

West Texas Needs Dorsey Hardeman

If we face political facts, we must admit that the sections of the state with the most influential legislators stand the best chance of getting the most services out of state agencies and funds.

West Texas, since we can't remember when, has been the whipping boy down at Austin while the fat cats from the more populous East and the big city areas got first attention from the state governmental agencies.

West Texas, then, in our estimation, would be downright foolish to trade a legislator of Senator Dorsey Hardeman's stature for a freshman in the State Senate, a fine young man though he must surely be.

Senator Hardeman, perhaps next to the governor himself, is about the most powerful man, politically, in Austin. He is not assigned to the committees of the Senate but picks the ones he wants to serve on, he's that advanced in seniority. He speaks with the silvery tongue of an orator but his words are carefully heard in legislative and administrative offices and when he stands up for his constituency he usually prevails.

Why would West Texas relinquish such influence and political power for a young man and wait another 20 years before it can receive a hearing in Austin? By sheer weight of numbers, already, West Texas is outnumbered by the East in representation. If Dorsey Hardeman is retired, his mantle of authority and influence will be picked up by the next ranking Senator, who, no doubt, is from East Texas, or Dallas, or Houston, or Austin.

Crockett county has always voted for Dorsey Hardeman and no doubt will do so again next Saturday. Only this time it is more important that this county give the Senator a resounding victory in our own ballot boxes. Crockett county owes Senator Hardeman a great deal — for many favors he has done its people through the years. One of the greatest of these, we recall off-hand, was a few years ago when some folks in an adjoining county sought to carve out the oil richest sections of Crockett and Pecos counties and create a new county therefrom, just to make some jobs for certain of their number and benefit their community by making a county seat of it. It was largely the influence of Senator Dorsey Hardeman that nipped this little scheme.

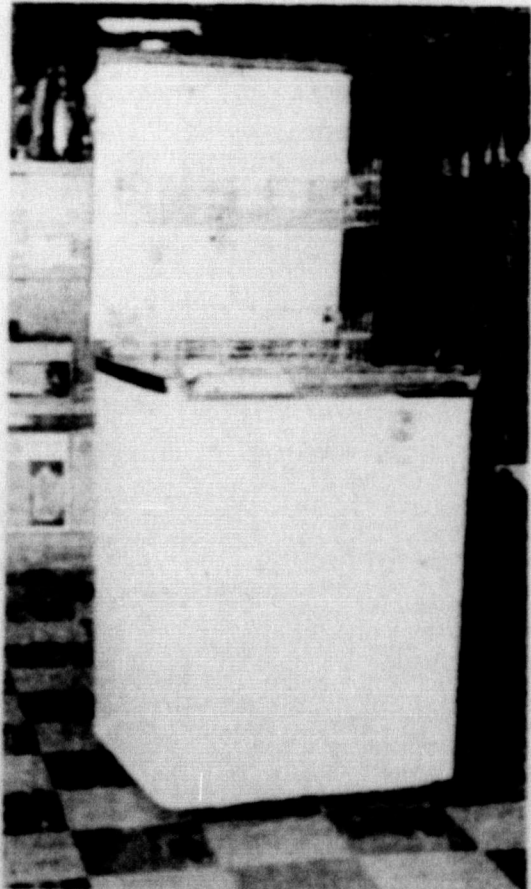

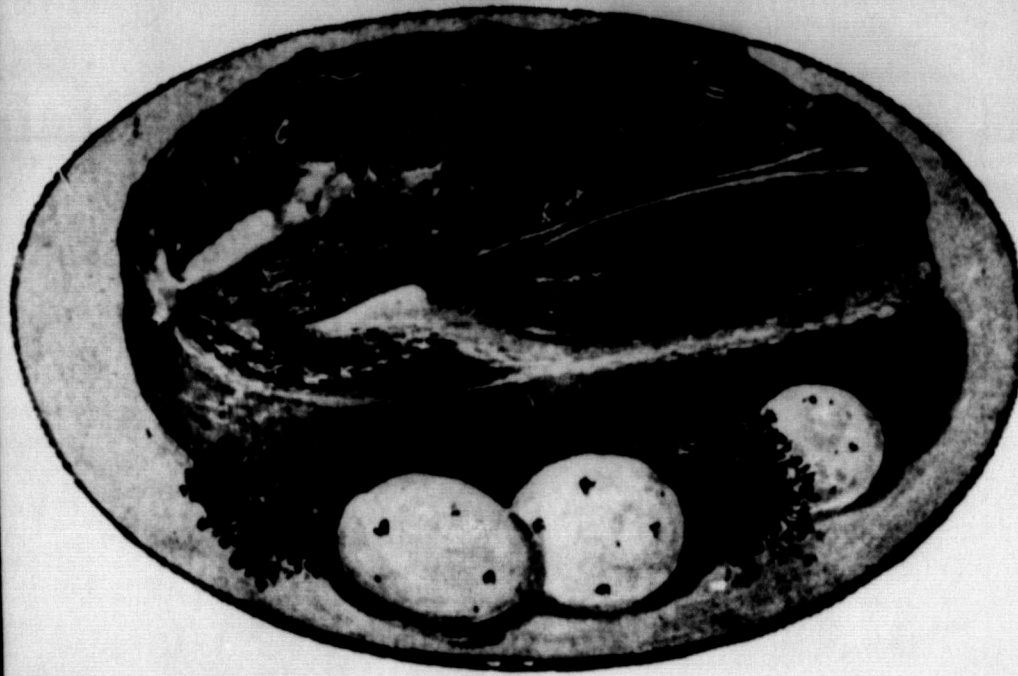

the democratic election. In this case the run-off election will be held 30 days after the May 4 primary.

The winner of the Democratic primary or run-off in the commissioner's race in precinct 3 will have no opponent in November. However, the winners of the Democratic races for commissioner in precincts 1 and 2 will face Republicans Baggett and Applewhite in the November election.
