County Trucks To Start Hauling Trash Next Week

The Ozona Garden club wishes to remind residents that the county trucks will begin picking up trash and refuse next Thursday and Friday. The trucks will continue the pick-up Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of the following week. Trucks will continue to pass through an area only once, so the club urges that members of the community have trash, prunings etc. stacked neatly near a curb or alley or in container.

The garden club committee in charge of the cleanup suggests that weeds and winter grass be mowed on lawns and vacant lots. Yards and lots should be cleared of debris, including old cans.

The committee reminds residents that streets, alleys and sidewalks are being used as storage spaces and workshops and this is against the law. Business places should clean curbs of weeds and garages and filling stations which have an accumulation of oil cans, grease, old cars and car parts need to clean their premises. Unsightly oil soaks on banks of the draw were also deplored by the committee.

Several lots where houses have been moved, leaving trash, broken trees and cement chunks need to be cleaned badly.

Ozona Delegation To Meet Mon. With Hiway Commission

A group of Ozona businessmen along with the highway committee of the Chamber of Commerce, headed up by Oscar Koet, will meet Monday morning in San Angelo with the Texas State Highway Commission.

The Ozona delegation will be one of six West Texas delegations to make requests of the commission. The highway committee spokesman will ask for an extension of new highway construction on Hwy 163 South of Ozona and further improvement of the route to Del Rio.

The committee feels that since Hwy 163 affords travelers from West Texas the shortest, most convenient route to the Amistad lake site, it will be heavily traveled when the dam is finished and the lake filled.

The office will be open Saturday from 8 a. m. until 12 noon and from 1 until 6 p. m. for those who wish to purchase license plates. It is necessary to present the vehicle title and the 1967 license receipt to purchase the 1968 tags.

License tags may be purchased April 1 and the tax office will be open until 5 p. m. New license plates must be on all vehicles by midnight, April 1. Those purchasing tags April 2 will be assessed a 20 percent penalty or must sign an affidavit that the vehicle has not been driven on the highway since the midnight deadline April 1.

Wool & Mohair Incentive Rate Set For 1967

Wool and mohair incentive payments for the 1967 marketing season were announced Friday by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Payments, more than double those made to wool and mohair growers last year, will be made through local offices of the ASCS beginning April 1.

Percentage payment on wool will be 65.8, nearly triple the rate paid on wool during the 1966 marketing year. The national average price paid for wool was announced as 39.8 cents per pound. The wool support price is 66 cents per pound. Producers will also receive \$1.05 per hundredweight on all lambs sold last year.

Payment percentage on mohair will be 86.80, more than double the 1966 rate. The average price paid for mohair was 40.9 center per pound. The support price is 76.4 cents per pound.

Bankers Come From All Over Texas For Opening Of New Ozona National

More bankers than you will ordinarily find at a bankers' convention swarmed into Ozona Saturday for the formal opening of the 62-year-old Ozona National Bank in its new building. They oohed and aahed as they toured the swank interior of the new banking facility, and as they toured Ozona by bus and car; they lavished praise on both the bank building and the town and most of them stayed over to attend a banquet given by the host bank at the civic center that night and for breakfast the next morning at the home of the executive vice president, Lowell Littleton and Mrs. Littleton.

Its sparkling interior banked with flowers and plants, sent by well wishers, the new bank presented an atmosphere of holiday as the crowds of home folk and visitors inspected and visited from the opening hour of 2 p. m. to past the scheduled closing hour of 5.

Secured especially for the opening, a famous display of United States currency from Colonial days to the present, loaned by the Federal Reserve Bank, was a point of interest for visitors. From shilling notes of Colonial times, the display ran the gamut of Continental Congress currency issues, through the elaborately engraved saddle-blanket size currency, to the Civil War and Confederate money, Republic of Texas currency, fractional currency and postal notes to the modern smaller and less valuable currency of today's inflation.

Saturday night, the bank officers, directors and personnel played host to the visiting dignitaries at an elaborate banquet catered by John Held of the HiWay Cafe and his staff. Mr. Littleton acted as master of ceremonies, introduced the bank officers and personnel, gave a brief history of the bank and a thumbnail sketch of Ozona and Crockett county history. Invocation was by the Rev. Jim Hancock, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Dinner music was provided by Mrs. Batts Friend at the organ.

An entertainment program following the banquet was presented by a male quartet, "The Wingmen," from Laughlin Air Force Base at Del Rio.

Nearly 200 bankers, representing banks in at least 37 Texas cities were here for the opening and entertainment. There were 210 at the Saturday night, banquet including local people, and around 130 for the breakfast Sunday morning in the Library this week only at 1:45 p. m.

Wise and Otherwise
Rambling Reflections

One of the fringe benefits of living in Ozona arises from the more leisureed pace of life that gives time for real living.

With me real living has for sixty years included reading. The thrill of the magazine "The Youth Companion", we took when I was a boy still makes my nerves tingle with pleasure. I also remember a real joy such books as "Robinson Crusoe, Treasure Island, Nicholas Nickleby, as well as the less classical Horatio Alger tales.

When I left the pastorate 25 years ago for administrative responsibilities in the church, one of the reconciling factors attending the change was the expectation that, being relieved of the pressures of the pastorate, I would have more time to read. Alas! I was sadly disappointed. Anyone engaged in the endless details of a purely administrative job will bear testimony that both schedule and focus of interest divert from reading.

Naturally most of my reading centers in biblical and the theological works. But I crowd in from time to time a Western a good novel that Miss North has recommended or some popular non-fiction.

Currently I have been reading the non-fiction best-seller of the season, a volume entitled, "The Naked Ape." It is an attempt on the part of Desmond Morris, English Zoologist, to explain human behaviour on purely instinctive evolutionary patterns inherited from what he supposes man's primitive ancestors to have been.

Written in a sprightly, sparkling style and studded with novel theories, the book affords pleasant entertainment plus moments of hilarity, incredulity, and at times even indignation. My chief benefit and joy out of reading this work, so much praised and publicized by "Life", book club selection, and other news coverage, arises from the fact that it only strengthens my conviction that man can never be explained in purely natural terms.

Yes, when such an attempt is made it becomes evident that such accounting is impossible.

This is, I believe, because God "Breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul." From that moment onward, an impassable gulf has existed between man and beast.

Man can never be explained in terms of his flesh alone. For God "has made him a little lower than the angels, and given him dominion over all nature."

Lowell Littleton, his fellow directors, officials and employees of the Ozona National Bank have put all Crockett County under obligation by the open house held last week-end. There must have been 150 out-of-town guests who received such superb welcome as to be impelled to go away to advertise our community.

Many of them spoke to me in highest terms of appreciation for this community. No doubt Lowell and his good wife sighed relief Sunday afternoon when the last visitor had departed and they could rest their weary selves. But as to all, who accomplish as nearly as human limitations permit a perfect occasion, the warm glow of a worthwhile achievement will linger with them for many a day and year to come. Friends, we and all Crockett County are indebted to you for a service that will bear fruit for our Community for years to come.

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Ozonans Join Area Scouts In Tour Of Laughlin AF Base

Laughlin AFB, Del Rio, Texas — Sixty-six explorer and sea scouts and their leaders came from far and near in Southwest Texas to tour Laughlin AFB Saturday. Their purpose? To see Air Force under-graduate pilot training in action.

The tour was conducted by Lt. John B. Barham, Boy Scout project officer at the base, who was assisted by Culver L. Duderstadt, District Scout Executive for the Concho Valley Council of the Boy Scouts of America. Col. William R. Goade, wing commander of Laughlin's 3846th Pilot Training Wing is currently an executive board member of the Concho Valley Council.

The scouts met at the base theater where they were welcomed by Lieutenant Barham, and shown an Air Force film, "TAC on Target," which cited the weapon inventory and capabilities of strike aircraft in Tactical Air Command.

After sampling the "cnow" in the Airmen's Dining Hall, the scouts proceeded to base operations where they received a weather briefing and tour of Laughlin's control tower.

Next stop was the synthetic link trainer section in which the scouts were given an opportunity to handle the controls in simulated T-37 and T-38 cockpits. Briefings in the physiological training center followed where the scouts observed the altitude chamber which simulates high altitude flight conditions.

The group then returned to Laughlin's flight line to watch the T-37 Tweety Bird jet trainers and the super-sonic T-38 Talon in action. The runways were in full use as the planes were being flown on a normal weekday schedule.

Following the Laughlin tour, some of the scouts visited Amistad Dam and Reservoir project, a joint project of the United States and Mexico, now under construction 12 miles northwest of Del Rio on the Rio Grande.

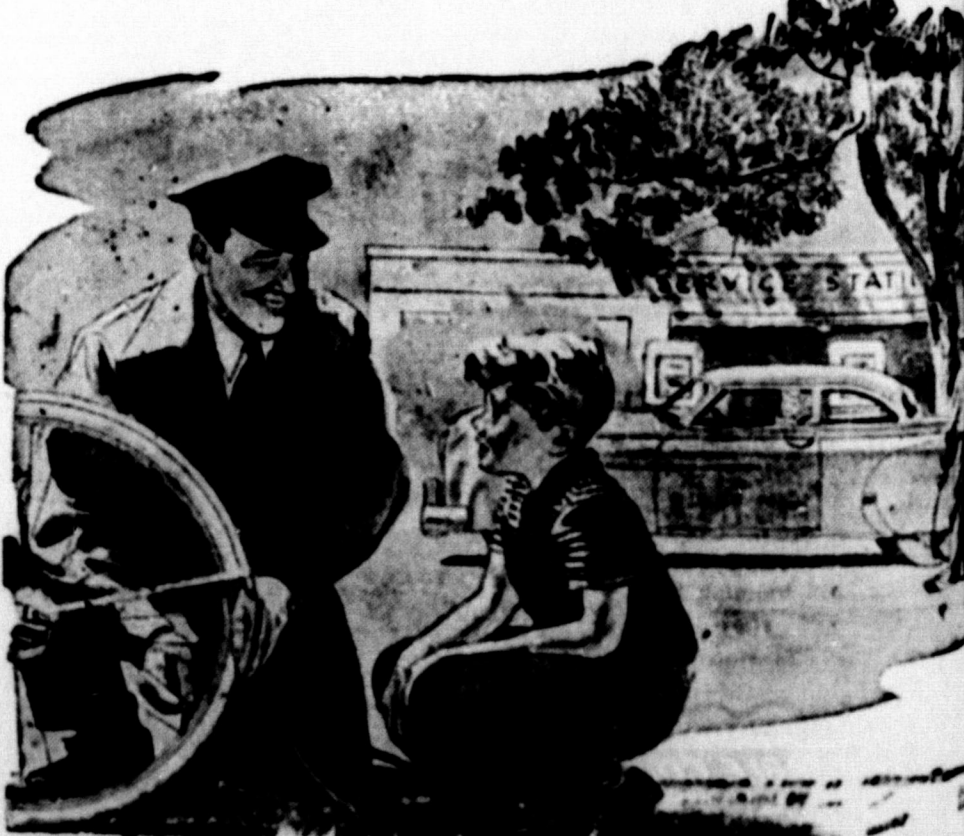

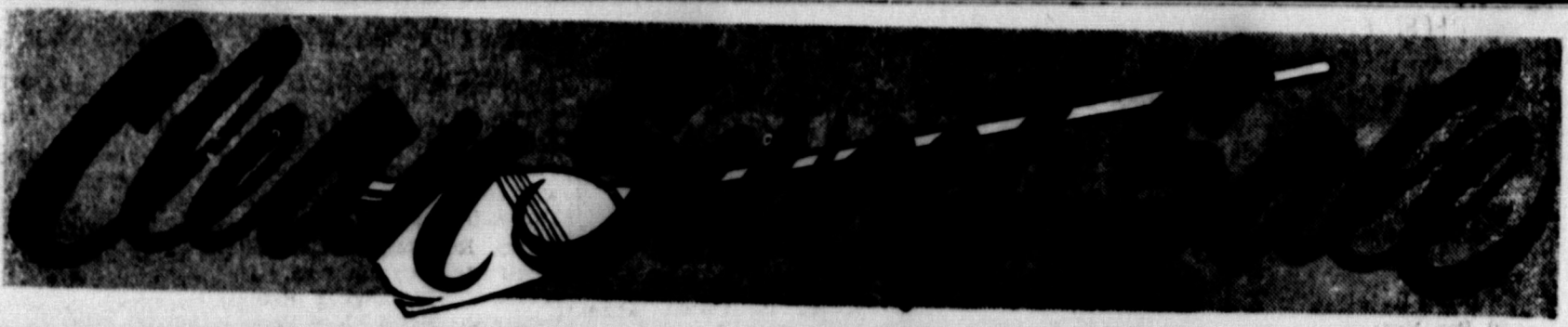

 2 cups light brown sugar
 3 eggs
 1 1/2 teas. soda dissolved in 3 tbs. water
 3 cups oatmeal
 20 candy orange slices cut in small pieces
 1 can angel flake coconut
 3 cups flour
 1 1/2 cups pecans
 1 1/2 teas. baking powder
 Cream shortening and sugar in large mixing bowl. Add eggs, soda, orange slices,

nuts and coconut. Add flour sifted with baking powder. Add oatmeal. Chill several hours before rolling in waxed paper. Slice with sharp knife and bake at 235 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes.

Grapefruit Bread

1 cup grape nuts
 2 cups milk
 1 egg, well beaten
 3/4 cup brown sugar
 3 cups flour
 4 teas. baking powder
 1 teas. salt
 Combine grape nuts, milk and egg. Let stand one-half hour. Add sugar, sift flour, measure and sift with baking powder and salt. Add to grape nuts mixture, mixing thoroughly. Bake in well greased loaf pan in moderately hot oven about 1 hour or until done.

Crockett Test Yields Gas From Canyon Formation

B. W. Wiseman, Jr., Midland, No. 1-5 Crystelle Childress in 5-A-TCRR, Crockett County wildcat 25 miles southwest of Ozona, 3 1/2 miles southeast of the Ozona (Canyon gas) field and three miles west of the firm's No. 1-101 Crystelle Childress, Canyon sand prospect, flowed an unreported amount of gas from the Canyon.

Flow was through a 32-64-inch choke and perforations at 6,043-65 feet, with tubing pressure of 300 pounds. Testing continued.

The No. 1-101 Childress, in 101-WC-A, Vasquez, two miles south and slightly west of production in the Ozona (Canyon gas) field, indicated production when it flowed four barrels of distillate in an unreported time through perforations at 5,750-6,400 feet.
