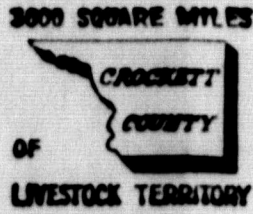

## Rainfall In First Half Of 1968 Averages Over 2 Inches Per Month

Ozona's rainfall average for the past 37 years is 18.11 inches per year. Last year's fall was under average with 13.69 for the entire year of 1967.

Indications point to an above average year for 1968, with over two inches of moisture falling monthly. January recorded 2.98 inches of rain, February, 1.12 inches; March 1.28 inches; April 2.60 inches; May, 3.06 inches; June 2.14 inches for a total of 12.28 inches of rain at the half year mark. The first two weeks in July 2.63 inches of rain fell to bring the yearly total to 14.81 only 3.30 inches short of the yearly average, and already more than the entire yearly total of last year.

Since the Stockman began compiling rainfall records 37 years ago, 1951 was the driest year on record with a year's total of 7.23 inches. The highest amount of rainfall came in 1941, when the

total was 38.08 inches for the year.

The record rainfall for a month occurred in June of 1954, when 12.46 inches fell and Ozona suffered its most disastrous flood. During the flood 40 inches of rain fell in 36 hours on the Marshall Montgomery ranch south of Ozona. This heavy fall was reported to be the most rain to fall in the length of time ever recorded on any spot on the earth. After this heavy fall, only four inches fell in the second half of 1954 and a fall drought inflicted heavy losses on ranchers in the county.

During the past 37 years there were fifty months which recorded no rainfall at all and well over that which recorded less than 25 of an inch of rain.

So far this year, it has rained almost weekly since the first of January and only February and March recorded less than 2 inches of moisture.

## Dr. Childers To Preach Sunday At First Baptist

Dr. Clyde Childers, Vice President for Development at Hardin Simmons University, will preach this Sunday in both morning and evening worship services at the First Baptist Church. The pastor, Jim Hancock, is attending a Continuing Theological Education Conference at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky.

Dr. Childers served the local church from January, 1938, to December, 1944. He was called from Ozona to be the pastor of the Riverside Baptist Church in San Antonio. Dr. Childers served as Area Missionary for the North Texas Area of the Baptist General Convention of Texas before assuming developmental responsibilities at Hardin Simmons. This return visit will be the first time Dr. Childers has preached both Sunday services here since his pastorate.

There will be an all-church fellowship immediately following the evening worship service.

## Rains Continue Toward Making Record Wet July

The total rainfall in Ozona last week amounted to 2.29 inches of moisture for a three-day period from Monday through Wednesday.

The rains generally covered the county with up to 2 inches reported in the extreme western part, up to 4 inch falls reported in the east and southeast parts of the county and 2 to 3 inches generally in the south part of the county.

Some showers fell in the north and northwest parts of the county, but there are some ranches in that area that have not had rain since the middle of May.

Official gauges in Ozona reported 1.8 of an inch of rain from a shower and electrical storm Monday night. Monday night's shower brought the total for the month to 2.53 inches, an above average rainfall figure for the month of July.

Let's retrace some of those steps across the bridges of understanding with Moscow. President Roosevelt told his son, Elliott, that he liked Stalin. Truman once referred to him as "good old Joe." Eisenhower fraternized with Khrushchev in the spirit of Camp David, and the Soviet Premier declared publicly in Paris six months later that President Eisenhower "should have his head bashed against the wall like a cream-stealing cat." Early the next year, President Kennedy flew to Vienna to "negotiate" an understanding with Khrushchev. By October of the following year, he discovered that Mr. K's official representative had brazenly lied to him, and that missiles had been installed in Cuba, pointed at the United States.

Truman and Eisenhower negotiated in Korea — behind Communist lines, where the Communist press photographed the arrival of our negotiating team in jeeps flying white flags — and photographs were circulated throughout Asia claiming

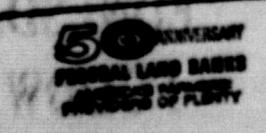

This man looked into every aspect of our business, spoke to all our employees, and when he found one that was doing any anti-Communist work, any free enterprise work, such as making talks like I am making today, he told me to take them off the payroll. When I asked if I could not hire whom I pleased, he replied, 'Don't you know that you are in a

tax bracket above 70 percent; don't you know that when you spend money on what you call education and we call propaganda, that you are spending 70 cents of our money for every 30 cents of yours. We are not going to have our money spent like that.'

"And he took these people off the payroll and charged them back to me personally. This is one more example which shows that as government gets bigger, controls get tighter and yet freedom was the basis on which our whole system worked..."

Over the years, Walter Knott has been one of that breed of businessmen, too rare, who has dared to "put his money where his mouth is." He has sought to preserve for others, and succeeding generations, the

freedom which he and prosper. Thousands on thousands of people can attest to the habits at the famous Berry Farm.

Recipe of the Week

**Beef and Cabbage with Rice**

- 1 pound lean chuck ground
- 1 small cabbage shredded fine
- 1 cup cooked rice
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 6 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 hard boiled eggs, chopped
- 2 tabs. flour
- 2 small cloves garlic, mashed
- 2 tbs. catsup
- 1 cup canned tomatoes
- 1 cup water
- 1 small can mushrooms with liquid
- 1 tbs. chopped parsley
- Salt and pepper

Saute the onion in 2 tbs. butter until soft. Add beef and eggs and heat well. Pour into a fairly shallow but wide casserole. Spread the cabbage on top of the meat mixture. Melt the remaining butter in a sauce pan and blend in the flour. Cook 2-3 minutes then stir in the garlic, catsup, tomatoes, water, mushrooms, parsley, and salt and pepper to taste. Simmer about 5 minutes and pour on top of cabbage. Cover the casserole and bake about 30 minutes in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, then uncover for the last 10 minutes.

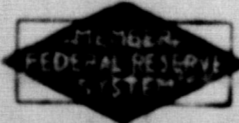

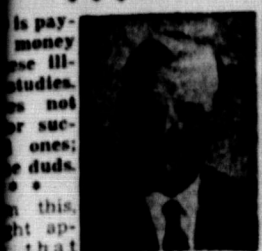

### WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

U.S. Agency for International Development (AID) is conducting a unique file of market surveys written by U.S. businessmen. Each report examines a possible foreign investment and every one concludes the outlook is unfavorable.



Does foreign investment of U.S. money constitute a negative factor in the balance of payments, as the President implied? And if so, why have we been so avidly encouraging it?

The Administration's own Economic Report of 1967 stated: "Over the years, the outflow of U.S. capital has made a major contribution to world economic growth. . . U.S. foreign investment also has yielded handsome returns to American investors and substantial investment income receipts for the balance of payments. . . U.S. investments abroad generates not only a flow of investment income but also additional U.S. exports. From a balance-of-payments standpoint this is an additional dividend."

Does the captain of our Ship of State know which way the wind is blowing? . . . And under the newest policy, what is to become of AID? Old Bureaus never die and they seldom fade away. Perhaps the bureaucrats at AID may be able to save their jobs by launching even more vigorous programs to promote an increasing number of futile market surveys.

### Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

A busy three days in the House preceded the long July 4 holiday week-end. The School Lunch program was continued and expanded; the Federal-Aid Highway program was extended; a Natural Gas Pipeline Safety Act was approved; and two major appropriation measures were cleared — making adjournment in early August more likely.

Right now it appears unlikely that gun legislation will get anywhere in the Congress this year. Congressional authorities, including Carl Albert, Democratic leader of the House, are now saying that to require registration and licensing "would put a burden on the law-abiding citizen and would have no way of reaching the criminal who intends to use his gun for illegal purposes."

Many experts agree with me that mandatory registration would not make a dent in the crime rate. There are more than 100 million guns privately owned. The criminal element would not voluntarily register their guns. That's been the experience in States which require registration. Besides, police records reveal that most guns used in crime are stolen.

Since 1938 all gun dealers have been required to keep records of all sales and to whom sold. That's the law now. Mail orders of pistols are now prohibited, and police scrutiny is applied to all mail order movements of rifles and shotguns. The 1938 Federal Firearm Act, under which Rap Brown was convicted and received five years, covers a multitude of illegal uses of guns. But there has been only token enforcement.

Some improvements to prevent sales of guns to children, the mentally ill, dope addicts, and criminals, can

do some good, without interfering with the right of the law-abiding to continue to purchase guns from dealers, and use them in any legal way desired.

The big need at this time is for more vigorous enforcement of laws we already have — particularly with respect to those who use guns for illegal purposes.

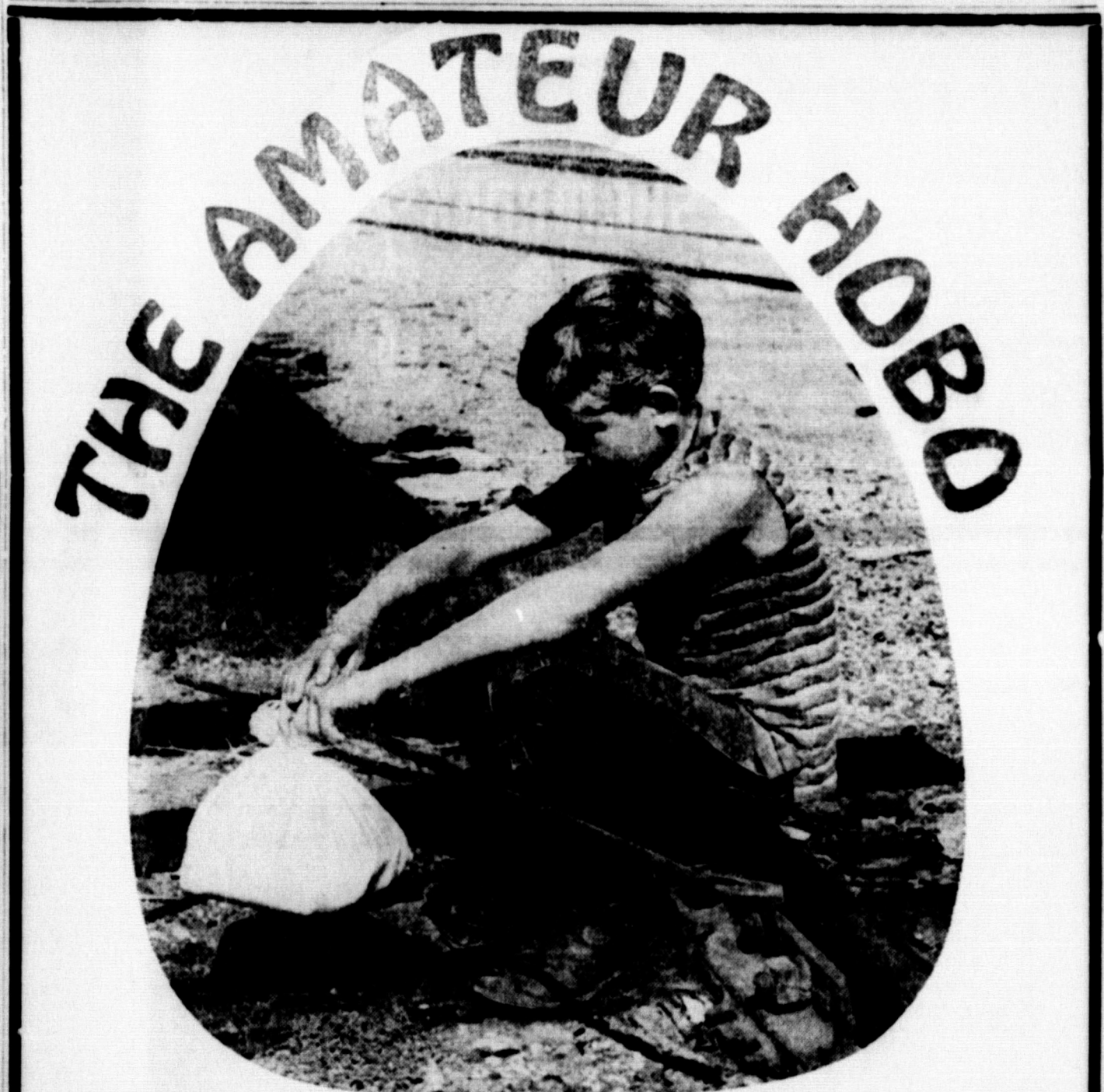

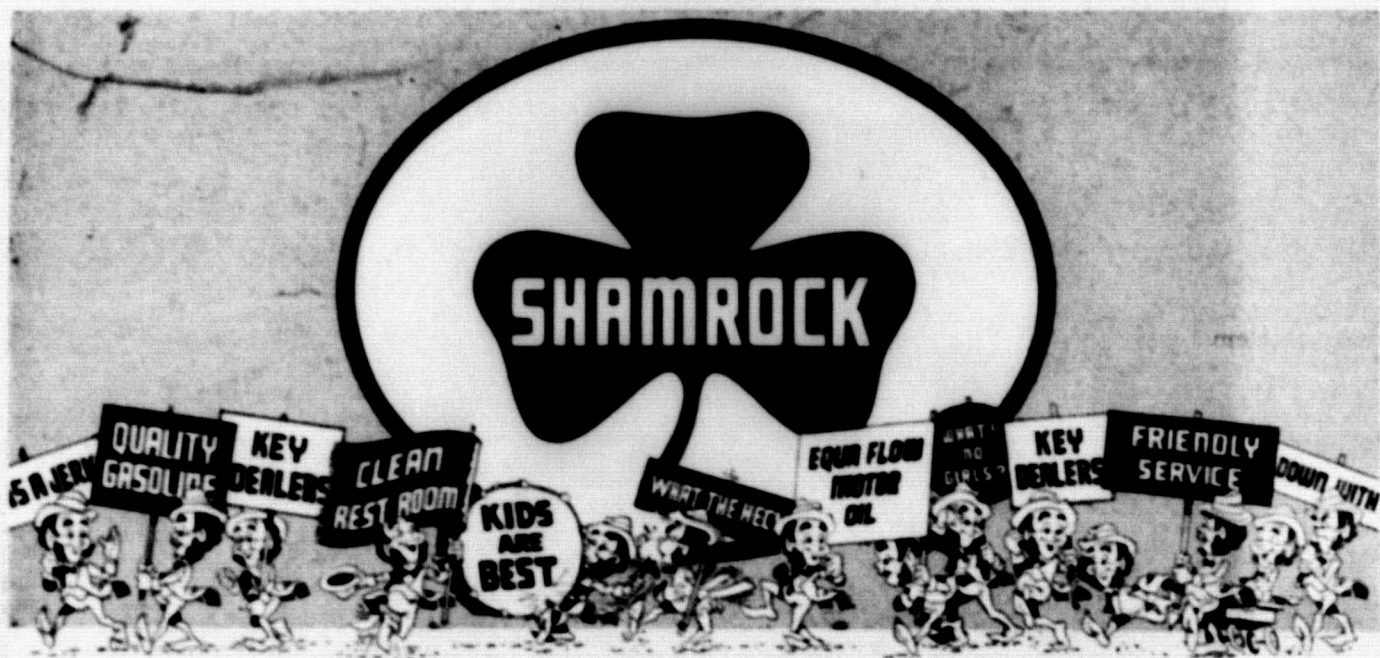

**HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS**

**Austin, Texas** — When the special session of the 60th Legislature called it quits and went home, its accomplishments seemed scant from a cold statistical point of view.  
During the 30 days of the session called by Gov. John Connally, the 150 House members introduced 32 bills, and the 31 senators kicked in 30. When all was said and done, only five House bills and no Senate bills were passed.

However, two of those House bills were the reasons Connally called the session in the first place. So their passage within the allotted 30 days gave an appearance of success to the session.  
One, of course, was the bill making state appropriations for the fiscal year beginning September 1, and the other was the tax bill to raise the money to pay for all those appropriations.

Texas taxpayers will start feeling the bite October 1 when the one-cent increase in the state sales tax, the one-cent increase in the motor-vehicle sales tax and the 50-cent-per-\$1,000 increase in the franchise tax go into effect.  
Only other thing of substance that the two houses agreed on was creation of the Governor's Advisory Committee on Physical Fitness. This was done by resolution.

Each house did create interim committees to study certain problems and report back to the next Legislature.  
Senate set up a committee "to study the problem of locating and securing more land which could be set aside for parks and recreational purposes, the better utilization of existing parks and development of existing parks to accommodate more visitors."

House created interim committees to study the Texas Election Code, the financial relationship between permittees and licensees under the Liquor Control Act and the need for laws on organ transplantation.  
Also, the lower chamber set up a Natural Fiber Study Committee and a Family Law Study Committee and asked the University of Texas Graduate School of Business to study the possible creation

of a Texas Stock Exchange.  
**Sales-Tax Schedule** — When the new increase in the state sales tax goes into effect on October 1, shoppers in cities which have adopted the city sales tax will begin paying the first of the four pennies when they spend their first 13 cents.  
Tax applicable to city-sales - tax - covered sales: From 1 cent to 12 cents, no tax; 13 cents to 37 cents, one penny; 38 cents to 62 cents, two pennies; 63 cents to 86 cents, three pennies; and 87 cents to \$1.12, four pennies.  
Shoppers in areas where there is no city sales tax are facing this schedule: 1 cent to 16 cents, no tax; 17 cents to 49 cents, one penny; 50 cents to 83 cents, two pennies; and 84 cents to \$1.16, three pennies.  
However, the Legislature did kick in a few more exceptions. One exempts sales through a coin-operated vending machine when each sale is for 16 cents or less, and another will exempt shipping charges when they are figured separately from the price of the commodities.

**TS-GRA Meet to Stress Promotion Industry Product**

Wool and mohair promotion, marketing and industry improvement in general will highlight the 53rd annual convention of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association when it convenes in Dallas July 22.  
Heading the list of special speakers will be W. E. "Hi" Overton of Yesco, New Mexico, president of the National Wool Growers Association. Other featured speakers include: Alvin Hay, C. P. A. of San Angelo, member of the National Livestock Tax Committee; Dr. W. E. Black, Extension Economist in Marketing and Policy at Texas A&M University; and Dr. Zerle Carpenter, associate professor of Animal Science at Texas A&M University.
