J. A. Pelto, High School Principal, Buried Here Mon.

Funeral services for Jorma A. Pelto, 48, Ozona High School principal, were held Monday afternoon at the First Baptist Church with Rev. Jim Hancock, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill cemetery under the direction of Janes Funeral Home.

Mr. Pelto died Saturday afternoon at 6 p. m. en route to Crockett County Hospital apparently of a heart attack.

Born Oct. 18, 1920 in Virginia, Minn., he had lived in Ozona the past 10 years. He was a veteran of World War II and a Lieutenant Colonel in the Air Force Reserve. He joined the Air Force Reserve while he was a student at Texas Christian University in Ft. Worth and was a P-47 pilot in World War II.

He was a graduate of TCU and the star of the 1941 and 1942 basketball teams there. He was dubbed the "terrible Swede" during a tournament and the nickname "Swede" stayed with him the rest of his life.

He was married to Marjo DeMontel May 26, 1951, in Tyler. Mrs. Pelto was a member of the faculty then and still teaches in the Ozona system.

In 1948 he came to Ozona as head basketball coach and led his team to regional finals the first year. His teams won seven district championships during his 10 years as coach.

He resigned his duties as coach in 1958 to assume the duties of high school principal.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Jan; two sons, Monte and Mike, all of the home, and a sister, Sirka Majlicica of Minnesota.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. at the First Baptist Church with Rev. Jim Hancock, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill cemetery.

First Snowfall Of Winter Brings .67 In Moisture

Snow fell in Ozona for several hours Friday as a cold front passed through the area. Even old timers could not recall snow in early November.

Light rain fell in the early morning, turning to sleet as the temperatures dropped. Large snowflakes began falling around 11 a. m. and continued, melting as they hit the ground, until mid-afternoon when light rain fell until sundown. The official rain gauge at the Water District office recorded .67 of an inch of moisture during the day. This figure was exactly a half an inch more than was recorded for the entire month of October and ranges in the county were hurting for moisture.

More rain is forecast for this weekend when a slow-moving front reaches this area.

WOMACK TO JR. HI. - Faculty Shifts Placed F. Moody As HS Principal

A shift in the faculty of the Ozona school system was effected following Tuesday night's school board meeting to fill the vacancy created by the sudden death of J. A. Pelto, high school principal the past ten years.

Foy Moody, a 13-year veteran of the Ozona faculty, has been named principal of the Ozona High School, moving from his post as principal of the North Elementary school. Mr. Moody has been principal of North Elementary two years. Before that he served eleven years as High School English teacher.

Roy Killingsworth, another long-time member of the faculty here, and principal of the Junior High School for the past 15 years, has been assigned as principal of the North Elementary School and Charles (Chick) Womack, for the past 17 years popular head track coach and physical education teacher in Junior High and High School will move into the post as Junior High principal. Mr. Womack will also continue as Junior High P. E. teacher, while the high school P. E. classes will be assigned to some present member of the faculty, L. B. T. Sikes, superintendent, who made the announcement of the faculty shifts, said.

To succeed Mr. Womack as head track coach will be L. T. (Rip) Sewell. Mr. Sewell, in his first year here, was former head track coach at Plains High School where he had a successful season before accepting a position in the Ozona system.

Lion B Closes Season Tonight With McCamey

The Ozona Lion B team picked up a 21-14 win over the Lee ninth grade squad Thursday afternoon in San Angelo, after a real battle. They will close out the season tonight with the McCamey Badgers here.

Coach Ned Fowler said the San Angelo team was by far the best team the Lion B had come up against all season and that his charges played one of their best games against the bigger, stronger players, making very few mistakes.

Officers Seek Driver Of Hit-Run Car Which Ran Down Ozona Youth

Officers are still searching for a hit-and-run driver who hit and seriously injured Jack Applewhite 8.4 miles north of Ozona Saturday night, as he was trying

to flag it down for help. A fair description of the car was given and it is believed that at least two people were in the car.

Applewhite had been riding around with a friend, Drake McKinney, and they had parked at the new roadside park north of town to listen to stereo tapes. When they tried to start the car about 9:15, the battery failed and young Applewhite walked to the roadside to get aid from a passing motorist.

According to both young men, a vehicle traveling south toward Ozona slowed and was apparently going to stop when suddenly it increased speed and veered toward Applewhite. He turned and ran, but the car hit his leg and mangled his foot, apparently running over it with the right front wheel, before it sped away toward Ozona.

McKinney rushed to his injured friend and was in the process of covering him with a top coat when the car turned around and headed back. Both boys were terrified and McKinney threw himself over Applewhite as the car approached. The car passed by the boys, made a U-turn in the highway and returned, again passing the pair to continue toward Ozona.

McKinney ran for help to the nearby John Childress ranch and accompanied by Childress brought Applewhite to the hospital, where he was transferred to San Angelo for bone surgery. (Continued on Last Page)

Farmer Field Strike Completed

Tyra & Tyra' Midland, completed No. 1-5 University, section 5, block 51, University Land, a San Andres oil discovery 2 1/2 miles south and slightly west of the nearest producer in the Farmer San Andres pool of Crockett County, 2 1/2 miles northwest of Ozona, to pump 10 barrels of 30 gravity oil, plus two barrels of water daily through perforations at 2,221 to 2,332 feet, after injection of 1,500 gallons of acid and 40,000 gallons of fracture fluid.

More Donors Sought - Local Welfare Fund, Used Mostly To Aid Transients, Needs Money

It stages no annual drives but one local welfare organization goes about its highly important relief work day after day in Ozona with a minimum of publicity and a minimum of fund raising.

It is called Crockett County Local Welfare Association, a voluntary organization formed to centralize the task of meeting emergency needs of transient indigents, to get them on the way to their destination and prevent their being stranded in Ozona or mooching donations on their own.

Most troubled transients come to the attention of local officers and, logically, the Welfare Assn. administration is in the hands of Sheriff Billy Mills' office force.

Its monetary needs are modest as welfare organizations go, but it serves a remarkably large number of persons in a year's time. For instance, in 1967, there was expended from the fund a total of \$217.68. With this amount of money, the fund served a total of 149 persons, an average expenditure of \$1.46 per person.

A faithful few make monthly contributions to the fund through bank drafts and a few lump sums. The fund is in need of bolstering since its present bank balance is only \$214.87. Anyone who would like to make a regular contribution or a one-time donation may call Mrs. Gertrude Perry at the sheriff's office or mail a check if it is a lump sum gift.

Wise and Otherwise
Rambling Reflections

Thanksgiving begins to be in the air. Football is coming down to the finish line; basketball looms around the corner; autumn colors begin to be seen and the nip and bite of winter stings exposed ears and fingers early in the morning, while Christmas commercials echo from around the corner.

These are all Thanksgiving indicators. They say a lot about modern American culture. All of them are harmless and some have inner spiritual significance.

But most of them, as most of us who have aided in making them, seem to forget that fundamentally Thanksgiving is a religious observance. As such it originated and as such it has been across the years proclaimed by presidential announcement. Again this year the President will call us to thanksgiving to Almighty God who has blessed us and our nation most abundantly.

Will we individually put religious significance into our observance?

Last week Mrs. Curl and I had the happy opportunity of beginning our celebration of Thanksgiving Season with a most enjoyable occasion at Pandale which was both social and religious in its character.

It began when Mrs. Al Mills, whom I baptized and received into the church 27 years ago while pastor at Del Rio, called and invited us to attend their community observance. She asked me to

speak and no preacher ever turns down an opportunity to be heard. Someone has aptly described a sermon as an oral communication any preacher will travel half a cross the continent to make but will scarcely cross to the street to hear another preacher make.

The day was lovely; our company with Mrs. Ted White, who rode down with us, after having brought the family car in for repairs, was as always enjoyable, and it was a real genuine joy to meet old friends whom we knew in the long ago and reminisce with them.

For while I was pastor in Del Rio during 1940 and 1941, I drove out to Pandale one night each month for services and also held revival services. We came to know and appreciate families such as the Mills, the Malones, the Dameron, the Arledges, and others. There were not many of them then; there are even fewer now since children have grown up and moved away.

But they were ten and still are the salt of the earth and the cream of the earth. They are much the same in heritage, outlook, and character as the pioneers of this community. Their fabric is sturdy and progressive.

I recalled some amusing incidents such as my experience of having my Dodge lock in second gear as I was out a few miles on the gravel road to Comstock and being compelled to travel all the remaining 25 miles in that gear. I remembered how as I complained a little to the repairman in Comstock about the difficulty of such travel he suggested I was just fortunate I didn't lock in reverse and have to back all the way.

Then there was the time when I went out from Del Rio to Juno to visit the Cauthorns and other ranch members of my church en route to preach at Pandale. I, being a tenderfoot, took the wrong road and wound up at the front gate of a ranch house some forty miles out of Ozona where lived the superintendent of the Ozona Methodist Sunday School and failed to be able to get back to Pandale for services on time.

I got my memory refreshed as to who the young couple was whom I visited one afternoon at their home down on the Pecos between Comstock and Pandale. I still have vivid memories of having gotten out to open the gate on the sloping road downhill from the highway into the ranch to have my car roll down and catch my leg between the front bumper and the gate. For a while I had some pretty lively squirming and fears until I finally worked my leg loose. Down at the ranch house I found a young couple where the wife was quite pregnant.

I talked with her, received her confession of faith, baptized and took her into the church. Then as I left the young man of the house looked at me with a squeamish grin on his face and asked me if I could tell them the day of the week stating that their radio was on the blink and they had lost count of the days I sometimes long for that kind of a life and was glad to get again the name of this couple who now must be near 50 years of age and find they live in Detroit. I guess that baby coming then is grown up and has children of his or her own.

Then neither the Malones nor my wife and I can forget the night we went home with them after Church in an open pick-up. Carl had to ride on front to drive and had the wives up with him while I was sitting in the bed of the truck with the young folks, some teenagers and younger, and it rained. But we all had a good time.

The Malones live in Val Verde County and travel 100 miles to the Del Rio Court-house to pay their taxes. But I still remember vividly the quiet and beauty of that high-up home of theirs.

And, of course, we can never forget the many nights we spent with the Dameron and the Henry Mills family, Mrs. Mills being the daughter of the Dameron. My wife gets reminded every Thanksgiving and Christmas when our now grown up children with their own families come home, since one of their inevitable questions is "Mother, did you make any of Je's cookies?" referring to a very special kind, the recipe for which came from Mrs. Mills.

We were also most happy to be with Mrs. Welton Bunker and the Ted Whites, whom we did not know at that time but have come to hold in warm affection since our Ozona days. And it was good to meet the seemingly earnest schoolmaster, Mr. West and his wife.

My! what a Thanksgiving spread. And at least the preacher enjoyed talking about:

"Count your many blessings. Name them one by one. It will surprise you. What the Lord hath done."

Now this little dog was approximately 7 inches tall and I don't see how he could hurt anything. He belonged to two little boys, ages 3 and 5, and it sure was pitiful to see their little faces.

The same evening I came home from work and was told that 2 cats had also died of poison. One cat belonged to my 7-year-old daughter and the other to the boys mentioned above.

Still later the same evening, I was attending a meeting when my wife came in and said that 2 more kittens had died. She went to pieces and said that the mama cat had also died of poison. Now this mama cat was given to my daughter when we moved to Ozona some 4 years ago. I can't for the life of me see what harm 3 little kittens, a mama cat and a little dog can do, but I can certainly understand the harm and tragedy if some child were to get hold of this poison.

I seem to recall about 2 years ago that your Mrs. Montgomery wrote about this sort of thing. The greatest majority of the people of Ozona, or at least those I talked to, agreed with her 100%. Most of those agreed that if their pet was bothering someone or their property that they would be more than glad to remedy the situation. They agreed that to go along and throw poison or something with poison on it into yards and around trash barrels, especially where they knew there were children in the neighborhood, would take some kind of low life creature that you could neither name nor describe.

As a member of the Lions Club and Little League Assn., two organizations that put emphasis on helping the youth of our country, and as the father of four youngsters, I am deeply concerned.

I would urge anyone that sees anyone or suspects anyone doing this to contact the Sheriff's department. I feel confident that they would investigate the matter to the fullest.

In closing I would like to thank the editor for putting this in the paper and ask the low-life creature who is responsible to please notify us dog and cat owners and parents of small children if our pets are bothering you

The Ozona, Northeast 7.5-20 foot Canyon gas field gained its eight, ninth and tenth producers with completion of three Crockett County projects by Tumland, 24 miles northeast of Brown Drilling Co., Inc., Midland.

The No. 1-10 Sinclair-Clayton, 3 1/2 mile northeast and southeast, was finished for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3,120,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 112,727-1. Gravity of the liquid was 64 degrees.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and west lines of 10-1-GC&SF.

The No. 1-11 Sinclair-Clayton, 1/2 mile south and 1 1/2 miles northeast, was finished for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,280,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-ratio of 106,731-1. Gravity of the liquid was 57 degrees.

Location is 1,650 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of 11-1GC&F.

The No. 1-12 Sinclair-Clayton, 1/2 mile south and 1 1/2 mile northeast, was finished for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,252,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 104,842-1. Gravity of the liquid was 59 degrees.

Location is 1,650 feet from the south and 1,320 feet from west lines of 12-1-GC&SF.

Hagelstein is a 1965 graduate of Ozona High School and a senior math major at Abilene Christian.

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


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
