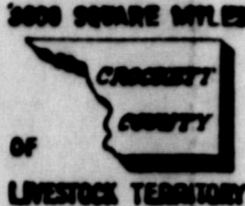

Junction received the ball and chucked up four first downs before the Lions dug in and put up a fierce defense. With Robert Maldonado leading in the tackle department, the Junction offense was stymied as far as yardage was concerned by the fired up Lion defense.

## Week-End Auto Accidents Take Property Toll

Weekend accidents took a high toll in property damage, but motorists involved escaped injury. Rainslick highways were directly responsible for two mishaps Friday on Hwy. 290, east of Ozona in the construction area.

Friday morning Margaret Becker of Austin lost control of a 1968 Ford panel wagon as she rounded a curve in the detour six miles east of town. The wagon skidded on the slick road, careened off the road and overturned. Estimated damage to the vehicle, belonging to the University of Texas and used in its special education program, was \$3,000. Miss Becker was not injured.

Carol Huntoon of Bayonne, N. J. attempted to pass another vehicle Friday afternoon 5 miles east on Hwy 290 and lost control of the 1967 Oldsmobile she was driving. The car slipped and spun around in the road, hitting a culvert and barricade before going through a fence and coming to rest in a pasture. Occupants of the vehicle escaped injury. Damage was estimated at \$400.

Saturday morning shortly after midnight Mrs. C. W. Musick, accompanied by her two small children, ran off the road 16 miles west of town on Hwy 290 in a 1959 pickup. The vehicle skidded in heavy mud near the roadside and overturned. Her husband was following in another car. Damage to the pick-up was \$75. The Musicks were in process of moving to Ozona when the accident occurred.

Midnight Saturday, Carle Pitts was making a turn in the Village Shopping Center when he hit a telephone pole. Pitts escaped injury, and damage to the 1955 Oldsmobile he was driving was \$75.

## Rains General Over County In Week-End Fall

Light rain fell all day Friday and into the morning Saturday for a total of 70 of an inch of moisture here in Ozona. Earlier in the month showers amounted to .64 of an inch of rain. At mid-month 1.34 inches had been recorded for September bringing the total for the year to 19.87 inches of moisture.

North of town, the Vaughn ranch recorded 1.5 inches for the 24-hour period. Two inches was reported on the Harris ranch in the extreme northwest portion of the county, while the J. O. Taylor ranch southeast of Ozona reported a 3-inch fall. The rain was general throughout the county with all areas reporting 5 of an inch and up.

The five-day forecast for this area calls for near normal to below normal temperatures with precipitation normal.

## Chamber Invites Ranchers To List Hunting Leases

All ranchers who are interested in getting their deer leases included on the lists distributed by the Chamber of Commerce are urged to get the information to the Chamber this week. Completed lists for the 1968 hunting season will start going out next week. Hubert Baker, manager, said.

Prospects look great for a good season this year, both from the standpoint of the deer crop and the number of inquiries already coming in for information on hunting leases, Baker declared. He expressed the Chamber's thanks for the cooperation already received from ranchers interested in leasing.

## Oct. 15 Election Date For Zone 5 SCS Supervisor

Zone 4 residents of the State's 185 soil conservation districts have an election date to keep on October 15. Pete Jacoby, County Agricultural Agent, says the election is very important and he urges all eligible voters to cast their ballot.

Zone 5 voters in Crockett Soil Conservation District will elect a farmer or ranchman who will serve as their supervisor and representative on the Soil Conservation District Board for the next five years. Time and place for the October 15 balloting is the SCS Office in Ozona.

L. B. Cox, Jr., is the present supervisor from zone 5 in this county.

A qualified voter is a zone 5 landowner who is over 21 years of age or older. Wives of eligible landowners can vote and should do so since they have an interest in their soil conservation district.

The Agent points out that soil conservation districts are sub-divisions of the State of Texas and by law are charged with the responsibility of carrying out a soil and water conservation program in their district. Through them such items as technical service, equipment, leadership in small watershed projects and many other services are provided to cooperating landowners.

If you are a qualified voter Jacoby urges you to participate in the October 15 election because of the great importance of the districts and the supervisors who direct our Conservation Programs.

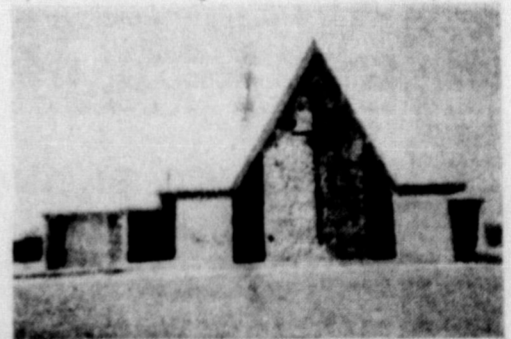

## New Faith Lutheran Church To Be Dedicated In Sunday Service

The new sanctuary of Faith Lutheran Church, Ozona, will be dedicated Sunday, September 22, at 6 p. m. The Reverend Eugene Gruell, executive director of missions for the Texas District of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, will give the dedicatory sermon. Rev. Stuart F. Firnhaber, pastor of Faith Lutheran, will serve as liturgist and officiate in the rite of dedication. The senior choir of Trinity Lutheran Church, San Angelo, will also participate.



The church has the basic design of a Celtic cross. It features a massive front constructed of native West Texas field stone. On both the sanctuary side and outside of this front wall are mounted huge crosses of structural steel. The side windows are colored fiber-glass.

The building is completely air-conditioned and has an overflow seating capacity of approximately 150. The building was designed by the San Angelo Architectural

Johnny Barbee led the defense with 14 tackles. The Lions first score came in the second quarter when a fumble in the Junction backfield was recovered by Tom Davidson at the Junction 30. Three plays later Coates ran the ball around left end from seven yards out for the score. The kick for the extra point was no good and at halftime the score was 6-0 Ozona.

Junction scored early in the third quarter to even the odds, even though they were a minus 2 yards for the first half. The score came on a quarterback sneak by Brent Rice from two yards out. The PAT was no good.

Neither team was able to get any sort of offensive drive going until late in the fourth quarter, when the Ozona offense came alive and drove downfield. With two (Continued on Last Page)

Sleo Thompson, Dallas, and Ozona will drill a 10,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 11 miles west-southwest of Ellenburger production in the Escondido, Multipay field, but separated by Ellenburger failures, and three miles southwest of the dual opener and lone producer in the Escondido, Northwest (Ellenburger and Pennsylvanian detrital) field. It is the No. 1 Shannon.

Location is 990 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 4-2-GC&SF. Estimated elevation is 2,450 feet.

**Creamy Potatoes**

5 cups sliced potatoes  
1 can mushroom soup  
1/2 cup milk  
1 medium onion minced  
Mix soup with milk and onion. Butter a medium casserole and arrange alternate layers of potatoes and soup. Cover and bake 1 hour in 375 degree oven. Uncover and bake an additional 15 minutes.

**Princess Potatoes**

6 cups grated raw potatoes  
1/2 cup melted butter  
1 1/4 cups grated onion  
1 cup minced celery  
2 teas. salt  
1/2 teas. paprika  
The simplest way to prepare grated potatoes is to do them in a blender. Do these in 2 or 3 batches and with the last batch add the onion and celery. Mix all ingredients together and pour into a well-buttered 2-qt. casserole, and bake 1 hour in a 375 degree oven.

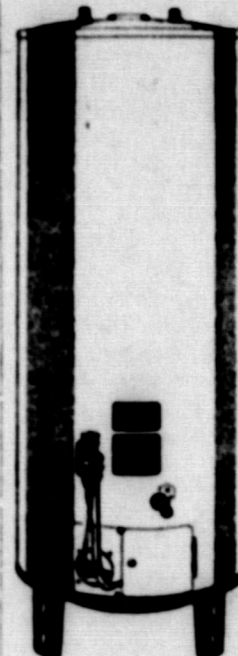

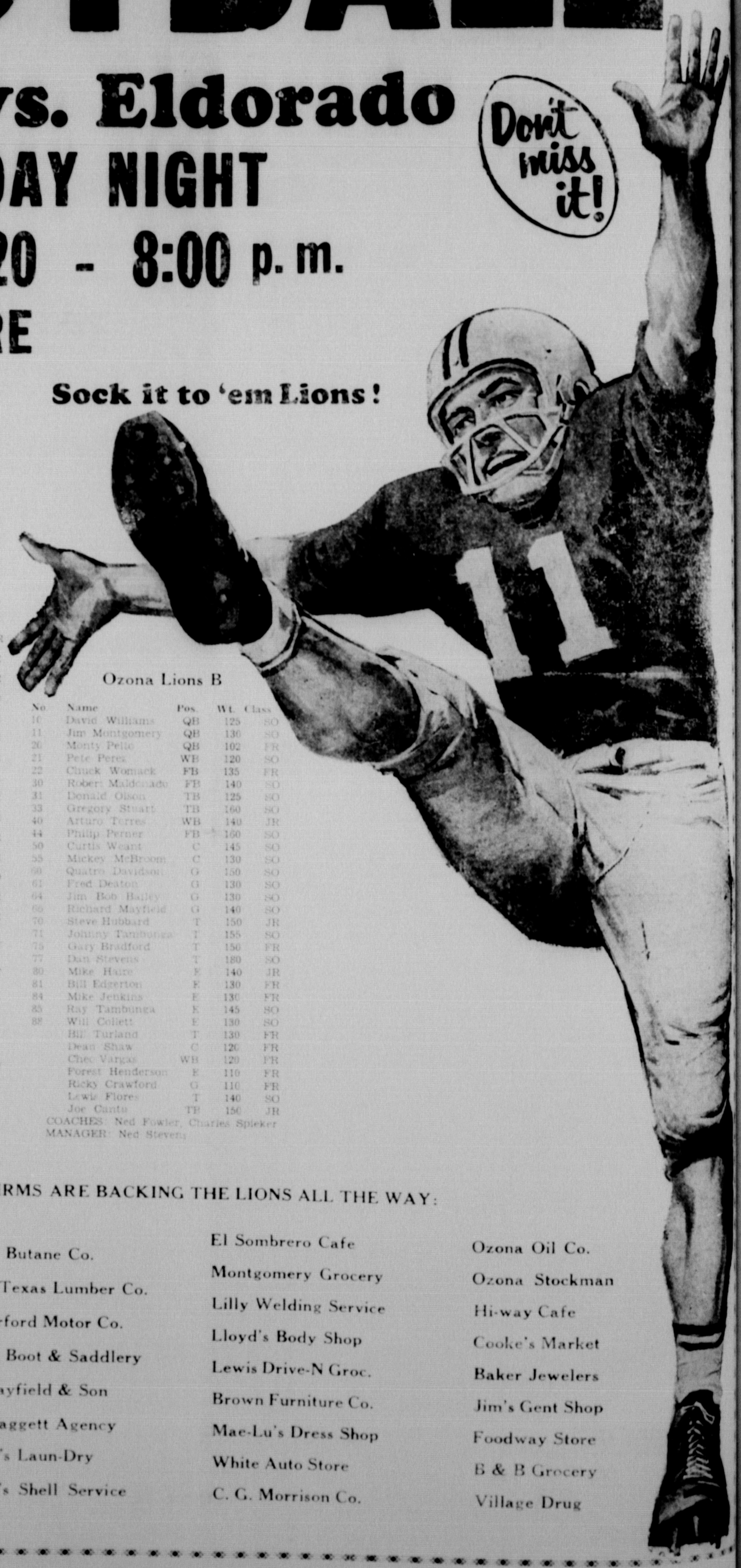

ditional supplementary funds as soon as possible after the new Congress convenes in January, 1969. The Trustees of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, the producers' official organization, will be leading this drive for these funds but a concerted effort on the part of every producer is also necessary. At the meeting on August 27 in San Antonio, representatives of the Mexican Livestock Confederation presented information to the effect that the Mexican Government was ready to start negotiations with the U. S. Government for the creation of a joint program. Mexico will provide one-half of the expenses and an additional sterile fly producing facility will be established at the Estancia de Tehuantepec, a barrier zone at the Isthmus would be very expensive to maintain. The early history of the eradication program in Texas and the Southwest proved that livestock producers, using their own money and not being bound by governmental red tape, could build the required production facilities at less than half the cost of a federally built plant. Mexican livestock producers have indicated a desire and willingness to join U. S. farmers and ranchers in raising the necessary NON-federal funds to construct the necessary plant in Mexico, thereby saving at least two years time and possibly 2 to 3 million dollars. This is something really worth considering. What will Texas livestock owners say? Do you want to help write the final chapter on screw-worms in your herds? Most of the members of the

**27 Worm Cases Confirmed Past Week In County**

Screwworms continue to plague Crockett county stockmen and are the cause of increasing alarm among officials of the screwworm control center at Mission.

There have been a total of 110 confirmed cases in the county so far this year, 27 additional cases having been reported since last week, County Agent Pete Jacoby reports.

Cases reported in this county since last week include the following: T. A. Kincaid, Jr., 1; W. W. Owens 2; Jess C. Marley, 13; A. B. Hoover, Jr., 8; Hudspeth Hospital Ranch, 1; Max Schneemann, 1; and J. S. Pierce, III, 1.

The sterile screwworm fly production plant at Mission is producing more than twice the number of flies per week as it was originally designed to produce, T. A. Kincaid, Jr., a member of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation board of trustees, reported here this week. But the need for hot-spotting outbreak areas and maintaining the buffer zone from Mexico is overtaxing the plant's capacity. All livestock producers are urged to take every precaution to guard their herds against possible infestation.

**Ask Stockmen To Keep Sharp Watch For Fever Ticks**

Fever ticks have been found outside the South Texas Quarantine Zone, advises County Agent Pete W. Jacoby.

He said Dr. James B. Henderson, Executive Director, Texas Animal Health Commission, Austin, made the announcement and asked stockmen to send a sample of ticks found on either cattle or horses to a regulatory laboratory for identification. The importance of the samples cannot be overemphasized, Dr. Henderson said, and it is urgent that stockmen throughout the State cooperate.

Ticks should be placed in a vial of commercial alcohol and mailed to the State-Federal Laboratory, Third Floor, Western Republic Life Building, Austin, Texas 78701. A label or memorandum should accompany the sample listing the name of the owner, the mailing address, location of the farm or ranch, and type of animal from which the tick or ticks were removed.

As an aid, Jacoby said the vials used for submitting screwworm samples for identification could be utilized. They are available at his office, Ranch Feed & Supply and Ozona Wool & Mohair Company. Do not send tick samples to Mission—change label to the Austin Address.

Because of the importance and urgency of this sampling program, all cattle and horse owners in Crockett County are asked to closely observe their animals for tick infestation and submit to the Austin Laboratory specimens if and when discovered. Assistance is available at the County Agent's office, he said.
