Shocking as they were, none matches the words of a "song" which the Yuma, Colorado, Pioneer has discovered in "New Hymns For A Day," published by the Youth Departments of the WCC and the World Council of Christian Education.

We print it not to offend anyone, but rather because we believe our readers will want to know about it, and whether or not any monies

collected at their church are going to the World Council of Churches.

#### BITING OFF THE NOSE

A pet charge of Vietnam critics is that we are "saying a country by destroying it." Perhaps it is valid if taken in the context of "why destroy South Vietnam while aiding the nations that are furnishing and transporting materials to North Vietnam, while preventing South Vietnam, from blocking Haiphong Harbor." But we have seen no complaints from critics on an analogous situation regarding Rhodesia, the United States and the Soviet Union. Perhaps these critics have not gotten around to reading the Congressional Record on November 22 and December 6, 1967.

Chrome is recognized as one of the important strategic metals essential to our

military and space programs. Our current stockpiles of chromite are sufficient for only 6 months; strategic stockpile requirements call for a 2½ year supply. There are only two sources of high-grade chrome ore, Rhodesia and the Soviet Union.

On January 5, 1967, President Johnson issued an executive order implementing the United Nations' sanctions against Rhodesia. Those sanctions were voted by the Security Council at the request of Great Britain.

Footo Mineral Co. is a wholly-owned US enterprise which had mined chrome ore in Rhodesia for years, shipping it to its processing plants in Ohio and West Virginia. Following issuance of the executive order, the company reduced its mining operations to the minimum necessary to keep the mines from flooding. It requested permission to import 40,000

tons of ore per year, a minimum to keep the mines in operation and to preclude flooding which would require at least three years and millions of dollars for rehabilitation. The permit was denied, apparently at the behest of our State Department.

If the Rhodesian mines are closed, it will mean the scattering of 27 European experts, some 1,200 skilled African employees and their 3,800 dependents. The Ohio and West Virginia operations will be idled. And the United States will be dependent upon the Soviet Union for a vital strategic material, the price of which has been escalated 25 percent to the detriment of our ailing "balance of payments."

We doubt that any editorial comment is necessary.

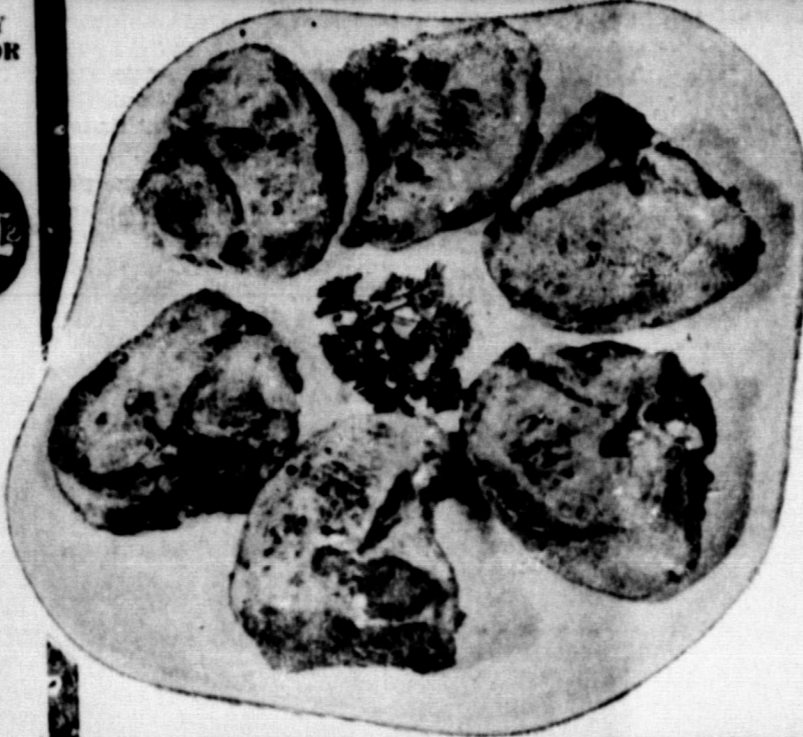

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (JUR 20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

"This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

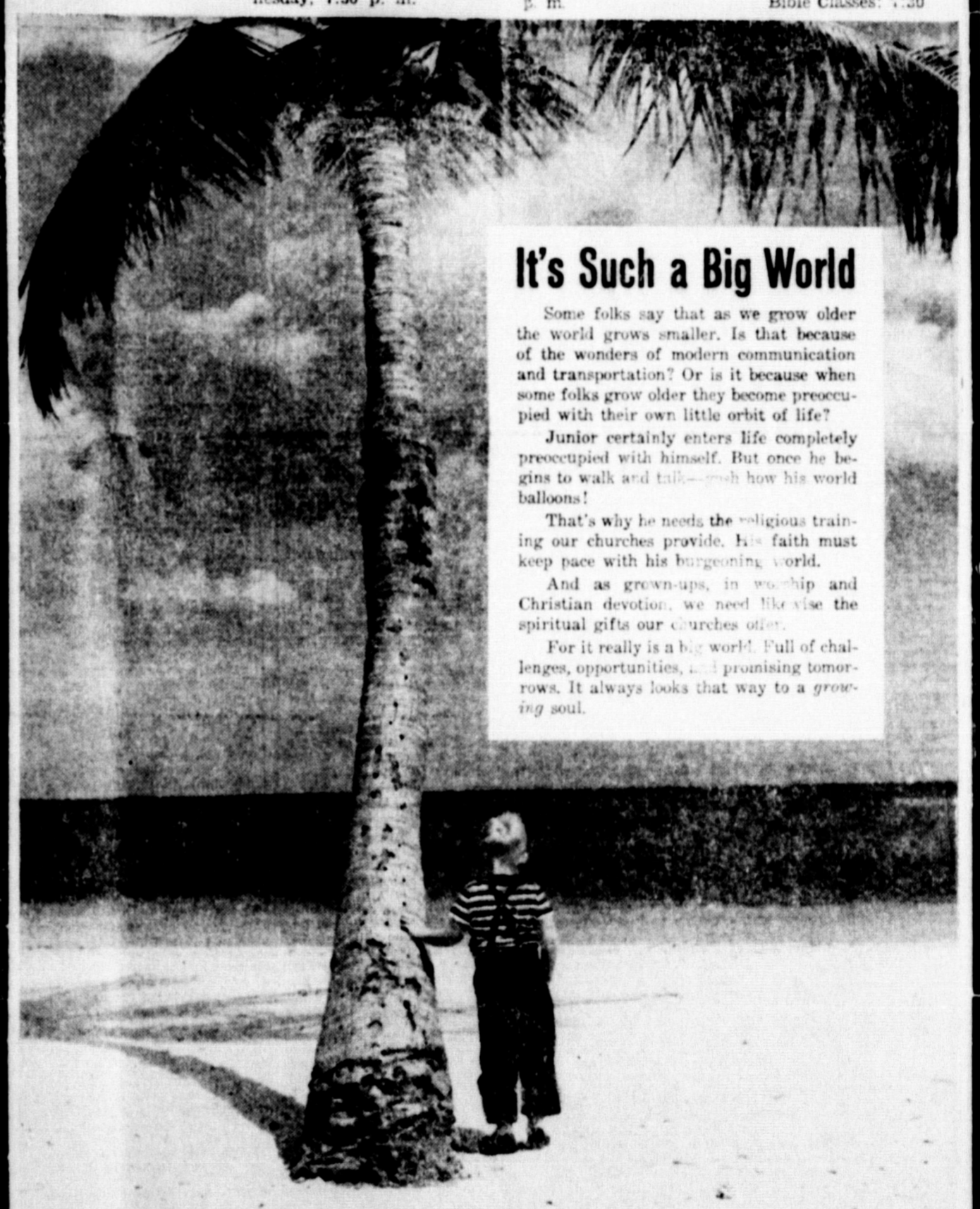

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

Strawn Gas Strike Finaled In South Crockett Co. Area

The Canyon Co. Ltd., M.D. land, No. 1-74 Inez Hedgpeeth Crockett County Strawn gas discovery, 2 1/2 miles southeast of Ozona and 8 1/2 miles southeast of the one-well Miller (Ellenburger) field, has been completed for a calculated, absolute open flow of 5,500,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day.

Production was through perforations at 11,549-647 feet, which had been acidized with 10,000 gallons. Total depth is 12,974 feet, and the plugged-back depth is 11,941 feet, with 4 1/2-inch casing seated at that depth. Location is 1,104 feet from the north and 850 feet from the east lines of 74-G-GH&SA.

An Ellenburger discovery was indicated in Crockett County with the unloading of 31 barrels of oil and the reversing out of 62 barrels of 44 gravity oil, along with 21 barrels of water blanket, on a drillstem test at J. L. Brown, Jr., Midland, No. 1 Ruth Schlinke, in 6-BE2-J. A. Stowell, Abst. 5333, 15

miles south of Rankin, eight miles northwest of the one-well Meek (Canyon) field and 5 1/2 miles northwest of the one-well Que Suerto (Pennsylvanian) field.

On the five-hour test at 11,380-420 feet, using a 2,000-foot water blanket, gas surfaced in two hours and 16 minutes, rated at 40,000 cubic feet daily and decreasing to 32,000 cubic feet at the end of the test.

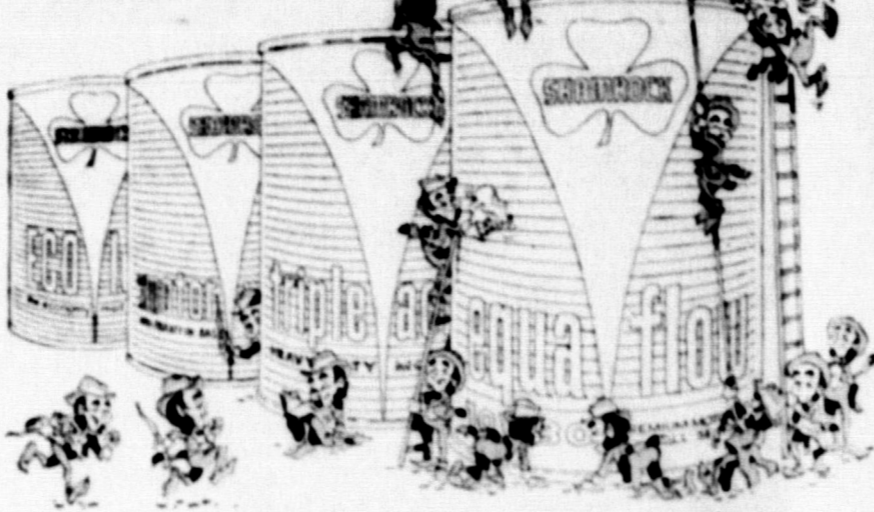
Flowing pressure was 1,397-3,605 pounds; 1 1/2-hour
