Show Off New Bank Quarters At Open House Saturday Afternoon

The new home of the Ozona National Bank will be formally opened to the public Saturday. Open house hours are from 2:00 p. m. until 5:00 p. m.

The final touches were completed Tuesday when the planters and grounds were landscaped and planted. Mrs. Bailey Post planned the landscaping and Coon

Chandler and his crew did the actual planting.

Construction of the facility began in February, 1967, with the razing of the old Wilson and Davidson buildings to clear the site. J. D. Burk of San Angelo was the contractor and shortly after the site was cleared, his crew began work on the basement. Hitting solid rock slowed progress considerably and finally small charges of dynamite were used to break up the rock and enable the equipment operators to complete the excavation. Progress on the building was held up several times by strikes in the east and delay in delivery of materials.

The exterior of the modern contemporary building was constructed of rough hewn and polished Minnesota black granite. The body of the building is finished with blocks of rough granite, while the portico columns and trim are of the highly polished stone. The portico, which extends halfway around the building boasts a walkway of polished red brick. Two entrances open onto Eleventh St. and Ave. D. A drive-in window is located in the rear for the convenience of patrons, along with a large parking lot.

The beautifully decorated interior features red carpet in the office areas and polished brick in traffic areas. Plush leather chairs in red and black are placed in the office areas and a large black leather sofa and complimenting chair are arranged in the foyer along with modern tables and lamps. The coffee room or lounge features antiqued iron tables and chairs with bright floral upholstery.

The elegant new building represents 63 years of progress for the Ozona National Bank, which began June 7, 1905, in the rear of Smith Drug Store. When the first day's deposits were looked up for the night, they totaled \$12,847.85. The old bank building was completed in the fall of the same year.

The bank was organized April 29, 1905, in the office of Dr. A. W. Clayton. Directors were J. W. Henderson, L. B. Cox, J. B. Moore, J. B. Reilly, John Young, Robert Massie, W. P. Hoover, S. E. Couch and Dr. Clayton. They (Continued on Last Page)

Two Cars Damaged In Highway Crash; Injuries Minor

Only one automobile accident was reported in the county this week, according to Highway Patrolman Orville Perry. Personal injuries were minor, but property damage ran into the hundreds of dollars.

The accident occurred Friday night on Hwy 290 six miles east of Ozona at 8 o'clock. A 1967 Plymouth driven by Eddie Harris, Jr., an employee of M. C. Winters Co., was traveling east, when it was sideswiped by a 1956 Dodge driven by Orbie Heirren of Midland, traveling west. The Dodge had veered into the eastbound traffic lane.

Heirren received a laceration over the right eye and was treated and released from Crockett County Hospital. Harris and his passenger, Robert Thompson of Houston, suffered some bruises, but were not treated at the hospital.

Damage to the Plymouth amounted to \$1,400 and to the Dodge, \$200.

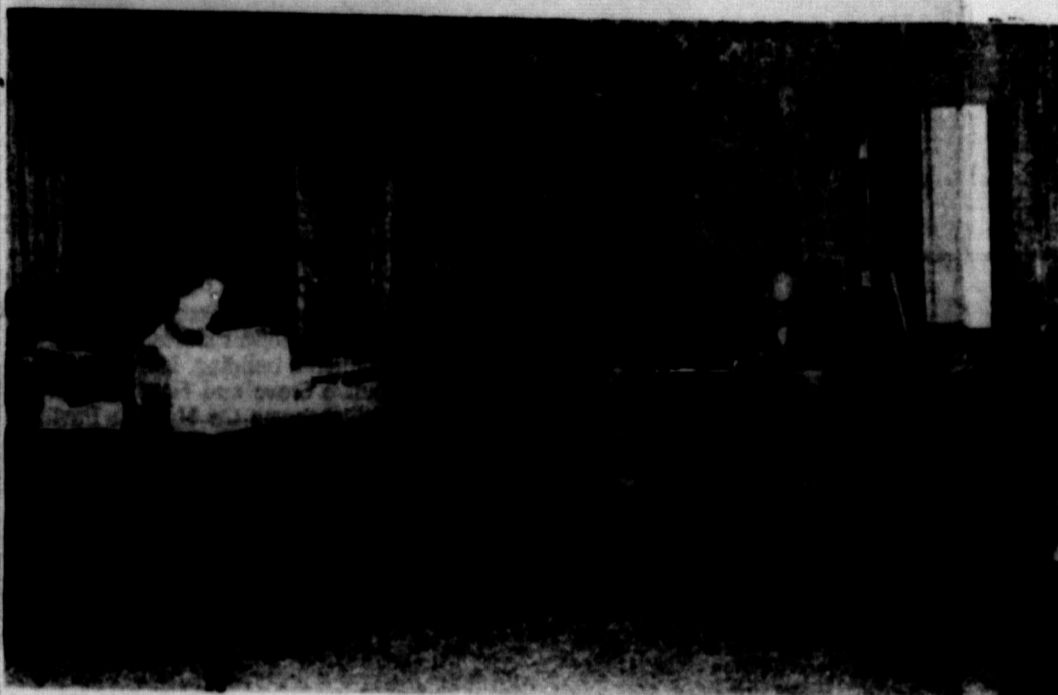

Shell Magazine Article Tells Giant Potential Of Mitchell Gas Field

Something of the proportions of relatively new JM Field, the gigantic natural gas field in extreme southwest Crockett county, discovered two years ago by Shell Oil Co., is disclosed in an informative article on the new "gas giant" contained in the January-February issue of Shell News, a house-organ magazine published for the benefit of Shell employees.

A number of superlatives are encountered in describing the Shell operation on the John Mitchell ranch, whose initials were adopted as the field designation. One of the twelve productive wells on the property so far completed is believed to be the largest gas well in the United States that produces from the Ellenburger forma-

tion. The well, Mitchell A-11-1, has indicated a flow potential of 850 million cubic feet of gas per day.

"In the rugged terrain of West Texas", the article begins, "Shell is continuing to add to previous deep-drilling achievements in a relatively new natural gas field in the Val Verde Basin called the JM Field. The JM stands for John Mitchell, on whose ranch the field is located, but for Shell the letters could mean "Just Mammoth".

Drilling crews have proved up reserves in the order of one trillion cubic feet since Shell discovered the field in 1965, so JM ranks with other giants of the Delaware-Val Verde Basins — Gomez, Puckett, Coyanosa, (Continued on Page 8)

\$100,000 Damage Suit Against Dr. Is Settled Here

A \$100,000 damage suit against a San Angelo doctor, charging negligence and malpractice which resulted in the loss of the sight in his left eye, filed by B. B. Adwell of Ozona, was settled in 112th district court Wednesday morning after the court had spent all day Tuesday selecting a jury to hear the case.

The suit named Dr. Chase S. Thompson as defendant. The jury had been selected and sworn in Tuesday afternoon and ordered to report back at 9 a. m. Wednesday. After some two hours delay, during which attorneys and the court were in conference, the court dismissed the jury.

Although attorneys were reluctant to discuss the case, it was announced that a "take nothing" judgement would be entered. Mr. Adwell said that the case was "settled out of court", that he had agreed not to disclose details but was "well pleased."

In his original petition, Adwell recited that on Nov. 29, 1965, he presented himself to Dr. Thompson for treatment for a sinus infection. The petition alleges that on Dec. 1, 1965, Dr. Thompson inserted what is known as a stylette into his left nostril and injected a saline solution into his left maxillary cavity and "through his negligence, carelessness and malpractice inflicted the hereinafter (listed) damages on the plaintiff."

The damage as recited in the petition was the ultimate loss of the sight of the left eye. Immediately upon injection of the solution into the sinus cavity, the petition asserts, the plaintiff suffered excruciating pain in his left eyeball that subsequently the eyeball and tissues around the eye swelled. He went to Fort Worth where he received attention from another doctor but treatment failed to save the eye.

The suit was filed on Mr. Adwell's behalf by Ozona Attorney Dixon Mahon and the law firm of Huff & Bowers of Lubbock.

ON TENS OF THOUSANDS

The art of political hypocrisy reached its zenith on March 7 for a few frightening seconds the pillars supporting the Senate chamber walls trembled and it was feared that ancient temple of tantrums might come tumbling down.

The Members were attacking the Administration's policy in Vietnam. First, Senator Fulbright rose to speak, to be quickly followed by Senators Case and Hatfield, Javits and Church, Hartke and Miller. Then all eyes were on the junior Senator from New York.

"Are we," he intoned, "like the God of the Old Testament that we can decide in Washington, D. C., what cities, what towns, what hamlets in Vietnam are to be destroyed? Or do we have that authority to kill tens of thousands of people because we say we have a commitment to the South Vietnamese people?"

Networks interrupted regularly scheduled programs to quote him. News tickers jangled the flash. And scarcely a big city newspaper failed to blazon the quote in boldface type the next day.

Forgotten, or at least unmentioned, was an historic meeting of the gods from Boston and environs who gathered in the White House parlor on April 17, 1961. The earthly destinies of "tens of thousands" of freedom-loving Cubans was to be settled. On that fateful day the gods assembled condemned "tens of thousands" of Cubans to slavery under the Red barbarians from over

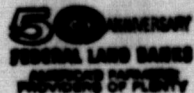

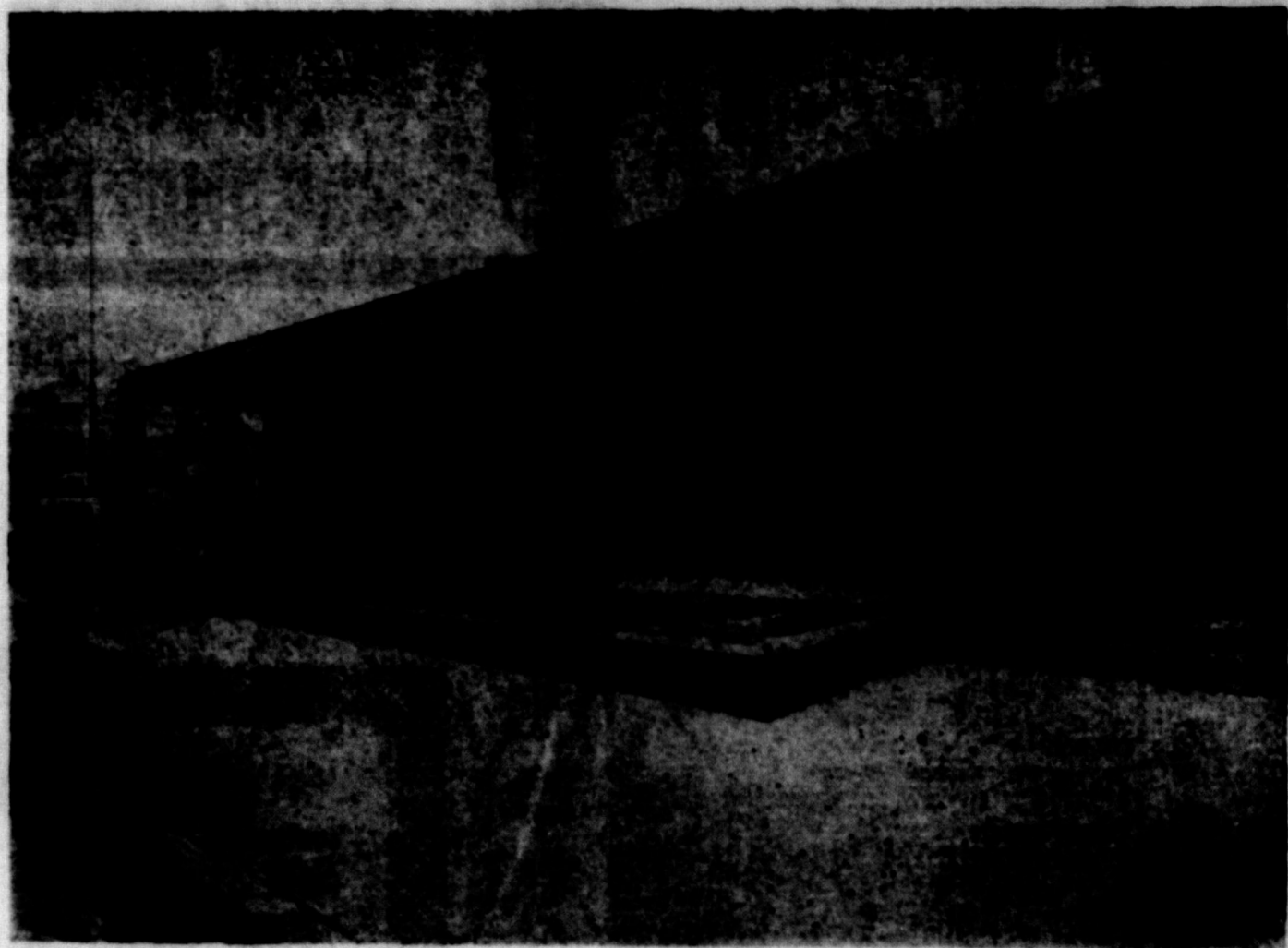

**Former Ozonan
Wins Award For
Work With Fish**

Bob Cooke, of Moorehead City, N. C. son of Mr. and Mrs. Cleophas Cooke, of Ozona, who is employed as a fishery biologist with Menhaden Research, recently received an award for safty suggestions given by the U. S. Department of the Interior.

Cooke, who suggested additional hand rails on smaller boats, was awarded \$25. The award was presented by Dr. Kenneth A. Henry, Director of the Biological Laboratory, Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, U. S. Department of the Interior.

The Menhaden Industry is one of the largest fisheries in the United States. Its principal product is fish meal, which is used in livestock feeds, pet food and fertilizer. Oil from the fish is used in perfumes. The product is made from fish which are unfit for human consumption.

During the summer months Cooke tags fish along the coastline from New Jersey to Florida.

Cooke is a graduate of Ozona High School and Texas A&M University. He lives in Moorehead City with his wife Anita, and two sons, Bobby and Craig.

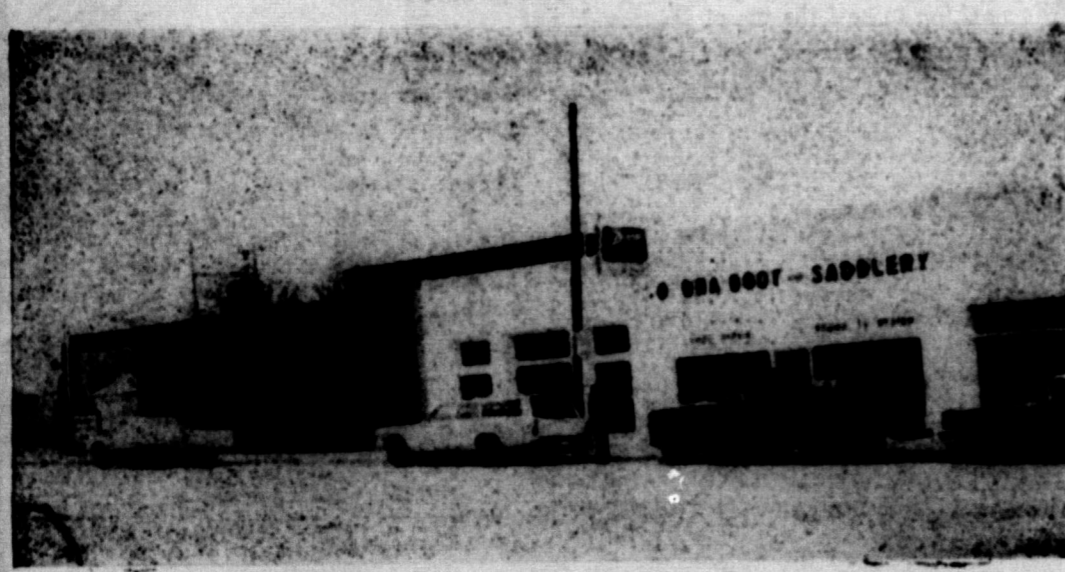

and Lockridge Fields. "The "Oil and Gas Journal" says of JM: "This giant producer, virtually unknown outside Shell, gives a new slant to area exploration." Shell itself is moving its exploration efforts southeastward with four new wildcats, and other companies, encouraged by the success of JM, are following suit. Previously, the trend of exploration efforts had been northwestward into New Mexico.

"Already there is a market for the JM gas. El Paso Natural Gas Transmission began transporting 25 million cubic feet a day last August and the contract figure of 125 million cubic feet a day will go into effect when El Paso obtains approval from the Federal Power Commission for expansion of its West Texas-West Coast System.

"Success of the JM Field adds another laurel to the crown of Midland E&P Area engineers, who successfully conquered the formidable deep-drilling problems of the neighboring Delaware Basin. The problems at JM were equally difficult, yet they were solved so successfully that Shell has been able to continue a very profitable drilling program for more than two years. In this time, 12 productive wells and two dry holes have been completed in an area where each well is a wildcat due to the complex geology.

"One of the 12 productive wells is believed to be the largest gas well in the United States that produces from the geological formation called the Ellenburger. This well — the Mitchell A-11-1 — indicated a flow potential of 850 million cubic feet a day of natural gas.

"The Shell achievements are all the more remarkable in that the Company has built a good lead on its competitors in reducing the costs of deep drilling. The JM wells, with a depth of about 15,000 feet, originally required about 70 days to drill and complete. Competitors in other fields are completing 100-day drilling periods for the same depths. Total costs in the JM Field were typically \$475,000 per well; however, recent wells have taken about 50 days to drill and have cost about \$375,000. Industry drilling costs are far higher.

"The two chief technical problems were obtaining reliable seismic data and selecting the best drilling methods to penetrate the hard-rock formations of dolomites, shales, cherts, and limestones.

"The area lies in the Southwest's remote border country characterized by towering mesas and narrow valleys. While the scenic grandeur would thrill the tourist, it meant nothing but trouble for the seismic crews. Many of the mesas ended in sheer walls, greatly limiting accessibility and making it almost impossible to obtain continuous seismic coverage. The hard-rock formation on the surface created severe problems in obtaining usable seismic information.

"Shell used many different seismic methods in an effort to accumulate knowledge of the underground structure, and also had access to the drilling logs of past probes and to surface geological information. Even so, there was some hesitation in selecting the site for the first wildcat in 1965.

"One of the keys to successful development of the gas field was the use of sour gas drilling. Normally, a liquid is used as a circulation medium, but in the hard-rock formations of the Val Verde Basin the penetration rate of the drill bit was slow. Nearly a year was involved from spudding to completion in some of the wells in the Delaware-Val Verde Basins. Water is scarce in the JM area and few water-bearing formations were encountered during drilling.

Through the years Shell

engineers in the Midland Area had developed techniques for using air or natural gas as a circulating medium because of the resulting higher penetration rate. After lab tests by Shell Development Company, the Midland Area experimented with sour gas as the medium at Shell's West Waha Field in the Delaware Basin. Air was used in the initial well at JM, and when it proved to be the discovery well it furnished sour gas for the subsequent program. The faster penetration rate meant fewer drilling days, which in turn meant a big saving in costs.

"One drawback of a dry circulating medium like air or gas, however, is that "crooked hole" tendencies are increased. Shell overcame this by using square drill collars, which tend to "pack" the hole and restrict the rate of change of the hole angle. The Company's success has led to widespread use of square collars by the industry for deep drilling.

"Gas pressures in the Ellenburger, as much as 6,500 high enough to prevent pre-pounds per square inch, were biems in completing wells; and the Company devised standards for casing, tubing, chokes, and other controls to withstand the sour gas pressures. The interaction of sour gas (containing hydrogen sulphide) and steel can cause materials to become brittle. The gas pressures in the Ellenburger are high enough to raise the possibility of failure under such conditions. So Shell engineers, after setting standards that would ensure against such failures, initiated a stringent inspection program to detect imperfections in tubular goods. This quality control program, however, enabled the Midland engineers to make further savings in money and time. Whatever formation was encountered, the tubular goods and other controls were designed for the maximum pressure that would exist, so that a safe flowing test of the formation could be obtained without time-consuming interruptions in drilling.

"There were other conditions that added to the challenge at JM. The area contains some of the highest underground temperatures in West Texas — as high as 320 degrees Fahrenheit. Since this complicated cementing operations by making the cement cure too fast, ingredients were added to the cement to counteract this action.

"Today the JM Field covers 20 square miles and is being developed with one well on each 640 acres. Each new well opens another area for exploration, with the result that full development may be well in the future. All this is highly satisfactory to Shell, whose early entry into the area enabled it to obtain a major share of the available acreage.

"Through technological ingenuity and dedicated personal efforts, the Midland Area has thus added a substantial new gas reserve to meet the nation's energy requirements. And the JM Field could be but the start of additional deep gas producing fields in the Val Verde Basin."

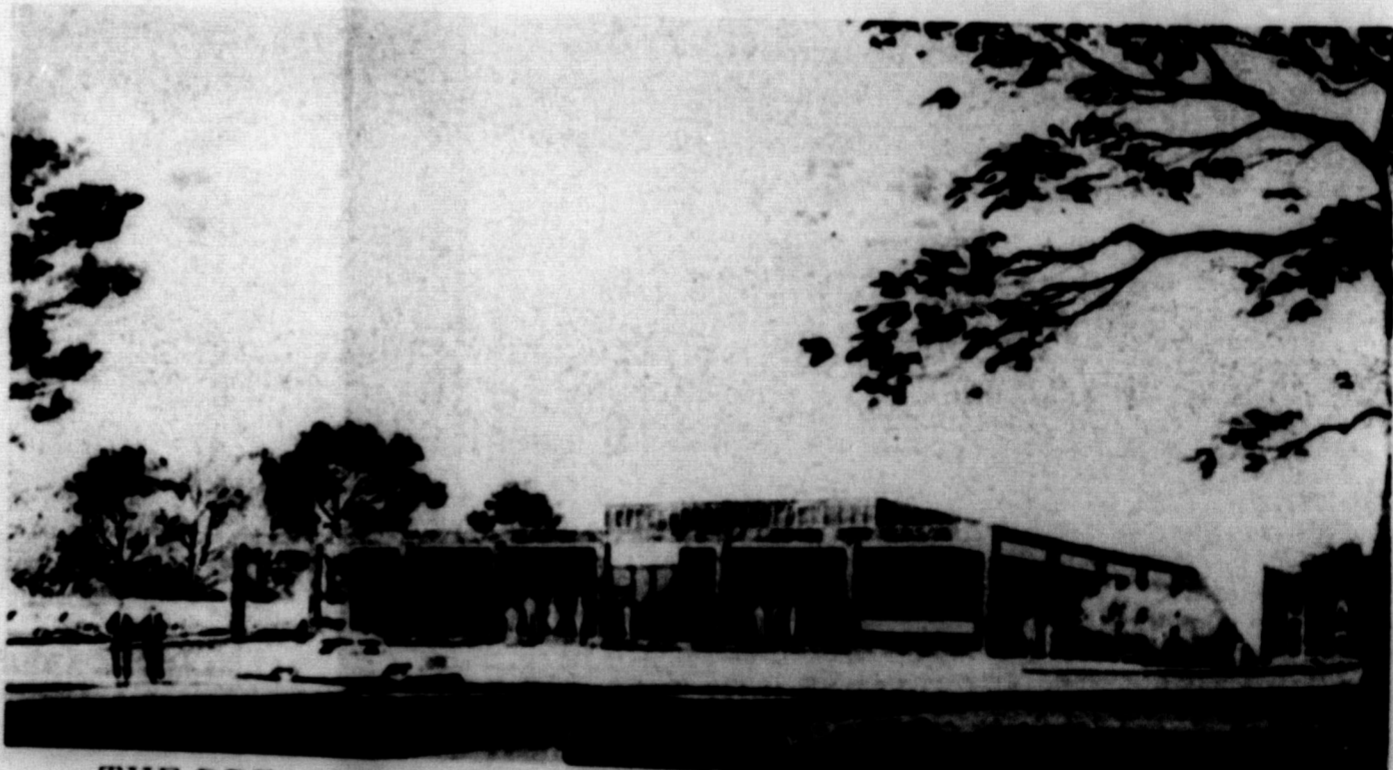

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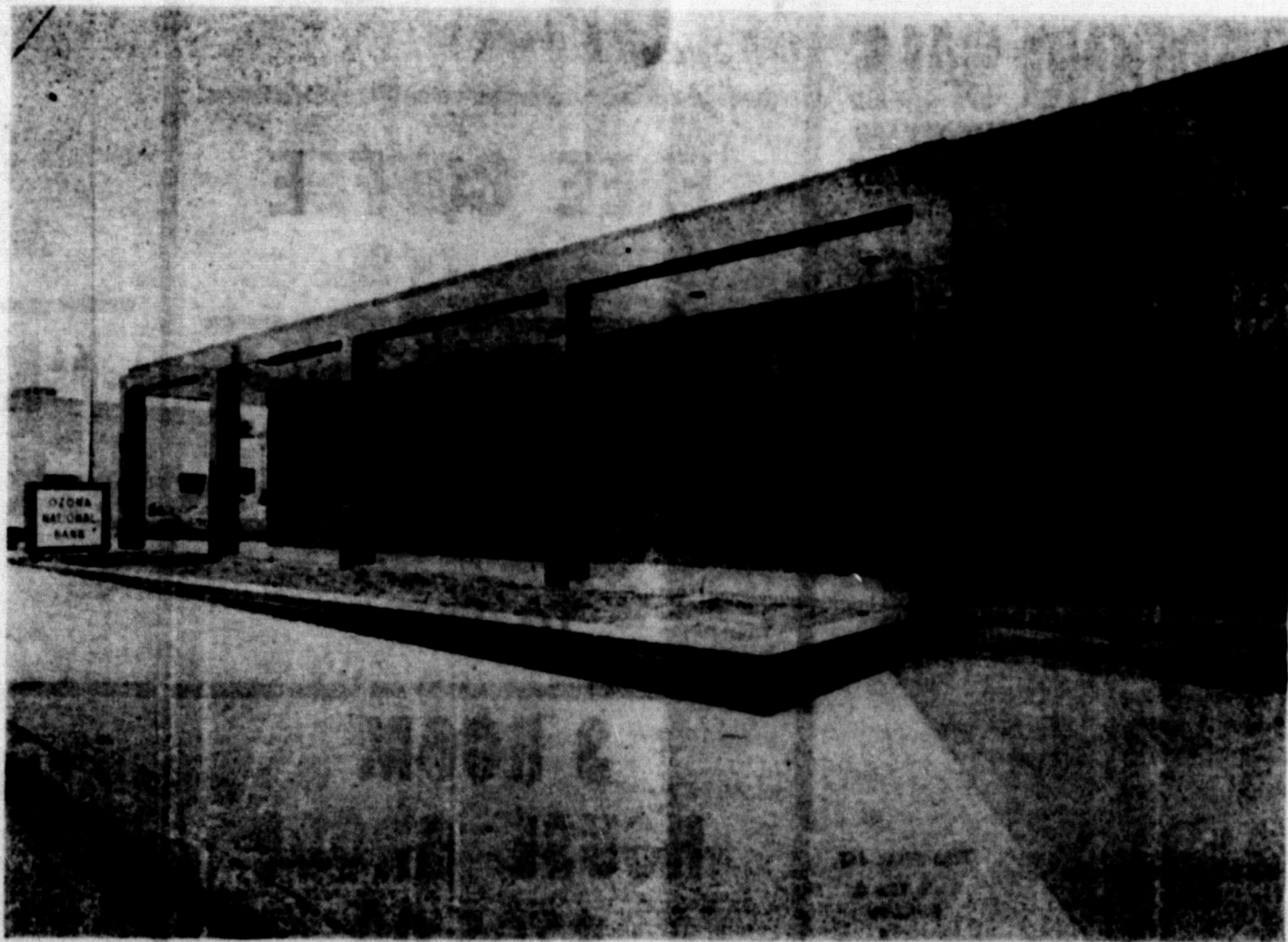

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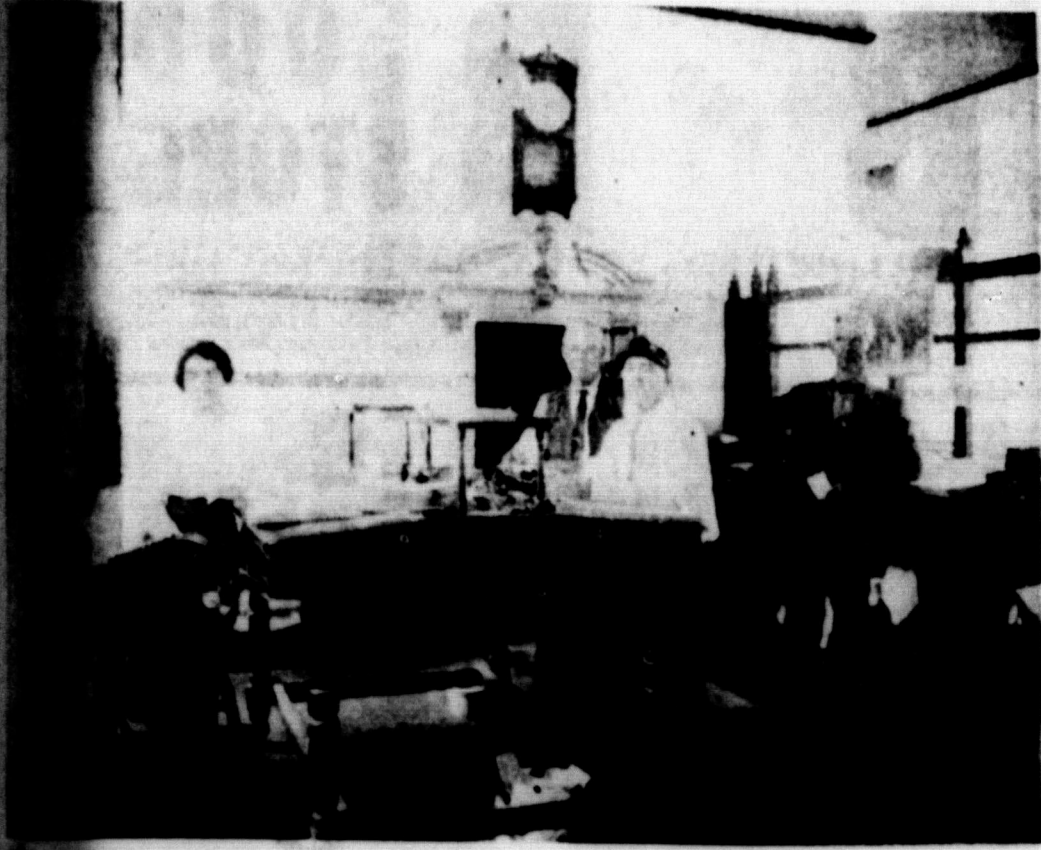

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

White Chocolate Cake

- 1/2 lb. white chocolate
- 1/2 cup boiling water
- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs, separated
- 1 teas. vanilla
- 2 1/2 cups cake flour (subtract 2 tbs. when using regular flour)
- 1 teas. baking powder
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 cup chopped pecans or almonds
- 1 cup flaked coconut

Melt chocolate in boiling water and let cool. Cream butter and sugar until fluffy and add egg yolks one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in chocolate and vanilla. Beat egg whites until soft peaks form. Add cake flour and baking powder together. Add dry ingredients alternately with buttermilk. Fold in beaten egg whites and gently fold in pecans and coconut. Bake in 2 round cake pans or 2 oblong cake pans, greased and floured, in preheated 350 degree oven for 35 minutes.

Icing

- 3 cups sugar
 - 1/2 cup butter
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 1/4 teas. salt
- Bring to boil over medium flame and boil for 4 minutes. Remove from heat and add 2 teas. vanilla. Let sit without stirring until very cool. Beat until creamy and thick enough to spread. Suggestion: make icing first and let cool while cake is baking.
- Totay Hazelstein served this marvelous cake at Forum Bridge club Saturday night. The recipe came from Gwynell (Walker) Wells of Dallas. It should be the most exciting cake recipe since the German Chocolate cake.

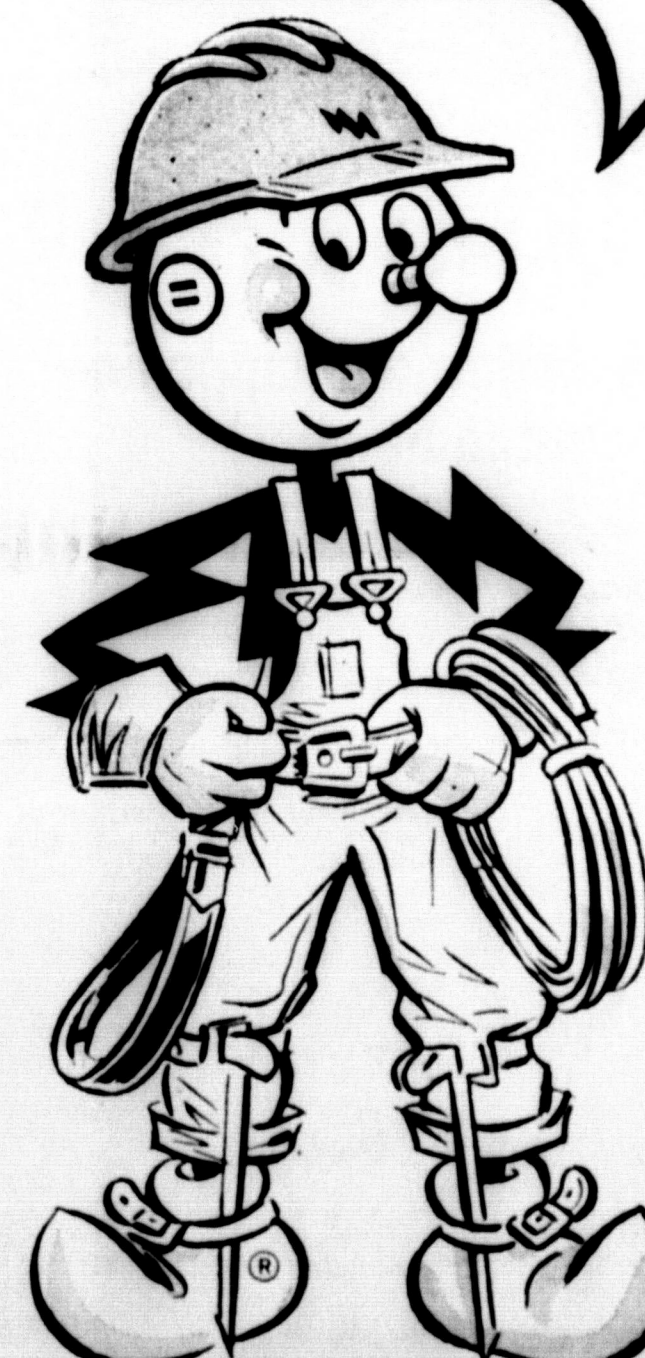

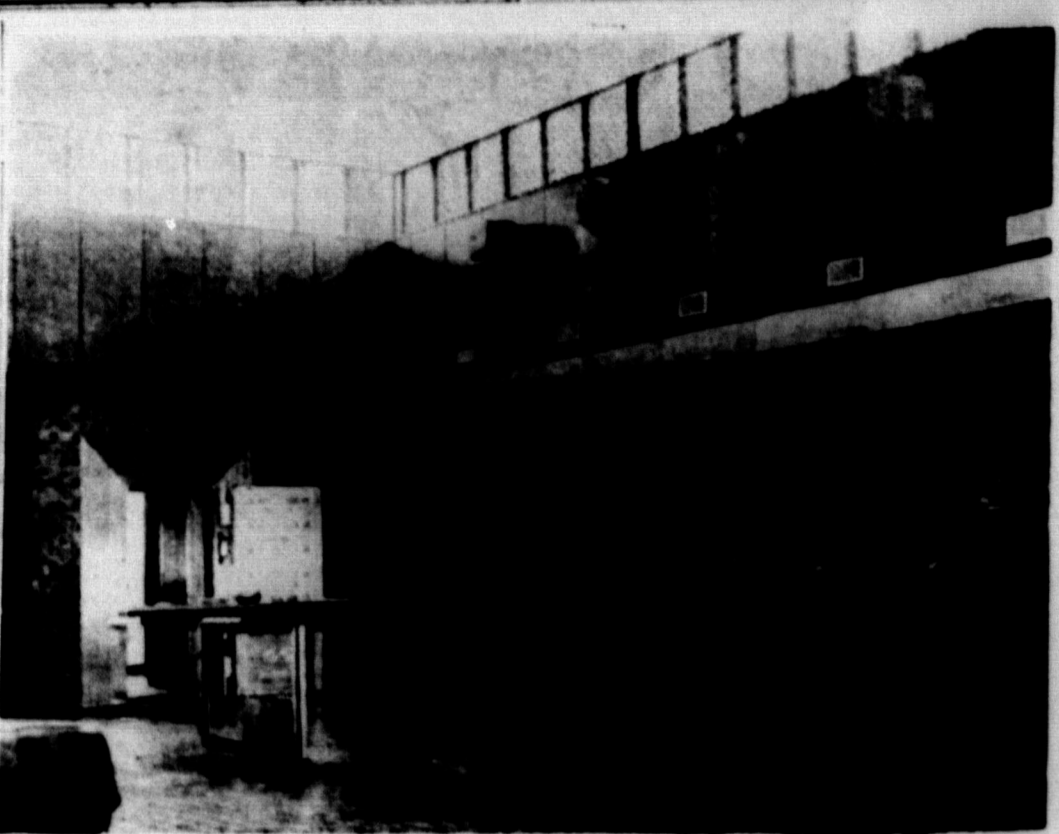

Pamphlet Explains Airlift Plan For Servicemens Mail

An illustrated pamphlet, "Mail for Servicemen," outlining the new postal program for airlifting letters, packages and other military mail overseas at low postal rates is now available through the Ozona post office, postmaster Floyd Hokit announced today. The guide was designed to familiarize families with the use of the new service.

As a result of the new legislation more than 75 percent of mail going to military men and women stationed abroad is being airlifted.

The eight-page pamphlet illustrates three services for airlifting parcels at rates the average family can afford, speedy service for newspapers and news magazines to overseas bases, special rates for books and educational materials, and the mailing of sound-recording messages. It also provides parcel wrapping instructions, information on the time it

takes parcels to reach Vietnam and other overseas bases from major U. S. cities, along with pointers on the correct way to address military mail.

For example, a 10-pound package from Ozona to Vietnam costs only \$2.75 if the package is marked PAL, while the air parcel rate for the same package is \$6.59. On parcels weighing less than 5 pounds it is often advantageous to use the Space Available service (SAM), which provides surface transportation to the port of embarkation and airlift overseas.

On packages weighing less than two pounds, air parcel post is often the patron's best buy, the pamphlet suggests.

Anyone desiring one of the free guides may pick one up at the post office.
