





THE 'LAND REFORM' GAMBIT McGovern apparently thinks would be a good idea, for he endorses Mr. Barnes' articles. Specifically, Mr. Barnes wrote that one "major area for change involves redistribution

> on Japan after World War II." in other words, landowners in the United States are to be treated as conquered foreign-

ers were treated.

Mr. Barnes is very explicit in his revolutionary thinking. saying that the "guiding principles behind redistribution are that land should belong to those who work and live on it, and that holdings should be of reasonable, not feudal proportions, " That's the type of notion one hears in Castro's Cuba, it hasn't anything to do with American concepts of law or with American traditions of economic freedom and individual

Mr. Barnes would have the government begin its revolutionary land program by using the Reclamation Act of 1902 to force landowners in the West to sell their property to the government. His notion is that the government would obtain "all property too big or owned by absentees," He favors a 160-acre limitation on individual landhold-

The misnamed "land reform" proposed by Mr. Barnes is a design for stripping Americans of their right to own land -- a right as old as the first settlement of this count ry. Countless numbers of people settled on these shores n order to own land and to avoid a powerful central authority that asserted claims to all property possessed by its subjects. The settlers of America wanted land -- lots of land. They regarded ownership of land as a guarantee and symbol of their freedom, if the day come when falsely labeled "land reform" denies Americans the right to buy and hold all the land they can afford and wish to buy, then

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



Shell Oil Co., Midland, will drill an 8, 800-foot wild-cat in Crockett County, nine miles northwest of Iraan, five miles northwest of the depleted Meek (Strawn and Canyon) field and one location southeast of the depleted Hanson (Grayburg field. It is the No. 1 Carpenter. Location is 617 feet from the

south (Pecos River) and 467 feet from the west lines of 88-1-1&GN. It is approximately 200 feet northeast of a 1, 699foot Ellenburger failure, abandoned May 27, 1970. It recovered oil-and-gas-cut salt water on a drillstem test of the Ellenburger at 7, 620-650 feet; and salt water on a test at 6, 497-573 feet.

McCulloch Oil Corp., Mid-land, will drill a 7,500-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crock-ett County, 26 miles northwest to rapid growth, Replies conof Ozona, one mile southwest of the depleted one-well Pil-

low (Clearfork) field and seven miles southwest of Ellenburger production in the Escondido multipay field. It is the No. 1 Shannon.

Location is 900 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of RI chard Pillow No. 1.

It is i mile east of Contin-ental Oil Co. No. 1-B Shannon, a 7, 320-foot failure, abandoned in August, 1951. It topped the Wolfcamp at 5, 760 feet and the Ellenburger at 7, 240 feet on elevation of 2,600 feet.


