas during 1967, compared to 297,810 offenses the year before, said DPS Director Homer Garrison, Jr.

All major categories of crime — murder, rape, robbery, burglary, aggravated assault and theft — were up 10 per cent or more. Only 27 per cent of known offenses were cleared by arrests during the year.
