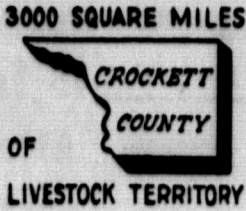

Ozona's Little League All-Star team was chosen by coaches and managers Thursday night and names of team members were announced following the final games.

Fourteen boys were chosen for the team and four alternates. Rex Fenton, manager of the championship Ozona National Bank team, will manage the All-Stars, assisted by Jack Tankersley, coach of the second-place B & B team.

The stars will play their first game in Sonora July 20. Practice started July 6 at 7 p. m.

Moore Oil placed four players on the All-Stars along with B & B Grocers. The Champion Ozona National

Bankers placed three as did Ozona Oilers.

Dr. Curl, Former Ozona Methodist Pastor, Is Dead

Funeral services for Dr. R. F. Curl, 73, were held at 10 a. m. Saturday at the Hunt United Methodist Church with burial in Center Point Cemetery under the direction of Plummer-Fair Funeral Home.

Dr. Curl died Thursday morning at Sid Peterson Memorial Hospital following an illness.

The Rev. Dr. Curl was born July 3, 1897 in Winfield, Ala.; moved to Texas in 1921 and was superintendent of schools at Bandera. He was married to Lessie Waldene Merritt June 8, 1922. He received his B. A. degree in 1921 from Southern Methodist University and in 1932, his M. A. degree from Perkins School of Theology. He was a Methodist minister for churches in Bandera, Harlandale, Bastrop, LaFeria, Merquite, Alice, Brady, San Antonio, Kingsville, Del Rio, Ozona and Hunt.

He served the Ozona United Methodist Church for a two-year period before moving to Hunt in 1969. Under his leadership, the new wing to the church was built.

He was superintendent of three districts of the Southwest Texas Conference of the Methodist Church between 1941 and 1967, including the McAllen, Austin and San Antonio districts.

Dr. Curl was executive secretary of the Southwest Texas Conference of the Methodist Church 1947-1953. He was professor of church administration and director of field work at Perkins School of Theology 1957-63. He was a minister of the United Conference of Methodists, a member of the General Conference of the Methodist Church; delegate to the World Methodist Council in 1961; member of the Council on World Service and Finance of the Methodist Church; a member of the Judicial Council of the Methodist Church, and was a member of the General Board of the National Council of Churches in America.

Two Ozonans Killed When Car Collides With Highway Bridge

Two Ozonans were killed in a grinding one-vehicle crash and another seriously injured Wednesday afternoon 23 miles northwest of Ozona on the Big Lake highway.

Dead are Mrs. Sally Jane Castillo Martinez, 19, and her cousin, Jesus (J) Sanchez, 17. Injured was Jesus Ramirez, also a cousin, who was taken by Janes ambulance to the Big Lake hospital and later trans-

ferred to Crockett County Hospital in fair condition.

The three were traveling south in a late model Oldsmobile when the accident occurred around 4:30 June 30. Mrs. Martinez was driving and lost control at high speed on a curve. The car careened across the highway, hit a bridge and flipped end over end off the bridge, throwing the driver and young Sanchez out of the vehicle. Both were pronounced dead at the scene by Peace Justice A. O. Fields of Ozona.

Double funeral services were held for Mrs. Martinez and Mr. Sanchez from Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church at 5 p. m. Saturday afternoon. Burial was in Lima Cemetery under the direction of Janes Funeral Home.

Mrs. Martinez was born in Ozona July 1, 1951.

Survivors include her fa-

ther and step mother, Mr. and Mrs. Juan Castillo of Calif., two brothers Johnny Castillo and David Castillo, both of California; a sister, Jessica Castillo of Ozona; a grandmother, Mrs. Felicitia Ramirez of Ozona.

Jesus Sanchez was born January 29, 1954 in San Angelo.

Survivors include his father, Jesus Sanchez of Ozona, four brothers, Abel Munoz of North Carolina, Lionel Munoz of Ozona, Richard Sanchez and Eddie Sanchez of Ozona; a half-brother, Eddie Vitela of Ozona, and his grandmother, Mrs. Felicitia Ramirez of Ozona.

Bankers Win 2nd Half To Sweep LL Season

Ozona National Bankers won the second half of Little League play Thursday night when they downed B & B Grocers 10-2, and are the undisputed champions of the season, having also won the first half. The Bankers lost only one game in each half of play.

In second place are the Grocers, who had a second half record of 5-3. Tied for bottom are Ozona Oil and Moore Oil with 2-5 and 2-6 records respectively for the second half of play. Moore Oil lost six straight games in the second half before taking two straight wins, Ozona Oil, the team which downed the Bankers, started the second half of play at the top of the heap, but were unable to hold on.

School Children Must Have Shots To Enroll

Supt. L. B. T. Sikes reminded parents of school children of the recently passed bill by the Texas Legislature which requires immunization against several diseases before admittance to school.

Before enrolling in school this fall all students must show proof of immunization against diphtheria, rubella, rubella, tetanus, poliomyelitis and smallpox.

The bill applies to students enrolling in any elementary or secondary school or institution of higher education with two exceptions. The immunizations are not required if the student presents an affidavit signed by a doctor who is duly registered and licensed under the Medical Practice Act of Texas, in which it is stated that, in the doctor's opinion, the immunization required would be injurious to the health and well-being of the applicant or any member of his family or household.

Several area towns have

set up clinics for mass inoculations, however, no schedule has been set for Ozona. Local parents are urged to begin the series of immunizations as early as possible, in order that they may be completed before school begins in the fall.

The majority of children in the area had a series of three combined inoculations for diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough, as infants. In this case, a booster will be required. For those who have received the series of oral vaccine for polio, a booster will also be required provided an adequate length of time has lapsed. This will effect children in secondary schools more so than those in elementary school or those entering school for the first time.

Students who have not been vaccinated for smallpox over a period of four to six years should check with their physician to ascertain the requirements for immunization.

Parents of children who have had no immunization at all against the diseases mentioned, should begin at once on the series of immunizations and be advised by their physicians of the time lapse between each.

School begins August 23, and proof of immunization will be required at that time from students enrolling for the first time, for those who have attended elementary school previously, for junior high and high school students.

Ozona Man Drowns In River At Christoval

Jesus H. Porras, Jr., of Ozona drowned during a July Fourth outing at Christoval's riverside park Sunday. According to Christoval Peace Justice Hazel Jones, Porras went under the water and was not missed until a young boy at the park told other swimmers that he had seen a man go under. She ruled death due to drowning.

She said that after a number of attempts to recover the body by divers, a number of swimmers formed a circle and moved toward the center, recovering the body.

Funeral services for Porras were held Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock from Our Lady of

Perpetual Help Catholic Church with burial in Lima Cemetery under the direction of Janes Funeral Home.

Funeral services for Porras were pending at Janes Funeral Home at press time.

Porras was born August 29, 1951 in Ozona.

Survivors include his wife of Ozona; two children, Norma and Delma, of the home; six brothers, Isidoro Porras of Florence, Santos Porras of Florida, Dario Porras, Sostenes Porras, Joe Porras and Johnny Porras, all of Ozona; four sisters, Inez Hernandez of Colo., Connie Elizalda, of Cisco, Lupe Ramirez of Dallas and Angela Enriquez of Midland.

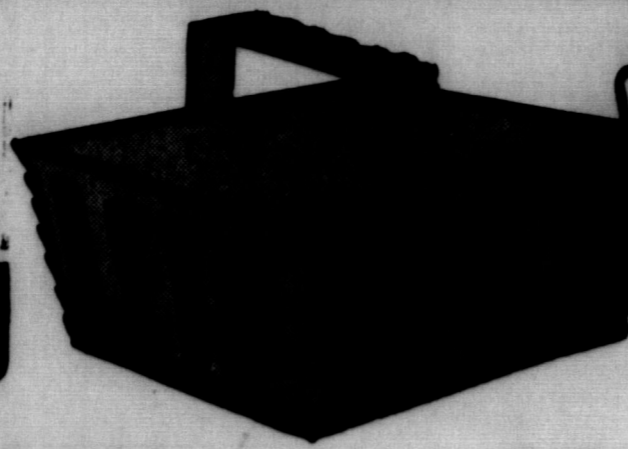

Treating Symptoms Instead of Disease

A great deal of controversy has been raised in the past few months on the quality of news coverage, with particular reference to the electronic media.

But the interesting light to develop out of all this heat is that so far the vice president has not come out in support of the fight being waged by William Buckley Jr.

The well known commentator has taken the position that for him, or any other commentator, to have to belong to a union in order to stay on the air is completely ridiculous and more importantly, illegal.

This is basically the same position that was taken by Chet Huntley and as the Buckley battle has revealed, the rules of the unions controlling broadcasting provide that the union can take steps if any newscaster or commentator issues statements the union feels are not in the union's best interests.

Thus, if there is a real, and honest concern with the quality of news coverage, then instead of attacking the symptoms, it would be more in line to attack the disease.

And while much of the current criticism is leveled against the heads of the networks, perhaps their only sin was failure to recognize the old maxim that no man can serve two masters. The press god of objectivity and the mammon of union dialectics are not compatible.

Thus, if they had been willing to bite the financial bullet
