Paul Hallcomb, Former Ozonan, Buried Wed.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon for Paul M. Hallcomb, 87, former Crockett county ranchman, who died Saturday in a nursing home in Cookeville, Tenn., after a long illness.

Services were held from the Ozona Church of Christ with Bill Brown, former minister of the Ozona Church of Christ, now of Lubbock, conducting the services. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under direction of James Funeral Home.

Mr. Hallcomb was born Dec. 12, 1880, in Russell county. The family moved to Sonora and he came to Ozona at the age of 21 years. He operated a barber shop in Ozona for several years, after entering the ranch business, continuing until his retirement in 1960. He married Minta Miller, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jones Miller, pioneer Crockett county ranching couple, on July 15, 1906.

Surviving are a son, Paul M. Hallcomb of Cookeville, Tenn., and two grandchildren, Mrs. Koy Lee Adcock, of Rock Island, Tenn., and William Hall Hallcomb of Cookeville.

New Cold Front Triggers Shower

A trace of rain fell Wednesday morning as a cold front moved into the county, but there were no reports of measurable amounts in the area. With only .09 of an inch of moisture so far in October, it is the driest month of the year, and local residents are recalling 1966 when abundant rains fell in the area until October and no moisture was recorded again until February of 1967.

As of this date, the rainfall for the year is already well above average, standing at 19.73 inches. Both May and July brought over 3 inches of rainfall. January, April, June and August averaged well over two inches, with Feb. March and Sept. recording well over an inch.

Joe Couch Named SCD Supervisor; Cox Re-Elected

Joe Couch was appointed supervisor of zone 4 to fill the unexpired term of the late Fred Hagestein, in a meeting of the supervisors of the Crockett County Soil Conservation District, on Tuesday night of this week.

Bascomb Cox was re-elected as supervisor of Zone 5 in an election of land owners of Zone 5.

R. A. Harrell was re-elected as chairman of the board for another year. Bill Baggett was named vice-chairman and Bascomb Cox named secretary. Charles E. Davidson, III, is the other supervisor making up the five-man board that supervises conservation work carried on by the Soil Conservation Service in the county.

Ballots Ready, Absentee Voting Now Under Way

Official ballots for the general election, which will be held November 5, were completed this week, and absentee voting began Wednesday. For the first time in a general election, there will be no scratching of names. Voters are reminded to place an X in the box beside the name of the candidate of their choice. Those wishing to vote a straight ticket may place an X in the box beside the party of their choice.

Offices are listed in the first column on the left side of the ballot, in order of national, state and local offices. A full slate of nominees for the Democratic Party appears in the next column, followed by the largest slate of Republican nominees to appear in years. The American Party is listed next, with only the presidential nominee, and is followed by the write-in column.

Fourteen proposed constitutional amendments to the Texas Constitution occupy the entire righthand side of the ballot. In each instance the proposal is stated with boxes beside For and Against for the voter to indicate his choice by an X.

Polling places include the courthouse for precinct 1, the high school building for precinct 2, south elementary school for precinct 4 and the Civic Center for precinct 3 voters. Out of town boxes are at Powell Field and WTU Power Plant.

Voters are reminded to follow the instructions on the ballot and avoid making any other marks on the face of the ballot. Scratched ballots, names encircled or any other method of marking may be thrown out by election judges.

Lion B Team And Cubs Play Big Lake Tonite

Ozona's junior high Cubs and Lion B will encounter the Big Lake teams this afternoon. The Lions will host the Reagan County B here at Lion Stadium at 7 o'clock and the Cubs will journey to Big Lake to play at 5:30.

The Cubs took an easy victory from the Sonora Colts Thursday afternoon by a score of 38-16, while the Lions suffered their second loss of the season. Earlier in the year the Lions downed the Broncos 26-0, but this time the tables turned and the score was 31-8 the Broncos.

Coach Womack cleared the benches early in the junior high game and still the Cubs scored. Ruben Tambunga, Jeff Stuart, Tim Evans and Gerald Olson were responsible for the Cub scoring.

The Lions got off to a bad start, allowing the Broncos to score early in the first period on a fumble. However, they narrowed the Bronco lead 13-8 when Greg Stuart got loose for a 35-yard sweep and a Lion touchdown. David Williams hit Arturo Torres for the two points.

Hit with penalties on almost every play, the Lions fumbled a kick return and Sonora scored again, stretching their lead 19-8 at the half.

Sonora scored on a 65-yard pass and run play in the opening moments of the second half and after that it was no contest. Penalties plagued the Lions throughout the game, rendering both the offense and defense completely helpless.

Three members of the Cubs were lost for the season, due to grades, and Jim Montgomery, starting quarterback for the Lions B, moved up to the varsity after Lion quarterback Randal Clepper was injured in the Sonora game.

New Addition To Ozona Gets Co. Approval

Crockett County Commissioners court met Monday in regular meeting and received various reports.

The budget for the county was reviewed and showed the county to be in excellent financial condition this far in the year.

J. C. Thompson, who purchased the Dick Henderson ranch several months ago, submitted a request for a new addition to the city of Ozona, to be located on the west hill and be known as the Childress-Mitchell addition.

Bids were opened for grass leases on two county traps. Bud Harrison was high bidder on the Ingham south of town and Jesus bid high on the Henderson trap north of town.

Judge Bernice Jones read a letter from the Dallas County commissioners court asking the voters of Crockett County to vote for amendment number 4 in the general election. The amendment must be passed by the (Continued on Last Page)

Continued Spread Of Screwworms Noted In County

Screwworm infestation in the county continues at a fast pace as 304 cases have been reported to the Screwworm Eradication headquarters at Mission, Texas. One hundred twelve cases have been reported during the past two weeks. The cases are pretty well scattered over the entire county, according to county Agent Pete W. Jacoby. Some ranches reporting many cases earlier have not reported cases the past two weeks while a number of the cases have shown up on ranches that had not reported outbreaks before.

While most of the cases reported seem to have been caused by shearing or in sheep's heads, probably caused by ram fighting or by horn flies, quite a few of the reported cases indicate that castration or similar wounds were made, allowing for cases of screwworms, Jacoby said.

Ranchmen should use all precautions toward stopping the spread of the screwworm by doping wounds and spraying animals when ever possible.

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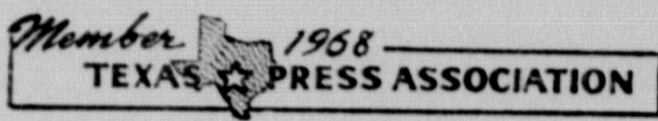

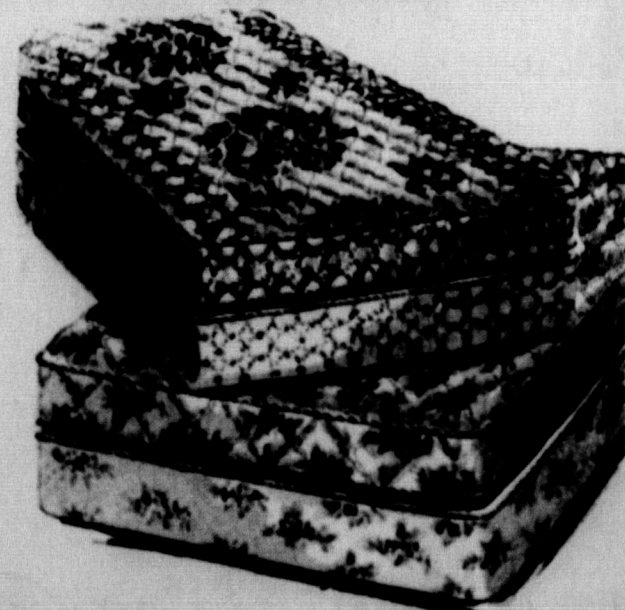

Parcel Post And Catalog Rates To Advance Oct. 19

Postmaster Floyd Hokit announced early this week that higher parcel post and catalog rates will go into effect Saturday, Oct. 19. The rate increase will average 16.5 percent and in most cases will mean an additional ten cents postage per parcel.

The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in order to bring revenue from this type of mail within 4 percent of operating costs, as required by law, according to Hokit. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth class mail, on a break-even basis. Also, additional revenue is needed from parcel post and catalogs to offset higher costs resulting from pay increases approved last year for postal employees.

Under the new rates minimum charge for local delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. Minimum charges for

parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50 to 60 cents.

Almost all parcels charged up to \$1.10 under present rates will go up 10 cents. This accounts for more than 80 percent of all parcel post. There will be a 15 cent hike on parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4, and a 20 cent increase on parcels now charged \$4 and more.

And most of us are quite confident that the rains will come. I notice in last week's happenings of 29 years ago...

But Autumn as usual has stirred up our political enthusiasm and our sporting mood. With the world series sucked away, Olympics in full swing, and college and high school football crowding our calendars...

I am sure everybody in Crockett County has been real proud of our Lions. They have given excellent account of themselves. Unfortunately for me, conflicts in schedule have kept me away from too many games this season.

But I sure plan to be on hand Friday night when we engage Crane, currently rated as I understand No. 2 team in AA for all Texas.

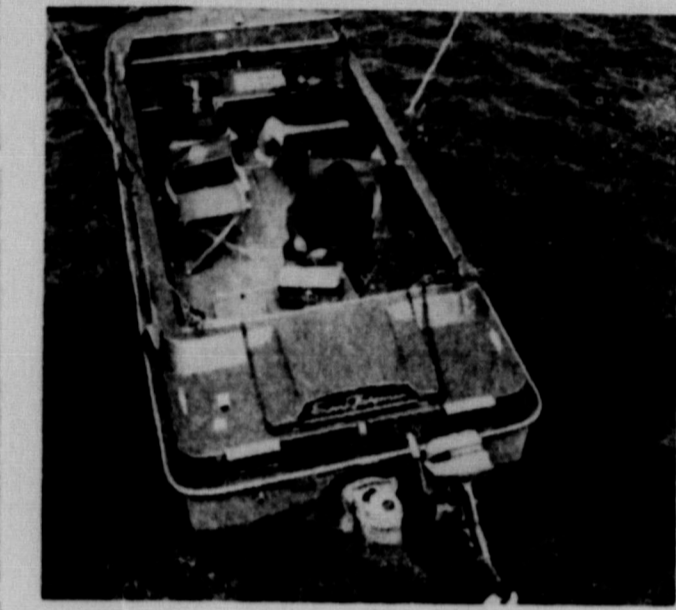
Ozona Service Man Completes Training As Air Controller

The court also discussed amendment number 11. This particular amendment was brought to their attention last week at the State Assn. of County Judges and Commissioners in Austin. In a business session from the floor, an El Paso county commissioner asked that those present help defeat the amendment. Speaking for the people of El Paso county, he said approval of the amendment would be a step toward metro government, where some county officials would be appointed rather than elected by the voting majority. The spokesman from Tarrant County, a county commissioner, also asked that the proposal be defeated.

The proposed amendment in question reads, "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties."

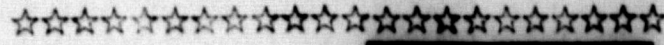
