It's taxpaying time and voter registration time. Crockett county taxpayers became obligated for 1969 taxes which became payable yesterday and must be paid sometime between now and February 1, when interest and penalty apply.

Beginning at the same time, Texas voters may register to vote in 1970. Every person of voting age must register to become eligible to vote --- there are no exemptions
